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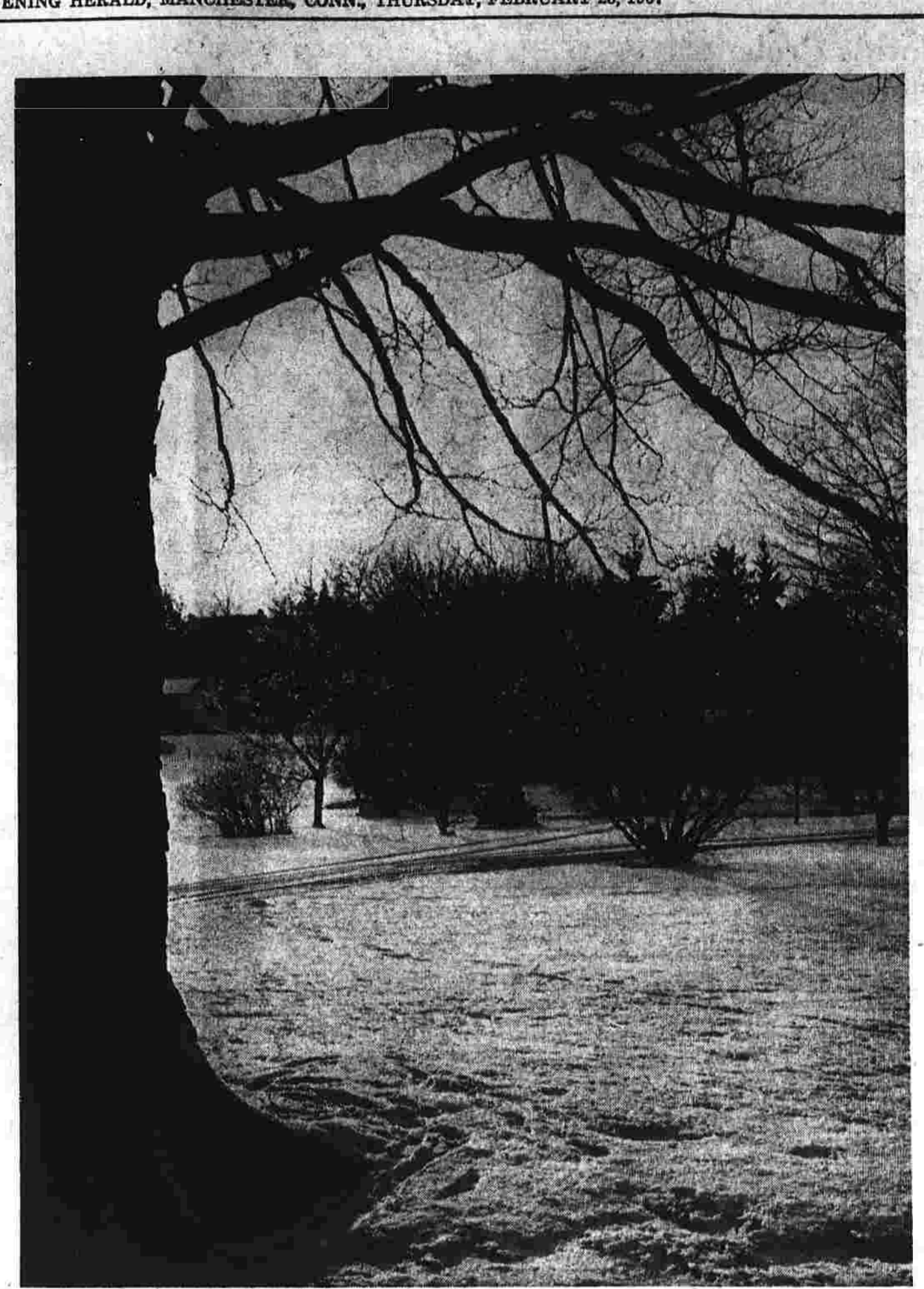

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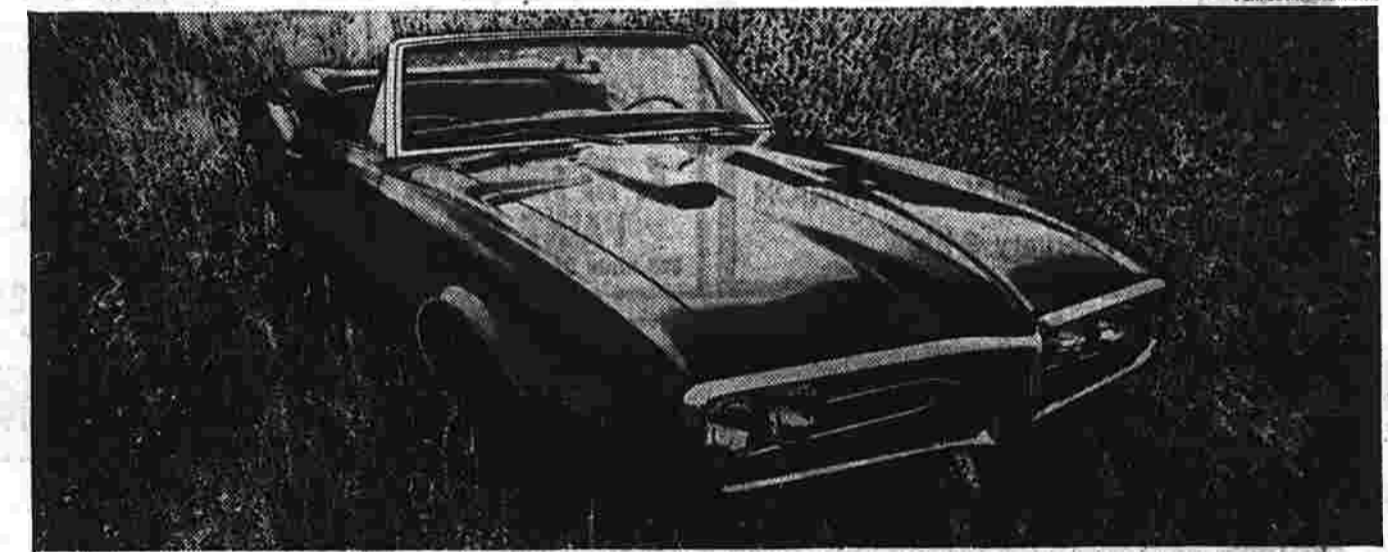

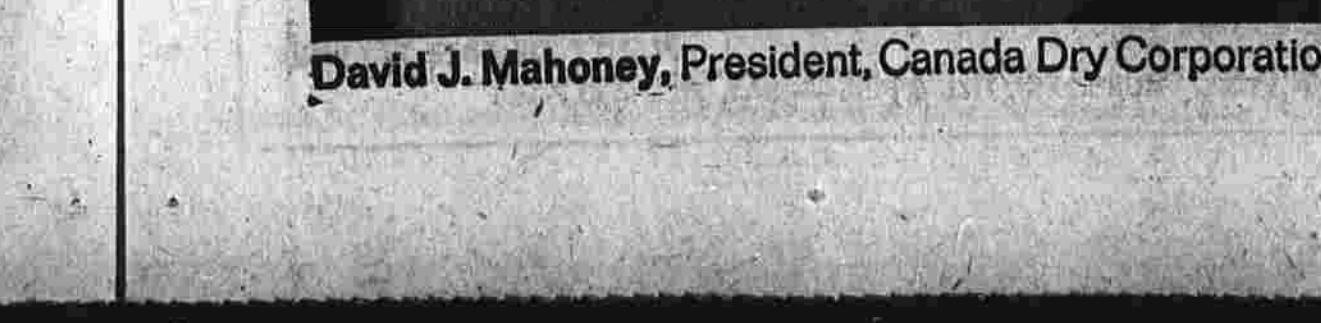

### Columbia Letter to Parents Explains Public Kindergarten Values

George Patros, principal of Porter School, has documented an impressive outline of the values and meaningfulness of a public school kindergarten. The compilation will be sent home to parents of kindergartners to establish a public kindergarten.

Patros says, "A good kindergarten pays more than lip service to the concept that there is no average child. Obvious physical differences exist and are reported, but not so obvious emotional and intellectual differences can too easily be overlooked in the elementary school.

"A teacher will work to respect each child's individual rate of learning—and as the discerning kindergarten teacher grows in her understanding of each child she will work to help each achieve his maximum potential."

Patros pointed out three basic facts to remember: one, that learning occurs most effectively when the child has reached a psychological and physical stage of readiness to learn; two, that the stage of readiness is not effectively predicted by the child's chronological age and, three, most of the effort directed toward learning before readiness occurs is lost and is often detrimental to later effective learning of the task.

"Research shows," continues Patros, "the average child is not ready to read until he has reached the mental age of approximately six years and six months, and starting children to school too soon often causes a feeling of failure which is not conducive to future growth and development."

A kindergarten was added to the local school system last fall, housed in its own private wing. There are more than 90 children enrolled.

The curriculum includes reading, language, arts, arithmetic, social studies, science, music, art and physical education.

Patros points out, in an introduction to his outline, that kindergarten is where a five-year-old has an opportunity to satisfy a growing curiosity

Zoning Panel Approves Cemetery on Deming St.

The planning and zoning commission has granted approval for a cemetery between Deming and Smith Sts. The application was made by the Catholic Cemeteries Association of the Archdiocese of Hartford.

The land for the planned cemetery is owned by the estate of Jean A. Hackett, Albert, Edward and Leon Schweit, Levi T. Dewey, Benedict, Paul and Walter Kupchunas and Alex Seta. Some 220 acres are contained in the parcel.

The application was approved by a unanimous vote of the five-member planning and zoning commission. The only stipulation contained in the approval was that the main entrance to the cemetery be no closer than 250 feet to Deming St. and Buckland Rd.

Some opposition from property owners in the Deming St. and Buckland Rd. area was noted. The main areas of objection were aimed at the possibility of the cemetery's depressing property values in the area and creating a potential traffic hazard on Buckland Rd.

It was indicated, however, that a shrine cemetery is planned with only a flat area for grave markers and appropriate stonework in designated areas of the cemetery.

Subdivision Amendments In other action, the commission postponed a decision on proposed amendments to the subdivision regulations. The group indicated that more study on the item was necessary.

The amendments deal with the location of utilities on town right-of-ways in subdivisions and the proper identification of such utilities. An additional requirement proposed would require a guarantee from developers that trees planted on treeless lots or lots without proper trees would stay alive for at least one year.

This would protect property owners as developers must plant on such lots at least two trees with a minimum diameter of two inches.

Also required would be an "as built" set of plans filed for future reference with the town.

These would be submitted by the developer and certified by his engineer and would show how the development was actually built with the location of gas and water valves. A performance bond would be required.

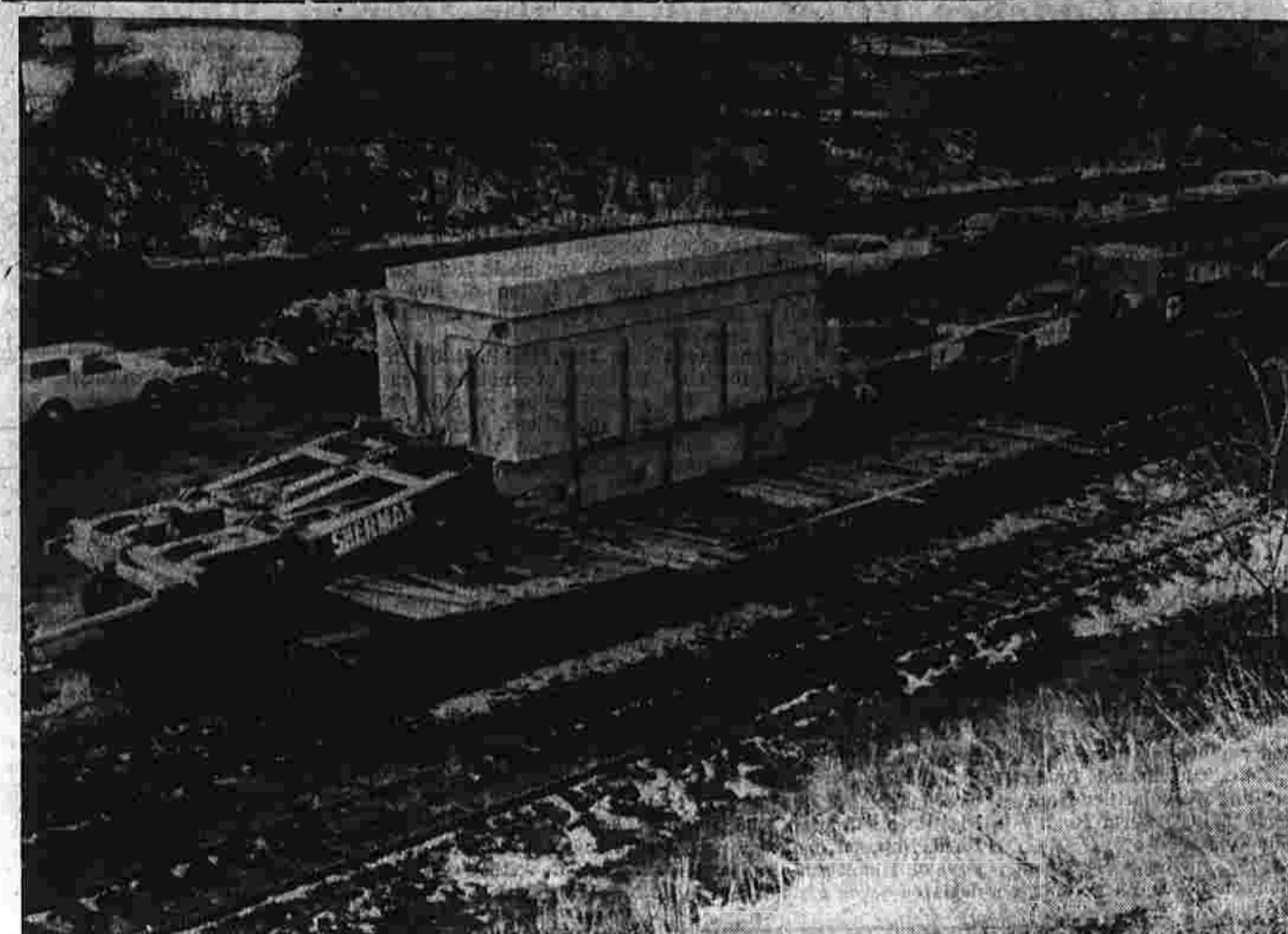

Maynards Come Forward, Inheritance Is Waiting

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — Stanley Maynard, a wealthy bachelor businessman, was very proud of his name. He dreamed of doing something for all the Maynards.

Maynard, who died Feb. 12, fulfilled his dream in a unique way. The counties specified were Cuyahoga (Cleveland), Lorain, Summit, Lake, Geauga, Portage, Ashland, Medina, Trumbull and Huron.

The will provides that the 4 per cent of the residuary of his estate will go to the first 50 persons whose last name is Maynard to come forward, but they must be over 21, have two natural dependent children whose names also are Maynard and live within a 10-county area in northern Ohio.

The bulk of the estate of the former research consultant goes to an unmarried sister, Edythe Maynard, who lives in Brooklyn, N.Y., to friends and to the Salvation Army.

No one knows how much is involved yet, but a spokesman for the Union Commerce Bank, executor for the estate, guessed that each of the 50 Maynards who qualifies might get several hundred dollars.

"He was very proud of the name Maynard and during his life tried to help people out," his sister said in New York. "He had a dream of doing something with it. I guess I'd use it for the family Bible."
