Cong Mortar Barrage Riddles U.S. Infantry

SAIGON (AP) — A U.S. company of infantry suffered heavy casualties in two Communist mortar attacks during the night as it was setting up a base camp in the central highlands facing the Cambodian border, U.S. military headquarters announced today. A spokesman said the company of 170 men of the U.S. 4th Infantry Division was hit by heavy mortar shelling 41 miles southwest of Kontum City. The mortar heavy casualties usually means a unit is no longer an effective fighting force. Four 4th Division tanks in the same area beat off a close-quarter attack by Communist anti-aircraft troops who climbed aboard the armored vehicles. The tank crews raised each other's turrets with machine-gun fire to clear off the Communists, and U.S. headquarters said that the men sustained no casualties and only light damage to three tanks. It was the first time reported in the Vietnam war that the enemy climbed onto tanks although this was a tactic frequently employed by the Communists in the Korean war. Sukarno Yields in Indonesia Under Threat of Plot Probe

Early Return Cuts Power of Ghandi Party

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — India's once invincible Congress party suffered a series of defeats from both the left and right in early returns today from the week-long national elections. One of Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's Cabinet ministers lost his seat in Parliament to an opponent from the right-wing Hindu Jan Sangh party and two other Cabinet members were 'trailing elsewhere. Despite the early reversals, the Congress party was expected to retain its majority in the lower house of Parliament. But it appeared to be heading for a sharp reduction in its 234-seat majority in the last house of the nation's capital, where the party swept six of seven allotted seats. Finance Minister Sachindra Chaudhuri was trailing in his constituency at Calcutta, while Railways Minister S.K. Patil was lagging at Bombay. In northern Bombay, returns in the preliminary stages show former Defense Minister V.K. Mehta.

Keeps Title, But Suharto Gets Power

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — President Sukarno tonight surrendered his presidential powers to Indonesian strong man Gen. Suharto and thus ended 21 years of one-man rule. By his own statement, he remains president in name only and even this title may be taken away from him. Informed sources said Congress at its meeting next month may take a final disposition of the future. There was speculation whether Sukarno would leave Indonesia. But his Japanese wife, Fatma Sari Dewi, said in Tokyo she did not believe he will leave the country. She is in Tokyo to await the birth of her first child. Sukarno had surrendered most of his powers to Suharto last March, but he remained a symbol to millions of Indonesians as the father of Indonesia's independence. A signed statement by Sukarno said he gave all power to Suharto "for the sake of the people and the country." Sukarno's stepdown was not a full resignation but was a surrender of executive powers. The 65-year-old president, who led this huge East Asian nation from Dutch colonial rule to independence, will remain president in name only. His decision came following two weeks of intensive pressure from Suharto and his military followers. Sukarno had been warned that if he did not hand over power he would be investigated by Congress and possibly brought to trial. There were no indications what compromises were made with Suharto. However, political and military sources said Sukarno would not be brought to trial. There was no indication if Sukarno would remain in Indonesia or leave the country. Sukarno's statement said Suharto would have to report to him regularly on how he was using the presidential powers. But this was probably a face-saving gesture. Following an attempt by Indonesian Communists to seize power Oct. 1, 1965, many of the coup leaders were brought to trial and some implicated Sukarno in the attempt. Congress, Indonesia's highest legislative body, will meet March 7. It placed high on its agenda an investigation of Sukarno's activities. Both Suharto and Foreign Minister Adam Malik had made it clear that if Sukarno did not step aside they would proceed with the congressional investigation. (See Page Two)

Judge Modifies News Guidelines In Speck Trial

PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — Judge Herbert C. Poeschl modified today — in part — his controversial guidelines for reporters covering the trial of Richard Speck, charged with murdering eight student nurses. The judge handed out a supplemental order before the start of the third day of Speck's trial. The rules had drawn protests from spokesmen for newspapers and broadcasters and prompted a suit requesting the Illinois Supreme Court to remove some of the restrictions. The supplemental order lifted the ban on use of the official transcript by newsmen — one of the points criticized in the protests and in the suit. "After the jurors are selected and sworn to try the issues," the supplemental order set forth, "the official court reporters shall be permitted to take orders for the transcript of these proceedings from any representative of the news media." The supplemental order also directed that the names and addresses of prospective jurors who are excused may be published. "But detailed questions and answers provided to the press come late May, desert heat will take over." The canvas classrooms will be used for the trial.

CIA Bid to Cut Financing Runs Into Outside Block

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Central Intelligence Agency sought to curtail its financing of private organizations in the past but ran into objections from other arms of the government, says Sen. Milton R. He said the spy agency's checks were subject to scrutiny in the Bureau of the Budget, the Security Council, a White House agency. School in a Tent Canvas Classrooms Used in California

CALIFORNIA, Calif. (AP) — classrooms will become portable in a tent. How did the youngsters of the Imperial Valley farming community get into such a predicament? Mary Sherry, an English teacher, said of the students: "At first they were so intense that we thought their feelings were hurt about moving out of the main building. But it was just that they were trying hard not to goof off." Superintendent of Schools James A. Stevens said he had anticipated many problems but everything had worked out smoothly. Manchester: Past Places, People

INVENTIONS, INDUSTRIES

Manufacturing and the inventiveness which developed it progressed rapidly in Orford Parish, later to be called Manchester, during the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries largely because of the availability of excellent sources of water power.

The first settlers in this area had to be primarily concerned with providing food and shelter from the severe winters of their families and their cattle. Their farms were large in acreage and each had to be self-sufficient. The ingenuity developed on a farm could be valuable in a small industry. Saw mills, grist mills, and blacksmith shops were built along the Hockanum River. Bigelow Brook and Hop Brook.

Economy changed with the end of the Revolutionary War made people realize that they had progressed beyond the problems of mere existence and that the need for self-sufficiency, in dependence of Britain, was a pressing matter. By the end of the eighteenth century in this area, the transition had been made from agriculture to small manufacturing. Men were inventing means of making a little extra and of relieving the women of the burden of making in their homes a cloth for the family's clothes and other necessities.

The first woolen mill to flourish in the United States was started by Aaron Buckland in 1790 and continued manufacturing until 1941 in the area, which became known as Hilliardville as Elisha Hilliard and later his son owned and operated the mill. The record of making blankets for the War of 1812 and the Civil War and khaki cloth for the soldiers of World War I. Several United States presidents have worn on their inauguration day, clothing of woolen cloth from this mill.

Attempts had been made in the state to locate cotton mills, but the first successful one in Connecticut was this one. It was erected in 1794 by Samuel Pitkin in Union Village on the Hockanum River. The machinery was made by a native of England, John Warburton, on the principles of the water frame. The mill was a success and a factory was built in 1828. John Mather put a mill northeast of Pitkin's in another stream, where he made cotton and powder.

Mather invented a machine shop near the springs in the woods north of the mill church where, according to a 1923 newspaper clipping, "He invented the first power loom weaving checks and plaids. The patent was dated Aug. 19, 1828." He further rigged up a loom pump and was able to supply water to people who lived near the Center.

Lyman Devoe was a farmer and an inventor. He did not invent the idea of using iron ploughs, according to the Bidwell and Spies "History" had. He made an unsuccessful attempt to sell hoop skirts in New York but, after returning to Manchester, he got a government contract on Dec. 27, 1862, to furnish 10,000 dozen pairs of iron hoops for the army. He was paid \$10,000. In 1864, he got a second contract to furnish 25,000 shirts at \$2.00, or \$50,000.

ant story on March 5, 1910. Mr. Lyman was a prominent inventor and successfully holding many town offices, and representing his town several times in the state legislature.

Improved Guns Major improvements on guns were made by Cyrus Buckland, born in Manchester on Aug. 10, 1799. Eventually he patented a new rifle in 1823, reported from the Hartford Courant.

In 1828, Mr. Buckland became a pattern maker in the U.S. arsenal at Springfield, Mass., and he soon realized that iron was the best material for guns. He designed machinery for making a new type of firearm.

Later he built 13 machines to make stocks for the guns from the rough state to the point where they required only smoothing of the outer surface. In particular, "the milling of the breech screw brought him the attention of the British government. In 1857, it made possible the interchange of parts, any screw fitting any rifle. The stocking machines and other improvements he made reduced the cost of making muskets 85 per cent. The British government copied the machines and other European countries also took advantage of them."

Like some other inventive geniuses, Mr. Buckland did not personally profit from his developments except for a \$10,000 Congressional grant on his retirement in 1859 when he was broken down in health.

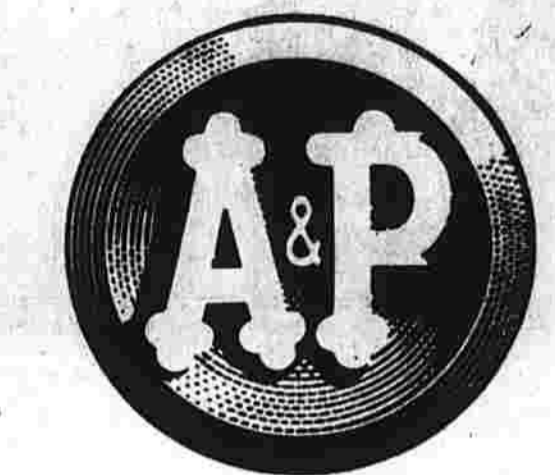

Guidelines Reached On Industrial Aid

The Board of Directors and a subcommittee of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce, after a 2 1/2-hour session last night, ironed out the differences over the guidelines of a town policy for aiding industrial development.

3. The plan for the proposed road must be approved by the appropriate town agency or commission.

4. The town must be guaranteed title to the proposed road, before construction starts.

5. Proposed water and sewer utilities will be constructed by the developer, when existing town facilities, or the ability to contract for them, make it feasible.

6. The town will contribute 50 per cent of the cost of a road or water and sewer facilities, to include engineering, planning and actual construction, and to be paid to the developer to be used for the facility or facilities are completed and accepted by the town.

7. The developer will pay the remaining 50 per cent of the cost and, in addition, will post a bond in an amount equal to the town's contribution.

8. The developer will be responsible for the engineering, planning, construction and full cost of the facility or facilities and will be paid the town's contribution when the facility or facilities are completed and accepted by the town.

WASHINGTON (AP)—A special House team will probe the Jan. 27 fire that killed three U.S. astronauts after finding "a remarkable number of similarities" between the blaze and a later fire that fatally burned two astronauts.

Chairman L. Mendel Rivers, D-S.C., of the House Armed Services Committee ordered the investigation Tuesday after receiving a report that safety procedures were inadequate in tests at Brooks Air Force Base, Tex., where the airman received fatal burns four days after the astronauts perished in their space capsule at Cape Kennedy, Fla.

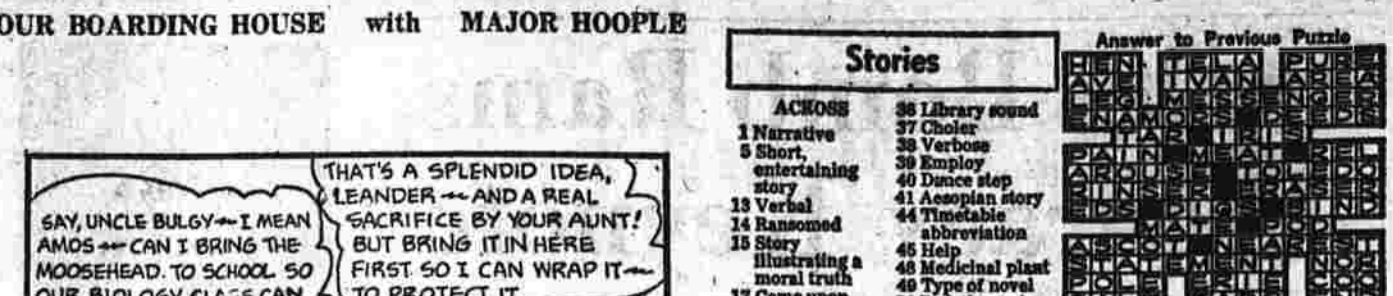

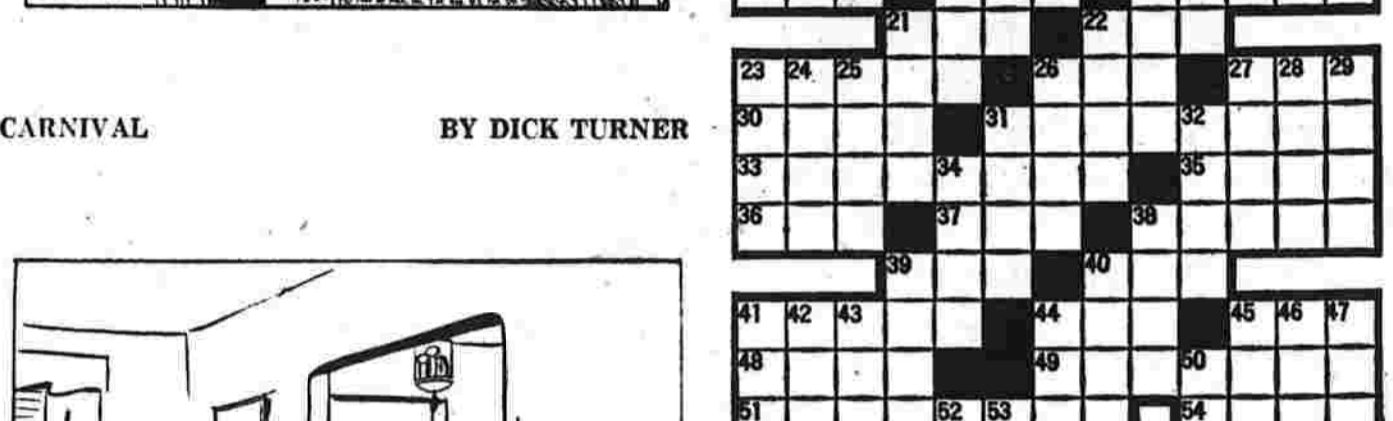
