Vernon State Mediation March 29 Over Teacher Pay Dispute

March 29 has been set by the personnel policy committee of the Board of Education for the date for the mediation session between the Board of Education and the Vernon Education Association, according to Kenneth Landy, mediation agent for teacher negotiations. The session will take place at the State Office Building in Hartford, Monday afternoon, and has been set to the parties involved.

A contract is not promised from the session, Landy said, as mediation is not binding on either party. But of 24 sessions Landy has been part of in the State, 18 have reached a contract agreement with mediation.

The other six disputes between school boards and teachers groups have gone on to arbitration, Landy said, before an agreement was reached. Arbitration might take as long as eight weeks, he said.

Landy refused to comment on whether the mediation session would be held in the State Office Building, but he did say the average starting salary for teachers in the state in the fall will be about \$5,750 from the results of contract agreements so far.

Vernon teachers have asked a starting salary of \$5,900. The school board's last offer was \$5,600.

If my personal means should not prove adequate, I will borrow the money, if necessary, to pay the claims which may be made in response to this statement."

Dodd used bitter words to describe Pearson and Anderson and also for his former assistants at the Connecticut Nationalists with documents he says were stolen from his office.

Pearson is the President of American Society and Jack Anderson is his "jackal," he said.

Pearson and Anderson issued a statement saying Dodd "knows that if the House pre-vent case if allowed, he faces exposure in the Senate."

Dodd said that he had used the money to pay political debts and to defray the cost of his public office. "I know in my heart I have raised the money for my education and in good faith," he said.

Dodd's speech lasted over an hour and a half. He was interrupted by 43 senators on hand and no comment when it was finished.

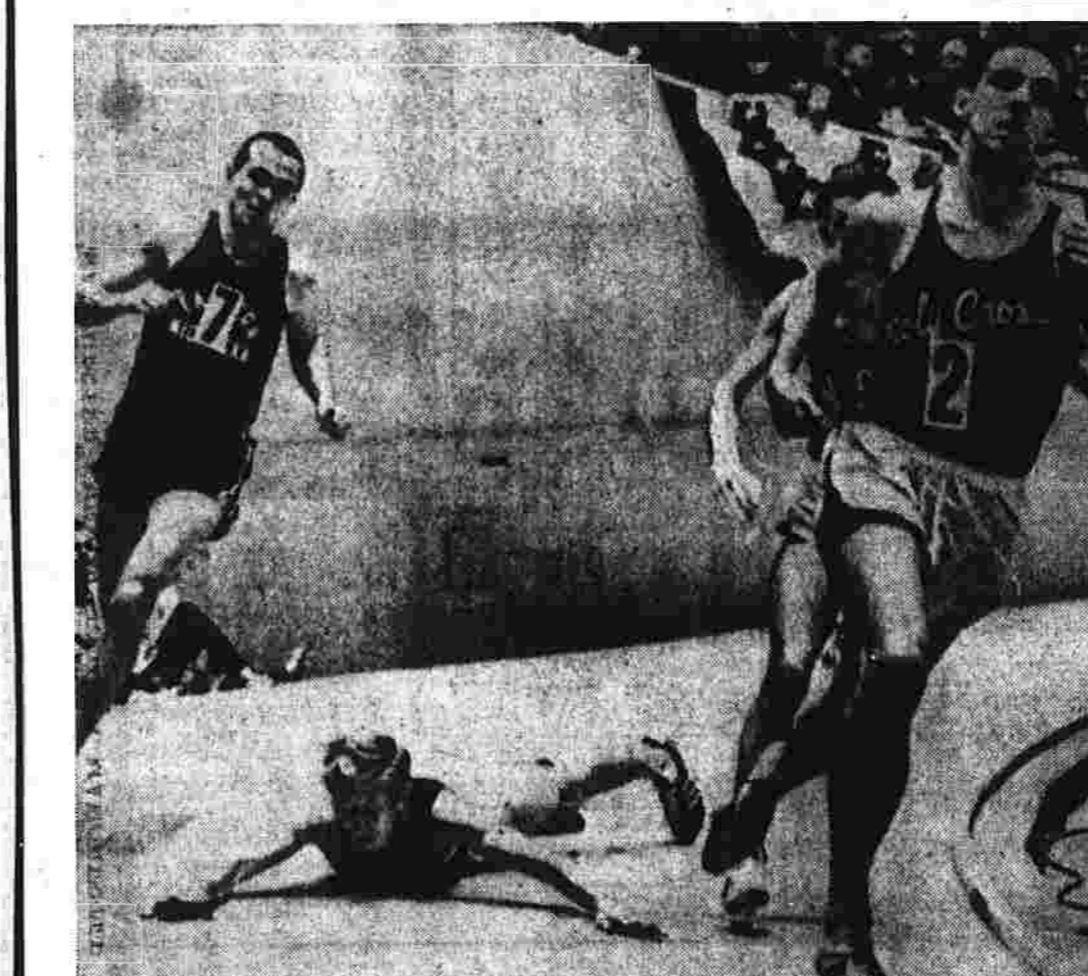

Danny Kaye Will Go Quietly on Last Show

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Ladies and gentlemen, the last four years have been the wonderful experience of my life. It has been a pleasure to entertain you, and now, until we meet again—good night."

This speech will not be heard when Danny Kaye appears on the last show of his CBS series on April 12. Reruns will follow until June 7.

"There won't be any speeches, no bursts of sentiment," the comic vows. "I'll just do the last show, and that will be that."

The Kaye era is passing at CBS' Television City, and he sighed over the fact as he presided over one of his ceremonial lunches in his office-suite.

"You know, I don't think I could have gotten through the four years if it hadn't been for this place," he said, referring to the elegantly furnished apartment. "We've worked on scripts here, rehearsed here. And now it's going to be broken up into offices."

He displayed no real remorse that the series was ending.

"I went into television expecting to do one season, maybe two," he remarked. "Then it stretched to four, and I must say I've enjoyed them."

"But it has become too easy. I

have fallen into the comfortable routine of coming in here Tuesday and working on the show until we do it on Saturday night. When something becomes too easy in show business, then it's time to quit and turn to something else."

Kaye said he had expected to spend the rest of the year making a movie—"I haven't made one in five years, and I'm overdue"—and picking up the loot in Las Vegas, summer theaters and state fairs.

Instead he's going to Chichester, England, to play in a classic Italian comedy, "A Servant with Two Masters."

"I must be out of my mind!" he said. "Here I've put aside engagements worth about \$700,000 to go to England and play in a period farce for \$214 a week, which I'll probably turn back to the company."

"But I had to do it. I've acted in straight plays when I was starting out, but never have I appeared in a real classic. It's a part that all the Italian comics used to play, bringing their own routines to it, but it hasn't been played in England for many years."

"The clincher came when Laurence Olivier told me I ought to do it. Well, why not? After four years in television, I need a change of pace, and this is certainly it."

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS reports of the impending death of "Gunsmoke," it turns out, were exaggerated. CBS Tuesday in a turn-about decided to put the 12-year-old Western back into its next season's schedule.

Then, in another unexpected move, it knocked "Gilligan's Island" off its list of programs to be renewed, decided against using an announced new comedy called "Doc" and thus opened up an early Monday evening hour for the venerable horse opera.

A network spokesman said that "Gunsmoke" won a new lease on life "after the surprise reaction of press and our affiliated stations" to canceling a fairly popular program. Actually, "Gunsmoke" had extremely healthy Nielsen ratings.

What apparently bothered the network was the fact that audience polls showed the program to be more attractive to older viewers than younger ones at a time when all three networks — and many sponsors — are preoccupied with reaching young families with growing children.

"Gilligan's Island," which in spite of critical scorn is in its third season, is popular with the young crowd. In the most recent Nielsen list it placed 44th, a few places higher than "Mission Impossible" and "The Wild, Wild West," both CBS shows which have been renewed.

The news about "Gilligan's Island" came as a distinct shock to Jim Backus, who plays a socialite millionaire in the broad comedy about a shipwrecked party.

Backus is in New York recuperating from a virus picked up while making NBC's adaptation of the musical, "Damn Yankees."

"It's hard to believe," said Backus. "And my wife just doesn't believe it. I guess we were all counting on at least one more season so we could have three years — 100 shows. That's important for the reruns and the residual payments, you know. Well, I guess nothing much stays in one place long these days."

CBS executives insisted several weeks ago that its fall schedule was firmly locked in place. But there are always shifts and changes made during the selling season.

HOPE SPECIALS

Bob Hope will expand the number of his comedy specials next season on NBC to nine. Six have been carried in past seasons.

The Smothers Couldn't Lose

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Either way, we couldn't lose," argues Tom Smothers, one half of the brother team that bumped "Bonanza" off the top of the Sunday night audience ratings.

The Smothers brother's reasoning: "If we had failed to beat 'Bonanza,' people wouldn't have blamed us, since they thought it was impossible. And if we did beat 'Bonanza,' people would say we were miracle workers."

Tom admitted that he is glad it turned out the latter way, rather than the former.

Of course the trend may be reversed, but CBS was enough encouraged to place the Smothers on its fall schedule.

"Yes, it looks pretty good for us," admitted Tom at his office; he is the comic of the team and, the most comic, a worrier.

"The ratings have been holding up and seem to be establishing a pattern. The better the movie on ABC, the better the chance we have of beating 'Bonanza' (on NBC). It appears that the viewers who want drama will watch either of the other networks, while those who want comedy and music will tune us in."

Why does he think the Smothers Brothers Show has succeeded after others have failed opposite "Bonanza"?

"It must be Dick and I," he replied without false modesty. "People must like us or they wouldn't turn on our show."

Yet apparently not enough liked the boys in their half-hour situation fantasy which flopped last season. Tom has an answer for that: He figures he and Dick were miscast in a show that didn't bring out their real personalities. Besides, he argues, the show developed a respectable rating but CBS pushed the panic button too early.

Tom contemplates an unlimited future for the brothers in the hour-long variety format.

"The best part of the show is how Dick has been able to prove himself," he said. "Straight men traditionally are underrated in this business. Dick has proven that he is much more than just a straight man. He has shown remarkable poise in introductions and has established himself as a singer. He's also great with comedy."

And how does Tom feel about the other half of the team?

"I get worried about Tom," said Tom. "Sometimes I think he plays too broad; I think he picked up some bad habits during the half-hour series. I'm trying to get him to play it more cool."

Other familiar names in NBC's fall schedule include Raymond Burr, formerly of "Perry Mason," who will star in "Ironside," a police story in which he plays a wheel chair-bound detective, and Eve Arden, once of "Our Miss Brooks," who will costar with Kaye Ballard in a comedy, "The Mothers-in-law."

The network's tentative weekly schedule indicates that programs to be dropped at this

season's end include "The Girl from U.N.C.L.E.," "Occasional Wife," "Hey Landlord," "Flipper," "Please Don't Eat the Daisies," "T.H.E. Cat," "Captain Nice," "Laredo." The network also plans to move the biweekly Telephone Hour and its news and public affairs shows back into prime evening time—at 10 p.m. Friday nights.
