

The Connecticut Valley's colleges have sent many graduates to positions of fame and importance around the world: others were to become wives (or husbands) of such prominent Americans. The valley branch of the Boston & Maine was probably never busier than during World War II, when troops on their way to bases or recruits about to be inducted-were regular passengers At the Greenfield station, where a restaurant once occupied more than half the floor space, more than 1,500 box lunches were prepared and distributed in one night to servicemen headed for Fort Devens. Springfield's Union Station was itself a bustling source of patronage. The late train announcer Michael F. "Mac" McCarthy, is remembered as the friend and confidante of many regular or frequent valley travelers, some of such note as the late U.S.

Sen. Ralph Flanders of Vermont. The Springfield - Greenfield operation was originally the Connecticut River Railroad (which long ago used to discharge Mount Holyoke students at Smiths Ferry, whence they would complete the trip to South Hadley by boat). How it was acquired by the B & M was a colorful story in itself. In the early 1890s, the presidents of both the New Haven Railroad and the Connecticut River Railroad had signed an agreement for the latter road to be leased by the New Haven; only the stockholders' ratification was needed. It was then that A. A. McLeod, president of the B & M, quietly bought up a controlling
