



### Conrad Will Chair Charter Commission

Manchester's 1967 Charter Revision Commission, in an organizational meeting last night, chose Donald S. Conrad, a Republican, as its chairman; Atty. John R. Fitzgerald, a Democrat, vice chairman; and Miss Elmer M. Hashim, a Republican, as secretary.

All were unanimous choices. The Charter Revision Commission, Conrad and Miss Hashim were nominated by Herlan Taylor, a Republican. Atty. Fitzgerald was nominated by Democrat Atty. Irving Aronson.

The nine-member committee charged it with three tasks: 1. To consider any other needed changes to the town charter. It has been asked by the board to report back to it by the first regular board meeting in October.

Conrad said last night that he soon will appoint two subcommittees to check the charter's referendum and residency rules. Other subcommittees will be named later, to study the charter by sections.

Conrad is requesting town residents who have suggestions for charter changes to submit them to the commission within the next 30 days. The commission will meet next on March 1 to review those suggestions.

They're very aggressive bidders but usually find a way to make their overbids. In today's hand, taken from their match against Norway, one of the English stars missed her way.

Opening lead - ten of spades. Dummy won the first trick with the queen of spades, and declarer took the ace of spades, ruffed a spade and then led a club, hoping the opponents would help her develop the hand.

West surely had five spades for the overall, and the play of the clubs indicated that West had four clubs and East only three. West's switch to a low diamond showed at least three diamonds (with a fourth one would have switched to the king rather than a low card).

In short, West surely held 12 or 13 cards outside of hearts. West held one heart at most, and East held at least three hearts.

Sign on Property to Note Pending Business with ZBA

The zoning board of appeals has announced a recent amendment to the board's bylaws that require a sign to be posted on any property on which an appeal to the board is pending.

According to the new rules, when an appeal is filed, the applicant will pay \$5 deposit fee for a sign which is to be placed on the property in question.

Further stipulations call for the sign to be placed not more than 25 feet from the street line and facing the street for a period of seven consecutive days and nights prior to the hearing date.

The sign is to state that an application is pending before the zoning board of appeals and will include the zoning number of the town building department and the zoning map reference.

### Food Prices Dip From Your Neighbor's Kitchen Since Fall of '65

NEW YORK (AP) — Housewives who were out picketing in the cold last fall over high food prices may find things a little warmer inside the supermarket this winter.

Many food prices are lower than a year ago. And there is much more pork and beef. Wholesale food prices dropped again this week to the lowest since mid-November 1965.

Subzero temperatures last week cut shipments of livestock to market in many parts of the Midwest. This week shipments were up again and prices down.

Turkey supplies Jan. 1 were 87 per cent greater than a year ago, after disappointing Christmas and New Year's sales. Now prices have dropped sharply, and are likely to remain at the current level for several weeks.

Lamb is on special in many areas.

Beef prices have dropped sharply just about every place. The biggest drops have been on the large sizes.

Fresh produce may be limited in some spots because of bad weather in growing areas.

Florida is shipping larger supplies of tomatoes, and prices are dropping. Celery is down in most areas because of big crops in Florida and California.

Oranges, fresh and frozen, are on special nearly every where, but it may pay to check the advertisements.

It is a good winter for juice drinkers.

With the huge orange crop, canners and frezers are offering specials not only on orange but including drinks as well—canned grapefruit juice, pineapple juice, grapefruit concentrate.

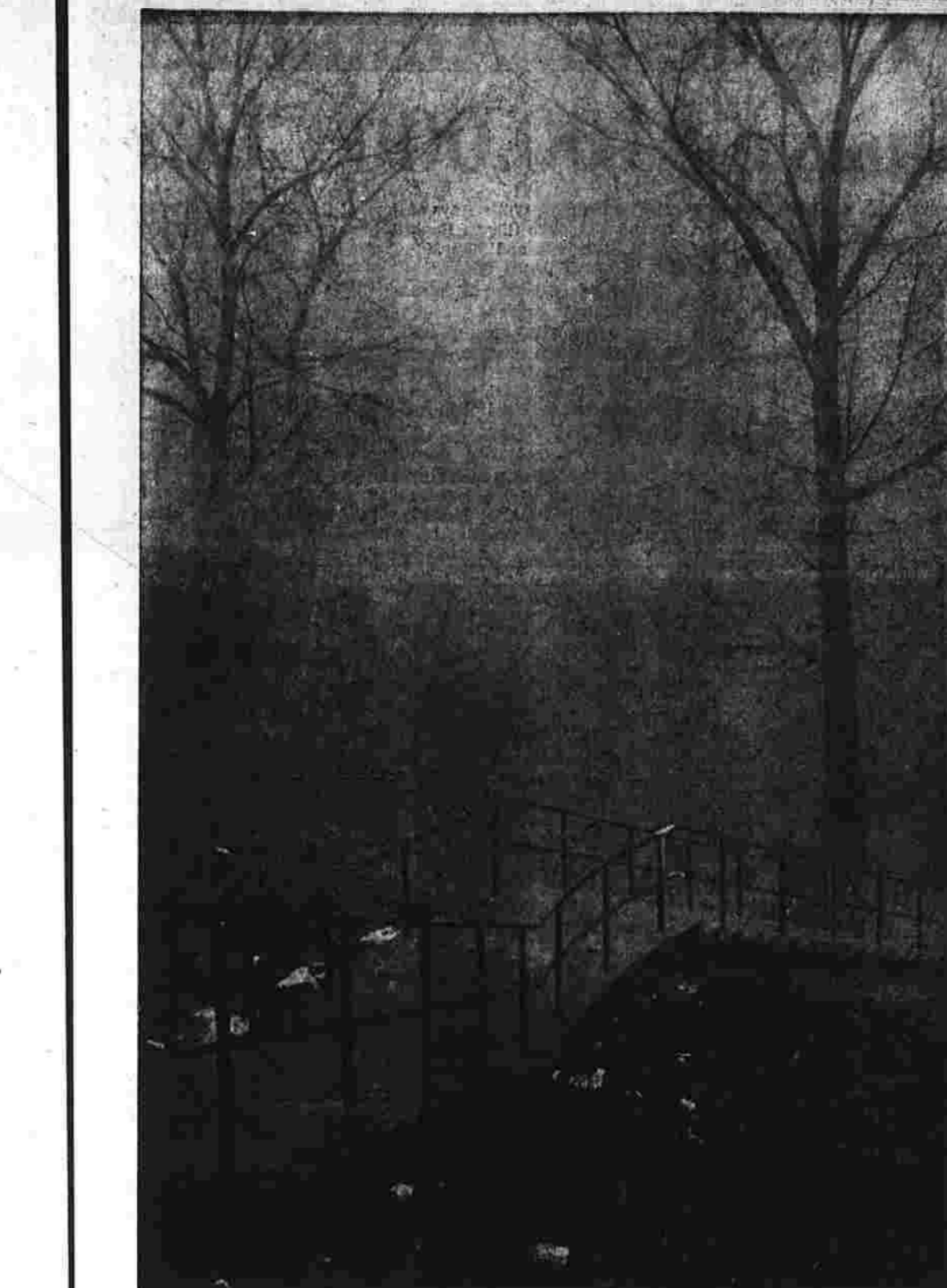

### Pollution Claims of Utilities Challenged by State Official

HARTFORD (AP) — A claim for damages by Connecticut utilities in any single hour of electric production, said a state official.

Louis J. Proulx, chief of the Health Department's Air Pollution Control Section, said Wednesday that two proposed new plants using atomic energy instead of fossil fuels may not eliminate pollution from Connecticut's electricity production.

Proulx said he would like to see electric companies to say how many of the older plants will be needed during periods of peak electrical consumption.

A spokesman for Connecticut electric companies made the claim Tuesday at a public hearing on air pollution conducted by the State Public Utilities Commission.

The spokesman also said that central electricity-producing plants in Connecticut produce 11 per cent of the state's annual air pollution.

Proulx said the utility spokesman should have mentioned the intensity of fly ash or sulphur dioxide emitted by Connecticut plants in any single hour of peak power production.

Yearly average figures such as those given by the companies, he said, are misleading because they ignore concentrations of pollutants falling on small areas during short periods.

Proulx also said the company spokesman mentioned only two major types of air pollution — fly ash and sulphur dioxide, but neglected to mention others.

One type is nitrogen oxide, he said, and electric plants generate 22.2 per cent of that pollution in Connecticut.

Proulx also asked whether the electric companies will decrease ground level pollution by building taller smokestacks or whether the companies will use the taller stacks to double production.
