"There was a moment's silence. Then, "Did you say 'steal'?" And silence again.

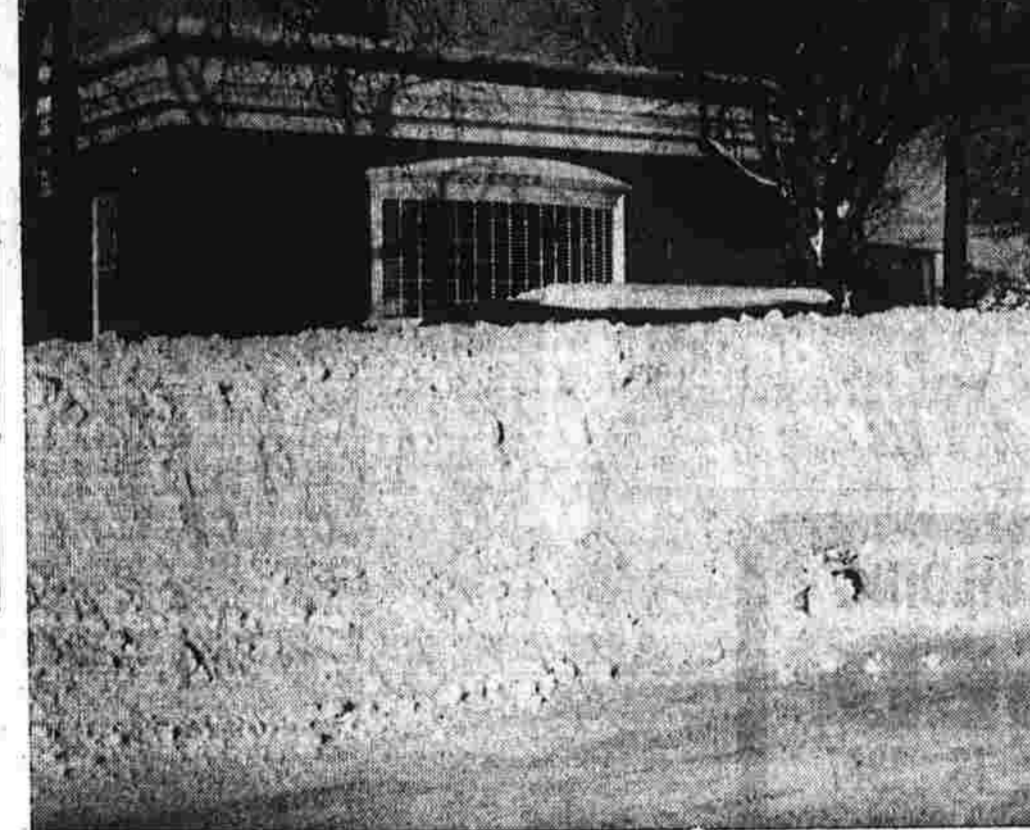
All Patients Escape Fire At Hospital

NORWICH (AP)—Fire in a fourth-floor cloakroom forced the evacuation of about 250 patients from a Norwich State Hospital building early today. No injuries were reported.

A hospital spokesman said that 100 patients from the fourth floor were moved, as well as about 150 others from other floors of the Kettle Building.

Damage was estimated at about \$1,000.

Record Low Of 13 Below At Bradley

NEW HAVEN (AP)—A howling, hungry blizzard bit deep into the state's transport arteries yesterday, forcing thousands of residents to shovel through heavy snowdrifts in bitter cold.

Many persons throughout the state were forced to stay home from school, from shopping trips and from most unessential activity. Many were kept from going to work.

Other persons, such as two radio newsmen stranded in their broadcast station high on a mountain in Meriden, were forced to remain on or near their jobs.

Late Tuesday night the storm was still lashing Cape Cod, but the storm center was moving so rapidly into the Atlantic that only a bitter cold and high drifts remained of the storm.

Otherwise, skies were clearing across the state, and winds had begun to dissipate, though they were expected to increase again Wednesday.

Temperatures which had been in the teens Tuesday dropped below zero Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning in inland sections. A record low temperature of 13 below zero was recorded at Bradley International Airport at 6:30 a. m. today.

School was called off Tuesday throughout the state, and most remained closed today, including public schools in the Hartford, New Haven, Bridgeport, Waterbury and Stamford areas.

Many factories curtailed shifts; city halls and courts closed; and mail delivery ended earlier than usual in some areas.

26 Perish in Dixie Rooftop Cafe Fire

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—A fire which began as tiny flickers in a cloakroom roared through a fashionable rooftop dining room in downtown Montgomery Tuesday night, leaving at least 26 persons dead, including a former state official who was indicted Tuesday.

Identification was difficult because of the condition of the bodies, which were taken to four funeral homes. A police identification team assisted by FBI experts was set up to help establish the identification.

Hours after the fire had been brought under control, Fire Chief W. T. Maloney said the cause was still undetermined.

"We're trying to arrive at that by process of elimination," Maloney added.

Water pouring from the blackened ruins of Dale's Penthouse restaurant atop the 11-story Walter Bragg Smith apartment hotel froze on the sidewalks and streets in the wintry 28-degree night, making it treacherous for firemen and police to move about. A city maintenance truck spread sand over the icy coating.

A spokesman at one funeral home said positive identification had been made of the bodies of former Public Service Committee member Ed Pepper and his wife Ann. The Peppers were dining with friends at the plush cafe when the fire started about 11 p. m.

Pepper was indicted on two counts of extortion Tuesday by a federal grand jury at Birmingham.

The indictments charged he "obstructed and defamed" the transportation of goods and commodities in interstate commerce while a PSC member. A third indictment was brought against Pepper last November by the grand jury.

Also missing was Mrs. Jack Doane, wife of the sports editor of the Montgomery Advertiser. She was a hostess at the dining room. Accompanied by other guests, Doane, choking back the tears, watched horrified, as the flames leaped high into the sky above the building.

LBJ Outlines New Aid Plan For Children

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson outlined today a far-ranging program to aid youths and children, including a strengthened Head Start program and increased Social Security payments for children.

In a special message to Congress, Johnson said recent studies have confirmed that in education, in health and in all human development, the early years are critical.

"Ignorance, ill health, personality disorder—these are the disabilities often contracted in childhood. Afflictions which linger to cripple the man and damage the next generation."

"Our nation must rid itself of this bitter inheritance. Our goal must be clear—to give every child a chance to fulfill his promise."

Powell Won't Reply To Probe Questions

WASHINGTON (AP)—Adam Clayton Powell, acting on his lawyers' advice, today refused to answer questions from a House committee examining his qualifications to be seated in Congress.

As the questioning proceeded, Powell, a New York Democrat, said he would have to withdraw from the hearing.

Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., chairman of the committee considering the case, asked for a brief recess and cleared the packed hearing room to discuss the move.

Powell was flanked by seven lawyers as he sat before the nine-member panel, and, on his advice, refused to be sworn in or answer any questions other than those dealing with his age, citizenship and residency.

Those are the only qualifications for House membership mentioned in the Constitution, and Powell's attorneys said the committee had no authority to inquire beyond them.

Powell, named and rested after weeks of fishing in the Bahamas, looked unconcerned as he strode down the hall from his office to the hearing room, where a cordon of police guarded the door. He was the only scheduled witness.

Inside, Chairman Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., opened the hearing by declaring that the nine members of the committee "regard their assignment as a high public trust."

"We recognize the gravity of our responsibility and are determined to discharge our duties faithfully under the Constitution, the precedents and the relevant facts," he said.

Any prospect of a dramatic performance by the flamboyant Harlem Democrat was soon dashed.

Fragile Truce Opens Viet Buddhist Holiday

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)—A U.S. photo reconnaissance plane was downed in North Vietnam and more than a score of shooting incidents were reported in South Vietnam following the start of the lunar new year truce today.

Most of the incidents were small, and both sides appeared disposed to hold their fire.

The American reconnaissance plane went down at noon, five hours after the truce took effect, and presumably was the victim of Communist ground fire.

The Viet Cong has declared a seven-day truce for the new year celebration known as Tet. Its cease-fire is scheduled to run three days beyond the end of the allied truce at 7 a. m. Sunday—9 p. m. EST Saturday.

A U.S. spokesman in Saigon said that under the truce deal the allies would not initiate any offensive operations. But he said because of numerous violations of previous truces, the allies assumed a "high alert posture."

This entails increased patrol and security activity and air and naval reconnaissance, he explained.

The United States prepared the necessary popping of fireworks against North Vietnam for the four-day truce period but is continuing to welcome in the "Year of the Goat" at midnight. Celebrations will continue until the end of the week at least.

Hearing to Continue New Bill Would Make State Eligible for Welfare Aid

HARTFORD (AP)—The West Hartford committee on the state legislature will continue Wednesday a hearing on a bill to qualify the state for federal aid for the care of mental and tuberculous patients.

During a preliminary session of the hearing Tuesday, State Welfare Commissioner Bernard J. Shapiro said Connecticut would be eligible for \$4 million yearly in grants under the proposed bill.

The federal matching grants would be about \$2,000 a day, he said.

Only recently, said Shapiro, has the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare decided to provide help for persons over 60 in mental and tuberculous hospitals.

Shapiro recommended that the bill be modified to make it retroactive to the beginning of the current legislative session.

A hearing was scheduled for Wednesday morning for the Dempsy administration's water pollution bill.

The House and Senate were scheduled to reconvene at 1 p.m. Wednesday.

During a hearing conducted Tuesday by the General Law Committee, two persons spoke in opposition to a proposed bill.

The United Nations commemorates its Development Program (UNDP) with the issuance of two new stamps of identical design. The U.N. Development Program, combined with the Expanded Program of Technical Assistance established in 1950 and the U.N. Special Fund founded in 1959, more than \$1 billion is committed to conduct the world's largest program of multilateral technical aid to developing countries.

The new stamps came in two denominations. The 5 cents is yellow, purple, green and orange. The 11 cents is blue, green, brown and orange. The common design features a chart denoting progress through development. The inscriptions are "United Nations" and "United Nations Development Program." The U.N. seal is also noted.

Another report from the United Nations Postal Administration announces a new commemorative stamp to be issued on March 10 on the theme "Independence." The independence stamp will be in 5-cent and 11-cent denominations.

Collectors who specialize in particular countries or areas will be glad to know that the popular Minkus Regional Catalogs for 1967 are now available at stamp dealers across the nation. Pope Issues New Asian Peace Plea

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul VI appealed today to the United States and North Vietnam to turn the Buddhist New Year's truce into negotiations for peace.

The Pope made his appeal in separate messages to President Johnson, President Ho Chi Minh of North Vietnam and Chief of State Nguyen Van Thieu of South Vietnam.

In his message to Johnson, the Pope said his appeals for peace had always found "a favorable reaction on your part" and he asked the President to "increase even more your noble effort" to find a way to peace.

The Pope said he hoped that the Lunar New Year truce would lead to negotiations for a just and stable peace, putting an end to the great suffering brought on by a war protracted now for years.

The Pope made a similar appeal at the time of the Christmas-New Year truce, recommending that the fighting be stopped until the Lunar New Year truce and that peace talks begin in the meantime. The fighting resumed on schedule after each of the cease-fires.

The Pope pointed out in his message to Johnson that the United States' favorable reaction to the Lunar New Year truce was "a sign of hope in this hour of anxious waiting."

"We pray (to) Almighty God that the cease-fire will be a step toward peace with every success. We assure you, Mr. President, of our sentiments of highest confidence."

Martin Sees Canada As Viet Peacemaker

OTTAWA (AP) — Foreign Secretary Paul Martin is convinced Canada can play a useful role in Vietnam peace efforts and he is determined to avoid any action that would jeopardize this role.

In an interview, Martin acknowledged that he is under constant pressure both to give full support to U.S. Vietnam policy and to denounce U.S. policy. He said he does not intend to yield to such pressures.

He stressed that Canada, as a member of the International Control Commission along with Poland and India, is in an unusual position and that this must be taken into account in Canadian attitude on Vietnam.

"I strongly believe that there is a role for the commission as an instrument to bring about negotiations," he said. "It has contacts with both Saigon and Hanoi. Its members move freely from one capital to the other."

The commission, he indicated, has not been able to act up to now because Poland did not feel that the time was appropriate for peace initiatives.

"We believe the commission could act with effect now," Martin said. "Our view is that the conflict should be brought to an end. A military solution is neither desirable nor practicable."

He noted that Canada has not confined its efforts to working through the commission, created by the Geneva agreements of 1954.

"We sent a special emissary to Hanoi last March," he declared. "We sent him again in June. We are prepared to send him again if a useful purpose seems to suggest itself."

This was a reference to the peace missions of retired Canadian diplomat Chester Romming.

Not so reluctant as Martin to express public opinions on the Vietnam war, Romming said recently U.S. attitudes are based on the "fallacious belief in some quarters that communism is a united force bent on world conquest."

Martin, referring to Canada's readiness to send Romming to Hanoi again, said:

"This channel is open. The Canadian government will keep it open. We are doing everything we know how to bring about peace in Vietnam."

Martin refused to talk about details of Canada's peace efforts or to say whether he was encouraged by contacts with Hanoi. Victor Moore, Canada's senior representative on the commission, recently met with Hanoi for six days in Hanoi.

Events in the World

3rd French Satellite

HAMMAGUIR, Algeria (AP) — France launched her third satellite into orbit today to study the topography of the Mediterranean area.

The 50-pound satellite, named Diadem, was sent up by a French Diamant rocket from this Sahara base after a 40-minute delay to iron out technical difficulties.

Ground stations in southern France, Algeria and Greece will source laser beams off the satellite and attempt by triangulation to catalogue topographic details of the Mediterranean area and the distance between various points with more precision than is otherwise possible.

The first French satellite was launched Dec. 6, 1965, by an American rocket in the United States. The second was sent up last Feb. 17 from Hammaguir.

Whitlam Elected

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Gough Whitlam, a leader of the moderate wing of Australia's Labor party, was elected today to succeed Arthur A. Calwell as party leader.

Calwell's bitter attacks on Australia's part in the Vietnam war was believed largely responsible for the overwhelming defeat of the party announced in the last election.

Railroad Merger Hearing Pauses Today for Review

NEW YORK (AP) — An 11- or 12-witness hearing for the Penn-Central Merger Commission today was postponed for a day to allow the commission to review testimony.

The hearing was to have taken place today at the New York Central Railroad headquarters in New York City. It was to be the first of a series of hearings on the proposed merger of the New York Central and the Pennsylvania Railroad.

The commission, created by Congress in 1965, is to decide whether the merger is in the public interest. It must also decide whether it is legally possible to deny creditors and stockholders of the New Haven a vote on the merger question, so that the merger may be speeded, and to defer until after a merger is completed the question of compensating the creditors and security holders.

Counsel for various parties indicated a desire for an adjournment after today's session until next Tuesday to permit study of pre-filed testimony, in preparation for questioning of the Penn-Central witnesses.

The bankrupt New Haven's trustees have agreed with Penn-Central to hand over the New Haven for the package valued currently at about \$140 million.

The New Haven concluded its presentation Monday following a prolonged cross-questioning of its 14 witnesses by bondholder counsel seeking more for the 1972-75 to as high as \$271 million.

While the ICC set inclusion of the New Haven as a condition for its approval of the Penn-Central merger, the commission must decide on whether the sale under terms of a reorganization plan submitted by New Haven.

Bolton Dana Hanson Named to Fill Education Board Vacancy

Dana S. Hanson of Hebron Rd. was chosen by the board of education in an executive session Monday night to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Kenneth MacIntosh.

Dana S. Hanson

Hanson is regional affairs manager of the Greater Hartford Chamber of Commerce. He describes his job as being responsible for coordinating activities of the 150-member Regional Advisory Committee, the Regional Council of Elected Officials and several other committees in the area of air, rail and highway transportation.

From 1961 to 1966 he was executive director of the Cambridge (Mass.) Civic Association, and before that, manager of the civic affairs department in the Greater Boston Chamber of Commerce.

He graduated from Wellesley (Mass.) High School in 1945, served as a cadet in the ROTC, and received a B.S. in education from Boston University in 1948. He has taken additional courses in his field of work.

Again, That Good Ribicoff Bill

Senator Ribicoff has with him 48 other members of the Senate at Washington as co-sponsors. This year, his bill to provide some income tax credit for parents who are financing the higher education of their children.

The 1967 version of the Ribicoff proposal offers a special income tax credit of up to \$250 for any expenditure of \$1,500 or over for the higher education of a son or daughter.

The arguments for the bill are many. It honors a principle dear to the American tradition. And it helps parents pay for education at a time when education is becoming increasingly expensive.

It offers its help democratically, to everybody. But it should be no argument against the bill's soundness to note that its benefits will be most welcome in those income groups which stand in between the high income groups which can afford college expenses anyway, and those lower income groups whose income is so low they do not pay enough income tax to be able to use the proposed educational deduction.

There is, as a great group of American parents who occupy it can attest, a great middle zone which needs particular help when it comes to the expenses of higher education. College has grown to be something more expensive than they can afford out of their incomes. But their incomes are still respectable enough to close the door to scholarship aid based on need.

As Senator Ribicoff said in introducing his bill this time, the measure is even more timely than before, because the federal government has now greatly expanded its aid to higher education through scholarships and loans. The income tax credit proposal would help families which need help but can't get it under the scholarship and loan program.

We hope the fact that this bill, this time, begins its life with 47 votes already assured is an augury of good fortune for it. And we hope that, this time, the argument will not be raised against it that, because it may be of special and crucial benefit to the one income group which otherwise gets no help in its educational expenses, it should be considered class legislation.

Not to pass such a bill is, in view of everything else government does for everybody else, the real class discrimination. It is the real class discrimination which Senator Ribicoff's special crusade was yielded its victory, which would be a victory not only for the American belief in education, but also a victory for fairness in government's help to its citizens.

Right to Silence
LOS ANGELES - After watching "From Here to Eternity" on the late show with his son last June 12, Chester W. Weger of Pasadena, Calif., decided to take a turn around the block and get a breath of air, even though it was 2:30 a.m. During this commonplace occurrence, Mr. Weger was unconstitutionally searched by a Los Angeles police officer.

On his walk, Mr. Weger, a 46-year-old aeronautical engineer, was stopped by two Pasadena police officers who wanted to know what he was up to. Mr. Weger gave them his name and told them he lived nearby, but refused on principle to accede to the officers' request that he produce some form of identification.

The officers arrested Mr. Weger and booked him under the anti-loitering law, which states that a person is guilty of a misdemeanor "who loiters or wanders upon the streets without apparent purpose and who refuses to identify himself and to account for his presence in the area in which he is loitering."

Judge Louis T. Fletcher of the Pasadena Municipal Court dismissed the charge when Mr. Weger appeared before him, but the city appealed. Judge Fletcher has since explained that "one cannot be charged as a criminal simply because he refused to identify himself to the satisfaction of a police officer."

This month Judge Shibley M. Hufstader of the appellate department of the Superior Court, which handles appeals from municipal courts, found that the law violates the Fifth Amendment. The violation seeks 3 indictments in the 1964 murder of three Civil Rights workers at Philadelphia, Miss., and the killing of Negro leader Vernon Dahmer at Hattiesburg.

It should be stressed there is no evidence whatsoever to go with the Klan claims that Eastland or his agents made any promises. Mississippians who know Eastland best are quite confident that, whatever he might have told the Klan, the threat and caution senator would not interfere with the processes of justice.

Reuther Rules Out AFL-CIO Split Now

WASHINGTON (AP)—Unbowed Auto Workers President Walter Reuther, in quitting the role of executive board chief, "regitimate and binding" before last Friday's announcement that Reuther and all other UAW officials had quit their AFL-CIO posts.

Reuther's cold war with AFL-CIO President George Meany yet may lead the UAW chief to yank his union out of the federation, but he used the UAW's own constitution to block such a move for the present.

The UAW is one of only 10 unions of the 125 affiliated unions whose constitution calls for membership in the 18.4 million member AFL-CIO.

Reuther, who joined Meany in founding the modern "House of Labor" 11 years ago, generally is regarded as the No. 2 man in the federation. Sources in his Detroit headquarters say Reuther wants to avoid a complete break if possible.

Meany also said "the days of the UAW sitting back and not criticizing President Meany and other AFL-CIO leaders are over."

Reuther and other UAW officials profess disenchantment with what they call complacency, lack of vision in social and economic affairs, and a too rigid foreign policy under Meany's leadership.

Meany said he was sure the executive board would be given authority at the convention to disaffiliate the UAW from the AFL-CIO. But he wouldn't speculate on whether the board would exercise that authority.

A curiosity in the large collection of family Valentines owned by Mrs. Richard Olmsted is this Punch and Judy show, with three different scenes which came into the opening.

The store, owned by Dow and in "Manchester: Past Places, Hatch, was on Church St. in Hartford. The historic Buckland Tavern was not located on the site of the present building, as stated in the column on May 11, but on a lane branching off from that site toward the cemetery, according to Mrs. Ethel Strong, who remembers that building since demolished.

Some valentines were apparently of the type called "Cupid's Game with Hearts," and is a satin-bound quarto with appropriate selections and illustrations upon a dozen pages, all very daintily printed. Another is called "Cupid and Coelets or the Documents in an Attachment Case." This is a handsome bound volume with pages are the exhibits, consisting of telegrams, bill of lading, bills of exchange and the like.

At Trinity College, a contest was held on Feb. 14 in which candidates for a scholarship, "who must be studying for the ministry," competed in reciting passages from the Scriptures. Top French Diplomat Is Unknown at Home

PARIS (AP) — He's one of the world's leading diplomats but Maurice Couve de Murville is hardly known here. He is much interested in his job. For the first time in his 26 years in government, Couve de Murville, 60, is trying to be elected a deputy by Parliament.

De Gaulle was anxious to have Cabinet members, especially the most important men in order to strengthen the New Republic — INR — party. The president felt that a Gaullist majority in Parliament is vital to his continued efforts to remake the French political scene.

Under the Fifth Republic, an alternate for each deputy is elected at the same time as the deputy. The alternate takes the seat if the deputy leaves the assembly for any reason. His constitution also says a person cannot be a minister and a deputy at the same time. Hence, a deputy must resign from the assembly to take a Cabinet post and his alternate becomes the assemblyman.

NEW YORK AP — The East Coast's millions, red-faced and numb in biting cold, struggled through the mountainous residue of a paralyzing blizzard today. Many schools remained closed, and the wheels of commerce and industry were slow to resume turning. As the storm that dumped up to 15 inches of snow on some sections swirled northward off Newfoundland, bitter cold rolled in from the Midwest, and plunged temperatures to sub-zero levels from the Canadian Border to Tennessee.

(Continued from Page One) out windows and crawling onto the roof surrounding the penthouse. One of them was Bill White of Dothan, Ala., a truck-line president who was with Mr. and Mrs. Pepper. White, his hand bleeding after he had smashed a window and led others to safety, said he saw no trace of the former state official or his wife after the fire erupted with a "whoosh" into a raging inferno. Relatives of diners who had gone to Dale's Penthouse to eat stood with gnawing fear, awaiting word on the number and identification of the dead. Firemen poking through the still-smoking ruins found some bodies huddled in closets and storerooms hours after the fire began. Police kept spectators and newsmen apart the street.

In New York City, where the mercury dropped to 11 degrees at 2:30 a.m., more than 100 persons took refuge in the armories opened by Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller to house the thousands of soldiers whose apartments and homes had no heat. Hotels did a booming business Tuesday night. Most schools were closed again today along the coast, including those in New York, the nation's largest city. In New Jersey, Gov. Richard J. Hughes declared today a banking holiday. In New York, the stock exchanges and banks said they would be open today. A total of 4,400,000 shares was traded on the New York Stock Exchange Tuesday before it closed an hour and a half early at 2 p.m. There were 10,680,000 shares traded on the exchange Monday.

The weather bureau said a zero-degree line early this morning enticed an area from Maine across Ohio and Illinois to North Dakota. Freezing extended deep into Dixie. A scattering of snow fell around the Great Lakes and across the Plains. Fair skies were dominant westward to the Pacific. The Weather Bureau said sunny but cold weather was in store for the bulk of the nation. Snow flurries were forecast for north central and southwest areas with a chance of flurries from the Dakotas through the Midwest. Great Lakes. Some moderation of temperature is slated for the early morning temperatures around the Great Lakes and across the Pacific, Arctic and the Atlantic. Melting water from the Columbia icefield, in Canada's Banff and Jasper National Parks reaches three oceans—the Pacific, Arctic and the Atlantic. Major airports in the East remained closed overnight as crews worked to clear runways to allow at least a limited resumption of operations. These included Kennedy and LaGuardia airports in New York, Newark Airport and Philadelphia International Airport. Philadelphia International Airport reopened on a limited basis at 6 a.m. Most major arteries and main highways in the East had at least one lane open in each direction. In Philadelphia, where 14 inches of snow fell, the city pressed a snow-melting machine into duty on an experimental basis but freezing temperatures proved ineffective. The machine sucked up snow, melts it and pumps the water onto the street to run into sewers. But the water froze before it could run off. The city planned to use salt to combat this.
