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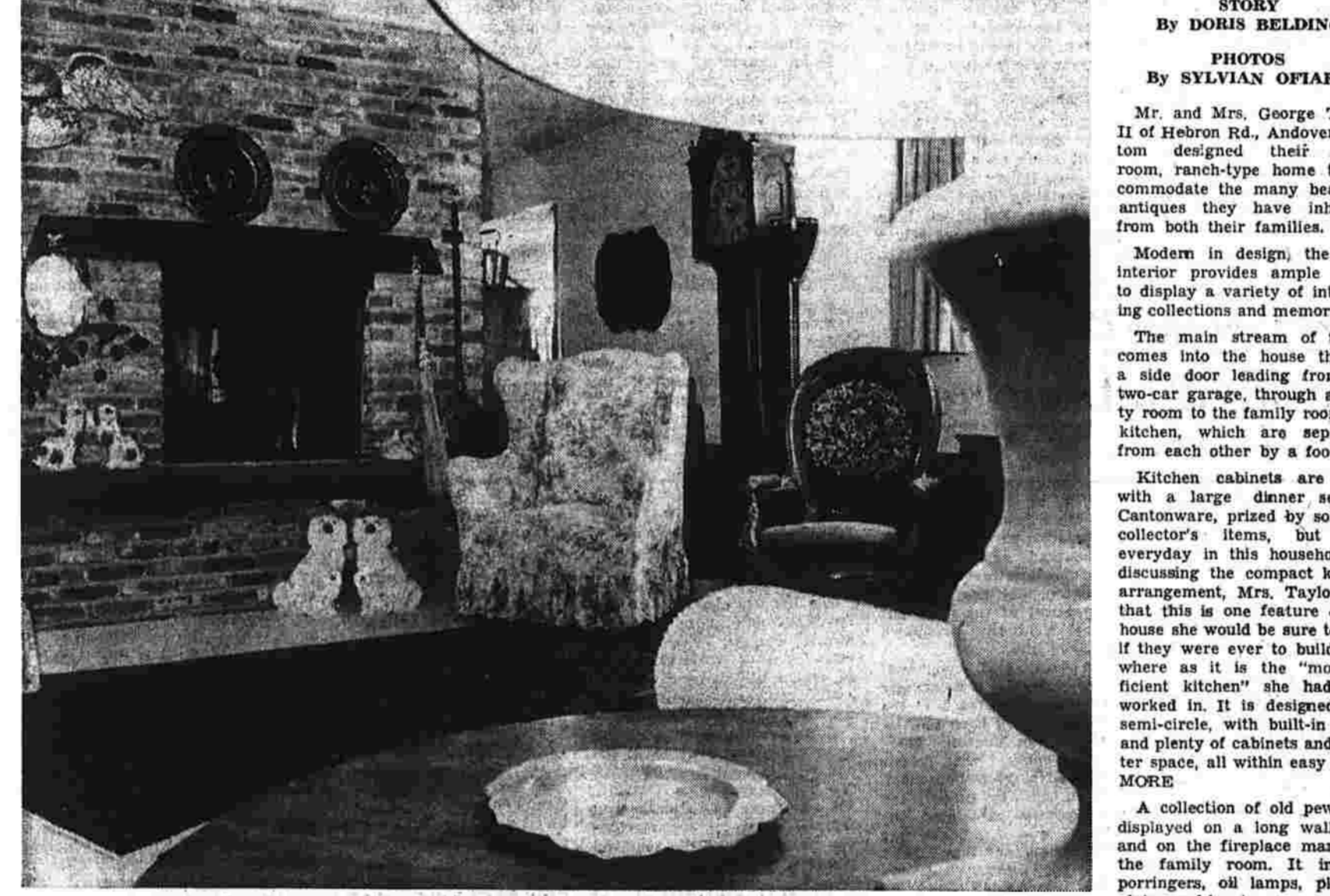

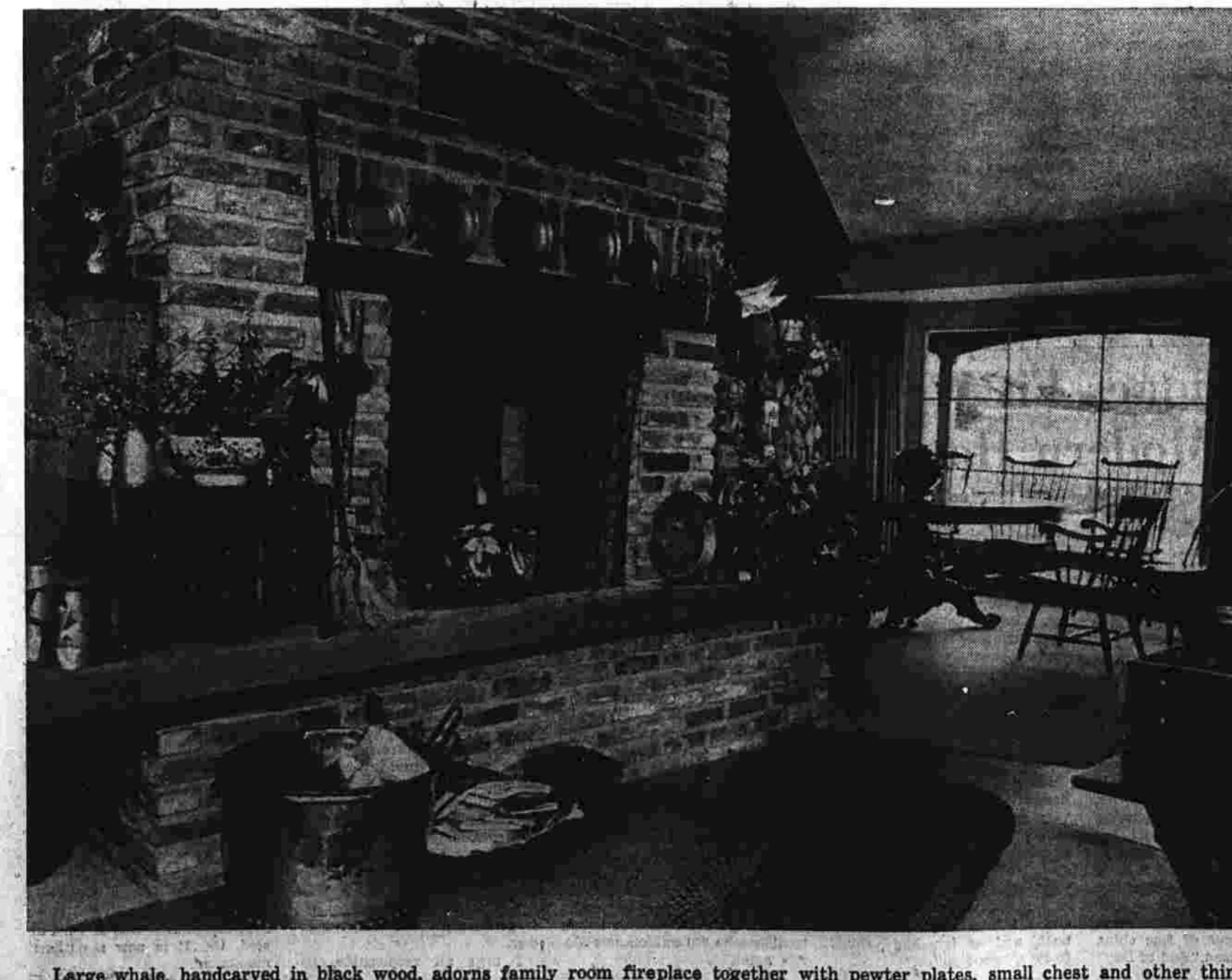

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What's TV Done for Children?

NEW YORK (AP) — Dr. Isidore Zifferstein, a Los Angeles psychiatrist, in a recent article critical of some television programming for children, wrote that children between the ages of 5 and 6 watch television on an average of more than four hours a day.

Nicholas Johnson, a member of the Federal Communications Commission, in an interview taped for broadcast Monday night observed that "tens of millions of children in this country are spending more time with the television set than in school — and are getting very little for this expenditure of time."

Even a casual observer can see there is a marked shortage of regularly scheduled quality programs for the very young on the networks.

There is "Captain Kangaroo" on CBS, a highly lauded program, and that network plans to start a "Children's Film Festival" of 13 programs on a Sunday afternoon early in February.

NBC has its very occasional "Children's Theatre" and one Sunday in early March will present "Rabbit Hill." Last year, the "Children's Theatre" showed an adaptation of E. B. White's "Stuart Little" at about the same time of year.

There are occasional special programs for the young ones, particularly around the Christmas season.

But blushing practically unseen by any but small children and some vigilant parents, are the solid blocks of cartoon programs that, on all three networks, completely fill the Saturday morning hours from 9 a.m. until after noon.

There are, in all, 24 different cartoon shows during these crowded hours. They range alphabetically from "Atom Ant" — NBC — to "Underdog" — CBS. In between are diversions like "King Kong," "Frankenstein Jr.," "Superman," "The Beatles," "Milton the Monster," "Magilla Gorilla" and "Hippety Hooper." A lot of them are old theatrical cartoon features. Most of them are harmless enough and are built around animals.

But what worries the experts is that the shows, while amusing the youngsters, add nothing to their lives and make for more of the passivity the experts deplore.

CBS, in spite of the death of

Milton Berle, the Loyal Picket

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The town's know-it-alls thought they detected bitterness when Milton Berle picketed ABC the week after his variety show had been dropped by the network.

He wasn't bitter, says Berle, just loyal.

"I belong to every union in the business — actors, writers, directors, even stagehands and cameramen," he explains. "That's so I can do anything I want on a set — move a table, change a camera setup — things that actors aren't supposed to do under union rules."

"The other day I was walking to my office when I saw pickets around the Hollywood Palace, where I did my show. NABET (National Association of Broadcast Employees and Technicians) was protesting the use of

new automatic cameras that don't need operators.

"The boys asked me if I was going to cross the picket line. Cross it? I joined it!"

Neither bitterness nor cancellation seems to stay Uncle Miltie from his comic rounds. Even though his Friday night show was not renewed by ABC at the end of its first 17 weeks, he believes he will return to the medium he once ruled as Mr. Television.

"Why not?" he says. "The formula still works. It's the same thing I used to do at the Strand and the Roxy, the same thing I do today in Vegas and Miami. It's entertainment, and the people go for it."

Then what happened to the ABC series?

"I made a mistake in setting

up the deal," Berle explained.

"I should have insisted on a 26-week contract instead of 17. I didn't know we would have only 120 stations on the network instead of the usual 170. That made the show look bad in the ratings, while in the 30-city survey it did well."

He also cited the familiar complaint of time slot. "Originally I was supposed to be on Saturday night at 7:30, which would have helped me get the kid audience. Jackie Gleason had announced he wasn't coming back on CBS. But when I appeared on his show last season he told me in his dressing room, 'You don't think I'm going to give up my time slot to you, do you?'"

"After he announced he was

"As The World Turns," it should be explained, is a daytime serial, or soap opera, on CBS that has been a favorite for so many years it probably should start dropping five years from its age. It moves inexorably from emotional crisis to crisis and is sneered at by people unable to watch television regularly during the daylight hours.

For the faithful fans, the return of Lisa Hughes was pretty exciting, for she had been a sort of antiheroine of the show for six years. In May, 1965, on the heels of the success of "Peyton Place," CBS decided to spin a nighttime soap opera off the popular daytime series. So one day Lisa Hughes, played by attractive Eileen Fulton, boarded a Chicago-bound train in Oakdale, scene of "As The World Turns." That night a new program, "Another World" had its premiere and was built around

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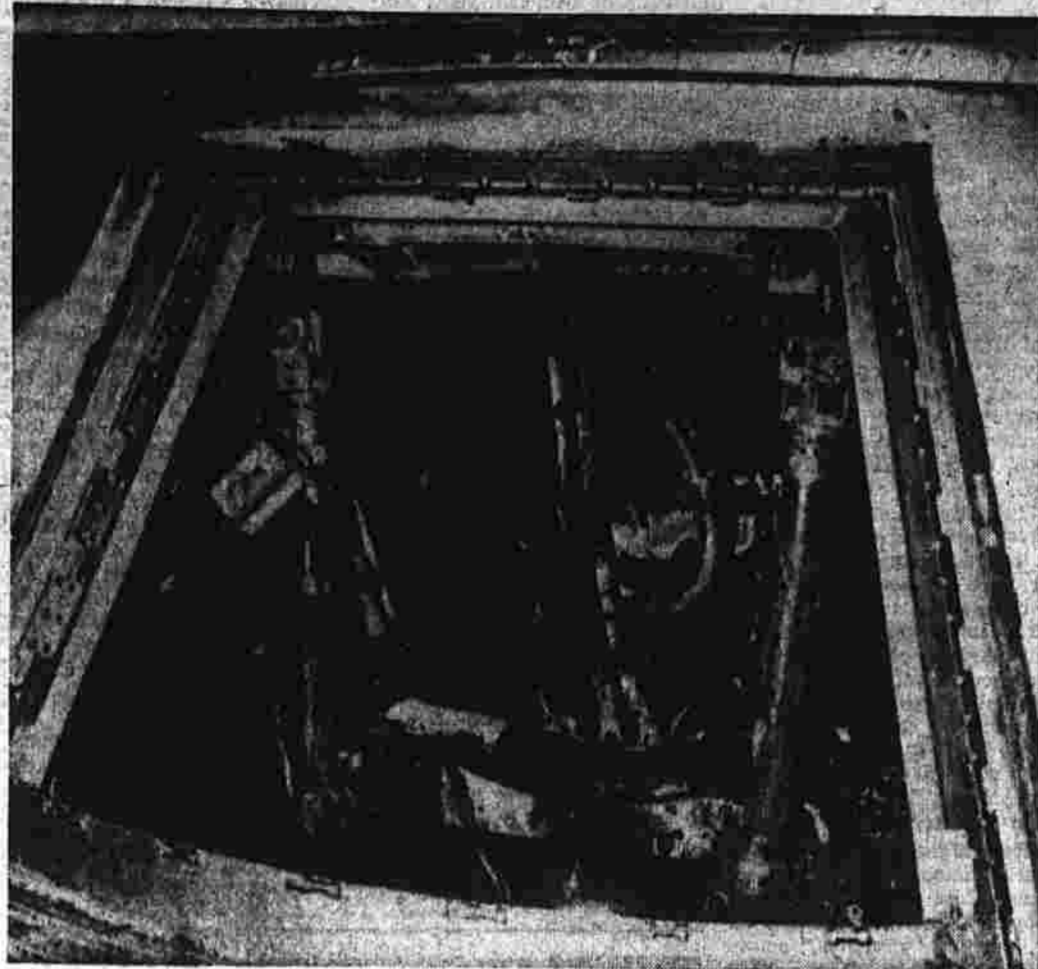

Memorial Services Held For Three Space Heroes

MANNED SPACE CENTER, HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Those who knew them best — friends, neighbors and fellow astronauts — join with relatives today at memorial services for two American space heroes, Air Force Lt. Col. Virgil I. Grissom and Edward H. White II.

With moving simplicity, they paid similar tribute Sunday to a third, Navy Lt. Cmdr. Roger B. Chaffee.

Families chose the Seabrook, Tex., Methodist Church where White was an active member for memorial services for Grissom at 10 a.m. EST and White at noon. The church is only a short distance from the Manned Spacecraft Center, heart of a saddened space community.

Grissom, White and Chaffee died Friday, victims of a flash fire that brought instant death inside their Apollo spaceship at Cape Kennedy, Fla., launch pad. They will be buried Tuesday.

As they did for Chaffee, the astronauts planned a tribute for Grissom and White the way they know best — in the air. Three white T38 jets, piloted by spacemen, roar over the church during each service in a traditional diamond formation, with one vacant slot as a salute to a dead friend.

where in Apollo 1's electrical system sparked the fatal flash fire that turned the moonship into a deadly furnace.

There was also reason to believe that the investigators do not now know exactly where or how that flaw occurred.

With a military escort, the coffins were carried in civilian hearses from a medical dispensary to the Cape Kennedy airfield, located less than four miles from the launch pad where the spacemen died Friday in a ball of flame.

Grieved friends stood solemnly at planeside, as an Air Force band played Chopin's funeral march, an Air Force hymn, and "Abide With Me" and "Faith of Our Fathers."

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Midwest Cities Partly Free Of Paralyzing Snow Cover

New Storm Goes Almost Unnoticed

CHICAGO (AP) — Midwest cities today shook partly free of last week's record snowstorm as the death count from effects of the paralyzing snow and ice neared 100.

An additional three-inch snowfall, which brought Chicago's total to 26 inches, went almost unnoticed as main streets and highways were reopened, and thin streams of traffic moved again.

Arctic cold moved into snow-clogged northern sections of lower Michigan where the mercury dipped to 20 below zero. Alpena had -18.

In the Far West, a coastal storm which had flung 100-mile winds and rain, lost much of its punch today.

The storm toll in Michigan rose to 22 deaths. Indiana counted 15, Wisconsin five, and Ohio one.

At least 56 persons were dead in Illinois following the 23-inch snowfall Thursday and Friday that set a Chicago record. At midweek Sunday, city and suburban crews worked to clear remaining snowdrifts—up to 15 feet deep—2 inches of new snow settled on the area. (See Page Ten)

B52s Stage New Raid, Closest Yet to Saigon

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) — U.S. B52 bombers staged their closest raid to Saigon of the Vietnam war today. Simultaneously, 3,200 more American infantrymen arrived in the country to join the growing U.S. force in the Mekong Delta.

The B52s unloaded their explosives on a base camp of the Viet Cong's 18A regiment 16 miles west-southwest of Saigon. The strike was two miles closer to the capital than any previous raid by the bombers and shook windows in Saigon.

Over North Vietnam, U.S. jet bombers struck the Thai Nguyen railroad yard 35 miles north of Hanoi Sunday and for the second day ranged along the Ca River for concentrated assaults on cargo barges.

Ground fighting in South Vietnam diminished to small, scattered clashes.

The U.S. command continued an investigation of an attack by three U.S. helicopters on a fleet of 200 sampans in the Mekong Delta in which a U.S. spokesman said 31 Vietnamese civilians were killed and 38 wounded.

night and early Sunday during the curfew hours after some of the sampans fired on the helicopters. He said the civilians told interrogators they were on the move in violation of the curfew because the Viet Cong was in the area and they anticipated allied attacks.

The latest American troops to arrive were the 2nd Brigade of the 9th Infantry Division and supporting artillery, medical, supply, signal, military police and maintenance units.

The 3,200 men came ashore from the troopship Pope at Vung Tau, 40 miles southeast of Saigon. They brought the division to its full strength, 15,000 men, and increased the total

announced American strength in Vietnam to 404,000 men.

The troops eventually will join other 9th Division units in the Mekong Delta, into which U.S. forces are now beginning to move in strength for the first time. Elements of the 9th Division moved into the first U.S. base camp in the delta, near My Tho, earlier this month.

U.S. pilots flew 78 missions over North Vietnam Sunday sometimes encountering heavy ground fire, but no losses were announced.

Baker Will Fight To Highest Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bob Baker plans to fight his convictions for tax evasion, conspiracy and stealing campaign funds to the Supreme Court if necessary.

His hands trembling and his cheeks whitening, the former secretary to Senate Democrats and behind-the-scenes power on Capitol Hill heard a federal court jury Sunday pronounce him guilty.

But Baker, 38, a one-time Senate page who built a \$2-million fortune, stayed free on \$5,000 bail.

Sentencing is expected in about two weeks. Penalties for the seven counts on which he was convicted could total 48 years in prison and \$47,000 in fines.

Eddie Fisher, Connie Stevens Are Engaged

NEW YORK (AP) — Singer Eddie Fisher and actress-singer Connie Stevens announced their engagement today. No marriage date was set.

Miss Stevens, 29, said Fisher gave her a diamond engagement ring over the weekend.

"We don't have a date for the wedding. It will be a while yet," she said.

Fisher was previously married to actress Debbie Reynolds and Elizabeth Taylor.

Miss Stevens had been previously married to television actor Jim Stacy.

N.Y. Tug Strike Cripples Harbor

NEW YORK (AP) — New York Harbor tugboat crewmen have gone on strike, sharply curtailing port activities and posing a threat to the city's fuel oil supply.

The first casualty of the walk-out which started Sunday was the cruise ship Victoria, which bumped into her Hudson River pier while docking unaided.

The bow was damaged but no injuries were reported among the 277 passengers and crew of 135.

More than 2,000 tugboatmen attended a Sunday morning meeting, rejected a proposed contract, and voted to strike at

Largely attended funeral services for the youth, the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Adolph

Quey of 65 Spruce St., were held from the John F. Tierney Funeral Home, 219 W. Center St., at 8:15 a.m., followed by a solemn high Mass of requiem at St. James' Church at 9 a.m.

Quey, a Manchester native and graduate of Manchester High School in the Class of 1965, was killed Jan. 19 by enemy sniper fire while on a combat mission. He was a rifleman attached to Co. A, 1st Battalion of the 4th Division's 8th Infantry Regiment, and had been serving in Vietnam since last October.

Asks for Pollution Control

Poisoned Air War Being Lost—LBJ

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson, saying "America's struggle against poisoned air" now is being lost, asked Congress today for legislation giving the federal government power to control air pollution.

But in a special message titled "protecting Our National Heritage," Johnson said federal action alone cannot master pollution.

"The states, the cities and private industry must commit themselves more fully, more effectively and with a new sense of urgency to America's struggle against poisoned air," Johnson said.

Johnson said one of the first new steps in the attack on air pollution should be emission control levels for those industries that contribute heavily to air pollution.

Fowler Asks New Hike of Debt Ceiling

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of the Treasury Henry H. Fowler asked Congress today to raise the national debt ceiling by \$7 billion to a new level of \$277 billion.

He said that unless Congress acts, the Treasury will have to start holding up some payments within a month.

In an unusually blunt statement to the House Ways and Means Committee, Fowler said: "You and I know that there are many who have voted for, and will vote for, appropriations and then take comfort and protection in a vote against extending the debt limit. This is not a responsible act."
