





One Scoundrel's Game Is Up There has never been a good cause in history which hasn't had some scoundrel latching himself on to it and then trying to hide behind it when he himself comes under attack for being a scoundrel.

When such a scoundrel is identified, and the good he is associated with is high and holy, there are two normal certainties. First, the attack upon him for being a scoundrel is muted and delayed for a long time, and sometimes perhaps never really launched, out of deference to his position as symbol of the good cause. Second, those who are enlisted in that good cause feel almost automatically compelled to come to the aid of the scoundrel, even though, sadly, they may know the truth about him, and calculate that the net result may

be damage to the cause itself. Now, in the case of one Washington scoundrel, the game is up. The immunity, he so long enjoyed because of his association with a particular cause has been destroyed, by his own bold and joyous excesses, by the final recognition of necessity for some kind of moral and legal line somewhere on the part of his peers.

This is good news, in two ways. resents the right thing happening to this particular scoundrel.

It is good news, in the second place, because it establishes a sharp precedent for the treatment and judgment of some other known scoundrels on the same Washington scene.

They, too, are sometimes gifted in the business of associating themselves with some high and holy cause, and then trying to hide their persona venality and hypocrisy behind it. They, too, are gifted and clever in making the claim that anybody who ever questions their conduct is in reality an enemy of the good cause with which they have Identified themselves. They, too, employ the argument that the possible immoralities and illegalities of their own conduct are nothing worse than those

of other colleagues. But the fact that one just and long overdue piece of judgment has now fallen upon one of their number means that there is no longer, in this particular period of time at least; any automatic immunity for any one else who has been treating public office as if it were some carnival confidence game.

The Pacification Of Bensuc

Nothing illustrates more pitifully the tortured nature of the war we find ourselves fighting in Vietnam-it must seem unnatural and unpleasant even to the most hardened military men engaged in carrying it out-than the story of what is now happening to the village called Bensuc.

Bensuc is only 30 miles from Saigon, capital of South Vietnam, center of American power in Vietnam. Despite that close proximity, neither

we nor our South Vietnamese allies

have ever been able to find any way of making Bensuc a place we could trust. Its 3,800 people are considered at least tacit supporters of the Vietcong. It is believed to be used by the Victoria for meetings. For all the long months and now years of the war effort, this aggregation of huts and small shops, in the suburbs of Saigon, has remained a pain-

Now this problem is being solved, by the operation of some 600 trooms mostly Americans. They have moved into Bensue, sorting out and classifying its 3,800 residents. Forty-one men who tried to escape were tracked and killed, as authentic Vietcong. The remainder of the population is now to be moved, in mass, to another site, 20 miles away, where another village will be constructed, and where they can be watched, to see they no longer maintain their contacts with the Victoria, and indoctrimated, so they no longer like the Viet-

cong anyway. When the 3,800 inhabitants of the village have all been moved to their new the bulldozers will move in and

We do have a receptive attitude toward any evidence or testimony which tends to relate the modern increase in this particular disease to circumstances which have in themselves shown some modern change. There has been no increase in smoking, there has been no increase in poverty comparable to the increase in the incidence of this disease. There has been a sharp modern increase in the industrial and automotive waste pollution of the air most of us breathe.

Yesterday on Wall Street, when the second rather furious day in a row was unreeling itself, the tickers that tell the investors and the world what the investors are doing with stock prices ran, at 'one time, as much as 19 minutes behind the actual progress of transactions on the Exchange. In order to keep this close, the tick-

ers had to run at a speed in which they flashed no fewer than 900 characters a minute at brokers and investors. But to speed the tapes beyond that, in order to try to catch up to a faster market, would, in the words of the experts in such matters, "cross the threshold of human discrimination."

In fact, it takes a practiced observer to be able to make sense out of the tape when it is moving at 900 characters a minute. Back in the days before the computers, when the tapes could move only at

a maximum of 285 quotations a minute, the lag between transactions and quotations could run into a matter of So the gratitude owed to the computers is demonstrably great.
