WASHINGTON (AP)— Atty. Gen.-designate Ram-sey Clark said today the Federal Bureau of Investigation already has investi-gated and cleared Clay L. Shaw — a businessman ar-rested in New Orleans—of any part in the assassina-tion of President John F.

Clark made the statement to newsmen moments after the Senate Judiciary Committee approved his nomination to become attorney general.

Shaw, wealthy retired director of the International Trade Mart, has been booked on a charge of "conspiracy to com-mit murder" in the Kennedy assassination investigation being run by New Orleans Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison. In a brief corridor interview,

Clark said the Justice Depart-ment knows what Garrison's case involves, and does not consider it valid. He said Shaw "was included in an investigation in November and December of 1963."

"We have the evidence and we can assume what their conclusions are," Clark said. "On the evidence that the FB has, there was no connection found" between Shaw and the assassination of the president in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963, Clark

It was built, unfortunately for the toll lovers, with the aid of federal highway funds, which carry with them the proviso that no tolls shall be collected on roads built

The existence of such a stretch of major highway has proved an annovance to the operators of New Jersey's toll roads. They resent the fact that motorists, when they have a reasonable choice, select the toll free road over routes where they would have to pay tolls. And they point, with holy horror, to the fact that the rush of traffic to the toll free road has created such a heavy traffic pattern that additional accidents have resulted.

So the proposal is to get the federal government to allow the state to sell he stretch of highway involved to the Parkway Authority, which would then

### The Limitations Of Power

There is a certain fascination about the revival of isolationism now surging through liberal circles; possibly a bit of instruction too.

The neo-isolationists usually do not admit to that term. Instead they are prone to talk of the limitations of power in the world, and much of what they say-but not all-makes very good sense indeed. For a fairly typical example of this line of thinking, here is Amherst Professor Henry Steele Commager, discoursing before the Senate Foreign Relations committee:

"I do not think the United States is prepared to be a power everywherein the Western Hemisphere, in Europe in Asia-nor do I think we should wish to exercise power everywhere . . . nations find almost insuperable difficulties in the application of power. . . .

"All the might of Britain was insufficient to impose British will on Ireland in the 18th and 19th centuries: all of the might of Austria could not subdue the states of northern Italy to her will in the 19th century. . . . We have ourselves found it advisable to come to terms with little Panama these last

illuminating connection between the Constitutional restraints on the Govtations on its power abroad. Just as numerous checks and balances were designed to prevent domestic tyranny, so our traditions have championed restraint in foreign affairs, at least until

All correct, we believe. But then it turns out that most of these people are not merely, or perhaps primarily, objecting to a policy of global interventionism: they are annoyed by what they call our national obsession with communism and our insistence on resisting Communist aggression. The annoyance comes through in

Professor Commager's words: "The notion of an international Communist conspiracy, which a good many Americans still cling to, fits neatly into (the) shibboleth of Old World wickedness and New World virtue." In other words, as a nation we are some kind of moral-Completely overlooked here, is that


real, live international Communist

conspiracy was in fact a dominant force in the earlier post-war years. I subjugated hundreds of millions of people in Eastern Europe and mainland had Stalin lived and the U.S. done noth ing to stop the aggressions, he would have attacked Western Europe and, almost inevitably in the process, the U.S. So the American reaction to international communism was not born out of obsessive concepts or crusading fervor It was trying to deal with a threat stemming from a Communist obsession the effort to gain world hegemony. In this regard American foreign policy was about as hardheaded as it could

It's a good deal different now, to be sure, the Red giants having fallen out and the Soviet Union having calmed down considerably. The changes do not however, eliminate the threat. Today as yesterday, both the Soviet Union and Communist China would be in the mar ket for anything that looked like a halfway easy conquest, whether by overt attack, indirect aggression, subversion

Still, we do not advocate retaliation in every instance of Communist troublemaking; as the neo-isolationists argue, it would unduly tax the country's re-

The guiding principle, as we see it, should be selectivity, particularly based on how grave and direct a threat the particular outbreak is to American ecurity. The question about Vietnam is not whether theoretically we should or should not resist Communist aggran dizement but whether this was a good or even tenable place to make a stand. The U.S. can neither withdraw from the world nor ignore the continuin Communist threats. All the same, should be careful in its choice of responses, ever cognizant of the limitations of power or even the greates
