South Windsor Speaker Urges More School Aid

SOUTH WINDSOR (AP)—House minority leader Nicholas Lange of West Hartford said Thursday night that larger state grants are needed for school construction. The advice of leading educators "has been ignored by the administration," the state Republican leader told the South Windsor GOP Women's Club. "Many communities faced with demands for new schools and additions to existing schools are being forced to raise taxes ever substantially higher to meet these costs—or put off some much-needed construction because of the absence of greater state financial assistance," Lange said. The GOP supports legislation that would raise state grants from \$700 to \$800 per pupil for construction of elementary schools and from \$1,100 to \$1,300 per pupil for secondary schools. This would boost the state's share of school construction costs from 46 per cent to 60 per cent, Lange said.

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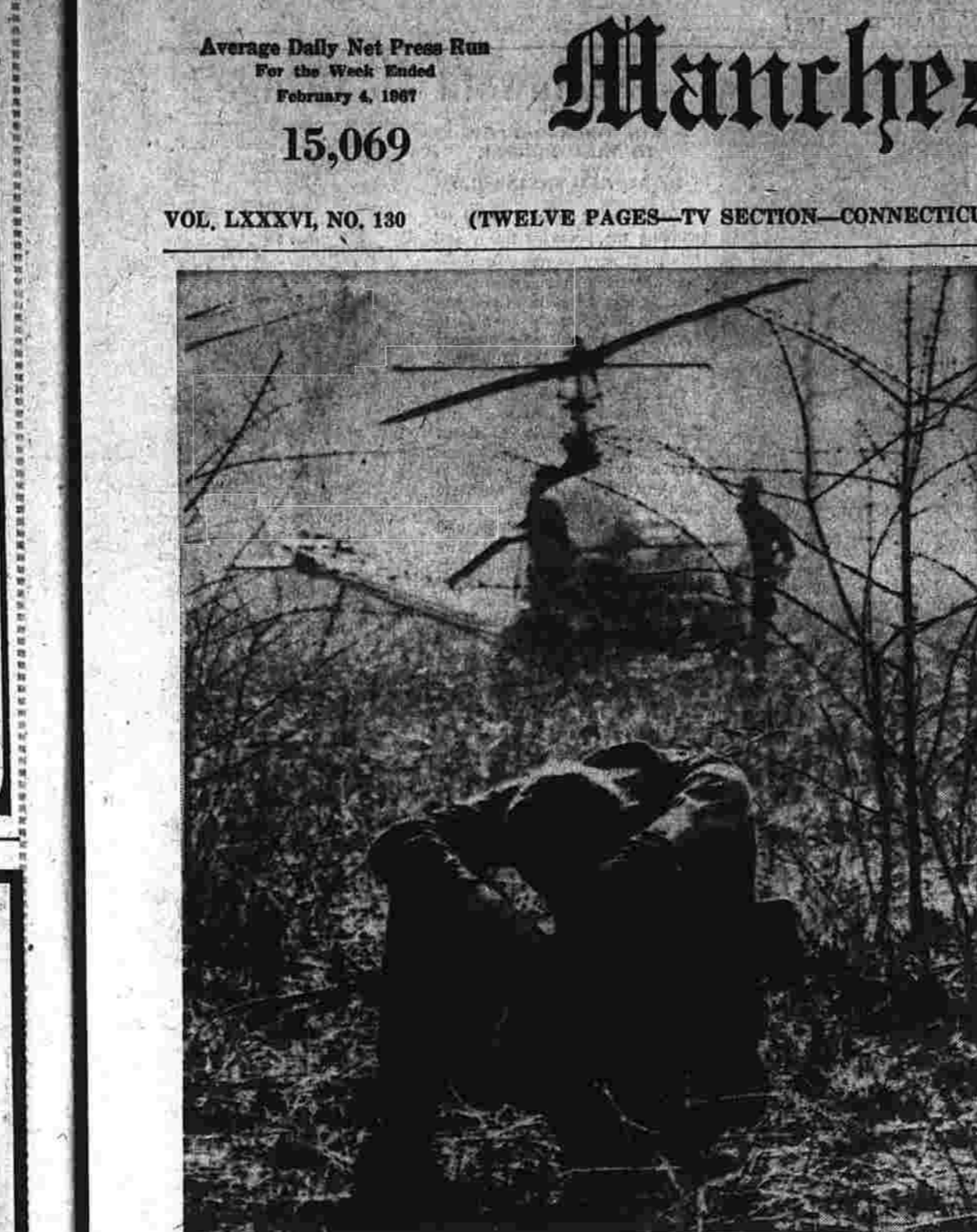

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP)—The crew patrol in U.S. waters 40 miles off a Soviet fishing vessel in the south side of the Alaska United States waters is scheduled to be arraigned in Kodiak, Alaska, Sunday on charges of violating U.S. territorial fishing laws. Six Viet Civilians Killed In New Accidental Shelling

SAIGON (AP)—The U.S. command disclosed today that six Vietnamese civilians were killed and 26 wounded in an accidental shelling by American artillery of a village and a group of river sampans. An announcement of the incident came as U.S. authorities clamped tight security over the area after a group of river sampans was bombed by "unidentified air" on Saturday night. The shelling occurred in the Mekong Delta region, about 60 miles north of Saigon.

The reduction of grain surplus along with government crop production controls has kept the U.S. grain surplus from growing to the point where it normally produces far more than it normally needs to meet domestic demand.

BUSINESS GOOD

Business continued to be good at Colonial Board Co., as the company proceeded with expansion plans and registered record sales and increases in earnings.

According to the company's recently released annual report, net sales rose by nearly a million dollars, from \$5,564,877 in 1965 to \$6,481,987 for the 12 months ended Dec. 31, 1966.

Earnings per share with the company rose from 65 cents as of Dec. 1965 to \$1.16 to the end of 1966.

In the review of the last five years, the report shows net income after taxes rose from less than \$100,000 in 1964 to about \$240,000 in 1966.

Robert Fuller, president of Colonial Board Co. said that the 17 per cent sales increase last year not only topped the 16 per cent increase of 1965, but also surpassed the goal the company had established.

"Problems were anticipated in the areas of labor in Connecticut and the start up of new machinery," he said, "and we had both. It was necessary at times to curtail production due to a shortage of help."

Fuller said further problems are anticipated for the coming year, but said the company has the reassurance in facing the problems with "the continued support of our good customers and the skills and devoted efforts of our employees. Their operation at all levels has been superb."

SWITCHING TOLD

An article in the annual report of the Southern New England Telephone Co. features Manchester and the electronic switching system which is coming to the company's town system.

Switching is the means by which a telephone can be connected with any one of 84 million others in the country, and with additional millions of others in other countries.

This summer, according to the annual report article, the company's first electronic switching system will be introduced in Manchester, following months of installation work.

An electronic switching system operates in millionths of a second, thousands of times faster than present equipment. The company considers this the most significant advance in telephony since the introduction of dial service.

FUEL CELL TEST

A portable fuel cell powerplant which converts fuel into electricity, developed by Pratt and Whitney Aircraft, is being successfully operated in exploratory tests being conducted by the Army Electronics Command at Fort Monmouth, N. J.

The fuel cell powerplant produces electricity up to five or six times more efficiently than a conventional small engine driven generator, company officials say.

The development consists of a compact reactor which reforms a kerosene-type fuel into carbon dioxide and pure hydrogen. The

hydrogen is fed into a fuel cell assembly in combination with oxygen from the air to produce a steady output to 500 watts—equal to five bright reading lamps.

Early last month the gas industry in conjunction with Pratt and Whitney launched a \$20 million program of research to develop a fuel cell for home use which converts natural gas to electricity.

The fuel powercell system being tested by the Army is one which uses hydrocarbon fuel as the prime energy source to meet the Army's practical weight and size objectives. The present exploratory model weighs 83 pounds, is divided into two box-like cases for easy carrying, and measures slightly over 2½ cubic feet.

NEW HIGH

The highest rate of sales growth in the last decade has produced a 15 per cent increase in earnings for the Hartford Gas Co. in 1966. New highs were also set in dividends, sales, revenues, number of customers and plant investment.

Per share earnings, based on 500,000 shares outstanding Dec. 31, 1966, were up to \$2.50 compared with \$2.18 in 1965. Total gas sales were 13 per cent higher in 1966 compared to the year before.

Greatest gains in the record-setting year were achieved in industrial and commercial heating sales. Industrial sales were up 18 per cent over 1965, while commercial heating revenues climbed 20 per cent. The number of gas customers served rose 1,700 to a total of 70,660.

SNET TESTS

The Southern New England Telephone Co. will begin testing exhaust control systems for its motor vehicle fleet this month.

According to Steven Carlette, staff supervisor—building supplies and motor equipment for the company, the test will involve about a dozen cars and light trucks.

Under the federal government's new air pollution act, all 1968 cars and light trucks up to 10,000 pounds gross weight will be required to have devices to cut down on the discharge of hydrocarbons and carbon monoxide.

"These devices are available now as options on 1967 vehicles. However, they will be standard equipment in 1968," Carlette said, "and we want to check the efficiency of the various models in advance. At the same time, the company will be looking at what additional service demands the devices will place on its motor vehicle maintenance program."

The test will take about six months.

INDUSTRY EXPANDS

Tight money, high interest rates and generally a poor year for construction has not slowed down the pace of Connecticut's industrial expansion during 1966. The Connecticut Development Commission indicated recently.

According to the commission, the state added 5,445,700 square feet of manufacturing space to its industrial potential. This was an increase of nearly 40 per cent over the space added in 1965. This space was the result of 166 completed projects, repre-

The network and advertising leaders can spot a trend when it hits them in the face. The word apparently has spread: get us shows that are musical and live.

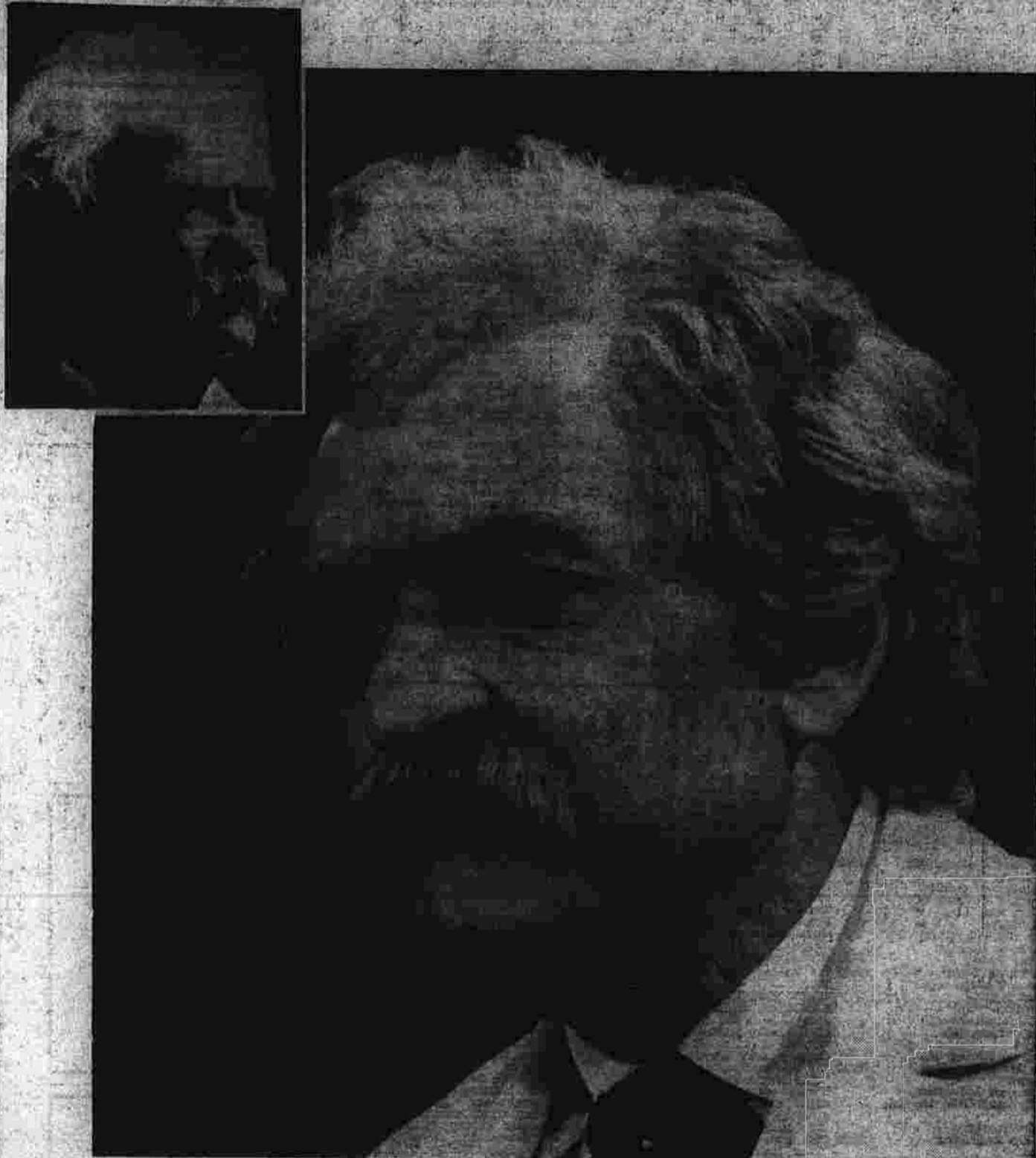

Danny Thomas will be presenting six variety shows as part of his weekly show. Bob Hope will be around for eight, including his 90-minute Christmas show, and Jack Benny will provide two.

As usual, ABC is the least active in the musical field. Lawrence Welk will be back for his 12th season, and the Hollywood Palace will continue. Negotiations for Debbie Reynolds to head up a weekly variety show were unavailing.

NBC Adds 8 Shows

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC's fall schedule will include eight — perhaps nine — new programs and there will be considerable shifting around of returning shows.

Stars of men programs will include Jerry Lewis, trying television again as host on a Friday night variety hour; Danny Thomas with an anthology hour on Mondays; Raymond Burr in a Thursday night police action series called "Ironside"; Jerry Van Dyke in another situation comedy.

The network has a new Western, "High Chaparral", to wind up its Sunday night schedule, which will make two one-hour shows in a row by producer David Dortort. His new show, like his "Bonanza," features an all-male family — a pioneer, his son and his brother. Earlier that evening there will be "The Mothers-in-Law," a comedy with Eve Arden and Kaye Ballard.

"Music Hall," a new variety hour Wednesday nights, will have assorted hosts. "Maya," now being shot in India for early Saturday evenings, will star Jay North, once "Dennis the Menace." He and an Indian boy will travel on an elephant hunting the American lad's lost father.

The fate of "I Dream of Jenn-

nie" has not been decided, but the rest of the schedule suggests the pending demise of "Hey Landlord." "The Girl From U.N.C.L.E.," "Occasional Wife," "Flipper," "T.H.E. Cat," "Please Don't Eat the Daisies," "Laredo" and "Captain Nice."

Culp: The Thinking Man's Spy

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The movie and television producers seem to be hopping off the James Bondwagon, and here's one spy who is glad: Robert Culp.

He might be called the thinking man's spy. Not only does he costar in NBC's "I Spy," he has written five of the scripts, including the one that kicked off the successful series and set the tone for the characters.

"I Spy" has been renewed for next season, but some of the more bizarre spy series appear to be in trouble. Also there appears to be an ebbing in the flood of espionage movies that followed in the wake of the James Bond hits.

"I view that as a good trend," says Culp. "It seems to me that the whole 007 craze has been a bad thing for young people."

"Of course kids must always find their fantasy heroes. But always in the past their heroes

have been more or less innocent of wrong-doing.

"James Bond changed that. He is an amoral figure who treats his enemies and women with equal cruelty. I think the affect of such a character is significant, as far as kids are concerned."

Culp views with calculated alarm the heavies of the Bondian epics.

"The villains of the past have been individuals or enemy nations whose motivations have been clear," he expounded. "But lately we have been menaced by the mysterious SMERSH and THRUSH, which are networks of mindless, soulless men whose only motivation is evil."

"When you have such a villain, he can only be combatted by a superman. And when the hero is a hedonist, amoral superman, you have a figure who can only bring confusion and subversion to young minds."

As might be expected, Culp does not hesitate to present Kelly Robinson (himself) and Alexander Scott (Bill Cosby) of "I Spy" as more ideal hero images.

"From the very beginning, Bill and I insisted that Robinson and Scott would be portrayed as fallacious men, full of foolishness and failure," said Culp. "When they win, it is often by accident, which is a good thing for young people to learn."

"Robinson and Scott are fallible, but they are relatively moral creatures. The fact that they — a white man and a Negro — work together as friends also carries an underlying message of the brotherhood of man, though there is never any preaching about it."

"And our heavies are not members of any vast network of evil, they are all individuals, and often a little on the silly side."
