LaBonne Offers Plan On GOP Leadership

By SOL R. COHEN George "Ted" LaBonne of Glastonbury is going all out for election as GOP state chairman and in letters and meetings is asking for support from the 72 members of the State Central Committee and from all Republican town chairmen and vice chairmen.

LaBonne is the leading candidate for the chairmanship, to succeed A. S. Pinney. A week ago, he received 14 votes from the 24-member screening committee, appointed in December to recommend a new chairman. Howard Hausman of New Britain, GOP Legislative Commissioner, received 9 votes. One committee member abstained.

Raymond Roncari, screening-committee chairman, announced after the vote that the results would be relayed to the State Central Committee as a report, and not as a recommendation. The central committee will meet later this month to discuss the report and to elect a chairman.

LaBonne is being backed by chairman by the Pinney-Alsop-Gengras forces. Hausman has the support of Ed May of Wethersfield and Peter Marani of Groton, plus Fairfield County GOP leaders.

LaBonne has sent letters to all members of the State Central Committee and to all town chairmen and vice chairmen, asking for their support, listing his qualifications, and offering his views on revitalizing the State Republican Party.

He has asked for meetings with the chairmen and vice chairmen, to appraise them of his qualifications, goals and hopes, prior to the meeting of the State Central Committee.

In his letter to the central committee, he has informed them of his letters to town chairmen, saying the action is consistent with his belief "in establishing a better communications system through the State Central Committee to the Town Chairmen."

LaBonne wrote: "The Republican Party needs to work as one solid unit, not as several separate groups. There is no question but that divided we have fallen."

"As I am committed to no one," he states, "I hope to be in a position to install this unity in our party."

He has made himself available at his home and office for any questions and comments, even before he meets the party leaders in person.

LaBonne lists three goals as his major objectives, if he is chosen party chairman: 1. To emphasize the importance of voter registration to develop aids and information to attract new voters and unaffiliated voters to the Republican Party.

2. To make the party one of inclusion rather than exclusion by developing a new and better system of communications between the state unit and the town chairmen.

3. To conduct an organized campaign for developing potentially good candidates, and for promoting them over a period of time, instead of just at elections.

In listing the qualifications of a state chairman, LaBonne states that he should be a full-time chairman, yet economically independent, so that he would have a job to return to when his term of office ends.

In that way, he says, he would not be subject to economic pressure from any source. In addition, LaBonne states, he should be a man of proven executive leadership—political, civic, religious, business—to be in a position to deal with all interests fairly, objectively and inclusively.

Throughout his letters and recommendations, LaBonne repeats the theme, "Inclusive Communication."

He is emphatic in his "Blueprint for the Future," that the state chairman must be a full-time, salaried man. Anything else, he says, would result in "too many chiefs, and a frustrating division of direction and authority."

He recommends that the chairman should have the aid of "an active executive committee, to consist of six members of the State Central Committee, plus five deputy chairmen, the national committee members and the vice chairman."

In addition, he recommends one representative from each of the state's six Congressional Districts.

The state chairman, he says, should be required to visit each Congressional District at least twice a month, with the emphasis on "a consistent program of communication at all levels."

LaBonne says that Connecticut Republicans must start immediately to select and develop candidates for both the 1968 and 1970 elections, and to work toward eliminating the party debt before 1968.

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The 'Green Hornet' Has Money Troubles

By BOB THOMAS HOLLYWOOD (AP) — There is more to the cancellation of a television series than an anemic rating. Economics can also play a crucial factor, as in the case of "Green Hornet."

The major film studios, which now produce the bulk of television series, are becoming more and more alarmed at the rising cost of putting a show on the air. Recently Darryl F. Zanuck, president of the biggest series maker, 20th Century-Fox, told me he was considering cutting down the number of shows made by the studio.

"We were making so many series we had to rent space at other studios," he explained. "When you do that, your possibility of profit becomes precarious."

Even with a hit, he added, the studio loses money on the first year's product. The second or third year could produce a profit. But some series never pay off until they go into reruns.

One of the Fox series is "Green Hornet," which can be classed as an itty show. It has received fair ratings, but star Van Williams figures it will return next season only if the economics can be solved.

"Bill Dozier, our producer, has been trying to sell ABC and

the sponsors on the idea of going to an hour show next season. It would make sense from the actors' standpoint. One of the problems with the show was that the network wanted half of it to be action. It meant dragging in action for action's sake, and that was lousy. We were left with only 12 or 13 minutes of dialogue, and that wasn't enough to establish any of the characters or develop the plot," Williams said.

"But most important of all, a half-hour show is almost impossible to do on an economic basis. Our show is budgeted at \$110,000, and I don't think we've met that mark in more than two or three of the 26 shows. I understand the loss to the company has been a million and a half dollars, some of which will be recovered on reruns."

"Converting to an hour show would mean an outlay of only \$25,000 more, which would make it a much better investment. I understand Fox is trying to convert all its half-hour shows into hours."

Williams, already a veteran, is philosophical about the outcome of "Green Hornet."

"After four series, a cancellation isn't that much of a blow," he said. "I figure I'll find work somewhere."

2nd Golden Era?

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Most critics and many viewers consider the 1950s to have been television's Elizabethan era, when live television produced vital drama that hasn't been matched since.

CBS is making what appears to be a brave attempt to bring back at least a semblance of that era. The network has contracted for a series of special dramas for "CBS Playhouse." The first is a story of the Vietnam war, "The Final War of Oily Winter," which appeared last Sunday.

Significantly, the producer is Fred Coe, a name revered for his association with such early series as Television Playhouse, Philco-Goodyear Playhouse, Playwrights 56 and Playhouse 90.

Coe, who turned in recent years to producing plays — "The Miracle Worker" — and films — "A Thousand Clowns" — seemed delighted to be back in the medium in which he began 20 years ago.

"We've done the show at Television City in much the same way we did plays in the early days," he said. "It's not live, but it is live on tape, which allows for sustained scenes rather than cut performances, as in film. Tape gives us the chance to make inserts if needed, but I prefer to use as few as possible."

Coe's drama was opposite NBC's top-ranked "Bonanza." He was asked if CBS wouldn't be accused of cowardice in not scheduling "Playhouse" where it had a better chance to gain a rating.

"I don't think CBS is presenting this series as a popularity contest," the producer replied. "I'm sure everyone would be very happy if our show does as well as 'Death of a Salesman,' which made a very good rating although it didn't beat 'Bonanza.'"

"The aim seems to be not to win viewers away from 'Bonanza'."

Picking the Losers

NEW YORK (AP) — Now is the time when the three networks are busily pulling together their schedules for next season's shows.

Because television lives and dies by the Nielsen ratings, it is pretty easy to pick the losers — right off the bottom of the list.

Thus, it would be logical to assume that the days are numbered for such shows as ABC's "Green Hornet," "The Monroes," "Love on a Rooftop." Even "Batman" doesn't look too healthy.

On CBS's dubious list are "It's About Time" and all their prime-time game shows, but the latter are inexpensive to produce so they might survive. NBC has trouble spots in "The Road West," "T.H.E. Cat," "Laredo" and "The Girl from U.N.C.L.E."

The jury, of course, is still out on the 10 new shows that were midseason replacements for the drop-outs of this season, but historically, few other than "Batman" and "Branded" have survived for more than short runs.

ABC has announced that the annual "Oscar" awards show of the film industry will arrive on April 10 with Bob Hope, as usual, in charge of things.

Phil Silvers will play the Devil and Lee Remick his handmaiden in NBC's two-hour production of "Dam Yankees" on May 8.

CBS will rerun "Death of a Salesman" for the third time on April 2.

Top Soaps
Soap operas continue to be the favorite day-time television pastime. In the most recent Nielsen ratings, six CBS serials were on the top 10 daytime list. They are in the following order: "Houseparty," "As the World Turns," "To Tell the Truth," "Guiding Light," "Edge of Night," "Search for Tomorrow," "Secret Storm," "Password," "Dick Van Dyke Show" reruns.

"Fugitive" No More
"The Fugitive," ABC's long-running series about a man on the run, is likely to come to a halt this season, a victim of

ratings and competition from NBC's movie reruns Tuesday nights. On Feb. 21, Dr. Kimble, who has been running from a murder rap for four years now, will catch up with the one-armed man he thinks killed his wife. The policeman who is chasing Kimble will also be part of the show.
