Hearing Set Tuesday on Claim Fund

The Board of Directors Tuesday night will conduct a public hearing and will consider action on a \$20,000 additional appropriation to the Town Council's Account.

The sum would go for the payment of pending claims and would augment \$25,000 already appropriated for that purpose. Approximately \$17,300 has been paid out in claims since July 1, the start of the current fiscal year.

During the last week, the town has settled two claims — one for \$1,700, the other for \$990. Both have been approved by the town manager.

The \$1,700 payment goes to Sam Lombardo and his minor son, Donald, both of East Hartford. The elder Lombardo gets \$1,000 and his son, \$700. The two had sued the town for \$10,000.

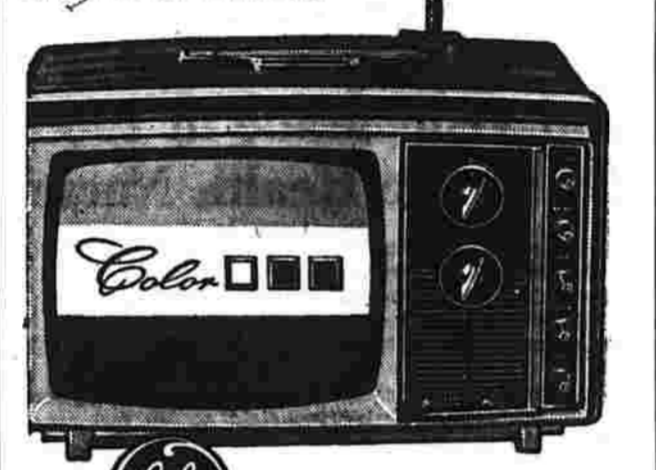

Dirksen May Be Key To US-Soviet Treaty

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen—who has a history of making or breaking some Johnson administration assurances—now appears now to hold the key to the President's U.S.-Soviet consular treaty.

The pact, which sponsors say is aimed at relaxing East-West tensions and opening the way for the end of the cold war, needs two-thirds approval of those voting on ratification.

Some of the same Republicans who wanted a civil rights bill in 1966 are seeking ratification of the treaty in spite of what they call "hysterical opposition" to it.

Sees Raids Key to Peace Bombings Defended By Korean Premier

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korean Premier Park Chung-hee argued today for continuation of the U.S. air war against North Vietnam, saying American efforts to open peace talks would be hopeless if the raids are stopped.

"The allied powers are on the way to military victory," he said in an interview. "We must redouble our military efforts to win and create conditions to force the North Vietnamese to sit at a peace conference table."

Chung, 49, ruled out an invasion of the North, saying the ground war can be expanded in the South while the bombing of the North continues, as agreed at the Manila summit conference in October.

Chung said the Soviet Union is not sufficient to have increased its military aid to North Korea. The equipment included four submarines and MIG-19 jets, he said.

Chung said South Korea does not intend to increase its forces in Vietnam.

"With almost 50,000 troops there now, we have reached our maximum capability," he said. "We have to secure our own nation."

LTM Needs Prop

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Few Mental Breakdowns Among U.S. Viet Units

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) — Remarkably few mental breakdowns and a very low rate of combat fatigue developed among U.S. and South Vietnamese troops in Vietnam, a U.S. Army medical research team reports.

The team from the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research said that during the first six months of 1966, when U.S. troop strength reached 164,000, only 703 men were hospitalized for neuropsychiatric disorders. Only about 6 percent of these suffered from combat fatigue, or emotional breakdown from battle pressures.

The 300,000-man Vietnamese army reported only 354 mental cases during the same time, but the American researchers said that the more seriously ill Vietnamese were hospitalized. Just under one per cent were combat fatigue cases.

One U.S. Army psychiatrist — not connected with the research team — said last month the mental health of American soldiers is better than that of the civilian population in the United States.

Capt. Jimmie R. Clemens of Dallas, Tex., psychiatrist of the 1st Infantry Division, said only 2 or 3 per cent of the patients he sees each month are seriously sick or psychotic — "a much lower proportion than you see in stateside practices."

The research team said nearly 30 per cent of the American neuropsychiatric patients in Vietnam suffer from character and behavior disorders, usually involving "an attempt to have their tour in Vietnam terminated and be returned to the United States."

Very few of these patients have been sent home, the team's report said, because if they were evacuated "the incidence of this condition might increase considerably."

The medical team said a large group of the South Vietnamese army patients — about 30 per cent — demonstrated chronic anxiety reactions "with a typical picture of headache, insomnia and palpitations."

Planes Avoid Hanoi, U.S. Figures Show

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pentagon sources said today that ping-pong Hanoi's southern border has been closed to U.S. military aircraft since the bombing raids on North Vietnam since April have been going on. The area is a 20,000-square-mile zone that includes Hanoi.

No figures were given, however, for an adjacent zone which includes territory near the capital city.

Responding to recent criticism about air raids near Hanoi, these sources provided figures showing that American city bombers have avoided Hanoi, and that the daily sortie rate over North Vietnam is kept secret to prevent the enemy from knowing how many U.S. aircraft are sent aloft on bombing missions.

Military communiques from Hanoi instead record the tempo of the air war in terms of miles flown, which usually mean three to five aircraft flying over more sorties.

Since April, sources said, United States has sent 30,000 flights — roughly one-third of its total — to raid supply lines in the Vietnam-China border. Military and storage areas hundreds of miles south of Hanoi.

Specifically, this is in what the military planners refer to as "Route Package One," a roughly 4,000-square-mile area of North Vietnam just above the former demilitarized zone separating the two Vietnam.

By contrast, said sources, there have been only slightly more than 3,000 raids in that area.

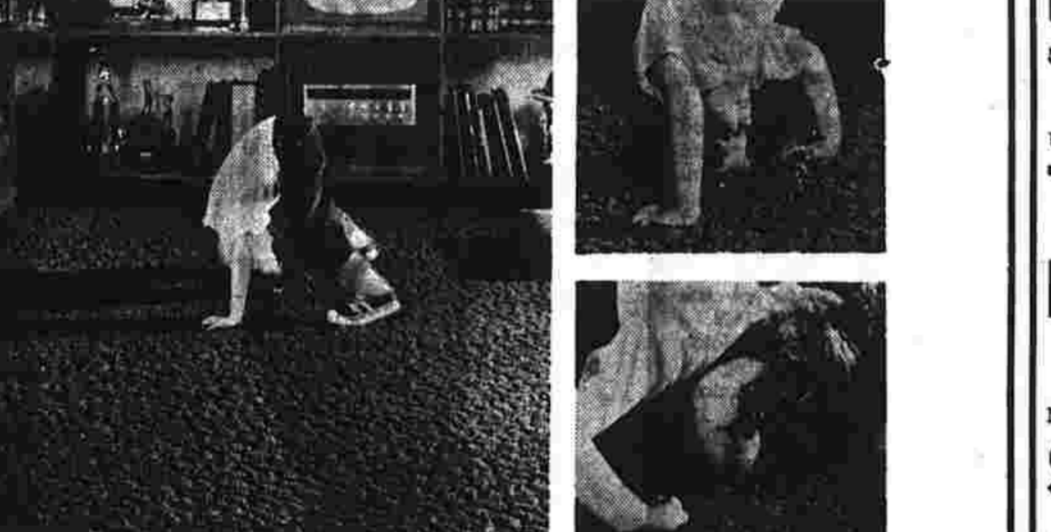

Long Labor Battle to End, Miners Will Join AFL-CIO

DENVER, Colo. (AP) — The International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers is engaged today in posting a final footnote to a 73-year saga of fierce and sometimes bloody labor programs. The union merges Wednesday with the AFL-CIO United Steelworkers.

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Some Still Slow To Buckle

Safety experts, who believe in their use because they think accident statistics prove their value, and motivational researchers, who specialize in finding out why people do or don't do things, are both puzzled by the public's continued resistance to seat belts.

They find extreme instances of dislike for the belts, like a Detroit construction worker who whipped the belts out of his new car the minute he got it home, like the woman who took her spilled heel and smashed the light on her instrument panel which was trying to remind her to buckle up, or like the character who has been in three accidents where the car was totally demolished and who was thrown clear of the car in all three accidents and who swears he wouldn't be alive today if he had been held in the car by a belt.

The researchers find that to some people the seat belt is a reminder of being strapped to the toilet as a child. To others, it is a symbol of adult staidness and cowardice. Pregnant women are said to wear them; other women find they ruffle a dress or promote cramps; others express a fear of being cut in two.

Such are some of the reactions the researchers have found. Probably the worst fear people have of seat belts is of the possibility that, in case of an accident which involves fire or water, the seat belt may prove the fatal trap rather than a protection. Although the safety researchers are not really being questioned when they claim that a universal use of seat belts would save lives as a general proposition, they do not do all they might to answer doubts about particular types of accident. One thing they might do if they wished to increase the influence of their arguments with the public, is try to have it established, in accidents when victims die inside their cars, whether or not seat belts were a factor in holding them there.

But the main thing still going against seat belts is an odd, persistent, quite illogical conviction on the part of numerous human beings that the car was invented to be the servant of man, not a race-track animal, and that it ought to be possible for human beings to travel from one point to another without putting on armor. Those who resist seat belts have every reason to believe that, as soon as they have been broken to the belt, which is a very poor protection at best when compared to a shoulder harness, the campaign will open to persuade or compel them to submit to the harness.

In safety measures, as in everything else, there is a law of diminishing returns, and in every confrontation with danger man comes to some point where he begins to think that maybe not even life itself is worth all the precaution he is asked to observe. Man wants to live, but he also wants to live as a free human being, not inside that scientifically perfect, germ and mishap free padded cell to which the seat belt is the natural precursor. In that sense, he would imagine, the ultimate discovery for motivational researchers trying to analyze resistance to seat belts.

The Solberg Case. There will be many who feel that the outcome of the murder trial of Harry A. Solberg was an outrageous lapse of justice. The decision by the state to abandon its efforts to obtain a conviction was certainly prompted by legal technicalities rather than by any massive doubts. And the technicalities, it appears, may have been unavoidable—because the mistakes of procedure took place several months before the Supreme Court ruling was issued which voids the cases where such mistakes are made.

Nevertheless, the case will probably go down as a classic example of bad police work, too. And what the bad police work is especially deplorable because the Connecticut State Police are not and cannot be reasonable.

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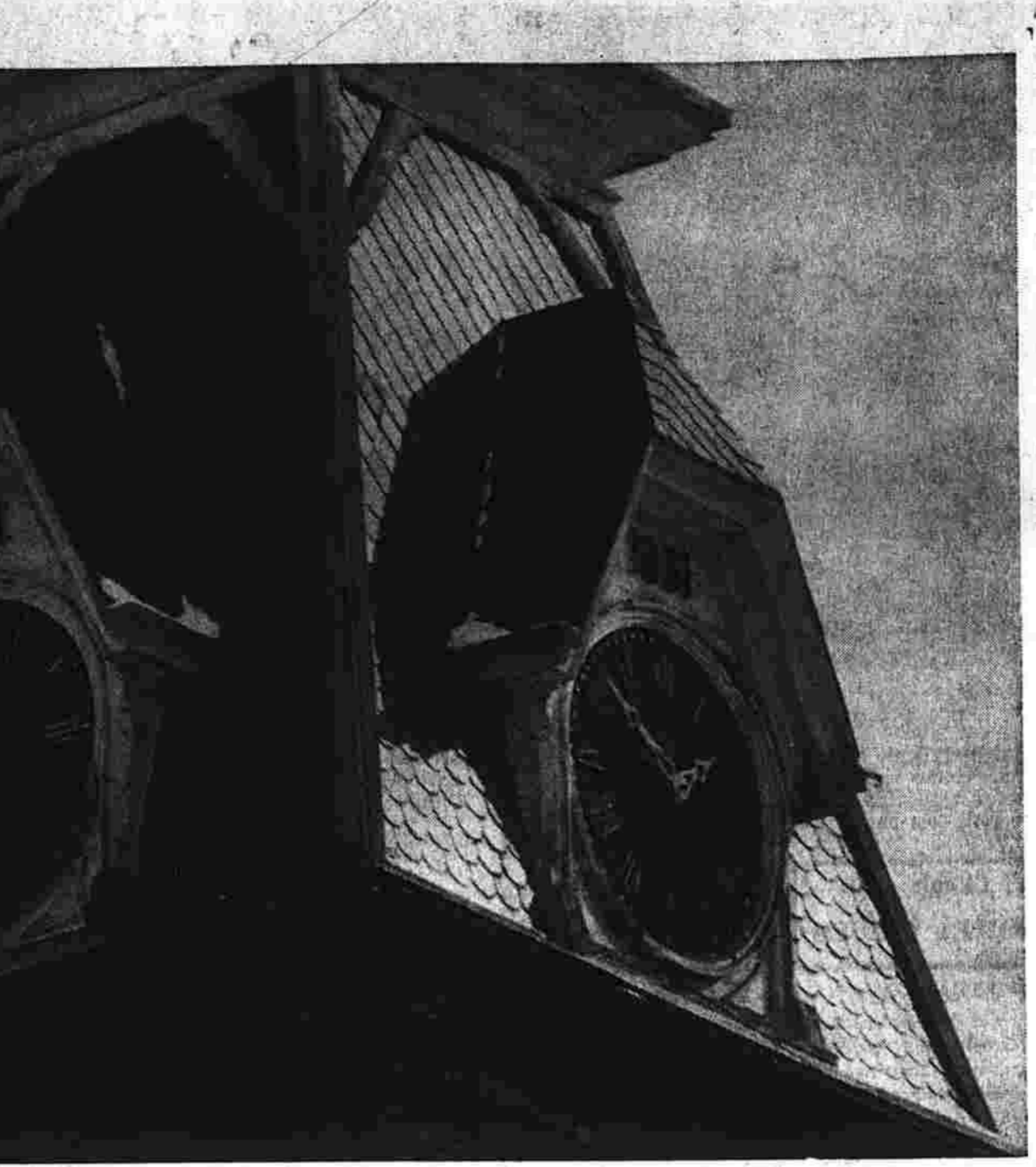

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Massachusetts Senate Weighs Increase in Pay

BOSTON (AP) — State senators took up consideration today of a bill to raise state legislators' pay to \$10,000 annually and increase their expenses allowances.

Speedy, favorable action is expected in the Senate, immediately after its passage in the House, the bill was forwarded to the Senate Ways and Means Committee.

Unless a majority bill is passed, legislators' pay will revert to \$6,500 a year from the \$7,000 they received last session after the House vote.

The House vote followed rejection for the second time of a bid by Rep. Francis W. Hatch, R-Beverly, to make the 1% increase permanent rather than limited to 1967-1968. The vote was 153-78.

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U.S. Reveals Advancement In Antimissile Missile Race

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has developed advanced nuclear-tipped missiles which have a better chance to penetrate antimissile defenses, the Atomic Energy Commission said today.

The development could play a part in the pending U.S. decision on whether to build an antimissile defense system or rely on offensive capability as a deterrent to war.

Late last year Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara said the Soviet Union had developed elements of an antimissile defense around Moscow.

The report indicated U.S. scientists have also found new ways to increase efficiency of other kinds of nuclear weapons ranging from bombs to land mines.

The advanced weapons apparently have increased power for penetrating a kind of nuclear test-ban treaty.

The report also said: —Some \$4.6 million in reusable nuclear and non-nuclear components was salvaged during 1966 from obsolete weapons.

—The committee continues to maintain capability to almost instantly resume nuclear weapons testing in the atmosphere, underwater, and in space.

—Should the AEC be directed to test in the event of an abrogation of the (test-ban) treaty by others or in the interest of national security.

—Porty underground nuclear tests were announced during 1966, all but four of them in the weapons or weapons-effects field.

Studios Find Film Vaults Hold 'Gold'

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Some-what belatedly the movie industry discovered the gold mine in film vaults, and efforts are now being made to protect that valuable gold.

During the first four decades of film history, little was done to preserve the movies that were pouring out of Hollywood. After a feature had exhausted its money-making potential, the negative was shoved into vault and forgotten.

Television changed all that. By selling their old movies for use on the home screen, studios maintained a financial equilibrium that helped them survive the theater depression. Then they became vitally interested in protecting their archives.

"In some cases it was too late," explains a film veteran. "The early films were put on paper film, which became moldy and bug-ridden with age. Sometimes you'd open a can of old film and find nothing, but dust."

"After the movies were put on nitrate film, which is very dangerous because it can explode spontaneously. Whole libraries of precious old films have been wiped out by fires. Not until the introduction of safety film in the 1930s could negatives be preserved without danger of loss or fire."

MGM is a leader in the preservation of the vast literature of the screen. Unlike other film companies, MGM has never sold its film; all of its television deals have been on a lease basis.

"Some time ago we became concerned about preserving our films against any contingency," says Raymond Kluge, studio manager. "We decided to make duplicate negatives of all our movies and place them in a repository where they could not be harmed. Now we have copies of all the features back to 1916."

The studio hunted for the best place to store the negatives and found it in the Kansas salt caves. Near Hutchinson are miles of underground corridors carved out of salt rock.

"The temperature doesn't change from season to season, and the humidity remains constant; the conditions are ideal for the storing of film," said Kluge. "There is nothing that can harm the negatives, including atomic attack."

"All of the films have been copied in the new 'wet-gate' process," Kluge explained. "It is a remarkable device that cures scratches on the original negative. When we re-release 'Gone With the Wind' later this year, prints will be made from the new negative, with the result that the film will be even better than when it was originally released."

LOBSTERMAN, 54, SON PLAN TO ROW ACROSS ATLANTIC

GLoucester, Mass. (AP)—Lewis C. Mills Sr., 54, a husky grandfather, truckdriver and lobster fisherman, said today he and his son plan to row across the Atlantic in a 16-foot dory.

"I've been wanting to do this for a long time," he said. "I've put myself in a real financial strait jacket, but I've been in that strait jacket before."

He said he hoped to get started on the trip in March or April. Mills said his son, Lewis Jr., 21, would go along with him, traveling non-stop, alternating in four-hour shifts.

"We hope to make it in 40 days," Mills said. "I've been around boats a lot but I've never done anything like this before."

He said the 92 days required by two Englishmen who made the trip from Orleans, Mass., to England last summer "made me sick."

Mills, a native of Wakefield, N.H., is an ex-soldier and also served in the Coast Guard Reserve. When not driving a truck, he goes lobster fishing in his own 42-foot boat.

He and his wife, Theresa, have three other children besides Lewis Jr. Their two daughters are married and a son is in the Coast Guard. Last summer, British paratroopers Chay Blyth, 26, and Capt. John Ridgway, rowed across the Atlantic in 92 days. Two other Englishmen died in a similar attempt from Norfolk, Va., last year and their empty boat was found in mid-Atlantic. The 55-day record was set in 1966 by two New Jersey climbers who set out from New York City.

First Phase Completed of Dump Shift

The first step in converting the disposal area from an open-face dump to the sanitary kind of operation, intensive vermin extermination, has been completed.

The second phase of grading the dumping area for safe and effective use of the new, heavy equipment is currently being done by contractor Felix DeStato of Wilmamantic.

The result in appearance of the facility is remarkable. The old view was a wasteland of debris, the new sloping hill side looks like a freshly plowed field. Except for the collection of salvaged materials, due for removal before long, there is little evidence of refuse. Two men from the state Department of Health have been supervising the changeover.

The large "translocator" was delivered to the site about ten days ago. The town voted the unit in the October town meeting. The machine has a life expectancy of five years and the cost will be amortized at about \$5,000 a year. With other costs of the new system of handling refuse totaling \$14,000 the total annual cost of operating the dump should be about \$19,000. Based on population, Bolton will very likely assume about 60 per cent of the \$19,000 or \$11,400 plus.

Nature lovers and protectors of wild life will be pleased to know that the junk motor vehicles at the dump have provided a snug home for numerous raccoons. Six or more of these handsome creatures were deluged by the bulldozing operations a few days ago.

Born Siamese Twins, Girls Almost Normal

HIGH POINT, N.C. (AP) — pinching of one infant provoked to respond to her twin.

Approaching their second birthday, the two girls laugh and talk, have healthy appetites and crawl with as much speed as any tot. One has taken a few steps and doctors today believe both eventually may walk at most normally.

Yet, during the first seven months of their lives, the girls were Siamese twins, joined at birth in the pelvic region. Their successful separation is believed to be the first of its kind.

Dr. Joseph E. Eades and Dr. Colin G. Thomas described the unique case in detail for the first time in the December issue of *Annals of Surgery*.

In a preface, the doctors said they found histories of 14 cases of Siamese twins being separated and surviving, with most of these involving boys joined in the area of the chest.

"They said, however, that they have never heard of another successful separation of Siamese twins joined in the pelvic region."

The twins, Althea and Dorothea Allen, were born in High Point Memorial Hospital on April 6, 1965, to Mrs. David Allen, 25. Their combined weight was just over seven pounds. Dr. D. E. Tillman, who delivered the infants, reported that they breathed and cried at the same time.

"The babies were moved immediately to the North Carolina Memorial Hospital at Chapel Hill for tests to determine if they could survive surgical separation. Monday, they delivered revealed that, except for the sharing of a few nonvital organs and functions, the twins appeared to be separate physical entities.

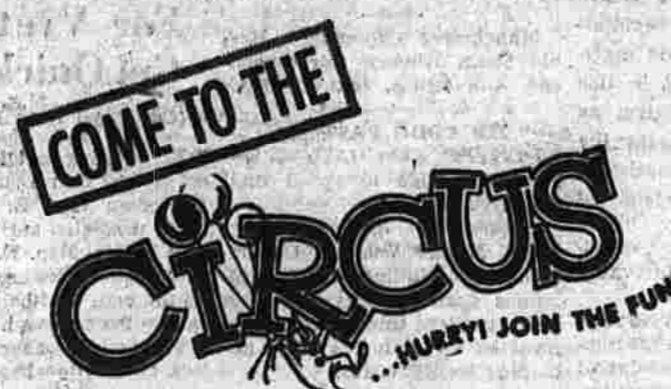

\$4.7 Million Blast WASHINGTON (AP) — The government plans an underground nuclear explosion in New Mexico later this year in an attempt to break up rock formations to stimulate natural gas production.

The \$4.7 million blast, called Project Gasbuggy, will be the equivalent of 20,000 tons of TNT — the same size as the Hiroshima atomic bomb explosion. Plans call for its detonation at a depth of 4,200 feet in a sandstone region 35 miles east of Farmington, N.M.

The Interior Department, the Atomic Energy Commission and the El Paso, Tex., Natural Gas Co. signed the agreement Tuesday.

The AEC said the explosion would be designed to occur in a low-permeability — or tight — gas-producing formation. The idea would be to break up rock formations sufficiently to let the gas flow more freely.

"If a successful nuclear fracturing technique can be developed as a result of Project Gasbuggy, it may find widespread applications in similar 'tight' formations in the United States, principally in the Rocky Mountain region," the AEC said.

Power Stripped WASHINGTON (AP) — Five Democratic and 14 Republican members of the House Banking Committee have stripped committee Chairman Wright Patman of his power to create subcommittees.

The committee is expected to vote next week on rules that would require the Texas Democrat to obtain committee approval before undertaking investigations. The panel also is to decide whether to reserve to the committee itself the hiring and firing of its staff.

Thirteen Democrats voted Tuesday against the initial curb of Patman's power.

Patman has been a critic of the Federal Reserve System and of bank mergers generally. One of the insurgents, Rep. Thomas L. Ashley, D-Ohio, denied the revolt was designed to block Patman's investigation of the ownership of banks and the alleged interconnections between big stockholders in financial institutions.

Ashley contended that, after winning a dispute over subpoena powers last year, he had voted authority to Patman to subpoena records for the investigation.

2-Cent Argument Ends in Death Of 'Arbitrator' NEW YORK (AP) — A 68-year-old man was stabbed to death after he intervened in an argument between two other men over two cents.

The man, tentatively identified as Earl Thomas, was slain Tuesday night in a downtown Manhattan grocery store.

Police gave this account: While Thomas was in the store, an unidentified man walked in carrying an empty soda bottle and asked the grocer, Murray Karion, to give him the two-cent bottle deposit.

Karion told the man he didn't carry that brand of soda, and an argument developed. Thomas tried to reason with the man with the bottle.

Karion, to keep the peace, gave the man two cents and threw the bottle into a trash can.

As the man began to leave the store he turned and said to Thomas: "Why don't you mind your own business?"

After a short dispute, the man plunged a knife into Thomas' neck and back and fled.

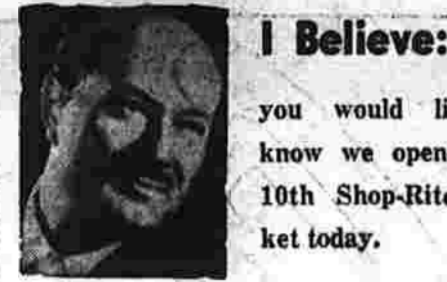

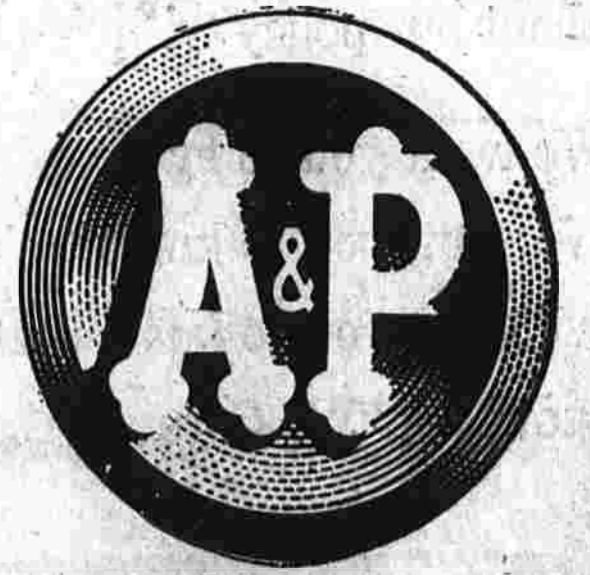

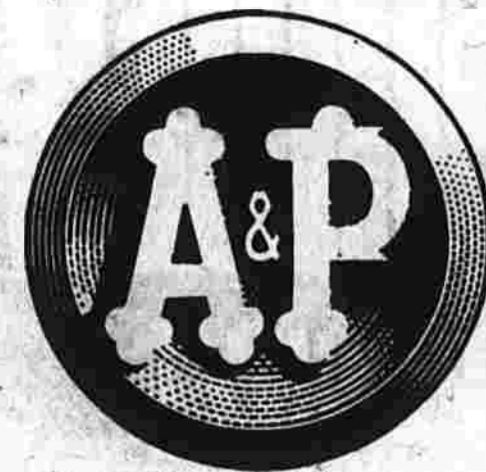

Grain Shipment Going to India, LBJ Announces

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson told Congress today he is making an immediate allocation of two million tons of grain worth nearly \$150 million to help India meet emergency food needs.

In a special message, Johnson recommended that Congress approve a commitment to share fully in the international effort to meet India's food grain deficit.

He said India will need total deliveries of 10 million tons of food grains this year, worth about \$725 million.

Of this total requirement, the United States would provide \$4 million tons, worth about \$275 million.

Johnson also recommended allocation of \$25 million in food commodities for distribution by CARE and other American voluntary agencies to help India with an emergency feeding program in drought-stricken areas of Bihar and Uttar Pradesh.

With the ever-greater American grain surplus now available, highly inflammable substances such as gasoline or paper might accidentally be used to help India and the tally has been left near a net surplus before submitting the request to Congress.

Snow Hits Chicago, Moves This Way

CHICAGO (AP) — A heavy snowstorm moved northeast today after plastering Chicago and other Midwest cities with four to eight inches of snow atop last week's smothering load.

The storm brought as much as six inches of snow to update New York, and sleet and freezing rain spread hazardous driving conditions from northeast Ohio toward lower New England.

The newest fall added eight inches of cover to the 22 inches at Flint, Mich., and dropped six inches at Lansing, Mich.

Warnings of the storm sent Chicagoans to shelters Wednesday afternoon, and waves of grocery shoppers cleaned off milk, bread, meat and produce counters.

But, although many suburban schools and plants closed, the overnight accumulations ranging from four inches at Midway Airport to seven inches at O'Hare International Airport were taken in stride by road clearance crews.

Traffic appeared hampered very little in Chicago.

The Weather Bureau said that the 30 inches of snowfall in Chicago had compacted to about 25 inches of ground cover.

The snow ended in Chicago in early morning, and 70-degree cold was expected tonight.

TOKYO (AP) — Peking Radio asserted today that Mao Tse-tung's forces had seized Manchuria's Heilungjiang Province, thereby smashing "a criminal plot" by the United States, the Soviet Union and Japan to take over the province.

The broadcast said Heilungjiang was taken in a bloody struggle by the army with the help of a republican anti-Mao party chieftain.

The Heilungjiang Revolutionary Committee in Harbin, the capital, sent a message saying they had also smashed a plot "to invade China by Soviet revisionists and U.S. and Japanese reactionaries," the broadcast added.

Heilungjiang was the third of Manchuria's provinces to be taken over by Mao's forces, along with the cities of Shanghai, Peking, Kweiyang, Tientsin and Tsingtau.

These areas—Shan and Kweichow are the other provinces—have more than 60 million people, more than 70 million people.
