Arctic Blast Adds to Work In Midwest

NEW YORK (AP)-A numbing cold wave knifed south and eastward into the country today in the wake of three successive killer snowstorms. The mercury plunged to more than 40 degrees below zero in Minnesota as the frigid thrust passed over the Canadian border.

The Arctic blast provided new hardship to overworked crews striving to clear away roadblocking snow drifts in parts of the winter-weary Midwest.

The third heavy snowstorm in 11 days Sunday piled new drifts atop old in Chicago and areas of the eastern Great Lakes. More roads were blocked in northern Indiana. All grade and high schools were closed in Gary,

As the cold fanned south and eastward, a frozen mixture of sleet and freezing rain penetrated central Texas on strong northerly winds, and a swirling

With one to three inches snow expected by nightfall in New York, the taffic department declared a snow alert and suspended alternate side street parking until further notice. The Weather Bureau warned of ich city streets and hazardous driv-

MITCHELL SHOWS UP

NEW HAVEN (AP) -Convicted draft dodger David H. Mitchell turned himself in at the U.S. Marshal's office today to start serving a fiveyear sentence imposed almost a year ago. He had been scheduled to show up at 10 a.m., but finally made his appearance shortly before 1:30 p.m., the marshal's office said. Some 30 to 40 sympathizers had been parading at the federal building long before Mitchell arrived.

No Secret Disposal This Time For the first time, a possibility of negotiation on Vietnam has become pubic knowledge before it has been blasted in secrecy.

There have been similar moments in the long course of the struggle. Nobody knows for sure how real they were, how much real hope there was in them. United Nations Secretary General Thant remains sure he had a real negotiation on the line once before. There have been rumors and reports of many other possibilities. But none of hese past possibilities, whatever they were worth, ever had public notice untill long after they had disappeared. The ohnson administration, perhaps operating quite sincerely because it did not consider the openings valid, denied heir existence until long after they had been secretly ignored or rejected.

Often it seemed to happen that, while the Johnson administration was denying the existence of negotiation possibilities in its diplomacy and its puble relations, it was escalating the var itself. Perhaps, in such escalation, was sincerely persuaded to the theory hat if the enemy had become a little at reasonable, more bombing would bring him even closer to the conference

Secrecy is generally considered an essential to delicate preparations for delicate negotiations. But there began to row a suspicion that the Johnson ad ministration had developed a habit of using this secrecy in order to have a freer hand, in rejecting tentative overaires, than it might have felt able to have if the world public had been

don is different. There are peace feelers in existence. And it has become public knowledge

that they are in existence. This means-and it must have been omebody's deliberate intent that it should mean this—that the Johnson administration has no privilege of denying now that the possibilities exist, of rejecting them privately, and of admitting their existence only months afterward when it is too late for anybody to

to anything about them. It is quite obvious that Senator Robert Kennedy has been used in, or has, possibly, even voluntarily sought to be an actor in, the creation of this new situation in which secret diplomacy has taken special care not to be quite as secret as in the past.

Very early in his recent travels abroad, he began saying that the next few weeks would be of critical importance to the question of peace in Vietnam. Today this hinting has come to a more definite head, with published reports of feelers, one of them involving the Senator personally, and with his own admission that he has a need to see the President and the State Depart-

That somebody's strategy of denying to the Johnson administration the privilege of dealing with the latest negotiation possibility in strict secrecy has already worked was proved, on Saturday, when Walt W. Rostow, President Johnson's special assistant on national security measures, and reputed to be next to Secretary Rusk, the most force ful and influential civilian hawk in Washington, admitted that the United States and North Vietn involved in "what is or might turn out

to be a negotiating r Meanwhile, in London, another angle of the possibility of peace has been anowed to come half way out into the open for the first time. For this meeting of the heads of government of Rusand Britain, there is advance admision, from the Russian side, that peace a Vietnam is to be a topic. Hitherto, Britain has made repeated efforts to get Russia to involve itself in some ositive peace diplomacy, and met only rebuffs. Now, suddenly, Russia sems a little less reluctant, publicly. one of this is any guarantee that the ciful thing will happen, and the sad, and war in Vietnam be finally turned

oward an ending of some sort. But it is something different. And, as for the secret diplomacy which has now been partially abandoned, one thing is seriain: a half-open diplomacy can ceraln'y do no worse.

The Komeito Gains

The real news of the Japanese national elections the other Sunday came several days after the main routine tabulations had been completed, showing the pro-American conservatives of he country neatly holding their own.

The special news that came out later was that of the progress made by the Komeito, or "Clean Government" party which is sponsored by the Buddhist sect which calls itself Soka Gakkei, or "Value-Creating Society."

The Komeito, in this election, was making its first try at running candidates for the House of Representatives. It nominated 32 candidates, admittedly in districts where it felt itself strongest. And it elected 25 of these candi-Doing so, it polled more than 2,400,-

000 votes, making it now the country's fourth largest party, and putting it ahead of the Communists, who elected five candidates, and had 2,100,000

The Komeito is the special party to watch in Japan because it features a certain cross-breeding of political appeals, mating noble talk about purity and honesty in public service with a strong emotionalism about nationalism. Most drastic efforts at "purification" of modern nations have ended up proving themselves marauding dictatorships of the far right.

The Japanese party which has been watched because people felt it might eventually turn into this kind of party has now scored its first notable popular gains, about the same time an extremely nationalist party in West Germany has also come to the fore.

If these two parties ever gain real power and control of national histories in our time, the fault will never be exclusively that of the Japanese or German peoples. It will also be the fault of the victors of World War II who, after a brief post-war pretense of being determined to shepherd both the Germanent ways of peace, soon began teaching them there was nothing so terribly wrong about war, providing they had the good taste, next time, to choose the right partners.

New Morality (Pen Division)

For some time the state of public morality has been reliably gauged by a judicious reading of only one indicator, the writing pen. Pollsters and newsmagazines regularly have a go at it, producing statistics and graphs and interviews on American morality, but the conclusions are questionable. The really definitive answer has come from a short visit to the neighborhood post office or

or the lack of pens told all.

When the pens were being surrepti tiously pocketed, then we could all justifiably reflect that the times were indeed evil that fostered people who prevented others from signing the back of their paychecks. After all, what would foreigners say of a country whose people made off with ink pens from public places?

When the ink pens were replaced by ballpoints that were chained to a holder or to the desk itself, then we could lean back, shake our heads and reflect that something was indeed terrible with a people who showed so little trust for each other, After all, what would foreigners think of a country that

had to chain down its ballpoint pens? An apparent alteration in the pen indicator, then, is news of no little significance. A shift in the public morality may well be discernible.

The other day we observed in a neighborhood bank that the chains on the ballpoint pens at a desk were no longer secured to holders. The pens, conceivably, could be removed, but

there were no pens missing. Does this represent a step forward, a prelude to a renaissance of public morality when the chains will be removed altogether?

Or does it, represent a sly modern hypocrisy, since the pens cannot be removed without a foot-and-a-half of damaging evidence trailing behind? In other words, are we being allowed to think ourselves grown in virtue while others, knowing better, have taken due

The matter bears watching.

The Size Of A Campus

When it comes to selecting the size of a community college campus, several campus must be kept in mind. The first of these is the fact that a community college has to deal with more cars than a four year college. Every student com-

Thus, if a college ultimately anticipates parking 6,400 cars, 50 acres have to be set aside for parking alone, if half have to be set aside for parking. Quite apart from education, athletics, and exra-curricular activities, most colleges today are finding that as much as 30 per cent of their land should be set aside for automobiles. Larger institutions have found that they have to bury their parking, lest the whole campus seem to be one vast parking lot.

Whatever guidelines are used now, the chances are that they will prove to be insufficient. The automobile age is far from over. The policy of the state should be to insure that no new public facilities are hemmed in, that parking is provided, and that sufficient land be purchased. - MIDDLETOWN PRESS
