





tion that this is what war is. Both these reasonings found expression in the speech Senator Robert Kensedy, making the most significant break in national unity this nation has ever faced in any modern war, delivered in

the Senate last Thursday. "We have," said Senator Kennedy, "sent more than 400,000 men into bat-tle. Fleets of extraordinarily complex planes pour their devastation upon the eaths and villages which divide an ancient jungle. The most powerful country the world has known now turns itsstrength and will upon a small and primitive land. . . . "The fault rests largely with our ad-

versary. He has pursued relentless and unyielding conquest with obdurate unconcern for mounting desolation. Now a conflict where violence breeds only endless violence. . . . "If this war was not our doing, and

is not our fault, still it is partly our responsibility. Events, many of them beyond our control, have brought the astounding might of American power upon a remote and alien people in a small and unknown land. It is difficult to feel in our hearts what this war means to the people of Vietnam. It is on the other side of the world and its people are strangers. Few of us are directly involved while the rest of us continue our lives and pursue our ambitions undisturbed by the sounds and fears of battle. To the Vietnamese, however, it must often seem the fulfillment of the prophecy of Saint John the Divine:

"And I looked, and beheld a pale horse; and his name that sat on him was Death, and Hell followed with him. And Power was given unto them over the fourth part of the earth, to kill with sword, and with hunger, and with

"Let us reflect for a moment not on the wisdom and necessity of our cause nor on the valor of the South Vietnamese but on the horror. For although the world's imperfections may call for the acts of war, righteousness cannot obscure the agony and pain those acts bring to a single child. The Vietnamese war is an event of historic moment, summoning the grandeur and concern of many nations. But it is also the vaeant moment of amazed fear as a mother and child watch death by fire fall from the improbable machine sent by a country they barely comprehend. It is the sudden terror of the official or the civil guard absorbed in the work of his village as he realizes the Vietcong assassin is about to take his life. It is the refugees wandering, homeless, from villages now obliterated, leaving behind only those who did not live to flee . . . "It is a country where hundreds of housands fight, but millions more are the innocent, bewildered victims of brutal passions and beliefs they barely unerstand. To them peace is not an abtract term describing one of those infrequent intervals when men are not killing each other. It is a day without terror and the fall of bombs. It is a family and the familiar life of their

acquire at a substantial price a section of adjacent land met with such loud out cries from neighbors on the other side of the present buffer strip that the matter was dropped. Then there was a proposal to use the former sewer beds, still owned by the town, as a land fill site. But this, too, met with opposition. One wonam who lived near the area when it was a sewer bed said that the rats that used to be there were as big as ponies and that to use the area for a dump would in-

vite the return of pony-sized rats. She was too old, now, to ride ponies, she proclaimed parenthetically. So the search for an adequate dump site was shelved for some months, but the need continued, and even got more desperate. Then last week another site was proposed out on the perimeter of the town near the Bristol line. The undeveloped area is presently zoned residential, although there are no houses near the proposed site. But a zoning change would be necessary to make it available as a dump. The request for a zoning change was all that was neces-

sary to start opposition anew. Nobody wants a dump in their back vard. That is understandable. At the same time, there has to be some metho of disposing of the trash from an expanding community. For most communities of moderate size, a carefully maintained land fill system seems to be the most feasible. Incinerators are useful, of course, but they are very coatly to build and to operate, even when several communities share in the use and the expense. Furthermore, there is still the problem of disposing of the cinders and other solids left from he combustion. And moreover, there is the fact that incinerators contribute to
