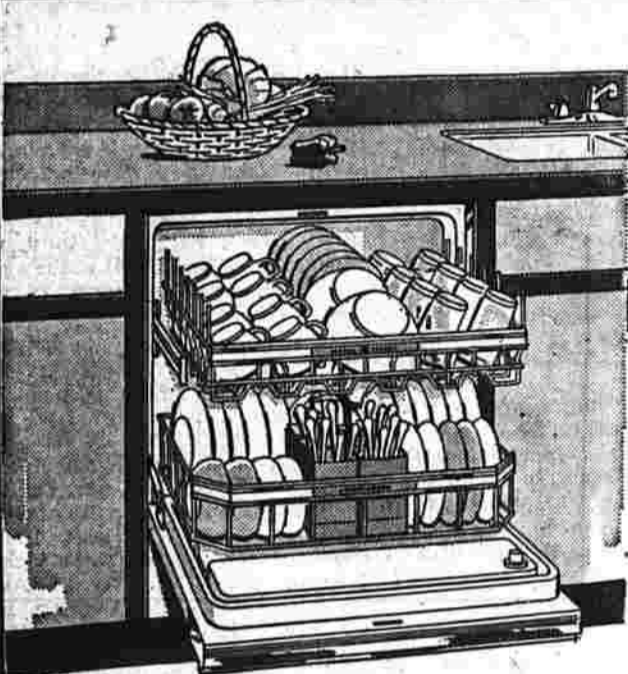

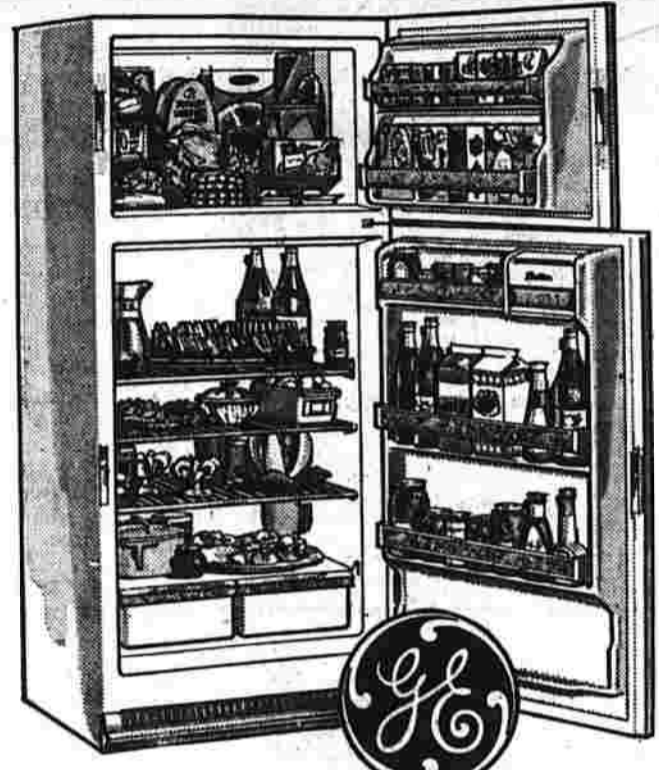

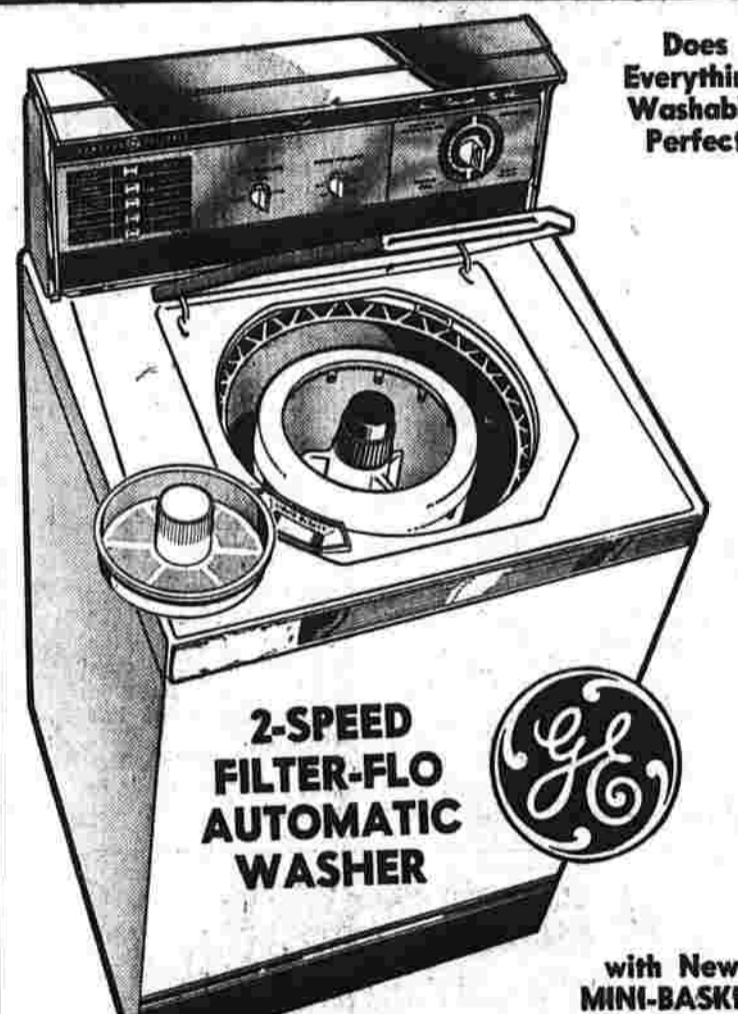

Oswald-Ferrie Connection Reported, Later Denied

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP) — Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison has been given information that Lee Harvey Oswald and a man wanted for questioning in the Kennedy assassination investigation were picked up together by police here in 1963, the States-Item reported today.

The States-Item first reported that Oswald's companion was David W. Ferrie, identified by Garrison as a central figure in his investigation. But the newspaper said later the second man was not Ferrie.

Before he was found dead last Wednesday, Ferrie had insisted he did not know Oswald, named by the Warren Commission as the man who killed President John F. Kennedy in Dallas, Tex., Nov. 22, 1963.

The States-Item reported that Garrison's investigators were told by a New Orleans law officer that he found two men sitting in a parked car near Lake Pontchartrain early one morning in the fall of 1963.

One of the men identified himself as Oswald, the officer said. The States-Item reported in its first edition that the officer — after seeing Ferrie's body said Ferrie positively was the second man. Later the newspaper said the second man was not Ferrie, but apparently was connected with another aspect of the Garrison probe.

The officer took the pair to headquarters, the newspaper said, where "his superior" demanded to arrest them on the grounds there was insufficient evidence they were guilty of any wrongdoing.

After the Kennedy assassination, the officer said, he recognized Oswald's face and name from pictures. He said he took no action because it was widely known that Oswald had lived in New Orleans.

Last week, when Ferrie's name was prominently linked to the Garrison probe, the officer gave the district attorney information, the States-Item said.

A typewritten note found in Ferrie's apartment after his death contained a bitter indictment of law enforcement officers, courts and American justice in general.

The first paragraph of the note, released on the day Ferrie died, referred to death as a "sweet prospect." Garrison maintains that Ferrie committed suicide, although Coroner Nicholas Chetta has ruled death resulted from natural causes—a ruptured artery in the brain.

Tests revealed the note was typed on a typewriter found in Ferrie's cluttered apartment. It contains numerous references to the writer's irritation at police methods. "Daily we are propagandized more and more about a rising crime rate. But how do we know it is true? We don't, for we Americans have little or no access to the courts, courts and American justice in general." (See Page Eight)

Witness Testifies: Turcotte Upset Before Shooting

A Rockville man testified today that he was with Richard Turcotte Jr. in the home of Marie Turcotte's parents at 11 Orchard St., Manchester, on the afternoon when Mrs. Turcotte was shot to death, and dozed off occasionally on the couch, Bouchard said.

He testified he gave Turcotte some tea and took a bottle of sleeping pills from him. Under cross examination by Atty. Sanford J. Pieper, Turcotte's counsel, Bouchard testified that Turcotte told him he "loved his wife and children and didn't want anything to happen to them."

Turcotte appeared "upset and cried" during the afternoon and "whenever he opened his eyes, tears would come out," Bouchard said.

Bouchard said he saw Turcotte again about 2 p.m. on the day of the alleged murder, and that he "seemed all right."

Founded Time Magazine Massive Heart Attack Claims Henry R. Luce

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Henry R. Luce, editorial chairman of Time Inc., died early today in a Phoenix hospital of a massive coronary attack. He appeared in robust health last Tuesday night when he attended a dinner in honor of Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and his wife. A few days later Luce also spoke in Tucson on behalf of a nationwide Presbyterian Church drive to raise \$60 million. There was no apparent indication of illness at that time, his associates said.

He was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital Monday afternoon, but there was no immediate word on the reason for his entering the hospital.

Luce, born of missionary parents in China, founded Time, the weekly news magazine, in 1923 with Briton Hadden, and started a new direction for the magazine publishing firm, which had been founded in 1905. Under Luce, Time continued to prosper, growing in circulation and influence. The firm today publishes Time, Life, Fortune and Sports Illustrated, plus a wide range of books.

Luce's widow is Clare Booth Luce, editor and writer, playwright, former ambassador to Italy, and former Connecticut congresswoman.

Luce resigned in April 1964 as editor in chief of Time Inc.; the magazine publishing firm, which he cofounded some 43 years ago. "I'm 60 years old," he said at the time. "I'm in good health and I'm eager to keep active."

Luce was born in Tengchow, China, April 3, 1898, the son of Dr. Henry Winters Luce and Elizabeth Middleton Luce.

Replaced White Worker Negro Man Killed In Natchez Blast

NATCHEZ, Miss. (AP) — A Negro man was killed in an explosion today that replaced a white worker. The victim had been given a job last week formerly held by whites.

The explosion Monday night ripped the cab of a truck being driven by Wheatley Jackson, 38, the father of six children, as he drove home from work. Police Chief J. T. Robinson said he believed a bomb had been planted beneath the truck.

The explosion was similar to one in August 1965, when George Metcalfe, president of the Natchez branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, was critically injured by a blast from under the hood of his car.

Treaty OK'd

WASHINGTON (AP) — The consular treaty with the Soviet Union was approved today on a 10-4 vote by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., who led a closed session early, announced the vote. He said he was one of the four opposing ratification.

The treaty now goes to the floor where Republican opponents may continue their opposition to the agreement as an unnecessary concession to Moscow that will help North Vietnam and facilitate Communist espionage.

Funds Asked For 'Rover' Engine Work

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson asked Congress today for money to begin the development of a nuclear-powered rocket engine, "The Rover."

For this and other scientific projects, Johnson asked \$144 million for use in the fiscal year beginning July 1.

In addition to the nuclear-powered rocket engine, Johnson asked funds for a physics laboratory for basic physical and biochemical research and a specialized facility for further exploration into controlled thermonuclear fusion as a potential source of electricity.

"The projects will advance America's ability to harness atomic energy for the peaceful exploration of space," Johnson stated. "They will also help chart new courses in nuclear science."

Johnson said development of a nuclear-powered rocket engine will take time, and that present plans call for delivery of the first test model in about 1971.

A number of flight and ground tests will precede full use of the engine — in space programs, Johnson said.

"That is why I have asked Congress to appropriate funds this year to lay the groundwork for this important program," he explained.

LBJ Asks Federal Action To Halt Health Cost Spiral

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson told Congress today he wants the government to seek ways to lower health costs.

He also called for action to expand the expansion of non-commercial television and radio, including especially education.

In a special message on education in our hands, Johnson announced that the Department of Health, Education and Welfare will hold a national conference on medical costs "to discuss how we can lower the costs of medical services without impairing the quality."

The President also recommended that Congress create a Corporation for Public Television and private funds to support noncommercial broadcasting, both via television and radio.

Picking up an idea that has been advocated by the Ford Foundation, which has urged establishment of such a corporation, Johnson recommended a study of "the practicality and the economic advantages of using communication satellites to establish an educational television and radio network."

These were the highlights of the multipoint message in which Johnson emphasized that this was the key to the program.

"I do not recommend more of the same — but more that is better: to solve old problems, to create new institutions, to fulfill the potential of each individual in our land."

The President noted that average hospital costs have more than tripled since 1960 and that other medical expenses have risen sharply.

Many of the other recommendations represented an expansion of programs already established.

For example, Johnson made an appeal for \$200 million to expand Teacher Corps design to improve education in urban and rural areas.

He recommended that the corps be enlarged from its present complement of 1,200 volunteers to 2,500 by the beginning of the 1968-69 school year.

He said that average hospital costs have more than tripled since 1960 and that other medical expenses have risen sharply.

Murphey to Retire From Town Position

Horace F. Murphey, long-time town superintendent of parks and more recently of the park department's budget, announced today that he would retire from his position as superintendent of parks and recreation in Natchez, Miss.

Murphey, 55, announced his impending retirement as he was preparing to go over time in the Park Department's budget request for next year, saying he hoped a replacement for his position could be hired and be on the job by July 1 for a month's orientation before Murphey leaves.

Murphey, apparently taken by surprise at the announcement, wished Murphey well, expressing the hope that he will enjoy "many happy and healthy years of retirement."

Murphey noted he had made no immediate retirement plans but said he may do some vacationing in Florida.

The superintendent has headed the park and recreation department since 1964 when he was appointed by General Manager Richard Martin to the combined post. He has been park superintendent since 1958.

Legislative News 200 Urge Boost In Mental Health Budget Request

HARTFORD (AP) — More than 200 persons appeared at a hearing by the legislative appropriations committee today to support increases in Gov. John Dempsey's budget for the Mental Health Department.

Rep. Charles J. LeClerc, D-Bristol, Myrtle G. Gutmann, D-Shelton, Barbara J. TerFul, R-Mitchfield, Paul Pawlak, D-Naugatuck, and John P. Papanicolaou, D-Meriden, led off the parade of witnesses.

Mrs. Gutmann said the proposed budget "would be disastrous" for the Mental Health Planning Council in her area.

Dempsey referred to the crowd in the Hall of the House as "the most eloquent testimony" of the need for more money.

The Mental Health Department asked for \$22.6 million for the next fiscal biennium. The governor cut that to \$18 million — a reduction of \$4.6 million — but \$18.1 million more.

New Total 21 1/2% Over 1965 Figure

Manchester's net taxable Grand List, based on October 1966 assessments, has hit \$219,275,414, for an all-time high.

The total is \$38,868,465, or 21 1/2 per cent higher than the October 1965 Grand List of \$180,406,949. Based on the present 42.6-mill tax rate it would produce an additional \$1,555,798 in General Fund revenue.

However, the Republican-controlled Board of Directors and Town Manager Robert Weiss are on record for reducing the 1967-68 tax rate and for holding the General Fund budget to a 5 per cent increase, which would add approximately \$350,000 to the \$7,655,338 current budget. Whatever town aid is voted by the State Assembly would raise the budget that much more.

Approximately 5 per cent of the \$38.9 million Grand List increase is attributed to a normal yearly rise. The remainder is attributed directly to revaluation.

The net taxable Grand List may be reduced by approximately \$11 million when the Board of Tax Review completes its deliberations and releases its allowable cuts in assessments.

The assessments for all of Manchester property, both real estate and personal, are based on the 1965 Grand List. The local rise is much more dramatic than the Grand List increase.

The market value of all local property rose by \$81,320,000 — an increase of 21.1 million when the 1966-67 year is \$33,882,200 this year.

All figures for 1967-68, true value and assessments, are true.

A tractor-trailer skidded on slippery route 8 in Naugatuck and plunged through a guard rail and down an embankment toward the Naugatuck River. A heavy telephone cable kept the truck from dropping into the river 30 feet below. Driver or James Van Dine, 45, of Derby, was not hurt in the 12:30 a.m. accident.

State police report slidding accidents throughout the state. Roadways were described as snow-covered from Hartford northward, with slick conditions south of Hartford.

The U.S. Weather Bureau said the storm tapered off before the morning rush hour, with flurries.

TAC Feels Rule Too Restrictive On Borrow Pits

A small group of the Technical Advisory Committee of the Town Planning Commission met last night and further pondered recommendations for future town zoning laws.

Only five members of the 13-member committee were at the meeting in the General Manager's office, which began late and adjourned early.

In the hour-long meeting members discussed only a small section of a study of proposed zoning regulations which they are inspecting in minute detail. The study, when completed, will be in combination with present zoning regulations, the basis for town zoning law.

Members indicated they felt a sentence of the study was completely unnecessary. It states: "Any use hazardous to health because of danger of flooding, inadequacy of drainage, or inaccessibility to fire fighting apparatus or other protective services," should not be allowed anywhere.

The committee largely felt this section was covered adequately by other town regulations.

A section dealing with borrow pits, (sections of land where earth is taken from the area or moved) was to have a complete rewriting. The section was too general, members said, and would impede the changing of the face of the land for improvements if it was permitted to remain the way it was written.

Atty. Leon Podrove, chairman, said the section would have

to be changed and made more specific, not to tighten it up, he said, but to loosen it.

Present also at the meeting were Andrew Analdi Jr.; Mrs. Olaf Anderson, Jack Davis and Warren Howland.

Several of the members were there before 8, but it was not until 8:42 that the small group began looking at the proposed zoning study and discussing it. They had been waiting for more members. The meeting was adjourned at 9:35, after one of the members had to leave.

Before the meeting began formally, Atty. Podrove told the group General Manager Robert Weiss would not be able to attend a meeting with them until after he completes his work on the town budget, a matter which takes up most of his time now. Weiss was invited to a previous meeting at which industrial zoning was to be discussed, but the meeting was called off when Weiss was unable to attend.

The next meeting of the committee was set for March 15.
