## LBJ to Order Draft Lottery, Recruitment of Younger Men

### Undergraduate Issue Shelved 'Indefinitely'

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson told Congress today he will order younger men drafted first under a lottery-type system as part of an overhaul of Selective Service.

His announcement of actions to come within two years—mostly without need of congressional approval—follows months of study and controversy over the nation's draft system.

The President said deferments for fathers, men with essential occupations and most graduate students will be ended. But in a special draft message sent from the Texas White House, he postponed indefinitely a politically touchy decision on whether to end undergraduates' student deferments. Family hardship deferments will be continued, Johnson said.

Key sections of the draft law expire June 30.

Without action by Congress men who had not had a deferment could not be drafted after that date even though they were in class 1A. Men who had been deferred but were in 1A on June 30 would still be subject to call. Johnson asked for a four-year extension of present authority to draft the new registrants.

He made it clear that some features of the revised draft system he has in mind won't be adopted for months—perhaps not until 1969.

Johnson shied away from total endorsement of recommendations made to him by a 20-member advisory committee.

### Two Young Boys 'Take Over' N.Y. Subway Express

NEW YORK (AP)—Two boys—aged 12 and 14—took charge of a subway express train and safely acted as conductors about halfway across Brooklyn Sunday night.

Here's how Transit Authority officials described the prank.

The boys hopped into the conductor's place in the middle of the 10-car Independent line train when he went for a drink of water during a two-minute stopover at the Coney Island terminal.

They pushed a button and closed the car doors, giving the motorman a go-ahead signal as the startled conductor watched from the platform.

The motorman made his usual stops, waiting as the boys opened the doors to take on and discharge passengers, then closed them to continue the trip toward Manhattan.

The conductor, who had been left on the platform reported the situation and a control tower 10 stops from Coney Island, was asked to check. When the tower reported the two boys acting as

### No Surprise In Opening French Vote

PARIS (AP)—President Charles de Gaulle's forces held their own in the first round of France's National Assembly election Sunday, and no significant shifts in the popular vote developed.

Complete returns for Metropolitan France, covering 476 of the 487 Assembly seats, gave the Gaullists 37 per cent of the vote and made them once again France's largest party. In the first round of voting in the 1962 Assembly elections, the Gaullists won about the same per cent.

The remainder of the returns, from overseas districts, will not be in for another day.

If the voting in the second round next Sunday also duplicates the 1962 pattern, the Gaul-

## Hanoi Sings That Same Peace Chant

NEW YORK (AP)—After conferring with North Vietnamese envoys, U.N. Secretary-General U Thant says he sees no prospects for peace talks in Vietnam unless the United States stops bombing North Vietnam.

Thant returned here Sunday night from a vacation in his native Burma, where he and the North Vietnamese diplomats met informally. He told a New York news conference the war is going to be "prolonged and bloody."

On a stopover in London, Thant told reporters that Hanoi is ready to withdraw its support of the Viet Cong if the United States withdraws its support of the South Vietnamese. He raised that point in discussing North Vietnam's interpretation of reciprocity on both sides in the conflict.

"The Hanoi idea of reciprocity is that there is a civil war in South Vietnam," Thant told London reporters. "Hanoi is assisting one side and the United States the other. If the United States withdraws support from one side, Hanoi is prepared to withdraw its support from the other."

While Thant's phraseology in stating the problem was new, the idea of withdrawal of support on both sides appeared to fit in with the second of North Vietnam's four points for peace: A withdrawal of U.S. and other foreign troops from South Vietnam. The four points were set down in a Hanoi broadcast April 14, 1965.

Thant did not say specifically that the point was raised by the North Vietnamese diplomats in Burma. But he indicated he did not consider it a new development. Asked in London about reports he was bringing back a new expression of Hanoi's posi-

#### Hoffa Plea Denied

WASHINGTON (AP)—The U.S. Court of Appeals denied today the plea of Teamsters Union President James R. Hoffa to remain free on bond instead of surrendering Tuesday to begin an eight-year sentence for jury tampering.

Hoffa's attorneys were expected to go immediately to the Supreme Court with their request for a habeas corpus order to permit Hoffa to remain free pending motions for a new trial. Hoffa's attorney Daniel Mahler told the Court of Appeals in his losing argument that unless a habeas corpus writ is granted for Hoffa and three co-defendants "at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning, they will all be in prison."

### Nelson Eddy Dead at 66

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Nelson Eddy, the tall, handsome baritone whose voice thrilled moviegoers in the '40s, died today a few hours after being stricken in the midst of a show at a Miami Beach night club.

Only last week Eddy, 66, once the highest paid singer in the world, said that he would continue working "until I drop" because "I love it."

He was at work, singing to some 400 listeners, when his voice failed and he was helped off the stage. A Mount Sinai Hospital spokesman said he apparently suffered a stroke.

Eddy was best known for a series of eight light operatic movies in which he costarred with Jeanette MacDonald, who

### 3,000 Attend Rally To Support Powell

NEW YORK (AP)—More than 3,000 persons jammed into Harlem's Abyssinian Baptist Church Sunday, shouting praises of their pastor, Adam Clayton Powell, and roaring protests over his exclusion from his congressional seat.

The three-hour rally threatened to break up in disorder at the very beginning. When called upon to open the meeting with the singing of "The Star-Spangled Banner," cries of "no, no, no" began drowning out those in the audience who were singing.

Cleveland Robinson, a rally sponsor, reminded the congregation: "This is a house of worship. Don't let's lose our heads."

Robinson is president of the Negro American Labor Council and a member of the City Commission on Human Rights.

Powell sent a message from Bimini, the Bahamas, saying Congress was "determined to show the people of Harlem that they can't have a congressman until they find one who will shuffle a little."

"Well, I won't shuffle and I know you wouldn't want me to shuffle," he said. "My head is high and my feet are walking in at straight line."

Powell is charged with misusing public funds while chairman of the House Labor and Education Committee.

The rally concluded with a unanimous pledge to elect Powell to his 18th Congressional District seat, which he has held for 22 years, "again and again and again until men of small minds and narrow vision are brought to their senses."

Neighborhood posters termed the House's action against Powell "an attack against people of color and oppressed people everywhere."

The rally was called by Robinson and the Unity Council of Harlem Organizations.

Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., who heads the special House committee whose recommendation to censure Powell and fine him \$40,000 was voted down, said Sunday Powell's "real crime" against the House of Representatives was "his failure to show any kind of humility."

Celler said he believes Powell has a good chance of winning a court reversal of the congressional action, saying that the situational requisites for membership in Congress—age, residency and citizenship.

Powell said Saturday that he would file suit in federal court in Washington to seek reversal of the House action.

His attorneys have advised him to remain in Bimini, since he currently lacks congressional immunity in the defamation of character suit in which the courts awarded Eather James a judgment. As a congressman, Powell could be prosecuted on contempt charges only if he appeared in New York.

Among messages read at the rally was one from the Rev. Martin Luther King, head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. King urged an immediate emergency conference of Negro leaders in Washington "to mobilize the full action of the national Negro community and all other supporters of representative democracy" to aid Powell.

### Ring Smashed

NEWARK (AP)—The FBI today smashed a half-million-dollar hijacking operation, arresting 22 persons on charges ranging from theft to kidnaping. An FBI announcement said those arrested were charged with being implicated in one or more of seven separate hijackings in the metropolitan New York-New Jersey area between October 7, 1966, and December 16, 1966. All those arrested today were residents of New Jersey and New York City. Four men already in custody on other charges also were charged in connection with the hijacking operation.

Some residents timed the first blast at 8:10 p.m., the exact time an air traffic control center in Cleveland reported it lost radar contact with the plane.

Five minutes earlier the pilot, Capt. John Horn, had radioed he was climbing from 8,000 to 10,000 feet, apparently to avoid storms which swirled sleet and snow over this area.

Horn, 45 and a Lake Central pilot since the line's first flight Nov. 12, 1949, gave no indication of trouble, but residents told of one or more explosions.

"It sounded like an awful combustion and we thought there had been an automobile accident," said Irene Heckathorn.

"There was no fire, no lights on the plane. I even heard the

## Recorders May Hold Key To Buckeye Air Disaster

KENTON, Ohio (AP)—Investigators digging through snow and ankle deep mud today found two recorders carried by the Lake Central airliner that exploded from a stormy sky Sunday night, killing all 38 aboard.

Federal investigators said both the cockpit voice recorder and the flight recorder were found in the wreckage of the airline's first fatal crash.

The voice recorder was expected to yield a tape of the crew's last half-hour of conversation. The other tape was to record altitude, heading speed and other information throughout the flight.

Wreckage from the Convair turboprop plane piloted by Lake Central's senior pilot was scattered over farm fields near Marselles, a town of 170 residents in northwest Ohio.

About 150 law officers and volunteers joined in the search for bodies most of which were found in a bean field where the main part of the fuselage fell.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation sent agents to the scene to help with the investigation and identifications.

Charles W. Bates, agent in charge for northern Ohio, headed the FBI delegation. A spokesman in the Cleveland office said, however, there was nothing to indicate at this time any explosive was aboard the plane.

The bodies were hauled in tractor-pulled farm wagons to a temporary morgue in an unused elementary school.

Investigating teams from the airline headquarters in Indianapolis and the Civil Aeronautics Board moved in to probe for the cause of the first major domestic air tragedy since a crash Aug. 6, 1966, near Falls City, Neb., took 42 lives.

The plane's flight recorder was recovered intact.

## GI on Vietnam Leave Survives Jet Crash

MONROVIA, Liberia (AP)—An American serviceman on leave from Katmandu, Nepal, to Monrovia, she has a sister, Mrs. C. C. Chalstrom, in Spirit Lake, Iowa, and a brother, Marvin, in Arnolds Park, Iowa.

An employee of the Monrovia airport said the jetliner circled the field, swung out to make a landing approach and then went down and burst into flame. He said he rushed to the scene in his car and found some survivors walking around. The pilot and copilot survived but were not available for comment.

Horton said a Monrovia commission has been named to make an inquiry into the crash and that Brazil and the International Civil Aviation Organization were sending representatives.

A Varig spokesman in Rio said a relief plane with technicians, medical personnel and rescue specialists was sent to Monrovia to aid the survivors and Liberian authorities.

Varig Viacao Aerea Rio Grandense was founded in the 1930s and is Brazil's only international airline. This was the airline's second disaster involving a jetliner on an international flight. The first occurred near Lima, Peru, Nov. 27, 1962, killing all 87 persons aboard.

## Town Man Killed In Highway Crash

Joachim F. Schiessl, 20, of 74 Hawthorne St. was killed in a one-car crash Sunday morning while traveling from his home to the Connecticut State Highway Department garage in East Hartford where he was scheduled to report for work.

Schiessl was one of five people killed in auto accidents in the state over the weekend. In addition, two other Connecticut residents died in accidents outside the state.

State Police in Hartford said Schiessl was driving his small foreign car west on the Wilbur Cross Highway when the vehicle skidded from the right to the left lane and slammed into a bridge abutment near the Forbes St. overpass.

He was pronounced dead on arrival at Hartford Hospital, police said. They said he died from multiple injuries.

Mr. Schiessl was born Dec. 18, 1946 in Bamberg, Germany.

Survivors, West Hartford, include two sisters, Miss Maxine I. Schiessl and Miss Frederika E. Schiessl, both of Manchester.

The funeral will be held tomorrow at 9:15 a.m. from the John F. Tierney Funeral Home, 219 W. Center St., with a Mass of requiem at St. Bridget Church at 10. Burial will be in Mt. St. Benedict Cemetery, Bloomfield.

### 14 Boys Perish As Flames Gut Orphans Lodge

BONNEVILLE, France (AP)—Fire roared through a winter sports lodge for orphans in the French Alps early today, killing at least 14 boys.

Six other young boys were in a critical condition from burns and injuries suffered in leaping from their third-floor dormitories.

From six to 10 other children were believed unaccounted for, but officials were hopeful that some of them were wandering in the woods nearby after fleeing in terror from the fire or had been taken in by neighboring families.

About 25 other children were hospitalized but their injuries were less serious.

A dozen bodies were found in the smoking ruins, and two other boys died in the hospital.

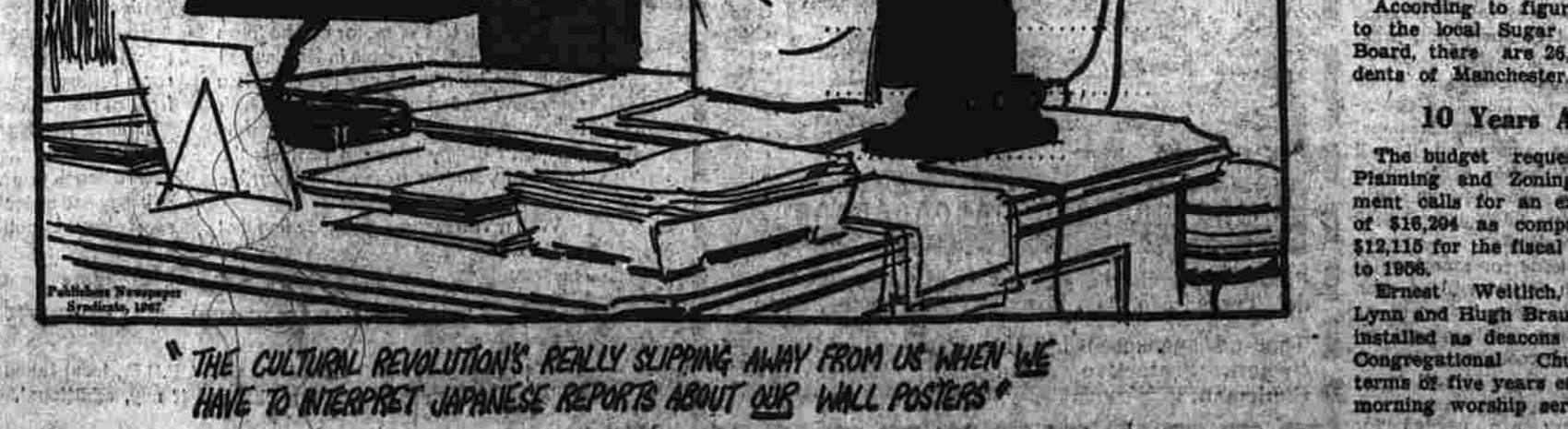

He is a rabid baseball fan, is a past president of the Hartford World Series Club, and is on its board of directors.

Lawrence is married to the former Rose McDonald of Cambridge, Mass. The couple has two married daughters and one son, the latter in the U.S. Navy.

### U.S. Revises Loss Report in Viet For Bombing of Viet Village

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. command in Vietnam is again reporting American battle casualties in specific numbers of killed or wounded instead of in terms of light, moderate or heavy.

The command said use of the three descriptive terms, begun 18 months ago for security reasons, led to ambiguities and frequent misunderstanding of the results of U.S. military actions.

It said press, radio or television reports described various units as wiped out after military spokesmen listed heavy casualties in the units.

The command had defined heavy casualties as anything more than 10 per cent killed, wounded or missing; moderate as 5 to 10 per cent; and light casualties were up to 5 per cent.

The command said the system was misleading because the wounded sometimes included persons whose injuries were minor.

It said another reason for the change was that the "enemy" has consistently grossly overstated friendly losses in his reports. It is possible that Hanoi has also been misreading terms such as "heavy."

Under the new procedure approved in Washington, a spokesman said, newsmen may report the number of American battle casualties they witness or a unit commander on the scene gives them.

They are not permitted to report unit designations below the size of brigade or regiment. The command said the restriction was based on military security and concern of relatives of persons of smaller units.

The new method of casualty reporting will not apply to other allied forces in Vietnam, the command said.

### No Explanation Given U.S. Accepts Responsibility For Bombing of Viet Village

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. military command acknowledged today that two U.S. Air Force Phantom jets mistakenly bombed the refugee-crammed village of Lang Vei, last Thursday but still gave no explanation for the mistake.

The raid killed at least 300 Vietnamese civilians and wounded 175 others, according to unofficial accounts from the village in the northwest corner of South Vietnam near the Laotian border.

The U.S. command said 83 villagers were killed, 10 were missing and 176 were injured. It was the worst such accidental bombing of the war.

The U.S. command said at least 24 Phantoms hit the village, causing light damage but no American casualties.



U.S. Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff and Connecticut U.S. District Atty. Jon O. Newman have written a book, "Politics: The American Way," which bids fair to become required reading for students and politicians.

Its 148 pages are crammed tight with an explanation of voters, candidates and office holders — what makes them tick and what makes them unpredictable. It can best be described as "instant politics," American style.

The book describes politics on a local, state and national level. It mentions little about Connecticut, except in passing, and devotes itself to generalities, albeit specific generalities.

One reference to Connecticut is contained in its chapter on Party Leaders. It names John Bailey as the acknowledged Democratic leader in the state. No mention is made of Connecticut's Republican political leader.

The book defends the words "politician" and "politician" against the unfavorable connotations they have derived in the past.

The ethics of today's politicians" in the authors state, "compare favorably with the ethics of those engaged in other endeavors."

The book's nine main chapters are devoted to explanations of What is Politics, The Voters, The Candidates, Political Parties, The Government of Politics, The Nominating Process, Campaigning, The Candidates, Campaigning: Partisans and Citizens, and Election Day. Two pages are added for suggestive reading by political students.

U.S. President Hubert Humphrey, in a forward, praises Ribicoff as "uniquely qualified to know politics in all its varied dimensions."

And, former Vice President Richard Nixon writes, also in a forward, "Sen. Ribicoff has successfully charted the labyrinth through which American politicians must travel to local, state, and national power. He reports what will not apply to other allied forces in Vietnam, the command said."

The book, published by Alyon and Bacon Inc., will go on sale next Monday.



### South Windsor Report Issued by Sprenkel On Town's Refuse Problem

Town Manager Terry V. Sprenkel, in a 12-page report to the town council, has made recommendations on the refuse problem in town and the use of landfills.

Cost to the town for operation of the facility on the present schedule is \$4,607 per year. This cost does not reflect the cost of landfills, which is estimated at \$100,000 per year.

Councilman Daniel P. Cavanaugh has requested the town council to study the problem. The cost of this operation is estimated at \$5,000 if the town council would purchase an ordinance on the subject. If the recommendation is accepted, the area to be open two additional days per week is accepted, the estimated cost of operation would be approximately \$8,000 per year. It was noted that this is a map showing the most favorable disposal refuse and days per week and should provide advantages to both industrial and residential needs of the community.

Sprenkel called for the drafting and adoption of a comprehensive ordinance establishing a refuse collectors in town and both industrial and residential collectors. It is in form of dumping rights at the sanitary landfill area.

Other recommendations call for an annual licensing fee of \$200 per unit, including registration with the town, a minimum inspection fee and other desired criteria for enforcement.

In addition, a listing of all customers, route layouts established, tonnage and collection days would be provided by the collectors to the town.

A performance bond to the town of not less than \$5,000 renewable annually is requested in the report.

The town would have the right to restrict or revoke rights of collection by a contractor for failure to perform property or for bringing in material from some other source or municipality.

Other recommendations are as follows:

- All non-combustible materials be discharged at a site not within the confines of the town and the town shall ascertain what is to be defined as acceptable refuse material.
- The sanitary landfill area will be available to private collectors and large business firms included on a schedule of three days per week—Tuesday, Friday and Saturday.
- No commercial carriers are to be allowed to use the landfill facilities on Sunday because of increased volume and filling problems.
- The program of increased hours are to become effective on July 1, the effective date of the next fiscal year.
- The town council is to appoint a landfill site committee as soon as possible to acquire second site or adequate adjacent land to provide facilities estimated to total 90 acres of land with the right to seek options on the land. An additional 50 acres would be necessary.
- The town council is also requested to appropriate sufficient funds to provide additional labor and equipment costs to operate the proposed expanded services.
- The town council should adopt and have in effect a comprehensive ordinance to assure adequate police, health and administrative controls for the use and operation of the existing landfill area.

Sprenkel said that "basically there are three pressing problems facing the town" in relation to refuse disposal. Additional hours should be provided for industrial and commercial firms to discharge refuse materials at the land-fill area at times considered more favorable and conforming with working and organizational requirements.

There is a demand and possible obligation to provide access to the landfill area for private refuse collectors operating in town or hauling residential refuse materials generated by town residents. However, adequate but fair and stringent controls should be in effect in this area, Sprenkel noted.

The third problem is that the existing Strong Rd. facility will be exhausted by 1973, based on projections and accepted professional criteria. The report called for additional landfill facilities should be sought by the council.

45-Acre Dump

The present sanitary landfill was acquired by the town in April 1963 and consists of some 12 acres. According to a report issued in 1963, the area was expected to meet existing needs until 1980. However, the report was based on data showing the use of the facility by private residents only on weekend and half a day on Thursday.

Use of the facility by collectors having industrial, commercial and residential accounts in town will reduce the life expectancy of the facility by 50 per cent or provide use only until 1972.

The 1972 estimate is based on data available at this time and stands to be revised either upward or downward after a trial

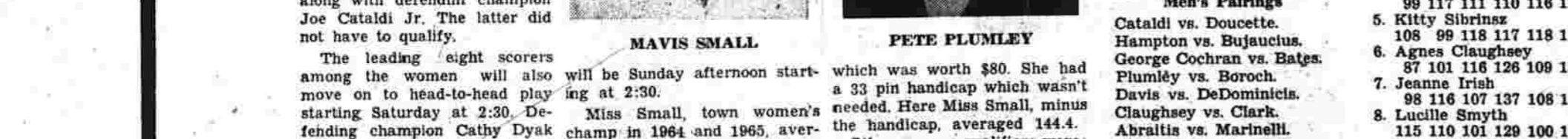

Donahue Wins DFC For Vietnam Action

Robert P. Donahue, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert J. Donahue of 90 Cooper Hill St., recently received one of the military's highest commendations, the Distinguished Flying Cross.

First Lt. Donahue received the medal for heroic action while he was serving as pilot with the U.S. Army Transportation Corps during an air force support mission in Laos, Vietnam, in February, 1966.

The citation states that on learning a friendly outpost was under attack he volunteered aid. He flew reconnaissance of the area and then directed the fire of an armed fleetship on the hostile forces. After one hour of accurate and effective fire, the hostile fire ceased, the citation says.

But the Viet Cong regrouped before daylight and again attempted to overrun the outpost. The citation continues: "Again Lt. Donahue flew in and, with complete disregard for his personal safety while receiving intense ground fire, fired spotting rockets and dropped flares to direct the fire of the fleetship with high precision, he directed the fire through a few meters of the outpost.

"After the Viet Cong attack ceased, Lt. Donahue flew at low level, determined that the Viet Cong were escaping in sampans and placed more suppressive fire on them. Despite having flown the entire night, he remained over the outpost until daylight to maintain its security."

The citation concludes: "Lt. Donahue's personal bravery and outstanding flying ability were demonstrated on this mission."
