

New Navy Jet Bomber 'Confidential' Tag Lifted from Corsair

WASHINGTON (AP)—The maintenance questioned Air Force quietly has lifted the "confidential" label from its A-7 Corsair II, a lightweight jet bomber which ultimately may carry a tele-guided missile.

The Corsair was designed specifically to meet the needs of limited war, such as the United States is encountering in Vietnam.

In the next five years the Navy and the Air Force are expected to purchase nearly 1,600 Corsairs for an estimated \$1.5 billion.

An industry source confirmed that the Air Force recently lifted its original purchase from \$70 to around \$90.

Both the Corsair and the tele-guided missile, known as Walleye, are expected to enter the combat inventory this year, albeit in very limited numbers.

There are reports the Navy hopes to have at least 35 Corsairs in fleet operation sometime this spring.

In time, according to Pentagon sources, the Navy may hope to replace all propeller-driven bombers now in Vietnam with single jet Corsairs.

The Corsair, built by Ling-Temco-Vought at Fort Worth, Tex., has roughly twice the ordnance capacity of propeller planes in Vietnam.

The Corsair, which has a large, T-shaped dive brake under its belly, is designed for pinpoint bombing in direct support of ground troops and for bombing missions over enemy territory where the United States flies.

Coroner Blames Motorist For Miss Muldoon's Death

The report states that Schechter was unable to describe the details of the mishap to police except that he saw a lady running across the street and he "jammed his brakes, but hit her."

Schechter commended Patrolman Dam for the excellence of his investigation.

The Trend Is Back To Reality

NEW YORK (AP) — Once network television gets past the New Year parades and football games, it will present viewers with almost a dozen new shows to sample and a lot of schedule changes. The so-called "second season" starts around Jan. 6.

But for those network executives who decide what we shall see and when we shall see it, the 1966-67 television season is already history, and not very happy history at that. They are now concentrating on the programs and schedules for next September.

CBS hopes to have its entire 1967-68 schedule "locked in" by Washington's Birthday, and NBC and ABC cannot afford to be far behind. For competitive and sales reasons, all three are trying to keep their plans and programs a secret.

Already, we know a few shows that will be arriving nine months hence — NBC's new Danny Thomas series and CBS' Carol Burnett comedy programs. There will be about 25 more when fall rolls around — fewer than usual because those two-hour movie returns take up a lot of time.

The one thing that makes television programming an expensive gamble is that a few men must try to guess now what viewers will be interested in watching months ahead — and viewers are notoriously fickle.

In this high stakes game, with millions of dollars in development money invested, the Nielsen ratings are more helpful than a crystal ball. Currently the Nielsen numbers indicate that we want more situation comedy and outdoor adventure.

A couple of seasons ago, situation comedy was as out of fashion as congress gaiters.

"There is an obvious trend toward reality, in comedy as well as other types of programs," said one network executive.

"It seems clear and marked. In comedy, 'family affair' appeals — and that is humor with heart and appeal. It is also clear that the fantasy (See Page Four)

It's Still 'Dragnet' But Friday's Demoted

NEW YORK — The world's most famous television cop will soon be back on the air — and the only thing new about him will be the fact that he has been demoted.

Jack Webb, star and producer of NBC's new "Dragnet" series, which will be colorcast Thursdays 9:30-10 p.m. starting Jan. 12, says that Joe Friday will be the same man the fans enjoyed during the series' prize-winning days of the 50's. But when the series went off the air in 1959, Joe Friday had been promoted to lieutenant. He'll drop back down to sergeant in the new series.

"Having Joe Friday as a lieutenant was a mistake. It limited us too much," explains Webb, a stickler for reality. "Sure, we could have Lt. Joe Friday running out to investigate every crime in his area, or questioning suspects at the drop of a hat, but if we did, we would be lying about the true duties of a detective lieutenant."

"The sergeants are the guys who do the questioning and the leg work — and that's what I want Friday to be doing, so there goes his promotion."

Will there be plenty of blazing gunfights and scenes where Sgt. Friday captures a whole gang of hoods all by himself?

"Absolutely not," says Webb. "Los Angeles detectives work in teams. They would never, never try to pull off a one-man gang round-up — and neither will Joe Friday. And good cops very seldom find themselves in a position where they have to shoot it out with a criminal."

"Friday and his partner will have to use their guns once in a while, but it will be the ex-

ception rather than the rule." Webb says he has two strong reasons for demanding true and believable action on the new shows:

"First of all, because the audience has come to expect an honest, no-gimmicks, police show from 'Dragnet' — and secondly because if we started getting cute and wild with the facts, the Los Angeles Police Department would slam their doors in my face."

Webb says that there are some minor changes in his TV stories, but they are only to protect people who were innocently involved in a crime, or even to protect a former criminal who has served his time and

Well, Everybody Likes a Rose

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC has been televising the annual Tournament of Roses parade for the past 15 years. CBS got into the act about a decade ago. And next Monday, ABC will have its color cameras, too, on the

scene. This kind of three-network coverage is the sort of thing usually reserved for space shots.

The logical question would seem to be why all this concentration on one parade sponsored

by the Chamber of Commerce of a city which is a Los Angeles suburb.

A valid answer is hard to come by. But it seems to be the one used to explain why men try to climb Mount Everest. Because it is there — and it is also there on a day when most families are at home taking life easy.

Betty White, who will once again preside over NBC's broadcast, describing the floats, identifying the bands and admiring the horseflesh for the 14th year in a row, thinks the Rose Parade gets so much attention "because it is unique in its field — more like a huge extravaganza than a parade."

Paul Levitan, CBS special events director in charge of parade coverage, says it is because "everybody loves a parade — the bands, the excitement." In fact, he envisions a time when, with the help of satellites, parade-hungry Americans can see live coverage of Bastille Day celebrations in Paris, the feasts of flowers in Barcelona, even Chinese New Year in Hong Kong.

The parade involves a lot of work for the on-camera people, Betty White says. On Saturday she and some 100 NBC people will attend a four-hour production meeting to receive their instructions. On Sunday there is a long rehearsal for the commercials and to get acquainted with the descriptions of the floats printed on large cardboard cue cards.
