





Hartt Group Does Well In MacBeth

Verdi's "Macbeth," based on the Shakespeare tragedy, is the current production of the opera department of Hartt College of Music, and a very good production it is, too. The final performance will be heard tonight in Millard Auditorium on the U. of H. campus, and if you can make it, it will be worth your while.

Hartt is a professional music school, of course and this production is smoothly professional. To expect consummate artistry from a student production is to demand too much; there is, however a vitality emanating from the young people, which is not to be encountered in the famous opera houses of the world.

"Macbeth" is eminently well suited to this type of production. Seldom heard, it invites no invidious comparisons, and a production can struggle through with only two very good singers, Macbeth and Lady Macbeth, sung here by James Foxworth and Maria Talaber, though there will be different principals tonight.

Both parts are extremely demanding, and it would not be truthful to say that these principals completely plumb the possibilities of the roles. Purely from a vocal standpoint they did very well; great artistry and understanding may come later. It was not to be expected at this juncture in any event.

The opera itself is not a popular success so it is seldom staged, as I have pointed out. Hartt did the community a notable service in letting opera lovers see the work, which otherwise they would not be likely ever to encounter.

Originally in four acts, the work had been abridged to three by Moshe Faranov, musical director of the production. This worked very well in general, although I must admit it was rather startling to hear the Prelude to Act IV in the middle of Act III. The orchestra, by the way, played extremely well, particularly in this portion of the performance.

The single set was designed by Elemer Nagy and executed by Iona Teeki and Pamela Kucenic. Representing an Elizabethan stage, it was handsome and extremely practical for the demands of the work. Staged by Donald Moriand, the action and spectacle went extremely well, with the exception of the scenes with the witches.

Costuming was uneven, varying from shoddy to opulent, while in general the lighting was rather unimaginative. On the other hand, the chorus was so good that it more than offset the other deficiencies. Furthermore, the size of Millard Auditorium makes it an ideal place to hear opera; there is a sense of intimacy and immediacy here that cannot be matched at the Bushnell or the Met, for example.

The audience loved the performance and accorded every one prolonged and enthusiastic applause, so that it is hard to understand just why "Macbeth" has never been considered a popular success. Chiefly, I suspect, it may be due to the fact that Macbeth is a baritone, rather than a tenor, and opera audiences (not noted for being overly intelligent) usually demand a tenor.

Personally, I always find it a relief to hear "Don Giovanni" or "Fiegende Hollander" where baritones have the juiciest roles, and while "Macbeth" is not in a class with either of these operas, it certainly is deserving of more frequent performances, particularly if they are as good as this one.

There is also the oft-quoted fact that this is early Verdi, before he really knew what he was doing. Actually Verdi completely revised the work in 1865 which makes it only two years younger than "Don Carlos," and considerably later than "Traviata," "Trovatore" and "Rigoletto," those mainstays of the operatic repertoire.

"Gunsmoke" had occupied the network's Saturday night tail position and although it had not caused much comment since Marshal Dillon lost his comical sidekick Chester, it seemed a sturdy anchor in the schedule.

CBS, of course, may make some further adjustments in its schedule since one of the favorite gambits in the annual network chess game is to announce a program for one spot and then, later, move it to another. 
"Cimarron Strip," a 90-minute western replaces "Coliseum" and "My Three Sons" on Thursday, followed by a two-hour movie period.

Demarest, who replaced the late William Frawley as cook-housemother for the MacMurray brood, was born in St. Paul, Minn., and grew up in New-bridge, N.J.

"We were poor as church mice," he recalled. "When I was a kid I used to get up at 3:30 in the morning to deliver milk, and for doing the job I got paid with a quart of milk and a pint of cream. Then at 7 I'd deliver bread for the bakery and they'd give me a loaf of bread and six rolls.

"After that I went to work delivering packages and that brought me \$3 a week. I went couple of grades in school, and that was it, brother."

He discovered lack of education was no drawback in show business and for years he traveled back and forth across the

country, playing every tank town that had a vaudeville or burlesque house. He played the Palace and in Earl Carroll shows on Broadway, came to films in 1927.

"How many pictures have I made?" he mused. "I never counted 'em. But you can figure I made about six pictures a year since 1927."

Now he works 102 days annually for "M... Three Sons," spending the rest of his time at his Palm Springs home with the wife he has been married to for 27 years. He plays golf with his cronies, also the stock market. Does he cook?

"Now, I'm not much good in the kitchen," he said.
