Tolland Write Orders Board to Halt Payments for School Milk

Belcher's Dairy of Staffordville, supplier of milk for the local schools, has been served with a writ of attachment by its former supplier, the Tolland County, in the amount of \$100,000. It was announced at Wednesday night's meeting of the Board of Education.

School board chairman David Cook, read a portion of the writ, in which Belcher claims it has not received payment for milk delivered as far back as January, 1965.

"There are no prospects of the milk to the schools being cut off," according to School Supt. Robert Briarson. The dairy has changed dealers and begins supplying Hook milk Monday, he said.

The writ, apparently filed last Monday, calls for the registration of the school board to pay for the milk delivered. The Manchester school system, which also contracts its school milk from Belcher's, changed its supplier this week, according to Belcher's.

The school board agreed to check with Town Counsel Robert King on what action to take.

Friday evening, a board member, suggested the school board establish a temporary milk payment and to insure the timely receipt of milk deliveries from the state.

Vernon School Board May Figure Budget with Last Pay Offer

The personnel policies committee of the Board of Education has recommended to the board's budget committee that teachers salaries be figured in the budget on the basis of the last board offer to the Vernon Education Association, Peter Humphry, committee chairman, has announced.

The last offer was based on a starting salary of \$4,800 with the present ratio of 1:14 to the highest salary.

The teachers' salaries are still not determined. The VEA has filed a grievance with the State Board of Education and has asked for mediation in the salary dispute with the board.

But past experience of other towns shows that before a settlement is reached through the state process, many months will go by. Humphry said the budget committee must figure on some sort of basis.

The salary schedule paid this coming fall without a contract settlement will be the present agreed schedule until the present three year agreement, Humphry said.

If the town figures on the last board offer and mediation brings in a lower figure, "the extra money will be a surprise," Humphry said.

The VEA has held out for a starting pay of \$5,500 with the 1:14 ratio.

"Naturally, we of the board committee would prefer the VEA file the question now, rather than have the inconvenience of waiting possibly a year to see the question resolved," he said.

"But all our efforts have been to go ahead," he added.

"The VEA committee will not negotiate," he said. "But we have only reiterated the last offer which was an increase over their first offer."

"It seems hard to believe the VEA committee actually represents the majority of our teachers whom we hold in high esteem," he said.

"Our inability to surrender to VEA demands that we refer the Board Committee's determination to consider the plight of Vernon taxpayers and the VEA to the town voters," Humphry said.

A spokesman for the state board of education said last week that a mediation settlement could probably be reached within a month.

Town Clerk Henry Butler reminds all residents tomorrow is the deadline for all qualified citizens to become voters prior to the town election, April 4. This deadline also applies to people transferring from another Connecticut town.

The requirement on residence is a person must have lived at least six months in Vernon. Therefore, Saturday, only those who have lived in Vernon on or before Sept. 10, 1966 will be eligible.

An requirement is 21 years and it has been ruled anyone celebrating a 21st birthday March 12 is eligible. This session will be held from 9 to 8 p.m. at the town hall in Rockville.

Also subpoenaed is Berlin Democratic Selectman Arthur Powers, treasurer of a 1961 testimonial in Dodd's honor.

Moriarty was Dodd's 1964 senatorial campaign treasurer and was treasurer of two testimonial dinners given for Dodd in 1963 and 1965.

Moriarty will appear at 10 a.m. Monday. He will spend the weekend with his daughter and son-in-law, Dr. and Mrs. Donald Kerwin, Washington residents.

He declined today to comment on his appearance, saying that it would be "inappropriate at this time to make a statement."

He has, however, that, as far as he has knowledge, there was nothing improper about the campaign and the two testimonial dinners which he was involved in.

Moriarty said that he is a carpenter by profession and has been in the business since 1925. He said he had received \$70,000 from several testimonials that were organized in his behalf in those years.

He said the bulk of this, \$160,000, went to pay off political debts that dated from 1966, when he first made an unsuccessful attempt to run for the Senate.

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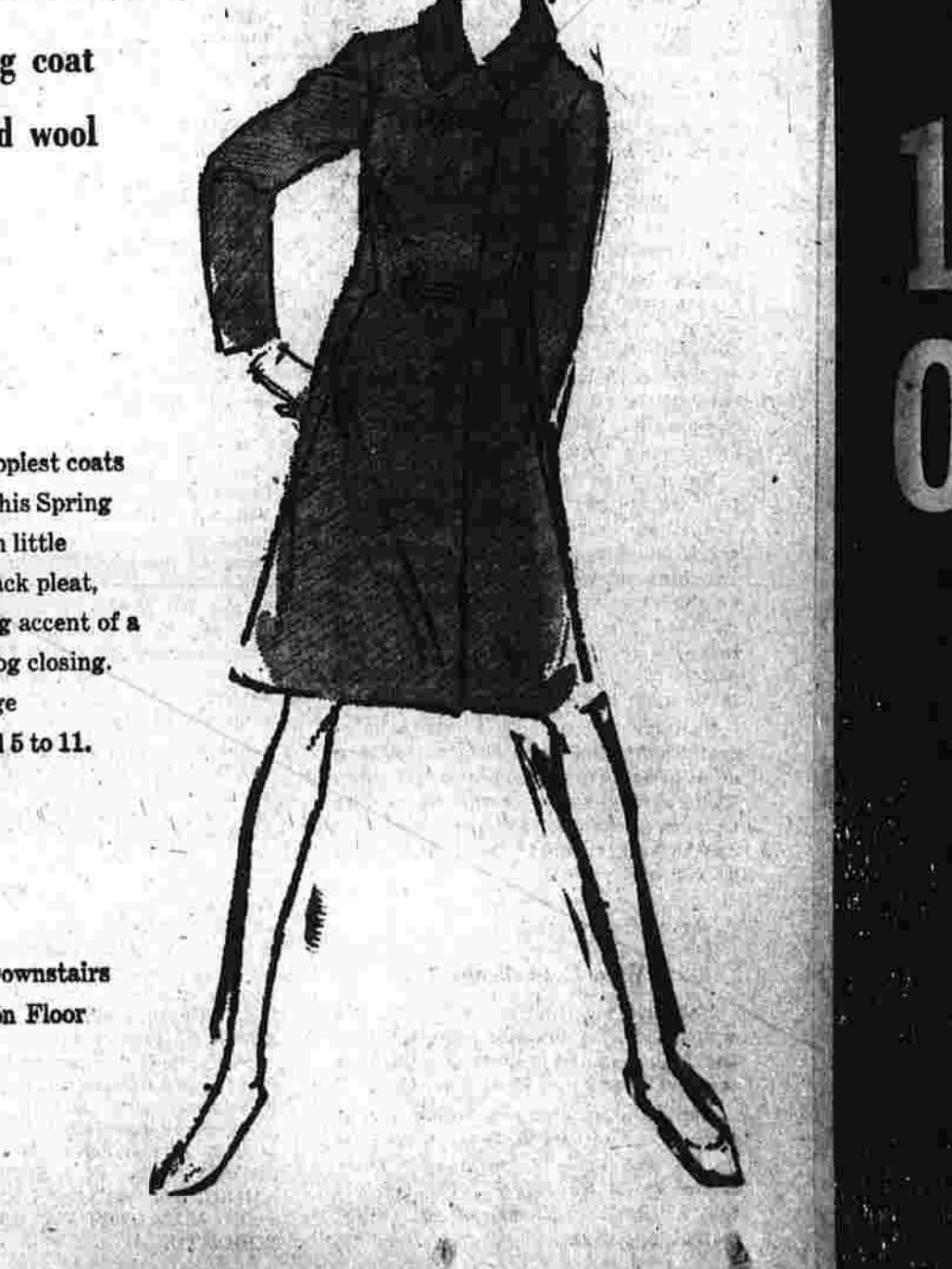

He's Not Turning Soft Now
The President's language, in his press conference discussion yesterday of his policy in Vietnam and of domestic criticism it has been encountering, is cool and restrained, which, it seems to us, is the perfect tactic for him at a moment when a good many people were expecting him to be shouting. Senator Kennedy is so many thin strips ready for broiling.

His language was effectively cool and restrained, and the ideas he expressed were cool and safe, too. If we were to summarize them, we would say that he managed to make it quite clear that his own mind is set on a course of deviation, from which he does not intend to deviate. At the same time, he was barred, by obvious considerations of expediency and responsibility and of dangers alike, from describing realistically and frankly the precise reasoning of his own firmness of mind.

We believe the unspoken reality of the situation as he sees and senses it can be described by saying that he believes we now have the enemy in Vietnam by the throat, and that, if we can hang on, keep shaking him and do not let up on him, even for an instant, we have him where he must, sooner or later, bend the military and the diplomatic knee to us.

The extent to which we are trying to press our own small of a real victory is stated, more openly than the President's words would choose or dare to do, by the casualty statistics from Vietnam. The number of American deaths is rising sharply, as we know, everywhere we can, for the chance of a kill.

Because the President cannot very well bare the real realism of his military posture publicly, he himself cannot defend his own real position publicly either, and is forced to shadow-box about being willing to "talk conditionally or unconditionally" now.

But there is a defense for what we surmise the President's real position to be. It is that, having come this far at so great a cost toward a chance of victory in Vietnam, he is not going to throw that chance away at the last moment. Having finally got ready to hold back what might be the final pressures, having carried the hawk policies forward to the point where they may be about to justify themselves, he is not now suddenly going to turn dove.

It would be a poor estimate of the President to think that the man who originally bought the policy of escalation in Vietnam should think, now, from that which increased expenditure of American life which might bring a military decision.

What he obviously wants, and what he obviously intends to get—and his restrained treatment of his domestic critics yesterday was, of course, the best way to cool them down and diminish their pressure—is the chance to carry through on the policy he himself selected over two years ago.

Who Gets Tenner?
Networks see, network do. This, we suppose, is the saddest inevitable in the high powered competition between network empires of New York City.

But if it seems interesting to speculate on the prospective success for each individual investment, it is more important to consider the picture as a whole. Eventually, we suppose, after each network has purchased enough sports, and tucked them away in its own exclusive portfolio, there will come a time for compromise bargaining among the giants, and they will, eventually, begin sharing their sports with one another. But this, obviously, is still the era of acquisition. We can't wait to see which network buys tennis.

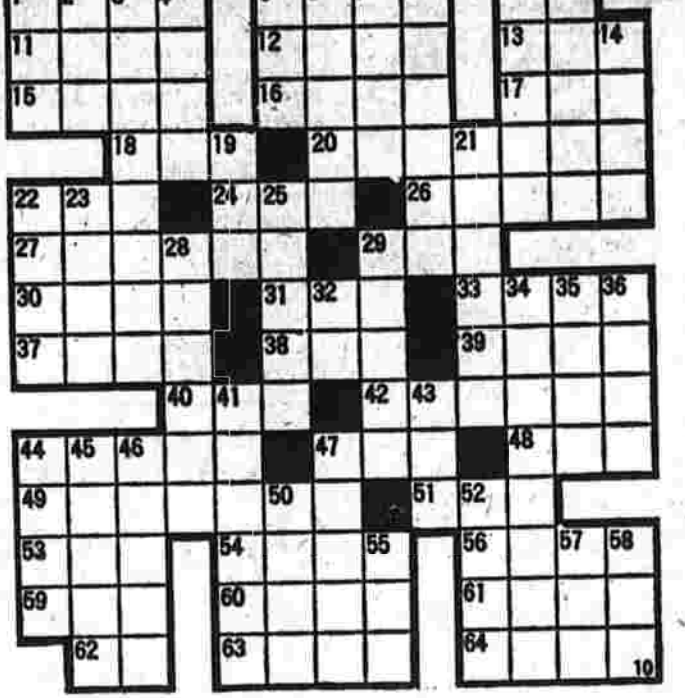
