### About Town TPC Preliminary Approval Given to Redwood Farms

The Town Planning Commission last night gave preliminary approval for a 107-lot subdivision, Redwood Farms, off Hillside Rd. and approved a zoning change from Rural Residence to Industrial Zone on an eight-acre town-owned parcel at Lane and Olcott St.

### Sheinwold on Bridge

MATHEMATICS PROFESSOR HELPS OFFICER COUNT

BY ALFRED SHEINWOLD

If you teach mathematics, your job is to make it easy for other people to count. Ivar Skagold, professor of mathematics at Northwestern University sometimes does his job at the bridge table, but somehow his opponents never thank him for the lesson.

Opening lead—one of clubs. Professor Skagold led the nine of clubs from the West hand, and South won with the queen. Declarer led the jack of hearts, leading a finesse to the king, and East returned the king of spades to declarer's king.

Skagold could easily tell that West had tricks to burn if he held both the queen and jack of diamonds. The only hope was that East held a diamond ten, and it was up to West to "protect" his partner's high diamonds. Skagold decided to lead South king that there were four diamonds in the West hand.

### Average State Base Salary Of Teachers Nears \$5,800

An average starting salary for teachers in the state will be \$5,800 next fall, according to a study by Kenneth Melley, field representative for the Connecticut Education Association. Melley, who has worked closely with the Vernon Education Association in its salary dispute with the Vernon Board of Education, said state teachers had originally expected a figure closer to \$5,600 for starting teachers.

"The lack of teachers for the growing needs throughout the state changed the picture," he said.

"For the first time in a long time," he said, teachers are getting what they are worth and deserve.

He cited starting salaries for teachers in Hartford and West Hartford at \$6,000. The real "Gold Coast" in the state is the Long Island coastal region near New York City, he said. Starting pay there reaches \$6,400, he said.

He did say the state has "Appalachian" regions where teacher pay is very low even for Connecticut. But he would not identify them.

The VEA request for \$5,800 as a 1.84 ratio is "very reasonable," Melley said. But he declined to say whether local teachers would get it.

The mediation session date for the school board and the VEA is March 28 in Hartford, according to Kenneth Lundy of the State Department of Education.

Contract's been set. Mediation is not binding on either party. Lundy pointed out recently that 18 of 24 cases Lundy has seen have resulted in contracts.

A contract for Vernon appears near. Peter Humphrey, chairman of the personnel policies committee of the school board, said recently a contract could come before mediation.

### Ky Proves He's His Own Master

Recent events in Saigon have constituted reassuring rebuttal to all those cynics who have maintained that there is no independent, self-respecting political regime in South Vietnam, but merely a puppet Ky who is the creature, creature and puppet of the Johnson administration at Washington.

Recent happenings in the streets of Saigon have provided the best possible proof that such evaluations of the Ky regime and of Washington's relationship to it have to be far from the mark.

In the streets of Saigon, operating on obvious instruction from the Ky regime, there have recently been a number of well arranged and well disciplined public demonstrations, in which students have prepared and publicly burned effigies of Senator J. William Fulbright, Senator Robert Kennedy, and President Charles de Gaulle.

Can one imagine for an instant that if President Johnson had any real influence with or control over the Ky regime in Saigon, he would ever let such fires be lit?

### Creators?

In the course of a lifelong association study of files-a Rockefeller University geneticist, Dr. Theodosius Dobzhansky, now thinks he has observed the beginning of the arrival on this earth of a new species.

The possible arrival of a new kind of fly is not, in itself, any matter for rejoicing. What is scientifically exciting is the possibility that the good professor, by being able to watch the creation of a new species take place, may be able to discover just what process is involved, and what agents may be at work in order to set the process in motion.

If he can discover how and why it happens, and what particular kind of manipulation, chance, accident, or stimulation it takes, then, some day, he might be able to set out on his own to create a new species.

This is one more indication, then, that mankind is making rather steady scientific progress toward the point where it may be able to accomplish what will amount to the creation of life in such forms as we choose to design. Should we ever find ourselves with such a power, would we ever be able to agree how to employ it? Are, we, in the clutch, really capable of designing something different from what we ourselves already are? Could we agree on the shape and content of the ideal human being? Or even that of the ideal pet-companion to the human being?

And if we ever could agree on what we would do with such suddenly instant creative power, then, would we also our long failure to make at least some token progress toward the same ideal by slower, harder work during all the centuries we have held the franchise on our earth?

After months of kicking the Connecticut Republican party has a new chairman. Howard E. Hausman, a Phi Beta Kappa from Yale, has taken over command of the remains left by a Searle Pinney. Mr. Hausman pledges an end to factionalism. He was elected with support from both conservative and liberal members of the committee. Despite this his task will not be easy.

Under the Pinney regime the GOP reached a point from which it would seem there is no place to go but up. Sometimes it seemed that the GOP was suffering from a death wish. It departed from its conservative foundation and southeast coast. It was somewhat nearer its own size and power.

It is difficult to see what, at such a stage, reassessment could accomplish. For, although it seems logical to believe that President Johnson's current decision to escalate and degrade in Vietnam has been based, in some degree, on an estimate that China is momentarily powerless and that China and Russia are split apart, there is no reason to believe that a change in this situation would afford President Johnson much new choice. Having gone in, deeper, as though compelled to do so by the rigidity of his cause, the President can hardly be expected to discover that his moral imperatives are suddenly any less binding than before they may in fact be a world instead of a jungle, or full instead of limited, weaponry.

The dire possibilities that lie ahead are the risks inherent whenever any great nation embarks upon a course of no return. As it closes its own options, it also, by the same act, narrows the options of its adversaries. The more it becomes impossible for us to draw back, the less possible it becomes for them to stay out. The greater the proportion of the victory we intend to seek, the greater the compulsion upon Russia and China to deny it to us. The more obviously we seek to exploit the split between Russia and China, the greater the danger we will force them to bear.

These are the dark side possibilities. There is, of course, the brighter side, which is what the White House sees. We have the thing almost within our grasp; given not too much more time we can squeeze it to our will; no one will dare interfere; if we make this one, we shall have taught the world a lesson that may last for a thousand years.

Chairman Hausman has only one thing going for him. The GOP is now so weak that the rule of the rule has no attraction. This might encourage the factious to forget their squabbles and unite behind a leadership which expresses a philosophy more in keeping with the GOP tradition. Chairman Hausman is intelligent and energetic. If the interest of candid two party effort in Connecticut be served, he serves the support of all Republicans. The GOP cannot stand five more years like the last five.—STAFFORD ADVOCATE

### Connecticut Yankee

It was not until 2:30 p.m., Wednesday, March 8, that all the judicial, constitutional and political changes in the Connecticut order of things came fully home to this observer.

At that hour, in the hall of the Connecticut House of Representatives, the Republican majority in that House completed a maneuver which, as nothing else could possibly do, symbolized the reversal which has taken place.

The Republicans succeeded in hooking a suspension of the rule. There were generations of Connecticut politics in which being able to block a suspension of the rules in the House was the highest degree of power the Democrats could hope for.

It is the smallest amount of power the Republicans have ever had in the House. Small and pitiful an instrument as it is, it remains a paragon of the generations of Republican mastery in the House, and the Democrats could hope for an inevitable instinct to try it out, and see if it works.

And this is the day that West Hartford, Conn., Republican Leader Nicholas Lange, of New Hartford, had decided to try out the last remaining weapon in the Republican arsenal. The measure which happened to get in the line of fire, because the Democrats were trying to get it passed immediately that day under suspension of the rules, was to accomplish the aiderman's redistricting of New Haven in advance of a federal court deadline of March 15.

In order to suspend the rules, a two-thirds vote is required. The elected membership of the 1967 House includes 117 Democrats, 40 Republicans, a condition likely to make every contested suspension motion a very close affair, with the outcome dependent on the attendance of the moment.

Once Minority Leader Lange had thrown down the gauntlet, claiming the principles of orderly government would be defended by the day members under suspension of the rules, and the Democrats had responded with protests against the inhumanity of such delay for the good people of New Haven, the situation resolved itself into one of marshaling and counting votes.

By the time it came down, if two worthy legislators will forgive playfulness with their names, the roll call was taken, and had come out 102 votes to suspend the rules, 96 against, which meant that, lacking a two-thirds vote, the Democratic motion had lost.

Before the vote was tallied and so ruled, Rep. Kenneth Rock, Democrat of Bristol, in former Speaker Testa's stead, his vote had not recorded on the electronic tally board. If this had been proved so, normal procedure would have been for the Speaker to instruct the House Clerk to include Rock's declared vote in the final tally. In this case, however, Speaker Testa ruled the whole vote invalid, and ordered a second roll call. Meanwhile, there was some report that the vote which had not been tallied was that of Kenneth Rock, the Bristol Democrat, that of Rep. Isabel Rock, the Wilton Republican, who happens to sit beside him.

In any case, when the second roll call, which might have proved that the House had any vote, strayed out of the chamber, was 102 to 97, which meant that the Republicans, not the Democrats, gained one vote by the maneuver of having the tally taken a second time.

It was, of course, mainly a parliamentary exercise, in which the Republicans were finding out, for the first time in their history, how wonderful it feels to be able to muster as much as one-third of a vote in the House.

Atty. Paul B. Groobert of Manchester is clerk of the State House of Representatives, one of the two top honors which the House can bestow on a non-member. The other is legislative commissioner.

Groobert, a Democrat, was elected unanimously and without opposition on Jan. 4, at the opening of the 1967 State Legislature. He succeeded John Gerardo of Hartford, clerk in the 1963 and 1965 sessions, and defeated Republican candidate for the state post of lieutenant governor.

As clerk of the House, Groobert gets paid \$8,500 for the biennium and has the services of Michael R. Serl, Republican of Danbury, as assistant clerk, and Mrs. Lucille M. Dow as permanent assistant and head of a permanent office staff.

It is the duty of the clerk to keep adequate records of the House proceedings, and to prepare bills, resolutions and other instruments presented for action; to keep the House calendar, including a daily calendar, including accurate records of all transactions between the House and Senate; to keep a record available to House members of actions to date on all resolutions and bills; and to sign bills upon engrossment.

In addition, he directs a staff of appointed document messengers, coat room attendants, a loud speaker operator, a sergeant-at-arms, House supply clerk and a House mail clerk.

They serve the needs of the House members, the general public, messenger service; distribution of mail, Bulletins, Journals and writing materials; and all other needs as may arise.

Groobert was a state representative from the 19th District in 1963 and 1965 State Assemblies. He was a delegate to the 1965 Constitutional Convention.

In November, running for the House from Assembly District 19, he was defeated by 61 votes, losing to Republican Robert Zemitsky.

Groobert, a Meriden native, is a 1942 graduate of Bacon Academy, Colchester, and a graduate of the University of Connecticut; and a 1952 graduate of the Columbia (N.Y.) Law School.

He moved to Manchester from Colchester in 1958 but has practiced law locally since 1952. He resides at 134 Ludlow Rd. with his wife, the former Beverly Nieber of Colchester, and twin Daniel and Hillary.

The Observance of Lent

The spirit of Lent has been part of our religious tradition since Old Testament times. records showed the national committee never had done so much for candidates in an off-year as in 1966.

That was just too much for Congressman Eugene Wyman of California, who has provided important national leadership in urging rebuilding of the national committee staff. In all conscience, said Wyman, he had to say that the national committee materially helped Gov. Edmund G. (Pat) Brown's successful campaign for re-election in 1966 but ignored his losing campaign in 1966.

For the future, Wyman went on, the national committee should establish a master strategic plan and get on with it now. Specifically, he suggested that the committee should confront disaffected college students. More important, he added, was a trip west by President Johnson.

Next on the firing line was outspoken, tough David Carley of Wisconsin, who, like Wyman, is an ally of the vice president. Carley grimly told the group that President Johnson, who carried Wisconsin by 400,000 votes in 1964, would lose it by 400,000 votes if the election were held today.

The big question was this, as posed by Dave Carley: Does Lyndon Johnson really want an active national campaign? Carley really was asking whether the President has managed to bring to his aid his ancient feud with the national committee, which he long regarded as an instrument of his Eastern liberal enemies inside the party.

Now more and more committee members rose to give testimony. Mary Helen Byck of Kentucky recalled that Lawrence F. O'Brien, now postmaster general and then a White House aide, came to Kentucky in 1960 and 1962 to help out, in sharp contrast to 1966 non-activity. Mary Walker of South Dakota added that her state party had learned to expect nothing from national headquarters.

Most biting of all was the highly attractive Fay Broderick of Maine. Commenting on Wyman's plea for the President to come to California, Mrs. Broderick was critical of his 1966 "non-political" trip to Maine. He spent the day "toting around" Republican Sen. Margaret Chase Smith, she complained, and scarcely had a moment for Democrats.

Nor did the unusual attention given them by the President and vice president or the obvious spirit of activity at national headquarters wipe away the concern expressed in the workshops. There was for some a particularly ominous tone in a phrase of Humphrey's otherwise reassuring pep talk to "private luncheon."

"If the war ends this year," said the vice president speaking off the cuff, "the President won't need you or me or the Democrats next year. If it doesn't end, President Johnson will need every one of us." (See Page Seven)

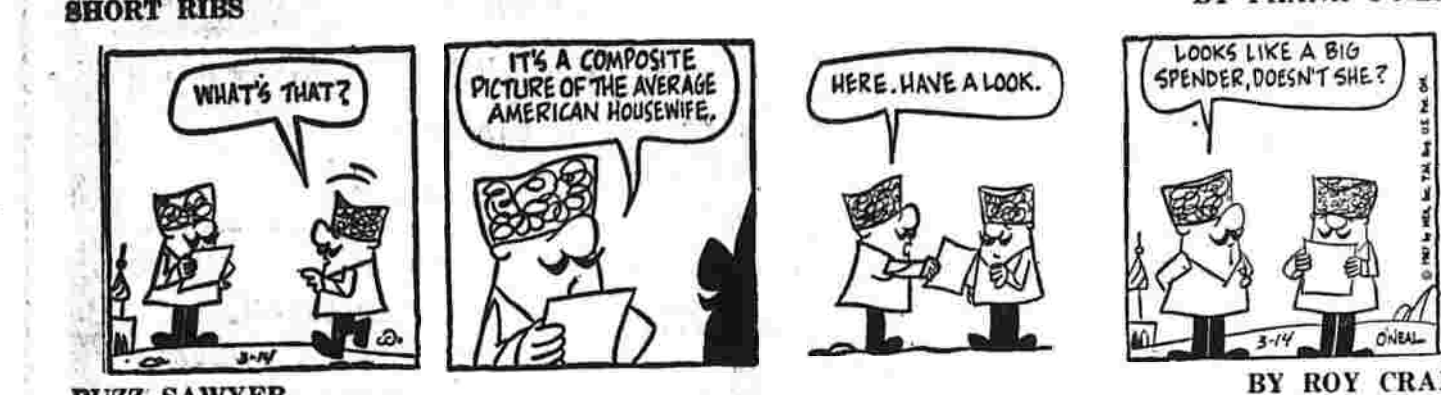

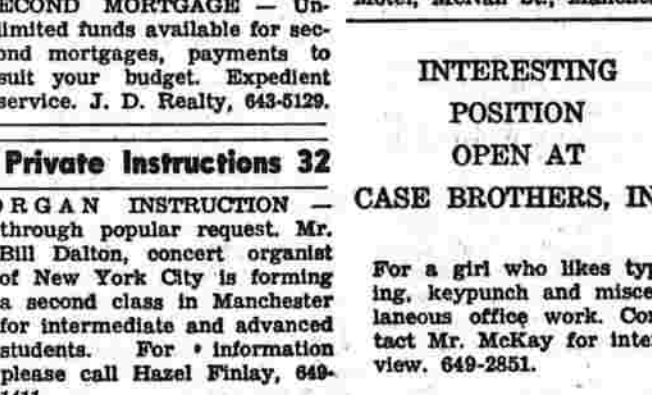

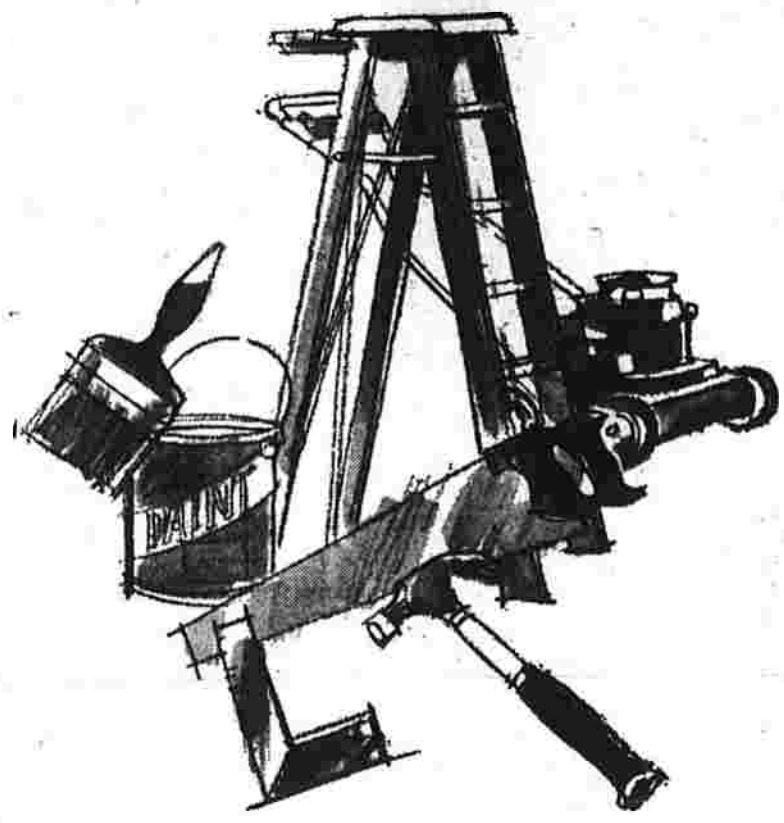
