A Rock For All Storms "The situation requires a good deal more than gloating," Erwin D. Canham, distinguished editor of the Christian Science Monttor, wrote at the end of a

piece discussing the significance of the present turmoil inside China. "Naturally enough," the same piece began, "most non-Communists tend to rejoice at the turmoll inside mainland China, We could all be terribly wrong." Editor Canham then spent consider-

able time analyzing various possibilities inherent in the situation. One might indeed be "a great breakflown of government authority, reducing the menace of Communist China to the rest of the world for years to

But there is also the possibility that one faction might seek to unite China by indulging in some "reckless international adventure" and might indeed succeed in uniting China that way.

A third possibility seen by Editor Canham is that a moderate faction might triumph in China, and then proceed to patch up China's ideological quarrel with Russia, thus unifying the Communist half of the world again, and obviously increasing its power politics power. As against such possibilities of de-

ham considers, and rejects as much too dangerous, the idea that there could be successful and beneficial intervention from outside-from Chiang Kai-shek on Formosa, on one side, or from Russia

The only sane role for the outside world Editor Canham finally defines as that of being "spectators at a gigantic cataclysm" and "keeping hands off." "It is time," Editor Canham declares, "for wise, responsible state-

It is impossible to quarrel with such analysis and such recommendation.

But we would wish to add one more moral. What goes on in China is dramatic and renewed evidence of our inability even to predict, let alone control, the course of events inside other political sovereignties. It is therefore, something of a sermon to us against trying to predicate our own policies solely or primarily on our estimates of what other peoples believe or plan or represent in relation to our own schemes of principles and values,

There is only one safe road for any nation in such a world, only one formula for real power and consistency. It is for that nation to be sure of its own beliefs and standards and principles, and to try to be sure its own conduct is built cleanly and squarely upon them -not, ever, upon any shifting idea of how to match shifting ideas and principles elsewhere in the world. 
