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Four from MCC at Meeting of College Council

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7 Million Due for Pay Hike

WASHINGTON (AP)—Some 7 million workers will be up for wage hikes in 1967 in new labor talks or previously negotiated contracts, and James R. Hoffa's Teamsters Union leads off the parade.

The Labor Department reports the round of major negotiations will be the biggest in recent years, covering airline pilots, auto workers, food processors, railroad employees and workers in textile, rubber, paper, telephone and many other industries.

The government's figures cover only contracts involving 1,000 workers and smaller cases will bring the total number of workers involved considerably higher.

Information on contracts covering 34 additional 1.7 million workers wasn't available for the labor department's report.

Of the 7 million workers listed, more than 3 million will be involved in new contracts. Hoffa, starting negotiations next month for some 400,000 Teamsters, is leading a national trucking contract, opens the first of the major new contract negotiations.

Reportedly planning to demand a 7 percent hike in wages and fringe benefits, but possibly settling for 5 percent, Hoffa's Teamsters will set the tone for the size of expected 1967 labor demands.

Although wage settlements averaged 3.7 percent in 1966, the pattern moved toward a 5 percent in the latter part of the year in major agreements covering airlines pilots, auto workers and electrical industry workers.

The airlines suffered a six-week strike before that settlement. Hoffa's Teamsters are one of many of next year's affected industries expected to renew demands for similar legislation.

The labor department report noted that, with the past year's big hike in consumer prices, cost-of-living escalator demands have again become a prime labor goal.

There was no immediate comment from the White House. "We write," the students said, "in hope that this letter will encourage a frank discussion of these problems. Bay State Calls Interest Conflict Probe of Bellotti Simoncelli Leaves Post Office

BOSTON (AP)—Atty. Gen. Edward W. Brooke has called for a penetrating investigation of charges of conflict of interest on the part of Francis J. Bellotti when he was lieutenant governor.

Brooke announced Thursday he is turning the investigation over to his assistant, Herbert P. Travers Jr., chief of the criminal division. Brooke said he had empowered Travers to conduct examination of witnesses before a grand jury which can issue subpoenas and take sworn testimony.

The charge was hurled at Bellotti at the height of the contest for attorney general's title. Bellotti was the Democratic nominee. His accuser, Elliot L. Richardson, now the Republican lieutenant governor, defeated Bellotti Nov. 8.

Richardson produced documents which showed that Bellotti was paid \$12,000 during the two years he was lieutenant governor in 1964-66 by Nationwide Insurance group, of Columbus, Ohio.

The records showed the company reported the payment "for legal services rendered which cover representation in connection with routine matters arising with the Massachusetts Insurance Department."

A couple of days after the charge was made, Bellotti produced a telegram from the company asserting it erred in describing his duties that way.

A week ago officials of the company filed amended reports with the insurance department, but Brooke says he is not satisfied with the information provided.

When the charge first was made, Brooke attempted to bring the question before a grand jury, but officials of the company said they could not provide the documents or witnesses required in the short time left before the election.

Brooke said he then appointed a former assistant, Edward M. Swartz, regarded as an expert in the conflict of interest law to review the entire matter.

He said that Swartz filed a 51-page report, plus 145 pages of exhibits, and that his own study of this report convinced him an in-depth investigation should be conducted.

Simoncelli who became postmaster after John G. Talcott Sr. retired in 1964, said when he started the post office was located in the old Talcott Brothers Store. The first postmaster was Samuel Talcott.

Postal headquarters are now located in a new building in the center of Talcottville constructed by Franklin Wetles. When Simoncelli started out it was a fourth class operation and as of January it will be first class.

Simoncelli noted in 1964 the operation grossed about \$2,500 and this has grown to over \$44,000 as of this year. He said the service is used not only by Talcottville residents but people from Rockville, Vernon, Manchester, Wapping and Stafford Springs.

Simoncelli pointed out people use the office because it is convenient for those traveling to Hartford and there is plenty of parking space.

Mrs. Simoncelli, the former Allice Talcott, a native of Talcottville, has assisted her husband throughout his term as postmaster. She noted they have seen many changes in the area, pointing out especially that the "Talcottville Post" has grown from one small service station to a whole chain of service stations and other commercial enterprises.

The Simoncellis said when the "Voice of the Andes" a missionary radio station, was located in town, mail was regularly sent all over the world. The Allen Spinning Mill, located in the center on Rt. 83, also does a great deal of international corresponding, the couple noted.

Simoncelli plans to enjoy his retirement by concentrating on his flower garden and doing some traveling. He is also an accomplished vocalist and sings in the choir of the Talcottville Congregational Church.

The couple have one son, Morris Simoncelli, who is a postmaster in the town of Japan. Japan Air Lines and presently in charge of the East Coast operation. They have two grand-sons, aged six and seven.

Mrs. Frances W. Beebe is assistant postmaster. The usual procedure for appointing a new postmaster is through the district post offices in Rockville and in Vernon, besides the Talcottville one.

Approval Sought Of Mobile Home Park For Elderly

HARTFORD (AP)—The General Assembly will be asked soon to authorize a state-developed model mobile home park for retired and elderly persons.

A study commission of members of the State Commission on Services for Elderly Persons and the State Public Works Department will make the recommendations.

The commission was formed by the 1964 General Assembly to study the costs and feasibility of such a park.

A 100-space park with a community office and service building and outside recreational areas would cost about \$500,000, the commission said.

Occupants would be persons over 60 and living on retirement or social security benefits.

The state would make a payment in lieu of real estate taxes to the local community.

Priority of admission would be given to residents of communities with no public rental housing for the elderly.

The State Public Works Commissioner would plan, develop and manage the park.

Tolland \$7,463 State Aid Approved For Reading Center Project

The Tolland school system has received approval for a special program grant of \$7,463 from the state to implement a special reading center program providing specialized instruction for students in the fourth through eighth grades.

The plan was presented to the State Department of Education by its originators, School Supt. Robert Briarson, specialized reading instructor Vincent LaMo and guidance director Andrew Wilkins.

The new program is designed to provide specialized group and individual instruction when necessary. Emphasis will also be placed on reading enrichment and study skills for eligible students.

Plans call for flexibility to best meet student needs and to provide the greatest value for every dollar received in state aid, Briarson explained.

The reading center will be in the high school, around the library, which contains both instructional and remedial material centers and the separate remedial reading laboratory being installed across the hall.

British Duo Lady Bird Cracks Top 12 Hits List of Best Dressed

LONDON (AP) — Two British fashion designers attached to the New York fashion industry's 1966 list of best dressed women. One said most of the 12 women were "imitation Jackie Kennedys."

"They turn out to be young women who dress like their mothers," wrote Priscilla Tucker in the Daily Mail.

With the striking exception of Sophia Loren, said Shirley List in the Daily Sketch, "it is a list of safe rather than risky dresses. So if you expect your fashion plates to have impact, you will find these a disappointment."

Miss Flack said the list, in which Mrs. Kennedy's sister, Priscilla Beaulieu, ranked No. 1, was "predictable" and "not certainly the silliest" in the American fashion field.

"There are no Englishwomen and certainly no miniskirts," Miss Tucker wrote, "though Princess Radziwill is said to have raised her hem slightly above the knees. The truth is, of course, that the best of the list are not even able to forget that it is Christmas."

Miss Flack noted that Princess Radziwill hit the top spot in the list elevated to the fashion "Hall of Fame."

"The daily Sketch writes: 'The top of the list is a list of imitation Jackie Kennedys in the neat, narrow, little girl way that is now considered the typical all-American look.'"

Notices are now being mailed to approximately 15,000 Manchester property owners, informing them of their assessments under revaluation, based on 1966 values, and listing the days on which they may appear to discuss the new valuations and assessments.

Representatives of the United Appraisal Co., which conducted the revaluation, will hold sessions in the Municipal Building Hearing Room from 1 to 7 p.m. on all weekdays from Jan. 5 through Jan. 17.

The hearings are scheduled to correspond with the first of the taxpayer's last names: Jan. 5, A and B; Jan. 6, C and D; Jan. 7, E, F, and G; Jan. 8, H and J; Jan. 9, K and L; Jan. 10, M, N and O; Jan. 11, P, Q and R; Jan. 12, S, T, U, V, W, X, Y and Z.

Taxpayers not satisfied with the results of the informal hearings may appeal to the Board of Review, which will meet in late February and early March.

The revaluation, the first in 10 years, will be the basis for the 1967-68 tax levy, to be set in May for the first year beginning July 1, 1967.

The new assessments will represent 40 per cent of the market value of property. The town has been assessing on the basis of 72 per cent of value since coming along when the Town Assessor P. Joseph Murphy, in a letter accompanying the new assessments, has cautioned taxpayers not to multiply the assessment figure by the current 42 1/2 per cent tax rate.

He notes that the new assessments will result in an increased Grand List (tax base), and that, unless there are substantial increases in the General Fund Budget, the mill rate should drop for the next fiscal year.

He notes, further, that the assessments do not show any exemptions of the taxpayer's veterans, blind, farmers, or other categories which are to be deducted later.

Taxpayers who wish to appeal their personal property assessments also may appear before the informal reviews by the Board of Review, which will hold hearings will be held on Jan. 15-16, also from 1 to 7 p.m. in the Hearing Room.

Town Schools May Share In Federal Aid Programs

Manchester's public and parochial schools may be in line to share in a portion of the \$2.6 million in federal aid to be allotted Connecticut during fiscal 1967 under three federal school aid programs.

In the last fiscal year under one of the programs—Title II of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act—all 11 town and Catholic schools received varying amounts totaling nearly \$27,000 for the purchase of library books and audio visual supplies.

Today, Dr. William J. Sanders, state commissioner of education, announced that Connecticut during the current fiscal year will receive slightly over \$2.6 million for Title II of ESEA and two sections of the National Defense Education Act (NDEA), according to notification received from Washington.

The total represents an increase of about half a million dollars over the amount the state was allotted in the fiscal year under the same three programs.

The Connecticut State Department of Education is charged with distributing money to local school systems under the two acts.

Title II will get the biggest slice of funds, \$1,424,683. Last year, the state's allotment under this title was \$1,392,995.

According to Ralph W. Goody, state department's Title II administrator, practically all of these funds were used.

He said it will take at least a month for the department to determine the amount each town will be allowed of the state's total.

The also get allotments of \$492,466 under Title III and \$332,032 under Title V of the National Defense Education Act. Both amounts are up somewhat from last year.

Title III awards money to towns on a matching basis for equipment and materials to improve elementary and secondary school instruction in science, mathematics, social studies, modern foreign languages, English and reading.

Under Title V of the NDEA, towns will be granted \$332,032 for school guidance, counseling and testing.

Sanders said it will take at least a month to determine how much money will go to each town.
