Why The Draft Is An Issue The Selective Service System as it has operated since the opening of World War II is a system designed to give the nation the best conceivable use of its available manpower and talent.

The "reforms" now being discussed and suggested, and now advanced by some of the recommendations of Presit Johnson, would alter the Selective Service System in the direction of fairness rather than maximum efficiency in use of the nation's human resources.

The justification for the system that has been in effect for the past 26 years can be stated very clearly if one wishes to be brutal enough. There are some young Americans who are being used most efficiently, in view of their talents, when they are put in the front lines, to shoot and to be shot at. There are other young Americans who can do their nation, and its whole effort at survival in our kind of world most good when they are kept far from any front lines, and perhaps given merely some problem in abstract science to ponder. The sentimental case against such rude realism about our human resources is also easily stated. When we follow this kind of system,it follows, inevitably, that certain elements of the copulation, lowest in economic standing, and therefore quite likely too to represent a high proportion from racial oups with the least economic and cultural advantages, are going to be most heavily represented among those young

We followed such codes and practices during World War II without known emplaint, or without much apparent sense of injustice. Perhaps, quite to the contrary, we all realized, then, the superior justice to all of giving to each that particular function he could best discharge in the grand total community effort necessary for victory.

Anyway, the CIA, ever since 1953, began being discreetly modest about how effective it had been way over in Iran.

The latest news from Iran was to the effect that Iran was now beginning to buy some military equipment from Russia, in exchange for Iranian gas. But this is all happening under the Shah the CIA put back in power, and Russia today is a different more friendly Russia than it was in 1953. It may conceivably be sald of Mossadegh, then, that he was ahead of his times, and that the CIA took care of that.

The Overtime Sign Of The Times The latest national statistic on industrial overtime work shows that the average amount of overtime per week was, in January, down to 3.3 hours. This average is the lowest in nearly two years, comparing with the record average overtime figure set in March a year ago, which was 4.1 hours per

This is one more rather firm and important indication of how the national economy is faring these days. In fact, it more or less reflects the whole state of business. Consumers have stopped consuming as much as they were; producers have finally managed to catch up to or get ahead of their orders, a condition which makes it possible for them to begin operating without overtime: the loss of overtime pay will make a rough completion of the circle, since it will inevitably inspire and necessitate some additional decrease in consumer spending.

To focus on such a statistic, and on the circle in which it travels, is not to become a prophet of doom and gloom. We needed readjustment; we needed to disabuse ourselves of the idea that all indices could forever move smoothly upward: we needed some tactful pauses in the production flood; we needed, however unpleasant it may be to say such a thing to any individual getting

Some of these things we, and the economy, needed are now obviously coming our way. Most of the signs in the economy are mildly recessive; almost none are, at the moment, positive or expansionist. All these mildly recessive signs have not yet combined together for their own fullest ultimate efble, everywhere one looks, to lead to the judgment that the federal government at the moment, doesn't need to do anything-like throwing a tax increase into this situation—to make the recession

But it would be the worst possible attitude on the part anyone to think for one moment that Mr. Johnson is not doing the very best he can to serve the interests of his country and the entire free world through what he sincerely believes to be the right course of action.

The eventual solution of this thorny mess in Vietnam is completely and unequivocally up to the President. The criticism of the several senators only serves to undermine the President, and the national interests. It makes no difference whether the senator 's last name is Kennedy or Fulbright. These critics only serve to stimulate the peaceniks and the anti-war demonstrators who, in another day and era, would be summarily arrested for sedition and treated

accordingly. It makes little difference whether there is an honest divergence of opinion during normal times. But it makes great deal of difference to the naonal morale, and to the morale of our fighting men, to have men high in the seats of government continually at-

It makes little difference whether we deplore the situation. We are in it and we must stay in it until a satisfacory arrangement can be made. The thing for all Americans to bear mind as they read of the harsh criti-

SAIGON (AP) -Communist guerrillas made two attacks on U.S. forces in the Mekong Delta before dawn today, killing six Americans and wound ing 25. One other American was missing, and two South Vietnamese platoons suffered heavy casualties. A 15-minute mortar barrag of 80 rounds hit the first majo American base established the delta about 2 a.m. catchin most of the soldiers asleep. The barrage killed two and wounded 23 at the 9th Infantry Division's Dong Tam camp some 40 miles

south of Saigon. It was the first shelling of the camp since 9th Division infare trymen moved into it in late January. The camp is about one mile square, on ground dredged surrounded by paddy land largely controlled by thu Viet Cong at night.

Another 9th Division post was hit by mortars and small-arms fire two hours later at Rach Kien, about a dozen miles from Saigon.
