Bailey Says Di Salvo Is 'Strangler'

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—Attorney F. Lee Bailey told a Superior Court jury today a mental patient on trial on assault charges had committed 13 murders in the period between June 1962 to January 1964.

"For a period of 18 months, 13 acts of homicide were committed by a completely uncontrollable and vegetative walking around in a human body," Bailey told the all-male jury.

Albert DeSalvo, 35, who claims to be the Boston stranger, on trial on charges of assaulting four women in their suburban Boston homes in late 1964. The charges are not related to the series of stranglings.

Bailey, in his opening statement, said he would not dispute that DeSalvo committed the actions for which he is being tried.

The defense attorney said he would call 20 psychiatrists who would testify in support of his contention that DeSalvo was insane at the time the crimes for which he is charged were committed.

"There is a facet to his personality which he cannot control," Bailey said. "He has no ability to control his actions."

Bailey outlined DeSalvo's background saying "as a child he was cruelly, brutally mistreated, exposed to the most devious conduct so that his ideas were warped."

He said DeSalvo was taught to shoplift when he was 6 years old and later taught to be a burglar.

Some Signs Seen Toward Easier Credit

WASHINGTON (AP)—Monday remains tight in many parts of the nation but signs of easier credit are mounting.

The first hint of the 5 percent prime interest rate that banks charge their favored customers for loans came Wednesday when a relatively small Minnesota institution reduced its rate from 6 percent to 5.75 percent.

Isolated action by the National City Bank of Minneapolis surprised many bankers but it was hailed by the Treasury Department.

Treasury is heartened and pleased at this early movement in the direction of lower interest rates that President Johnson has advocated in the State of the Union message.

President Johnson, in proposing a 5 percent surcharge on income and corporate taxes Tuesday night in his message to Congress, said it was partly designed to keep the economy growing without new inflationary strain and to move toward a more credit and lower interest rates.

The Minneapolis bank's action, although unique, was not the only sign of an easing of credit.

First National City Bank, New York's largest, announced a cut in the interest rate it will pay on some long-term certificates of deposit.

The rate since last spring has been 5.5 percent on certificates maturing in 30 days and the First National City cut the rate on maturities of nine months and longer to 5.25 percent.

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South Vietnam, who has been making steady gains lately. Where it has been his usual style to scorn the very idea of negotiations, he has now expressed his willingness to meet President Ho Chi Minh of North Vietnam in some third country to talk peace. In other statements, he has been saying that negotiations are getting closer every day. When asked to explain this, he says this is because our side is winning the war so speedily and conclusively. But, at the same time, the censorship of his government is permitting the newspapers of Saigon to carry news about various world initiatives for peace. By the rule of the game, it is about time for Premier Ky to lead the first United States man bombing of Hanoi, just in case Hanoi thinks he is getting soft.

Super Super Super
The first really super thing about it is that it is a super fraud.

It is the temporary simulation of a world's crisis in professional football which was dangled before Congress and before the public in order to get them both to agree to the eventual elimination of all chances of real competition and real world series events, between two rival leagues.

Conceived as a super fraud, it may conceivably prove a super game. It is played on the field. We have no instinct to fault either of the teams. One of them, we are sure, is a real football team; the other may succeed in becoming one for the occasion.

But the other super attributes for the game and the day are dubious. We doubt that it is really the super super most realistic.

It is to say that everyone, on both sides, feels concerned primarily with the necessity of not surrendering whatever bargaining power it may have gained through its efforts in the military field, the world political arena, or the propaganda battle.

If we keep this wariness in mind, we find it easier to understand a number of things which otherwise seem infuriatingly hazy, or hatefully obtuse.

Using this rule, one can, for instance, almost understand some of the recent developments on the nebulous Vietnam peace front.

The other day Premier Van Dong of North Vietnam told Harrison Salisbury of the New York Times that Hanoi's often stated four points for peace were not things that had to be accepted and accomplished before negotiations could open, but merely the conditions that any reasonable negotiation must meet.

There was the other evening, a first edition, on Educational TV, Channel 24, of a program called "Variations On a Literary Theme." It presented, in the full flower of its versatility, virtuosity, scholarship, human insight and sense of being possessed of life and wit, Professor John Dando of Trinity College.

This was the same, and yet not the same, John Dando of long time distinction in radio discussion of books, of suave urbanity on a certain portion of commercial television, of lucidness and depth in the memorial reading of T. S. Eliot on the Trinity campus last spring.

In "Variations On a Literary Theme" all these preparatory Dandos of the past were merged into what might be called the ultimate Dando, the richest display of sense and wit, learning and fun, sound and force, ever presented in any minute span of entertainment in any medium anywhere.

Never stated, half-hidden, but nevertheless implicit in this performance was one of the noblest and most beautiful of truths: that the best of human genius can speak when its medium allows it, and the artist so will it, transposing magic to the most ordinary among us. With a hand from Dando, we peasants found ourselves standing, for this swift of intervals, on Mount Olympus, and were god-like.

"Variations On a Literary Theme" is scheduled for Monday evenings, Channel 24, at 7:45.

One thing you have to say about our affable governor. He is an incurable optimist.

How you provide all these new services and new programs without increasing taxes is something that never happened and never will and nobody knows it better than John N. Dempsey.

Perhaps the best comment on this inaugural speech came from A. Seaside Finney, Republican state chairman, who said, "The speech covered the usual front and I don't think it can be properly evaluated until the budget message puts the final seal on the bones. At that point we can make a better judgment."
