## Course Change For Orbiter 3 'On the Money'

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Scientists changed the course of Lunar Orbiter 3 slightly today and said preliminary data indicated the maneuver was "right on the money."  
It takes several hours of tracking to determine results accurately.  
Previously the experts said the launch from Cape Kennedy, Fla., Saturday night was with "fantastic accuracy."  
The midcourse maneuver today slowed the speed of the spacecraft by 11.4 miles per hour and changed its trajectory to put it in a more desirable position when it arrives in the vicinity of the moon Wednesday.  
This will enable scientists at Jet Propulsion Laboratory here to put the 850-pound spacecraft in a proper orbit for the subsequent photographing of the safest sites for landings by U.S. astronauts.  
The correction was made today by burning the velocity control engine of Lunar Orbiter 3 for 4.4 seconds. Originally the spacecraft would have reached the target in a point 295 miles above the northeast edge of the lunar disk.  
A spokesman explained that a higher orbit was desired for greater maneuverability.

## French Newswoman Released by Cong

AN KHE, South Vietnam (AP) — Michelle Ray walked out of the jungle in black pajamas and a peasant's conical hat today after 21 days in Viet Cong captivity. Twice, she said, she thought she might die.  
The first time was when the Viet Cong captured her as she repaired a flat tire on her small French car on a road in the central highlands. The second time was in a six-foot cave she shared with eight Viet Cong during an artillery bombardment by South Vietnamese army troops. She said she thought she would suffocate.

## Bomb Birthday Marked

Miss Ray, 28, a Frenchwoman, is in South Vietnam as a freelance photographer. She once was a model and cover girl in France. She was captured Jan. 17 north of Bong Son, 290 miles northeast of Saigon, while trying to complete a drive over the length of South Vietnam.  
At headquarters here of the U.S. 1st Cavalry, airborne, Division, she told of her capture.  
"Three Viet Cong with rifles came up on me and harshly bound my arms," she said. "I was very afraid. I knew not what they intended to do with me. I thought the worst about them. But within five minutes they released my bindings, and kept only one arm loosely tied."  
The following day, she said, she and eight of her captors hid in the cave, six-foot long, three-foot wide and three-foot high. Miss Ray is 5 feet 9.



## Arctic Blast Adds to Work In Midwest

NEW YORK (AP)—A numbing cold wave knifed south and eastward into the country today in the wake of three successive killer snowstorms. The mercury plunged to more than 40 degrees below zero in Minnesota as the frigid thrust passed over the Canadian border.  
The Arctic blast provided new hardship to overworked crews striving to clear away road-blocking snow drifts in parts of the winter-weary Midwest.  
The third heavy snowstorm in 11 days Sunday piled new drifts atop old in Chicago and areas of the eastern Great Lakes. More roads were blocked in northern Indiana. All grade and high schools were closed in Gary, Ind.  
As the cold fanned south and eastward, a frozen mixture of sleet and freezing rain penetrated central Texas on strong northerly winds, and a swirling snowstorm buffeted, by strong winds swept into New York City.  
With one to three inches of snow expected by nightfall in New York, the traffic department declared a snow alert and suspended alternate side street parking until further notice. The Weather Bureau warned of icy city streets and hazardous driving.  
In New Mexico, the Ruidoso-Sierra Blanca ski area, plagued by picnic weather most of the winter, had up to 10 inches of snow during the night.  
Cold wave warnings were posted today for Wisconsin and Illinois and for a wide area extending from Texas and the Indiana.

## Two Peking Leaders Ousted, Newsmen Say

TOKYO (AP) — Diplomatic sources in Peking say Red China's President Liu Shao-chi and Communist party general secretary Teng Hsiao-ping have been ousted from their jobs, two Japanese correspondents reported from the Chinese capital today.  
The reports to Asahi Shimbun and Yomiuri did not say how or when Mao Tse-tung's two leading foes were removed. But resistance to Mao's campaign to replace their appointees in the party and government machinery throughout China was expected to continue unabated.  
The Yomiuri correspondent said Liu had lost both his government and party posts.  
Teng could have been expelled from the party secretaryship by the central committee's plenary session last August. But Liu could be legally removed from the presidency only by the National People's Congress which elected him and which is not known to have met since 1965.  
Neither Liu nor Teng have

publicly exercised their official duties in Peking since last November. But continuing reports from Peking of resistance to Mao's purge indicate that their supporters retain control of wide areas of China.  
These other developments were reported from turbulent China during the weekend:  
The New China News Agency, controlled by Maoists, acknowledged that Mao's opponents still control the party machinery in southwest China, a vast area including Tibet, Kweichow, Szechwan and the World War II stronghold of Yunnan. The agency said the pro-Mao party

## Fire Claims Four Lives, Investigators Seek Cause

Fire officials today were inspecting the charred ruins of a three-story Rockville tenement house to determine the cause of yesterday's fire that took the lives of four children and severely injured an infant.  
Fire Chief John Ashe said he suspects a "human element" was involved, but he would not elaborate. He said the building, at 110 High St., was physically sound.  
Killed in the early-morning blaze were three members of the Raymond Mitchell family: they were Carlton, 7, Jean Marie, 6, and Raymond, 3. The family lived on the street-level floor.  
Also killed was Dawn Marie Gibbs, 5, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Dupuis. The family lived in the basement level apartment.  
Another child of the Dupuis couple, Renee Dupuis, is in serious condition in Rockville General Hospital's intensive care unit, a hospital spokesman reported today. She is suffering from first and second degree burns on 50 per cent of her body.  
Two of the Mitchell children were discovered dead in their beds, the other on the kitchen floor. Dawn Marie's body was found in the basement apartment.

NEW YORK (AP) — Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff, D-Conn., says he is asking the Department of Justice to investigate and determine whether any witnesses committed perjury last March before a Senate subcommittee which was looking into auto safety.  
Ribicoff issued a statement from his Washington office Sunday after it was disclosed that a private detective's court deposition varied with testimony by the General Motors Corp. concerning Ralph Nader, an auto safety critic.  
Testifying before Ribicoff's Government Operations subcommittee last March 22, General Motors President James M. Roche said GM had started an investigation of Nader before his book, "Unsafe at Any Speed," came out and before he was scheduled to appear before the subcommittee. ## Fire Officials Say Children Died Apparently of Asphyxiation

Chief Ashe, who began the probe today with Fire Marshall Inspector Joseph Bussanese, said, "We're interrogating several people. It's premature for me to say (the fire's cause), when I haven't got answers from them. We think we'll have the answer in a short while."  
Saved from the blaze was the fourth Mitchell child, Kevin, nearly 3.  
The family on the top floor, Mr. and Mrs. James Lee and their four children escaped unharmed.  
Mrs. Mitchell told firemen that when she learned of the fire she awakened her children and carried the youngest with her to the third floor where she roused the Lee family.

## \$50 Million 'Punch' To Seek Crime KO

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson urged on Congress today a massive effort to combat crime "with every means at our command."  
Johnson proposed to throw at least \$50 million into what he termed a bold venture "to treat ancient evils and to ensure the public safety."  
The \$50 million is aimed primarily at helping states and cities to help themselves in efforts to uproot crime. The money would be used in the next fiscal year under a Safe Streets and Crime Control Act, largely for grants for planning, anti-crime campaigns and for research and pilot projects.  
Johnson proposed that the federal government put up 90 per cent of the cost of financing the planning and 80 per cent of the outlay for action programs, such as setting up more effective alarm systems, tactical squads, special street lighting, and new rehabilitation efforts.  
The crime message is one of a series of special messages sent by Johnson to Capitol Hill, spelling out details of his legislative programs.

Johnson's message said, "We can control crime if we will. We must act boldly, now, to treat ancient evils and to ensure the public safety."  
And, he emphasized, it is the American citizen who will determine finally whether "streets will be safe to walk, whether homes will be secure, whether property rights will be respected, whether integrity and honest dealing will govern relationships among men."  
Among other things Johnson urged the outlawing of all wiretapping, public and private, and all willful invasions of privacy by electronic devices — the only exceptions to be where national security is at stake.  
Wiretapping by the federal government itself has figured in prominent legal cases lately, including the trial resulting in the conviction of Bobby Baker, a former secretary to Senate Democrats.  
Johnson also urged enactment of a law to crack down on mail order sales of firearms. It was a mail order rifle that killed President John F. Kennedy.

No Secret Disposal This Time: For the first time, a possibility of negotiation on Vietnam has become public knowledge before it has been blasted in secrecy.

There have been similar moments in the long course of the struggle. Nobody knows for sure how real they were, how much real hope there was in them.

United Nations Secretary General Thant remains sure he had a real negotiation on the line once before. There have been moments when, after a brief post-war pretense of being determined to shepherd both the German and Japanese nations toward permanent peace, soon began teaching them there was nothing so terribly wrong about war, providing they had the good taste, next time, to choose the right partner.

Often it seemed to happen that, while the Johnson administration was denying the existence of negotiation possibilities in its diplomacy and its public relations, it was escalating the war itself. Perhaps, in such escalation, it was sincerely persuaded that the theory that if the enemy had become a little bit reasonable, more bombing would bring him even closer to the conference table.

Secrecy is generally considered an essential to delicate negotiations. But there began to grow a suspicion that the Johnson administration had developed a habit of using this secrecy in order to have a freer hand, in rejecting tentative overtures, than it might have had if it had to have if the world public had been watching.

Today, for the first time, the situation is different. There are peace feelers in its existence. And it has become public knowledge that they are in existence.

The means that it must have been somebody's deliberate intent that it should mean this—that the Johnson administration has no privilege of denying now that the position exist, of reflecting them privately, and of reflecting their existence only months afterward when it is too late for anybody to do anything about it.

It is quite obvious that Senator Robert Kennedy has been used in, or has, possibly, even voluntarily sought to be an actor in, the creation of this new situation in which secret diplomacy has taken special care not to be quite as secret as in the past.

Very early in his recent travels abroad, he began saying that the few weeks would be of critical importance to the question of peace in Vietnam. Today this hinting has come to a more definite level with published reports of feelers, one of them involving the Senator personally, and with his own admission that he has a need to see the President and the State Department.

The Komeito Gains

The real news of the Japanese national elections the other Sunday came several days after the main routine tabulations had been completed, showing the pro-American conservatives of the country neatly holding their own.

The special news that came out later was the progress made by the Komeito, or "Clean Government" party which is sponsored by the Buddhist sect which calls itself Soka Gakkai, or "Value-Creating Society."

The Komeito, in this election, was making its first try at running candidates for the House of Representatives. It nominated 32 candidates, admittedly in districts where it felt itself strongest. And it elected 25 of these candidates.

Doing so, it polled more than 2,400,000 votes, making it now the country's fourth largest party, and putting it ahead of the Communists, who elected five candidates, and had 2,100,000 votes.

The Komeito is the special party to watch in Japan because it features a certain cross-breeding of political appeals, making noble talk about purity and honesty in public service with a strong nationalistic about nationalism.

Most drastic efforts at "purification" of modern nations have ended up proving themselves marauding dictatorships of the far right.

The Japanese party which has been watched because people felt it might eventually turn into this or that, now has scored its first notable popular gains while at the same time an extremely nationalist party in West Germany has also come to the fore.

If these two parties ever gain real power and control of national histories, in our time, the fault will never be exclusively that of the Japanese or German peoples. Democrat Town Committee Endorses King Bill on Jails

The Democratic Town Committee, in an unusual move, unanimously has endorsed a bill submitted to the legislature by Republican State Rep. Robert D. King.

The bill calls for transferring abandoned state jail facilities to the town or city in which they are located.

The bill is of particular interest to Tolland residents as various study committees investigating the state penal system have recommended closing the Tolland State Jail on the Green.

Democrat Town Chairman Preston Harding said "King's bill, as presented, is a good bill deserving the support of all people in the town."

In view of the fact the state will establish new, statewide jail facilities, the Tolland Jail need no longer be used as such," Harding added.

The bill calls for transfer of the old jails to town or city for public use only, providing the legal body of the town accepts the facility and its land.

If the land and jail is in a redevelopment area (as is the case in Hartford), the transfer shall be made to the redevelopment agency of the municipality on request of the treasurer of the agency.

A second section of the bill provides for the use of all or part of any former jail facility and land as a historical museum, or as a place for display of items of local, state or national historical interest for which a reasonable admission may be charged.

The operation of such a museum must be under the direction of a board of trustees, which may be historical or antiquarian society approved by the State Historical Society.

The Tolland Historical Society has been considering the possibilities of turning the old jail, or a portion of it, into a historical museum when it is abandoned by the state. The jail, constructed in 1810, is the oldest in the state.
