When astronauts have died in the erash of a normal, earth-atmosphere plane, that has not been very much more than the crash of any well known national figure.

When, as it is certain to happen some day, some astronaut dies because of some mysterious accident far out in space, and is thereby consigned to a spatial eternity from which no symolic ashes will ever be returned, that will be the nation's peak sensation of tragedy for an astronaut.

What happened at Cape Kennedy last evening involved the paraphernalia of space, and death came to Astronauts Grissom, Edward White and Roger Chaffee while they were in rehearsal for the great adventure of a space flight which was itself to be a rehearsal for the eventual landing on the moon.

The quotient of shock is, then, a life tie less than will be the shock of the first human beings to be lost in space itself, a great deal more than some ordinary earth kind of accident to an as-

Perhaps in that flash second these three astronauts may have experienced last evening, they at least had the satisfaction of realizing that their sacrifice was one being made in the course of unusual service to their country and to the spirit of man. Done for Children?

NEW YORK (AP) — Dr. Isi-dore Ziferstein, a Los Angeles psychiatrist, in a recent article oritical of some television programming for children, wrote that children between the ages of 5 and 6 watch television on an average of more than four hours

a day. Nicholas Johnson, a member of the Federal Communications Commission, in an interview taped for broadcast Monday might observed that "tens of millions of children in this country are spending more time with the television set than in school — and are getting very little for this expenditure of time."

Boven a casual observer can see there is a marked shortage of regularly scheduled quality programs for the very young on the networks.

Fowler Asks New Hike of **Debt Ceiling**

WASHINGTON, (AP) .- Secstary of the Treasury Henry H. Fowler asked Congress today to raise the national debt ceiling by \$7 billion to a new level of

He said that upless Congress acts, the Treasury will have to start holding up some payments within a month.

In an unusually blunt statement to the House Ways and Means Committee, Fowler said: "You and I know that there are many_who have voted for, and will vote for, appropriations and then take comfort and protection in a vote against extending the debt limit. This is not a responsible, act."

Fowler said that among the payments that would be in jeopardy about March 1 unless the lebt limit is raised are Social Security and disability benefits, veterans pensions and military and civilians retirement pay.
