

Price Should Have Been Calculable As the list of organizations which may have, wittingly or unwittingly, received money from the CIA continues to grow the affair threatens to take on something of a light opera quality. There is something almost comic in the spectacle of the Newspaper Guild, the AFL-CIO, the YWCA, the National Council of Churches, and Socialist Norman Thomas wrestling with the double question of how in the world they ever appened to get involved in such a business, and just how wicked was it, anyway?

Obviously, CIA money went into a wide variety of functioning, including hat of many organizations the CIA probably never had any idea of controlling or influencing. And it provided this kind of money, apparently, quite as willingly as it set out its dollars in organizations and in areas from which it xpected, and exacted, some definite return in the realm of policy or espionage. Of some of these CIA expenditures, then it becomes quite easy to ask what harm was really done. It is even possible to contend that great good may

have been done. Is there anything wrong with such an pproach? Is there, after all, some good kind of case to be made for all those members of government, both in the executive and the legislative branch, who had to know something of all this that was going on, and who never ob-

The answer to such questions comes ap against consideration of the method

The method was roundabout and seeret and deliberately deceptive, usually nvolving the funneling of the original government money into one dummy undation which would, in turn, funnel t into another more respectable founfation which would then dispense it to the organization or activity the CIA wished to encourage and sustain.

This was the method employed not merely because the CIA wished to hide its moves from its enemies abroad, not nerely because it didn't want its someimes unwitting assistants at home to know precisely what they were doing. There was an additional reason for method. It was that there would have been no legal way for the federal government to pass out tax dollars to uch organizations or such individuals

or such purposes. Such deception, such evasion of the will always come out, sooner or ater. This should be the rigid realistic alculation any time anything like it is ever inaugurated.

There is another calculation, less igid, but not easily gainsaid. It is that, when the business of deception and evasion of the law does come out, the realzation that all this has been woven so eply into the fabric of the national chavior is likely to do the nation a narm much more important than the of all the tactical goods that may claimed to have resulted from activifostered by such methods. finally, aside from the calculation of

The bird is about as large as a chicken and stands upright, like a penguin, with its short wings resting by its side. Occasionally, as if to reassure itself that it is essentially a bird, the cagou will soar several feet into the air and then drop, appar-
