A Brookline resident, Richard Pickett, reported that three men showed up at his home between 1 and 2 a.m., asking to use his phone to call a taxi. After they made three unsuccessful calls, Pickett said he offered to call police to help them, but they left hurriedly.

Word of the escape of DeSalvo spread quickly through the town of Bridgewater, a community of some 10,000 about 20 miles south of Boston.

In Raynham, a town some six miles from Bridgewater, police were checking reports that cars had been stolen by burglars who broke into an automobile sales firm. Also missing, police said, was some \$1,200 in cash.

Hospital Supt. Charles Gaughan said the men were in adjacent rooms on the third floor of a building which also housed elderly and sick patients.

DeSalvo was arrested in November 1964 by Sgt. Samuel S. Rome of the state police. At the time, Rome said DeSalvo admitted attacks on women in West Hartford, Hartford, Hamden, East Hartford, and New Haven. He was identified by three of his victims, Rome said.

Connecticut state police say they have issued two warrants against DeSalvo.

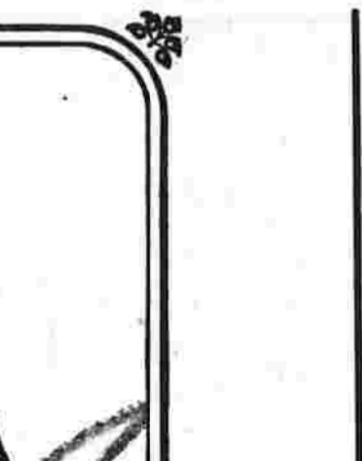

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other-war, in Bonn, which had been begun by one of the world's most powerful nations. The United Nations has managed to halt and patrol war in Palestine, war in Cyprus, and war in the Congo. One of these accomplishments has been far beyond anything the League of Nations could even attempt to do.

What the record actually says is that it was not for the current full-fledged war being waged in Vietnam, the United Nations would today have a rather magnificent record of preventing war and halting aggression. And, although it is quite true that there is no simple explanation of the failure of the United Nations to take and exercise jurisdiction in Vietnam, one sorry part of any explanation has to be that the United States, the world's most powerful nation, and leading founder of the United Nations, has repeatedly preferred to shun the United Nations out of the way and make it clear that it, the United States, intended to handle this particular situation alone.

The Compulsive Journey

It is not what the public thinks at all, but some deep inner necessity, which sends gentlemen about to run for President back on a special journey, first, to their own beginnings.

The public thinks it is a brand of corn, a piece of campaign abuse, in which the scenes and acquaintances of the prospective candidate's boyhood are so many Madison Ave. props being brought into the picture for a psychological moment in the image making process.

But this was not, we think, the way it really was when Governor George Romney, the other day, went back to Chicago, and the white stone bungalow where he had lived for five years of his boyhood, to drive past the school where he had been eighth district superintendent in 1927, to muse about the field where he had earned his first dollar—thinning sugar beets at a rate of \$7 an acre—and to recall his first date—with one 30-year Smith.

The Governor of Michigan, finding himself about to try to run for President, felt within himself some overpowering destiny to find out who he himself really was, where he came from, how he ever got this far in the world.

He must have felt that he couldn't properly take another single step forward in that Presidential race until he had gone back and touched base there in the Upper Snake Valley of his boyhood.

All this may have seemed, in the press and in the news, rather merely part of the schmalts that goes into the building of every candidate. But we view it as a natural compulsion, and a good and pleasant one, that a man who gets this far in the world should find that the scenes of his childhood have suddenly taken on an added and irresistible emotional appeal. It is as good for man to go back, for a refreshing drink at all the springs of all the old simplicities of his life, as it is for him to go ahead to new and as-for him complicated intoxications.

Rather than muse upon the possibly planned aspect of such a sentimental journey, we would choose to ask what kind of a man it is who possibly he not feel compelled to make it.

Disappointment All Around

For reasons as compelling as they are now regrettable, the new Roman Catholic high school proposed for the Meriden-Wallingford-North Haven area cannot be built now in the foreseeable future. The announcement of the indefinite postponement of the project was made Sunday by the Most Rev. Henry J. O'Brien, D.D., archbishop of Hartford, in a letter read in the 13 parishes involved.

The parishioners had worked hard and contributed generously toward the construction of what Archbishop O'Brien characterized as a "needed and long desired" parochial high school. The school was estimated to cost \$3 million; to raise \$1,500,000. Actually they over-subscribed by \$1,600,000. But now comes the word that construction costs have risen so greatly that an additional \$200,000 would be necessary to build the school.

The original cost was only one factor in the decision to defer the school. Not only cost of construction, but also cost of operation has risen substantially, especially since the school does not appear to be a religious community available to start the school. The only alternative would be employment of a substantial number of lay teachers. This would not only prove to be more costly in terms of operating expense, but would in large measure vitiate the unique advantages of a parochial high school. As Archbishop O'Brien said, "The decision to defer the school had looked forward to the school for so long and were prepared to sacrifice so much for it, but also to their neighbors who wished them well in an undertaking so dear to them.

WASHINGTON—When President Johnson summoned civil rights leaders to the White House on Feb. 13 for a private preview of his 1967 civil rights message, the unpublished roster of those present showed startling omissions.

The heads of two major civil rights groups—Stokely Carmichael of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and Floyd McKissick of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE)—were not even invited. Nor was Bayard Rustin, who planned the march on Washington, or Joseph Rauh, civil rights spokesman for the Americans for Democratic Action (ADA). Dr. Martin Luther King of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) was invited but didn't come.

What's more, there were unfamiliar faces present—for instance, Texas State Sen. Harlan Jordan, a Houston lawyer and the only Negro in the Texas Senate, Miss Jordan lacks the national notoriety of Stokely Carmichael and Floyd McKissick. But also unlike them, she is a practical politician who understands reality—King, Carmichael and McKissick do not.

The omissions and inclusions on that invitation list reveal how far President Johnson's sophistication in the politics of civil rights has progressed the last two years.

When Mr. Johnson signed the 1965 Voting Rights Act, the White House was naive enough to give honored places at the ceremony to SNCC functionaries who had tried to sabotage the bill. Invited to planning sessions for last year's White House Conference on Civil Rights were SNCC and CORE officials who, predictably, later attacked the whole idea.

At long last, however, the White House has learned that one of the "big five" civil rights leaders, only two—Roy Wilkins of the NAACP and Whitney Young of the Urban League—can be counted on to actively back any Johnson civil rights bill. The others—King, Carmichael and McKissick—immensely prefer agitation over legislation.

Beyond this, the White House realizes that many civil rights activists want to believe in the wisdom of Lyndon Johnson. Consider Professor Kenneth Clark of City College of New York, a Negro militant who in the past had cooperated with the school's administration. When Mr. Johnson's 1967 State of the Union address contained only 44 words on civil rights, Clark issued a bitter condemnation of the President. He was not invited Feb. 13. To replace the disaffected militants, the White House has been working with Louis Martin, deputy chairman of the Democratic National Committee and a Negro, to bring the growing list of state and local Negro office holders into national civil rights activity.

Had President Johnson not scheduled for the Feb. 13 briefing at the last moment, many Negro state legislators besides Miss Jordan would have been present. As it is, the White House was far more impressed with her than the usual run of civil rights leaders.

Another newcomer at the White House on Feb. 13, Catherine Mc Archibald Patrick O'Boyle of Washington, D.C., pointed up another new trend in the Johnson civil rights strategy. The White House wants high-ranking church leaders such as Archbishop O'Boyle, more conservative than the idealistic young priests who marched at Selma, to sell the President's

existence of or contents of a confession or admission. Also barred would be any disclosure by lawyers of testimony or trial evidence excluded by the court, or the conduct, reputation or criminal record of any party or witness.

Not to be restricted, however, would be a lawyer's statement of his client's intention to plead innocent, the identity of the defendant, the date and place of arrest and the charges.

The above regulations are to be adhered to even in those instances where charges of police inefficiency or misconduct appear in the public press, or where the published reports are misleading or inaccurate.

Youngsters Welcome Latest Snowstorm

Vacationing school children were out in force today with snow shovels, sleds and skis, taking advantage of the opportunity to earn some spending money or to whizz down Manchester slopes in the wake of yesterday's wet five-inch snowfall.

And weary town highway crews were conducting "mop-up" operations after managing to complete snow plowing along town roads by 10 last night. The storm, the second major one during February and the third of the winter, resulted in death for Joseph Strimatis, 70, of 27 Homestead St., who collapsed yesterday as he was entering his home after clearing his yard with a snowblower.

He was taken to Manchester Memorial Hospital by ambulance but was reported dead on arrival by Dr. Robert Keeney, medical examiner, who said that death was due to a heart attack.

The storm, which began intermittently early yesterday, got under way in earnest about mid-morning, and by 11 a.m. more than an inch of wet snow covered the ground, reported Ernest Turcek, highway department superintendent.

Town crews began snow clearing operations on a 24-route schedule shortly before noon with continuous plowing carried out until the crews were sent home at 10 p.m.

Standing and sitting, carried on throughout the day, was also done during the night as a standby emergency crew tackled trouble spots on highways and at intersections and plowed out town parking lots between 10 last night and 4 this morning, Turcek said.

At 4 a.m. men released earlier were back on the job for more sanding and general cleaning up. Turcek said removal of snow from the middle of downtown Main St. and from other trouble spots will begin tonight.

As the storm intensified throughout the day, numerous meetings and social events were canceled. Many offices and business establishments released employees early, and the Municipal Building shut down at 3:30 p.m. on directions from Acting Town Manager John Shea.

Manchester Community College's evening classes at Manchester High School were also canceled.

The wet, heavy snow, falling at the height of the town's mid-day activity on a normally busy Thursday, came "at the worst possible time," Turcek said. The heavy, slow-moving traffic and poor visibility considerably hampered plowing operations.

Chinese Peasants In Revolt

TOKYO (AP) — Peasants in Communist China's Kwichow Province, where party chairman Mao Tse-tung's "revolutionary rebel" claimed victory Feb. 14, have swarmed into the cities and attacked pro-Maoist forces, a provincial radio broadcast reported today.

It said army units were called out belatedly to guard warehouses holding seed for planting, but the peasants already had set the stock, sold it and split the profits. The broadcast gave no details of fighting.

The Yugoslav news agency Tanjug, in a report from Peking, said pro-Mao authorities and the army commander in Kwichow published an announcement describing the situation as serious and blaming anti-Mao reactionaries and rich peasants for sending the farmers to the cities.

The agency said the provincial revolutionary committee issued an order which stated that "men in authority and other monsters" would be severely punished if they continued such activities and demanded that the peasants return to the farms as "the agricultural production will be jeopardized."

An unconfirmed report in Hong Kong said that the military commander of Sinking Province, Gen. Wang En-mao, seized control of China's two nuclear bases in that province earlier this month.

The Hong Kong Star, quoting sources from inside China, said the seizure was a factor behind Mao's apparent decision to ease his purge against party cadres.

The star said that after taking over the bases, Wang wrote Mao demanding that he call off the Sinking purge and convene a plenary session of the Communist Party Central Committee in the Szechuan city of Chengtu to thrash out the Communist party line.

The paper said Mao, Defense Minister Lin Biao and Prime Minister Chou En-lai vetoed the congress idea but agreed to let up on the purge.

Sinking, on the edge of the Soviet Union, was the scene of all five Chinese atomic tests. News from there has been sparse and unofficial.

But none of the men directly involved in the wildcat strike which led to closing of the GM Fisher Body plant at Mansfield had any idea their actions would affect plants in 17 of the 48 states in which GM has production facilities.

The Mansfield strike ended Thursday and GM says it is preparing a worker callback program but indicated another full week may pass before all 45,000 GM workers are back on the job at its 127 plants.

In the case of workers at the behind the two-week walkout of United Auto Workers Local 449 at Mansfield was continuing concern by union members over what they felt amounted to taking work away from them.

This complaint turned into a work stoppage after a foreman ordered two men to load dies on a truck for shipment to a GM plant in Pontiac, Mich.

The men — crane operator James Strickler and helper Paul Sloan refused. They were suspended under procedure under the union contract in which workers are taken off the payroll when they refuse to work.
