

McNamara to Congress:

Air War Stepup Won't Halt Hanoi

WASHINGTON (AP) — The bombing of North Vietnam has failed to reduce significantly the infiltration of men and material into the South and there is no evidence increased attacks would prove more successful, Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara told Congress in testimony released today.

In what amounted to a sharp rebuttal to those who advocate a stepup in the bombing of the North, McNamara repeatedly told often skeptical members at a joint Senate Armed Services and Appropriations Committee hearing, "I don't believe that the bombing up to the present has significantly reduced, nor any bombing that I could contemplate in the future would significantly reduce, the actual flow of men and material to the South."

At another point, McNamara indicated that it may be the North Vietnamese — not the U.S. bombing efforts — who control the rate of infiltration.

"Undoubtedly, the bombing does limit the capability of the North Vietnamese to infiltrate men and equipment into the South," the defense chief said. "But it is not clear that the limit that results is below the level that the North Vietnamese planned on, and in any event, it is not below the level necessary to support the force in the South at the present time."

McNamara explained that despite his reservations he believes the air campaign against the North has been successful when viewed against its stated objectives.

He described these as:

1. Increasing the morale of the South Vietnamese;
2. Increasing the cost to the North of its infiltration;
3. Raising the political price paid by the North to continue the campaign in the South.

"Those were the stated objectives we had in mind and we have accomplished them," McNamara said.

McNamara and Chairman Earle G. Wheeler of the Joint Chiefs of Staff appeared at the closed Senate hearings Jan. 23, 24 and 25 to testify on the \$12.7-billion Vietnam war supplemental money bill.

They dwelled at length on the effectiveness of U.S. bombing and the rate of North Vietnamese infiltration. Some of their testimony was censored from the transcript released.

McNamara acknowledged that the Johnson administration now has "many signs" that the rate of North Vietnamese infiltration, which averaged 5,300 men a month for the first nine months according to administration estimates, fell off sharply in the October-December period.

At one point, McNamara told the senators that "my guess, and it is only a guess, based on very fragmentary information, is that it has fallen off in the last three months, and I would be surprised, frankly, if it was much over 4,500 per month for the year." This would mean that infiltration in the last three months of 1966 was slightly over 2,000 per month.

McNamara emphasized, "I don't believe any amount of bombing, within practical limits, of North Vietnam would have substantially reduced the rate of infiltration."

DaVinci Work In Washington, Price Unknown

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Gallery of Art announced today it has acquired Leonardo Da Vinci's Portrait of Ginevra de' Benci, the only generally acknowledged painting by the Italian Renaissance master known to be in private hands or in any collection outside of Europe.

The gallery declined comment on published reports that the price for the masterpiece was between \$5 million and \$8 million, the highest ever paid by a gallery for an art work.

The figures were given in stories in the Washington Star and the New York Times.

The portrait will go on display March 17, the gallery's anniversary. The gallery opened March 17, 1941.

The published stories identified the seller as Prince Franz Josef II of Liechtenstein, a tiny principality between Switzerland and Austria.

Mao Backers Resume Viet Policy Attacks

Stiff Terms Urged Before Peace Talks

TOKYO (AP) — Despite reports of new unrest in Red China's strategic border areas and elsewhere, Mao Tse-tung's supporters turned to foreign policy today and urged Hanoi to stiffen its terms for peace talks.

After weeks in which the Maoist organs virtually ignored Vietnam and other foreign policy questions, except for Moscow-Peking relations, the Peking People's Daily took note of recent moves to bring the United States and North Vietnam to the negotiating table.

"The whole point of the Vietnam problem revolves around the withdrawal of (U.S. and allied) aggressive forces from Vietnamese territory, not on the question of the cessation of U.S. bombing," the People's Daily said.

This implied a bête to Hanoi, which last week said it was prepared to talk peace with the United States if the Americans "put an immediate end" to their bombing of North Vietnam. Hanoi did not mention a troop withdrawal as a condition of negotiations.

The People's Daily said the United States and the Soviet Union were trying to blackmail Hanoi. The newspaper added that Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin's talks in London with British Prime Minister Harold Wilson constituted "proof that the Soviet revisionists are trying to sell out the Vietnamese revolution and are supporting U.S. aggression."

What prompted Communist China's sudden emphasis on foreign policy was not clear. The People's Daily editorial said the Vietnam situation was at "a critical stage," and over the weekend Chinese Foreign Minister Chen Yi declared that Peking would not change its foreign policy because of the great cultural revolution, Mao's battle to purge President Liu Shao-chi's supporters from the government and the party machinery.

Chen Yi charged that the imperialists, presumably the United States and the Soviet Union,

Court Backs Auto Search, Drug Conviction Upheld

Supreme Court upheld today a California narcotics conviction despite a claim that it was based on unconstitutional search of an automobile for evidence.

Justice Hugo L. Black, delivering the 5-4 opinion, said police seized Joe Nathan Cooper's auto because of the crime for which they arrested him. It would be unreasonable to hold, Black said, that police had no right to search the vehicle in those circumstances even though they did not have a search warrant.

"We cannot hold unreasonable under the 4th Amendment the examination or search of a car validly held by officers for use as evidence in a forfeiture proceeding," Black wrote.

REASONING REJECTED
WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court rejected today a dissenting plan for the Texas House of Representatives.

The plan now goes back to a three-judge federal court in Houston where the state will have a chance to justify variations from the "one man-one vote" standard.

If the state fails to justify the population differences in districts a new start presumably will have to be made.

The 6-3 decision, announced in an unsigned opinion, said the majority had not been convinced that the range of deviations was necessary under state policy calling for respect of county boundaries wherever possible.

And, the opinion said, the lower federal court did not "articulate any satisfactory grounds for rejecting at least two other plans" which respected county lines but produced substantially smaller deviations from the "one man-one vote" standard.

CONVICTIONS SET ASIDE
WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court set aside today the convictions of Ruth Elizabeth Chapman and Thomas LeRoy Teale in the 1962 slaying of a Los Angeles bartender, Teale was sentenced to death and Mrs. Chapman to life imprisonment.

By a 5-1 vote the court said Mrs. Chapman and Teale are entitled to a new trial "free from the pressure of unconstitutional inferences."

Town Man Killed In Bolton Crash

Allen C. Davidson, 27, of 302 Charter Oak St. was killed and a Rockville man injured Saturday night when the car in which they were riding plunged into two telephone poles and a tree on Bolton Center Rd. in Bolton.

Davidson was pronounced dead on arrival at Manchester Memorial Hospital. The Rockville man, Frank P. Naume, 24, of 52 Ellington Rd., was taken to MMH by ambulance where he was treated for multiple scrapes and released, a hospital spokesman reported today.

State police in Colchester, who investigated the mishap, said the wreck was discovered at 8:16 by an unidentified motorist who called the ambulance. Both victims had been removed from the scene before police arrived, they said.

Police said they do not know yet who was driving.

The car was traveling east on Bolton Center Rd. when it veered into the westbound lane and struck a telephone pole at Birch Mountain and Bolton Center Rds., police reported.

The car continued east across Birch Mountain Rd. Ext., hit another pole on the south side of Bolton Center Rd., then careened into a tree, they said.

The vehicle was demolished, police reported.

The accident is under investigation.

Davidson was one of six persons who died in highway accidents in the state over the weekend. Two others perished in fires.

George LeBlond, 76, of Putnam was killed Friday night when struck by a car on Route 44.

Elizabeth Carrozza, 24, of Plainville was killed Saturday when the car she was driving left Litchfield Turnpike in

STIRKE LAW SOUGHT
MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz said today President Johnson is still considering the possibility of new legislation to deal with strikes that affect the national interest. D.A. Runs Own Show To Prove Conspiracy

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP) — A district attorney is keeping secret the details of an investigation he says is making of the Kennedy assassination, contending federal intervention might only slow him down.

Jim Garrison, betting his investigators can prove a conspiracy in New Orleans led to the death of President John F. Kennedy, spun a suggestion he give his facts to the U.S. attorney general who could pass it on to President Johnson.

"I am running this investigation, not the President, not the attorney general," said Garrison.

"I'm in charge of the operation and we've made a lot of progress working this way. So I don't propose to make any changes that might result in a slowdown and make us less effective."

Asked what the Federal Bureau of Investigation is doing about Garrison's probe, an FBI spokesman said, "the only thing I can say regarding any questions about that is, 'no comment.'"

After New Orleans newspapers broke the story of his investigation on Friday, Garrison said "irresponsible release of so many details" would delay the arrests he said would be forthcoming.

The release of details and names, he said, "has now created a problem for us in finding witnesses and getting cooperation from other witnesses and in at least one case has endangered the life of a witness — a possible witness — so that whatever timetable we might have had before is somewhat extended now."

Garrison's statement that an assassination plot was conceived in New Orleans, that he will find and arrest the conspirators and that he will obtain convictions caused widespread furor.

The district attorney refused to go into the question of whether only Lee Harvey Oswald was involved in the assassination of Kennedy in Dallas Nov. 22, 1963.

"I'd rather not comment on that," Garrison said.

"I will say this, that from our inquiry into the matter, there is no question at all that other individuals were involved in the initial planning in the New Orleans area which culminated in the death of President Kennedy."

In Miami, a Cuban exile, Bernard Torres, 32, who helped the Secret Service guard President Kennedy in Miami four days before the assassination, said Garrison had engaged him to look into the background of some Cubans reported to have

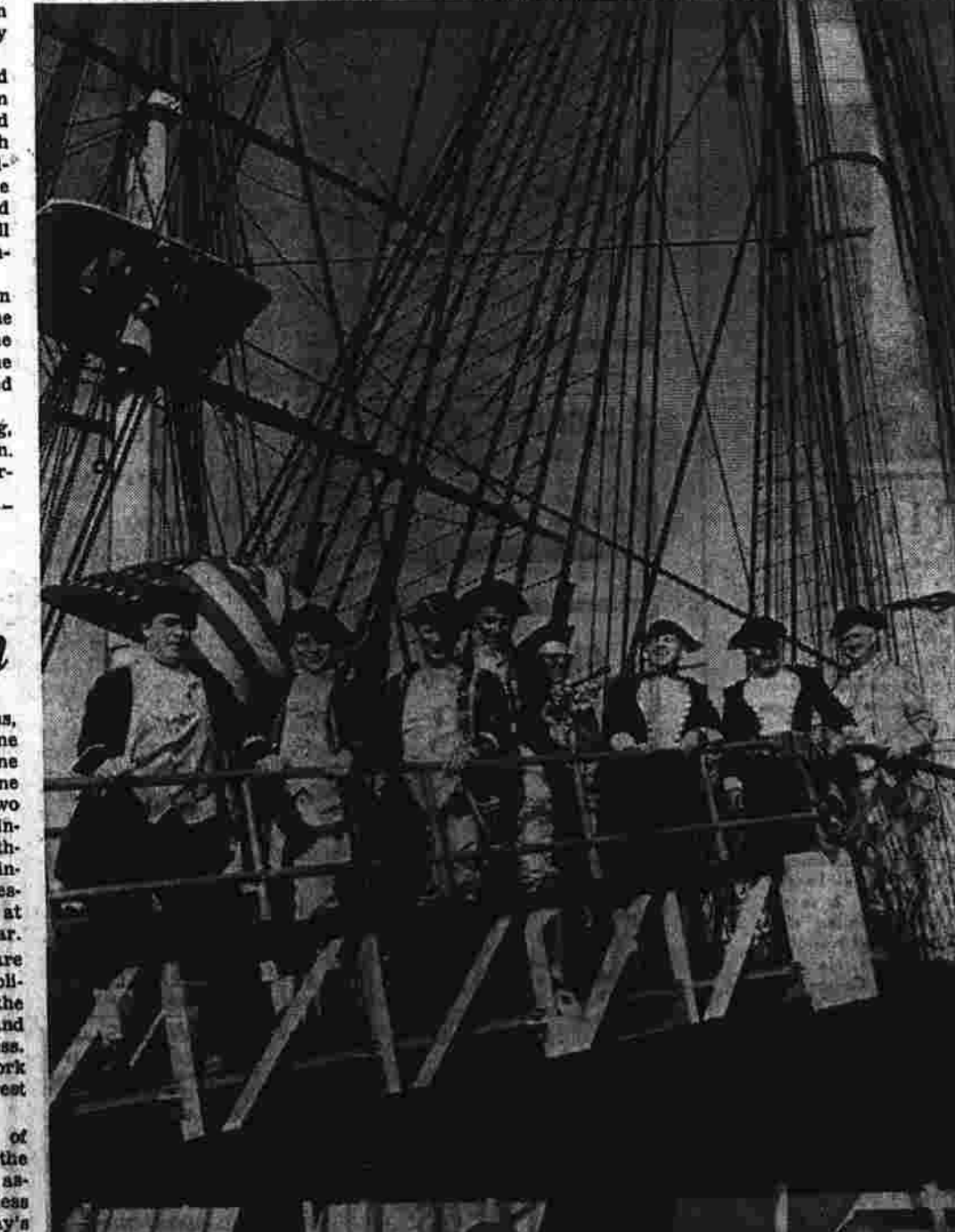

Some Salaries Top \$20,000 41 Legislators Employ Kin

EDITOR'S NOTE — The relative-employees exceeded \$305,000, but have none working for them now.

No law bars nepotism, although Rep. Neal Smith, D-Iowa, again has introduced a bill to prohibit it anywhere within the federal government.

Smith has sponsored similar legislation unsuccessfully each session since 1961.

Smith said that while the case of Adam Clayton Powell is the most widely known, there are other relatives "who perform little service for the salary paid."

Powell, the controversial Harlem Democrat who was denied his House seat this year pending an investigation, had his wife on his office pay roll (under her maiden name, Y. Marjorie Flores) at \$20,878 a year.

After investigators reported she lived in Puerto Rico and did no work for Powell's office, the House Administration Committee ordered her name stricken from the pay roll.

The AP study showed 15 other

wives, two daughters, four sons, four brothers, nine sisters, one niece, one grandnephew, one cousin, one uncle, one aunt, one granddaughter, one father, two sisters-in-law, two brothers-in-law, one son-in-law, two mothers-in-law and one brother-in-law's wife are on the congressional payroll — or were at some time during the past year.

Of the 45 congressmen, 33 are Democrats and 12 are Republicans. This compares with the division of 310 Democrats and 223 Republicans in Congress.

Fourteen of the relatives work in home state offices, the rest on Capitol Hill.

Four years ago, the wives of 29 House members were on the pay roll, along with 19 other assorted relatives. That is two less relatives than found in today's survey. Then, as now, most of their bosses made no attempt to hide the fact.

to insanity. "It isn't timely,"
he said. "The defense was available before."

Atty. Volpe contended, how-

when he and Baldwin changed
their plea last month from not
guilty to guilty.

He contended further that "at
the time of the robbery my client
was under physical duress
and was incompetent at that
time to understand what was
going on."

Judge Clarke said the doctor

plea, during the robbery, and
if he is competent now.

It was disclosed in court that

Gavin Says Peace Road Is Open Now

WASHINGTON (AP) — Soldier-diplomat James M. Gavin said today the United States, with "strong will and determination," can now negotiate for peace "confident that a free, neutral and independent Vietnam can be established."

Gavin, a retired lieutenant general and former ambassador to France, said that the avenue to peace has been opened by the upheaval inside Communist China.

"We may now deal with Ho Chi Minh with some confidence that he is free of Chinese pressure and entanglement," Gavin told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

With that knowledge, he said, it should be possible to talk peace with Hanoi and the North Vietnamese National Liberation Front, seeking a Vietnam that would be guaranteed stability and neutrality by an international body.

"It will take strong will and determination to bring peace to Vietnam and to get on with the establishment of a free government and the ultimate withdrawal of U.S. forces, but it is a task we should undertake," said Gavin, now in Cambridge, Mass., businessman.

As he did one year ago, Gavin contended against assassination of the Vietnam conflict.

He said the "destructive use of massive power against North Vietnam, with seizure and occupation of Hanoi and Haiphong, would be most dangerous."

"This might provide the very basis for bringing order into the Chinese situation, with a prompt military response to the aid of the National Government of China," Gavin said.

He also spoke critically of American bombing in Vietnam.
