
BOSTON (AP)-New Englanders muttered, struggled and cussed a little today as they coped with the after-effects of the season's heaviest snowfall, frozen solid by arctic temperatures overnight, but the storm had its brighter sides. The mounds of snow could have been higher and the road ruts deeper if the "precipita-tion" Tuesday had been all snow instead of being mixed with rain and sleet.

And the very combination o wet snow followed by a freeze that caused today's inconvelences was viewed by meterologists as a fine omen that the long-standing drought had been dealt a severe blow without the danger of flooding. He said that "the American Government," instead of availing itself of the opportunity for negotiations, "on the contrary, trying to camouflage its aggressive intentions, hastened to set forth ultimatums that were absolutely unacceptable to the Vietnamese people,"

Premier Kosygin said that, instead of responding to the peace overtures, the United States "violated" the lunar new year truce by using it to redeploy and reinforce its troops.

Then, describing the "escalation" of artillery and naval shelling of the North and the mining of rivers with which the United States followed the truce. Premier Kosygin sald that such moves appeared aimed at the "isolation of North Vietnam."

"One must say," he went on, "that their hopes are in vain. They obviously do not understand the people's feelings of internationalism., The people will find a way, by united efforts, to assure the necessary aid and support to the heroic, smbattled Vietnamese people. . . . The new step escalating the aggression will encounter new efforts to put an end to it."

A Crisis In Swearing

A South Yorkshire miner who was fined for using obscene language the other day protested that he had "heard worse in the television." The newspaper report of the case did not quote his actual words-no doubt they were written down on a piece of paper and passed up to the magistrates-but, assuming that they were chosen from the lower enominations of oaths, one can sympathize with his feelings of outrage. For, like so many other institutions in our rapidly changing society, the practice of swearing is fast approaching a state of crisis. Like the teen-agers, and gynecologists, parsons, parents, and schoolteachers, the modern curser and swearer finds himself beset by evershifting standards, and is desperately searching for some firm ground to stand on.

and religion. People presumably use

swear words to give unusual force to what they are saying, or else to shock or outrage. In the past, the use of tabooed sexual words (obscenity) or of words or phrases with religious mean-We convicted Alger Hiss not of trea-

ing (profanity), has served these ends well enough. When virtually everybody believed that God could very easily damn someone to hell, there was some point in calling upon Him to do so. And even if one did not believe He would do it just for the asking, as it were, then one was still conscious that in asking for it to be done one was asking a terrible thing. Constant repetition no doubt dulled the edge of the curse but parents and preachers were ever ready

Well, as they usually continue, a time of crisis is also a time of challenge. If the main supports of British swearing are collapsing under us, this surely presents a splendid op-

portunity for refounding it on a differnt and more secure foundation. And while we're about it, a broader foundation too. For one of the least attractive features of British profanity and obscenity is their drear repettve ness. Most practitioners have a vocabulary of no more than a dozen or so words which are employed over and over again, usually without regard to context, rhythm, euphony, or even aliteration. People familiar with other bad languages claim that swearing in Arabic or Spanish is much more imaginative and varied. And, indeed, apart from the Americans, the British have fewer strange oaths than any other nation. Perhaps this is because in these countries, unlike our own, comparison

with animals is regarded as a highly

suitable source of swearing and a great deal more attention is paid to the shortcomings of a person's ancestors and family than is the case in England. What we really need is a bad language commission. When countries like Israel or Ireland decide to revivify an old language, they appoint a committee of experts to decide what is going to be the Hebrew for "telephone," or the Gaelic for "jet propulsion." The time is now ripe for such a body in England to invent and inject into the language a whole series of new swear

Both GM and the UAW International Executive Council termed the mid-February walkout illegal and the union chiefs ordered strikers back to work, Local President Robert Hall went along with UAW President Walter P. Reuther and other executives after they threatened to take over the local.

Lincoln Parents To Hear Tamsky On School Issue

Joseph R. Tamsky, town planning director, will discuss the Planning Commission's views on the Lincoln School Center Springs Park issue be-fore the Lincoln School Parents' Association tonight at 8 at the

Manchester's town planner since 1964, Tamsky has opposed taking open space park land for a school to replace the existing 50-year-old Lincoln School at the Center since completion of a study he made last October. The study calls for abandoning the Lincoln District and placing the school's pupils in surrounding districts and has received backing from the plan-The commission has twice vot-

ed against placing a school in the park, though the proposal has repeatedly received unanimous approval from the board The board has maintained that the district should be retained

and that placing its pupils in expanded Bentley, Nathan Hale and Washington Schools would prove impractical because their sites are already inadequate. In its next recent move, the planning commission last week issued a resolution calling for a long-range study of all the town's future school needs —to be made jointly by Tamsky and the school administration —before a final decision on Lincoln. That idea, however, has been rejected by the school board, which has asked Curtis to compile additional data supporting its position on Lincoln and to submit it to the Board of Di-

rectors for study.

The directors have agreed to bring the matter to a vote at a special meeting in the near future, but a date has not yet been established. A 6-3 vote by the directors would be needed to over-rule the TPC decision and pave the

way for the school's construc-A committee of the Lincoln Parents' Association, headed by Mrs. Virginia Celinski, has been pressing for the new school for more than a year.

The group first appeared before the school board in Febru-

ary 1966 to complain about what it termed the "deplo able" physical conditions at Lincoln and to seek action for its replacement.

Week's Total Highest Yet: 232 Killed

SAIGON (AP)-The highest American losses of the Vietnam war were announced today, reflecting the steadily rising U.S. military effort and Communist retaliation with heavier mortar attacks, mines, booby traps and hit

and run assaults. The total casualties last week were 1.617 killed, wounded and missing. It included 232 dead, 1,-381 wounded and four missing. Most were in the small skirmishes and fleeting Red jabs that have characterized the recent fighting.
While the over-all total was

the highest of the war, the total of 232 killed was exceeded by one week in November, 196 when 240 Americans died. But most of that death toll came in the fierce Is Drang Valley battle, not in engagements scat tered the length of South Viet-

The U. S. command reported 1,736 Communists were killed last week, well above average but not a record. However South Vietnam's "open arms" program to attract defectors dealt the Reds a hard blow. A record weekly total of 1,168 Communist soldiers and political workers came into allied lines waving the slips of paper granting them amnesty for turning on the Reds. Allied statistics show the open


