

Meredith Quits Race, Won't Oppose Powell

NEW YORK (AP) — James H. Meredith, a civil rights maverick who drew the wrath of many Negro leaders for opposing Adam Clayton Powell, suddenly pulled out of the special congressional race today. He apparently gave into growing pressures.

In a surprise post-announcement, just as stunning as his entry into the race last Tuesday as the choice of Republican leaders, Meredith offered no explanation for his withdrawal. He declined to elaborate on a statement: "I have decided not to run in the 18th Congressional District."

Some Harlem sources said that Meredith, an independent Democrat, bowed to pressures from civil rights leaders. There also were reports that Powell, through intermediaries, had been appealing to Meredith to drop out.

The appeals were said to have been made on grounds of a need for Negro unity. Meredith reportedly was told that by accepting the Republican nomination to run against Powell, a Democrat, he would be the white man's candidate.

Sources said Meredith was told that he could make an even more dramatic gesture by giving up the support of the white people. This, it was said, would make him an even bigger hero in the Negro community.

One factor that reportedly influenced his decision to quit, it was understood, was a statement by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

King said in Hartford, Conn., Sunday night that Meredith's campaign against Powell in Harlem is ill-timed. King said that it would be much better for the House to seat Powell again because of what he termed "unique factors" which would cause Harlem Negroes to vote for him en masse.

Meredith, 33, admitted when he accepted the Republican offer to oppose Powell that he was laying himself open to "the fear and the scorn from fellow Negroes."

Not a single Negro political leader of either major party, or any Harlem community or national civil rights leader supported him.

Pedestrian Dies in Vernon

Town Girl Killed In Hartford Crash

Linda Caselli, 18, of 125 Bourget of Weymouth, was killed on Spruce St. and a 63-year-old man was killed in Massachusetts when they were struck by a car while walking in separate auto mishaps in Hartford and Vernon Saturday night.

Miss Caselli, who suffered severe head injuries, was pronounced dead at Hartford hospital, a hospital spokesman reported.

Hartford police, who are still investigating the mishap, quoted the driver of the car in which Miss Caselli was killed as saying his car was struck by as many as three cars. No cars were discovered at the scene, police said, but they are checking stories of several witnesses.

Police identified the driver as Dennis Methot, 22, of Hartford. His car was found facing south against a guard rail, police reported.

Investigation of the accident is expected to be concluded in a few days, they said. No arrests have been made.

In the Vernon mishap, the elderly man had gotten off a bus at a gas station and was crossing the highway when he was hit by a car driven by William Owens Jr., 22, of 13 Laurel St., Rockville, state police in Stafford Springs reported.

The accident occurred near the twin parkway gas stations. No charges were placed against Owens, police said.

In other state fatalities during the weekend, Robert E. Lee Jr., a 17-year-old Darton wrecker operator, was killed by a car last night as he was standing next to his wrecker on the Connecticut Turnpike in Stamford. Police said the driver of the car which hit Lee was Thomas McGuinness, 25, of Stamford.

The vendors protested that such sales are made in stores and were made the previous Sunday at an automobile show. Kelley's order stuck.

So, rather than deflate their helium-filled balloons and repack them, the vendors gave them to the youngsters.

Red Dust Bin Yields Pair Of Old Foes

MOSCOW (AP) — Two old men who once were among the Soviet Union's most powerful politicians — Nikita S. Khrushchev and Vyacheslav M. Molotov — emerged from obscurity Sunday to vote in a legislative election.

Consigned to what Khrushchev used to call "the dust bin of history," the two former adversaries have been living in the secluded retirement he Kremlin's post-Stalin leadership reserves for its political losers. Their public appearances are rare, and they are seldom mentioned in the Soviet press.

Khrushchev drew a friendly crowd of at least 1,000 at a polling station near his Moscow apartment. It was his biggest public turnout since he was ousted in 1964.

Thin, subdued and looking his 72 years, Khrushchev smiled back at his greeters, touched his

hair and looked at the camera. (See Page Twenty-Three)

Youngsters Safe After Plunge Into Icy Pond

TORRINGTON (AP)—A nine-year-old girl and her younger brother clung to broken ice in the Brass Mill dam for 15 minutes before being rescued by two firemen and a passerby.

All three rescuers also broke through the ice before seven Bush and her brother Jeffrey, 8, were pulled to safety Sunday. Seven and her brother were released after treatment for exposure and shock at Charlotte Hungerford Hospital.

Neighbors heard the youngsters' screams and crowded to the shore, and police were notified.

Two firemen, Lt. Joseph Battistoni and Pvt. Richard Oakley, laid some 100-foot ladders on the ice. Battistoni crawled out on his stomach, but the ice gave way. Oakley went through the ice as he tried to grab Battistoni.

Then the passerby, Oscar Landucci, waded from another bank through the ice that crumpled under him to reach the youngsters.

Solon Admits Personal Use Of Some Cash

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Thomas J. Dodd was described today as a major organizer of his own testimonial dinners — affairs which helped two years ago to put \$94,869.57 into his personal bank account.

The Connecticut Democrat acknowledged that deposit in one of a tangled series of stipulations filed as the Senate ethics committee opened its inquiry into his financial affairs.

And Dodd acknowledged that some of the \$170,000 from four testimonial affairs went to pay for home improvements, liquor, flowers, football tickets and other personal expenses as well as campaign costs.

He insisted, however, that virtually all the funds went to pay off political debts. And it could not be determined immediately from the 162 pages of stipulations and exhibits how much testimonial money Dodd spent for personal expenses.

A series of stipulations covering loan repayments with funds from a testimonial bank account showed that part of the money went to make payments against \$38,500 in loans taken to pay his income taxes.

The testimony about Dodd's own role in promoting the testimonials came from James P. Boyd Jr., former administrative assistant to the senator.

Boyd said at the time of a 1961 dinner — addressed by then Vice President Johnson — Dodd instructed him to give this answer to people who asked whether he would get money from the affair: "Tell them I

High Court Ruling

Speedy Trial Right Binding on States

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court ruled today that the right to a speedy trial, guaranteed by the sixth amendment to the U.S. Constitution, is binding on the states.

Chief Justice Earl Warren announced this for the court as it ruled North Carolina may not indefinitely postpone prosecution of a Duke University zoology professor on a trespass indictment.

"This court has never decided that issue before," the chief justice said from the bench.

"The right to a speedy trial is as basic as any right contained in the sixth amendment," he added.

With the decision the court took another historic step toward requiring Bill of Rights guarantees in all state legal proceedings.

Seven of the nine justices fully subscribed to the action. The two others agreed on the result in the case itself.

One, Justice M. Harlan, said in a brief separate opinion: "I am unable to subscribe to the constitutional premises upon which the result is based — quite evidently the viewpoint that the 14th Amendment 'incorporates' or 'absorbs' as such all or some of the specific provisions of the Bill of Rights. I do not believe that this is sound constitutional doctrine."

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Moriarty Mentioned In Dodd Stipulation

The stipulation announced today in the investigation of Sen. Thomas Dodd's finances includes data on testimonials held in Connecticut and elsewhere between 1961 and 1965.

Matthew Moriarty, Manchester businessman, is listed in the stipulation as having been treasurer for several fund raising efforts around the time of Sen. Dodd's 1964 campaign.

Moriarty has been subpoenaed to appear before the committee, which convened at 10 a.m. in the new senate office building.

The committee is trying to decide whether the funds raised during that period were for political or personal use.

Moriarty, according to the stipulation, was treasurer of a

"Dodd Testimonial Breakfast" in Hartford on Oct. 28, 1963, and of a 1965 victory dinner. He was also treasurer for two 1964 campaign drives, listed in the stipulation.

Moriarty had signed a number of invitations to both events and was empowered to draw on the receipts.

The stipulation states that the proceeds from the several affairs and from some campaign fund drives were deposited in an account at the Connecticut Bank and Trust Co. totaling \$232,309.97.

Of that amount, \$135,440.40 was spent for expenses related to the campaign; \$2,500 was transferred to a campaign committee; and \$94,369.57 was turned over to a joint account in the name of Grace M. Dodd and

Air Strikes Stepped Up

Ky Won't Participate In Guam War Huddle

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson's Vietnam strategy huddle in Guam next week — that emphasis will be placed on slowly increasing military pressure and intensifying attempts to win over the South Vietnamese people through economic and political development.

Ky attended Johnson's last two Pacific conclaves — at Honolulu in February 1966 and at Manila last October.

But sources indicated the Guam session, announced Saturday night, will probably involve only top Americans, including Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara, Ambassador to Saigon, Henry Cabot Lodge, and Gen. William Westmoreland, commander of U.S. troops in Vietnam.

Johnson is to leave late Saturday and arrive early Monday in Guam.

George Christian, White House press secretary, said the meetings are expected to last "a short time — a few days at the most."

DeGaulle Prestige Mauled at the Polls

PARIS (AP) — French voters mauled the prestige of President Charles de Gaulle's government badly Sunday and left his forces with a majority of only one to three votes in the National Assembly. Even that narrow margin was in doubt.

With two of the 487 Assembly seats still undecided, the ministry of interior reported candidates pledged to De Gaulle had won 244 seats, or a majority of at least one in the full Assembly.

Other checks of the candidates' political labels indicated the Gaullists had won only 243 seats, while the combined opposition had 241 or 242. French political experts varied in their assessment of the situation.

The election for one seat in Tahiti will be held next Sunday. Another seat is being held for French Somaliland in case that African territory decides in a referendum next Sunday to remain with France rather than choosing independence.

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Big Debate, Losses in Viet Sure to Alter Draft Policy

WASHINGTON (AP) — A national debate on the military draft, intensified by the steadily growing casualty rate in Vietnam, is certain to produce major changes in the Selective Service System.

The question is: "What is the fairest method of choosing young men for duty in a jungle war that already has killed more than 7,900 Americans?"

The catalyst for converting argument into action is the June 30 expiration date for basic sections of the Selective Service Act, enacted 19 years ago when the United States was involved in only a cold war.

In the past week, two study commissions have suggested alterations of the draft; President Johnson has announced that he'll make some changes of his

own, and members of Congress have issued a stream of statements on the issue.

What would the changes mean to draft-age men? When would they take effect?

Interview with officials, and a comparison of the various recommendations, produced these consensus answers:

Question: Why do many Americans, including President Johnson, argue that the draft law should be changed?
Answer: They believe that aspects of the present law are unfair.

A basic complaint is that there is no uniform national standard to determine who will be drafted.

Another is that the present system creates too much uncertainty in the lives of young men; they can be called up to

age 26, when they might be well into a career.

But most of the criticism has been aimed at the means by which some men avoid military duty.

Students have been deferred first for college, and then for graduate school, until they reach 26 and are no longer subject to the draft. Members of National Guard and Reserve units have escaped active duty because no such units have been called for the Vietnam war.

Changes in the draft system would be designed to assure that as President Johnson put it, "In this land of equals, men are selected as equals to service."

Q. What has Johnson recommended?
A. He has called for a study of the draft system.

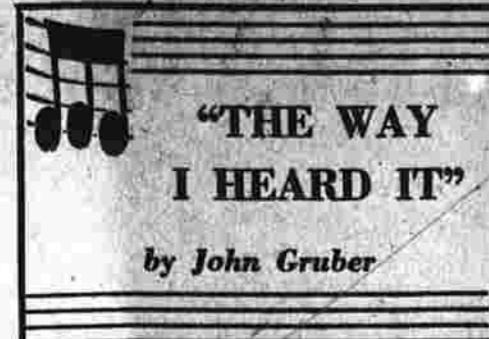

Getting back to our discussion of composers, you'll recall that I mentioned Chopin, a pianist in the last article...

Romanticism is now in bad repute, and in worst repute with those too young ever to have been exposed to much of its music. Primarily, it stemmed, in many respects, from the piano which had developed practically into the instrument we know today and had quite supplanted the harpsichord.

Practically all the romantic composers were Chopin, some virtuosi like Liszt and Clara Schumann, and others of lesser technical ability but well grounded in the instrument if not outstanding performers.

Romanticism is generally conceded to have begun with Franz Joseph Haydn, who was a brilliant pianist, and an operatic composer of note. His opera was still mounted in Germany, but here we encountered only the overtures to three of them: 'Fidelio', 'Barrymore' and 'Oberon'.

leader. Judging a performance of these requires a knowledge of the language in which they are sung, usually German. Unfortunately, few in the audience have this facility, and in fact it was common about 20 years back to find that the 'solist' didn't know the language either.

They had been 'sponsored' to pronounce the words with some sort of approximate accent, but lacking any knowledge of the meaning of the words they lacked understanding and conviction in performance.

The advent of the piano, with its excellence as an accompanying instrument, also gave rise to a vast number of great songs. Here we must mention Schubert who invented what is today called the 'Lied', which simply means 'song' in German.

It was a short stop from songs which actually told a story by means of words, to instrumental music which tried to tell stories without words. Mendelssohn, of course, wrote a whole lot of pieces which he called 'Songs without Words', and Liszt came up with the idea of the 'symphonic poem'.

This is the age of science, says the public, and music should be approached scientifically along with everything else. The approach to musical technique has indeed been rendered into much more scientific terms in the baroque era or with the advent of the piano.

concerned with emotional content and story-telling or picture-painting. Every one of the composers, naturally German, wrote symphonies, but the symphonic form became merely a mold into which the story was poured, rather than a form that evolved from the musical content.

Eventually, the symphonic form proved too restricting in the hands of composers, and Liszt invented the 'symphonic poem' whose form was no longer dictated at all, and which reached its culmination under Richard Strauss of whom I shall also speak later.

Hardly any practicing pianist of the present day is at least conversant with the piano as a piece of music. It is absolutely essential to recognize that the piano is a technique concentrates on the piano as a percussive instrument, and that the piano is a drum, for rhythmic rather than melodic effects.

Continued 'poking' at the keyboard as demanded by modern composers, has led to a considerable loss of touch and control. The piano has become a mere mechanical device, and the pianist is reduced to a mere technician.

But technique is not art, however technical may be the age in which we live. The performer, whether pianist, violinist, vocalist or conductor, who is not, and does not have a thorough knowledge of history to his education cannot be a true artist.

Rusk Reports North Viet General Leading South Reds

WASHINGTON (AP) — A four-star North Vietnamese general is in South Vietnam giving both political and military aid to the Communist forces, says Secretary of State Dean Rusk.

Rusk said he had not been able to confirm the shift through official sources, although "we would be interested if Mr. Phat or anybody else comes into the Liberation Front and moves the front toward Phat."

Washington officials picture the NLF as a Hanoi instrument operating in the South. They said a combination of political and military direction, of the sort Thanh reportedly provides, is particularly important in the Red campaign in the South.

Thanh is reported to have been in North Vietnam in 1964, the year the first North Vietnamese army crossed the 17th parallel. Intelligence indicating his presence in South Vietnam was said to come from Communist documents and prisoners. A film purporting to show him in the South is said to have been headed by Thanh.

For many years, until her death, she refused in-person interviews or photographs, and enjoyed listening to opera on the radio.

'Golden Age' Opera Singer Dies in State

RIDGEFIELD (AP) — It was after the turn of the century — during the golden age of opera — and the young soprano stepped on to the stage of the Metropolitan.

The combination of voice and beauty was overpowering to the audience.

Events In Capital

Special Briefing

WASHINGTON (AP) — A special news briefing was held Monday only by newsmen from Communist nations of Eastern Europe who have been invited by Secretary of State Dean Rusk.

Such "background" sessions are a common feature of news coverage in Washington. The meeting Friday was the first background session held by a secretary of state exclusively for Washington-based reporters from Communist nations.

The newsmen, about a dozen in all, represented the Soviet Union, Romania, Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia, Hungary and Poland. The subject matter included the Vietnam war.

Rusk's visitors said afterward they were highly satisfied with the conference and complimented Rusk for his patience and openness in providing them with the American position on various issues.

Urges Old Age Support

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson is urging support of his proposal to liberalize Social Security age benefits so that "14 million citizens will be lifted out of poverty in 1968."

The President has proposed a 20 per cent over-all increase in the payments to provide at least \$100 per couple for retired persons in retirement and \$100 for single persons with at least 25 years of covered work.

In a filmed talk Sunday before AFL-CIO rallies in several cities, Johnson announced that five million elderly persons in the United States live in poverty. More than two million are on welfare, he said.

Nearly 40 per cent of the elderly have total assets of less than \$1,000, Johnson said.

"I believe these conditions are intolerable and unnecessary," he said.

Corps Not Spying

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Peace Corps has never done any spying for the Central Intelligence Agency or anyone else, the director of the Peace Corps today said.

Former Peace Corpsmen, he said, are barred from joining any U.S. intelligence agency until they have been out of the Peace Corps at least five years.

And if a Peace Corpsman is drafted, he may not be assigned to military intelligence, he said.

"As far as I know," Vaughn said, "the Peace Corps is the only federal agency of connection from the beginning has taken the position that there will be no involvement of any kind with intelligence agencies."

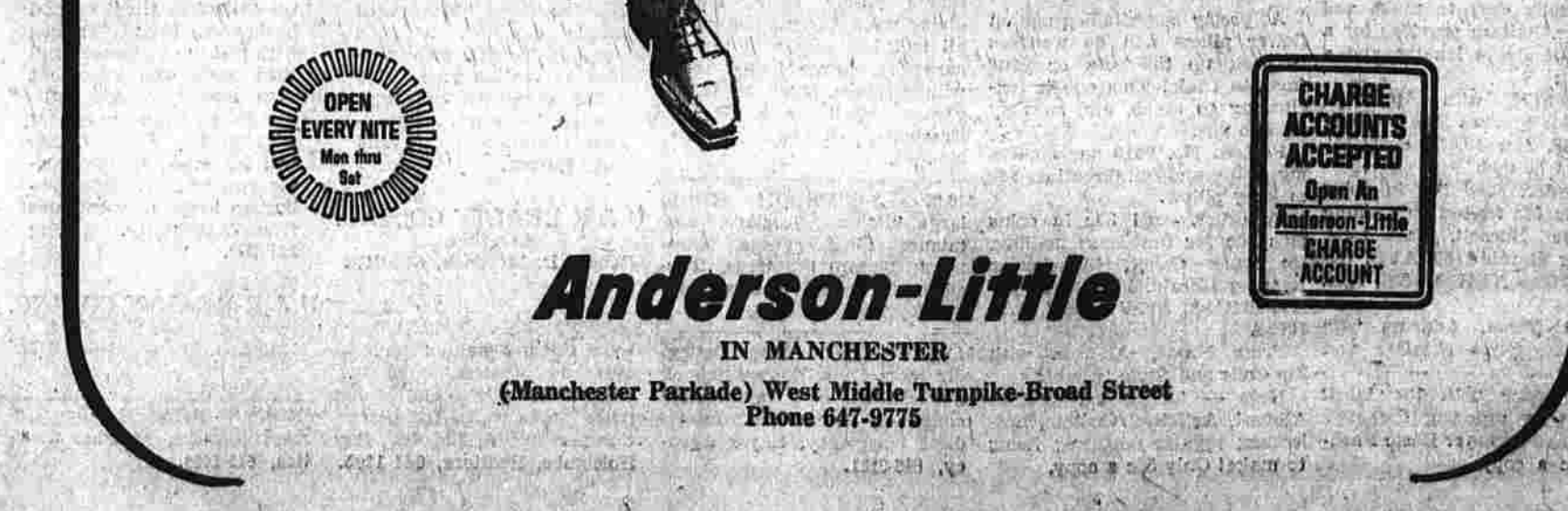
