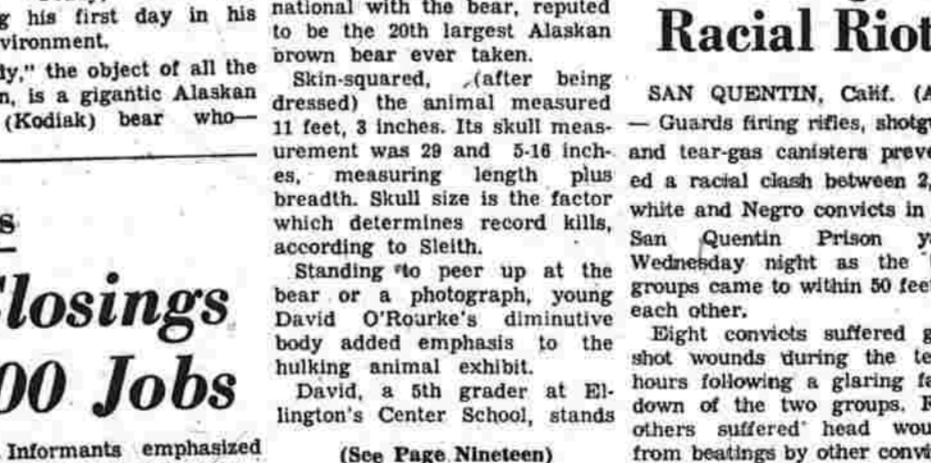

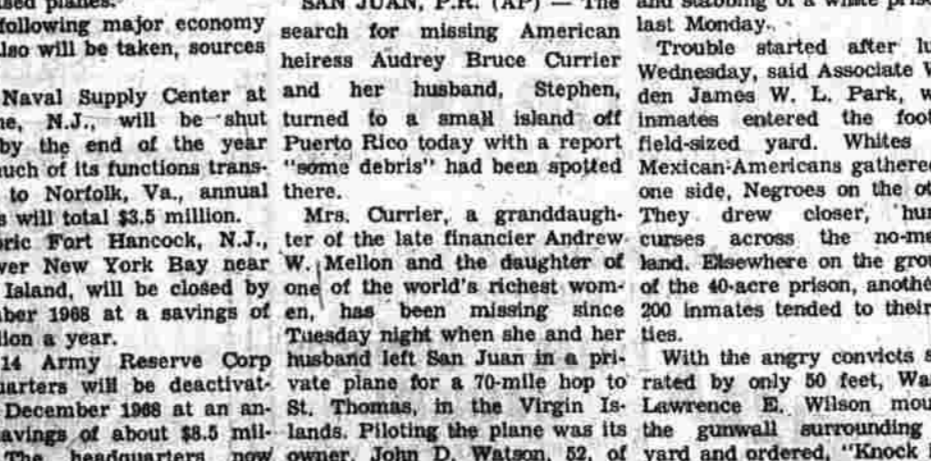

Subzero cold along the nation's northern border states produced New England's coldest morning of the winter to date, then continued a retreat as snow drove eastward off the Pacific and northeastward through the Appalachians.

The day's bitterest cold, in New York's northern Adirondacks and interior New England, included 14 below zero at Lebanon, N.H., 12 below at Montpelier, Vt., 23 below at Houlihan, Maine, and 30 below at Watkins, N.Y.

You can tell it's getting cold when the trees snap," said a spokesman for the New York Ranger School at Watkins, N.Y., "but we're accustomed to it."

There was no such complacency about a snowstorm that struck Washington, D.C., bedeviling the morning rush hour and prompting Weather Bureau warnings of a three- to six-inch accumulation.

The Eastern storm began during the night as freezing rain that glazed the streets and highways in northern and central Louisiana, southeastern Arkansas and central Mississippi. It deposited five inches of snow at London, Ky., and in the eastern Tennessee mountains, up to four inches at Whitesville, Va., Crandall, Miss., and in North Carolina's Great Smoky Mountains National Park.

Mrs. James A. Birdsall, wife of the vicar of St. Peter's Episcopal Church, Wapping, says she cherishes the many wonderful recipes, mostly for German dishes, which she inherited from her mother and grandmother. One which she makes often is Kartoffel Klosee (Potato Dumplings) which she serves with Sauerkraut. To complement the main course she makes Rotkohl (Red Cabbage) and sometimes includes Beet Salad.

Kartoffel Klosee (Potato Dumplings)
 6 medium potatoes, unpeeled
 2 eggs, slightly beaten
 1/2 cup flour
 1/2 cup bread crumbs
 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
 1 teaspoon salt
 bread

Boil potatoes in jackets until cooked. Remove from water, peel and let cool. Put through ricer. Add eggs and remainder of ingredients, except bread, and mix thoroughly. If mixture is too moist, add a little more flour.

Cut bread into small cubes and toast. Form potato mixture into medium sized balls and insert three or four bread cubes into each ball.

Drop potato balls into rapidly boiling, slightly salted water. When balls float to top of water, begin to time cooking and let boil for 10 to 15 minutes. Remove with slotted spoon. Serve with sauerkraut or pot roast and gravy.

Left over Kartoffel Klosee may be sliced and sauteed in butter.

Sauerkraut
 3 pounds bottom round steak
 1 cup water
 1 cup vinegar
 1/2 cup sugar
 Dash pepper
 1 medium onion, sliced
 1 teaspoon salt
 3 bay leaves

Four water and vinegar over meat; slice onions over meat and add remaining ingredients. Allow to stand 48 hours, turning several times. Remove from liquid and cool. Cut into a pot roast. Use some of the strained liquid to make gravy. A few crushed ginger snaps add flavor to the gravy.

 1 tart apple, grated
 5 tablespoons brown sugar
 1/2 cup water

8 Satellites In Test Orbit, May Be 'Spies'

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Eight new communications satellites are being launched today, undergoing tests to qualify them as carriers of secret messages between far-flung U.S. military bases.

The eight were launched from Cape Kennedy Wednesday by an Air Force Titan 2 rocket that sprayed them like beachballs into

separate orbits 21,000 miles up. They joined seven other identical payloads sent up last June.

The first seven already are spreading messages among eight ground stations. Emphasis is on traffic between Washington and Vietnam.

Col. W. T. Olson of the Defense Communications Agency said the new batch would be tested several weeks, and hopefully would be operational this summer. They were ejected from the rocket at slightly different speeds so they gradually

Salisbury's Alternatives
The final conclusion Harrison Salisbury, assistant managing editor of the New York Times, brought back from his visit to North Vietnam is that the war "appears to be entering a new phase—one that may lead to eventual settlement or to a sudden and extreme escalation."

As against the Salisbury verdict that the war seems to be approaching a turning point, which will either bring leading toward peace, or turn sharply toward "sudden and extreme" escalation, the consensus view would seem to be that we are now in for a long pull in Vietnam in which we may go for a very long time without any very important changes in the situation for anybody.

That was the way President Johnson described the war situation. It is about what we all expect. It is pretty much what most of us think is the minimum we can do in Vietnam, grind on as we are, perhaps, inertly, with less need for offensive action and therefore, fewer casualties per week.

Salisbury, on the other hand, coming out from the other side of the war, and exposed to feeling and theory there as well as to his own analysis and that of his colleagues of what real prospects are on the American side of the future conduct of the war, postulates a turning point.

Apparently, he does not believe the war can level itself off and then follow such a level indefinitely.

war in Vietnam will be in difficult, tortured, but nevertheless relatively peaceful progress, or the world's military giants will be engaging one another directly on Vietnamese soil, and perhaps elsewhere.

Can States Afford Illusion?
