



#### A Course Beyond Alteration It is now reported at the United Nalions-in diplomatic gossip, that is that Soviet Russia and Communist

China are currently engaged in direct discussions with one another on the subject of aid to North Vietnam. This is supposed to be in response to recent North Vietnamese pleas made both to Moscow and Peiping - pleas that the two Communist giants suspend their own monstrous feuding for the precise and limited purpose of seeing to it that North Vietnam isn't wiped off the map by the United States.

The same United Nations gossip which reports that such meeting is in process somewhere also offers, for what gossip is worth, the opinion that Soviet Russian and other western Communist countries which had been trying to pressure North Vietnam toward a willingness to negotiate have now concluded that the United States rejected what it might have interpreted as a concessionary gesture by North Vietnam, and have, therefore concluded as well that what now lies ahead in Vietnam is prolonged struggle with progressively wid-

Such diplomatic gossip, being gossip, is not very frightening, and one can guess that it is being shed and discardvery easily at the White House.

The White House, with its almost daily discovery of some new means of stepping up its military pressure on North Vietnam, with its increasing revelation of its own peace of mind it considering its Vietnam policies now beyond debate, with its increasing frankness, as in the final open acknowledgment of the extent to which we are using Thailand as a great American base against North Vietnam, is not going to be halted or slowed by what may be wishful-thinking gossip among United Nations diplomats.

Even the White House will allow itself at least a brief moment of shock and pause, however, if something a little more tangible should happen. Should the great recent turmoil inside China suddenly resolve itself in a moderate outcome which would make it possible for Russia and China suddenly to heal their schism-then the White House would have to stop and assess, once more, its chance of encountering, in and over the swamps and jungles of Southeast Asia, foes somewhat nearer its own size and power.

It is difficult to see what, at such a stage, reassessment could accomplish.

For, although it seems logical to believe that President Johnson's current decision to escalate and escalate in Vietnam has been based, in some degree, on an estimate that China is momentarily powerless and that China and Russia are split apart, there is no reason to believe that a change in this situation would afford President Johnson much new choice. Having gone, in deeper, as though compelled to do so by the rightness of his cause, the President can hardly be expected to discover that his moral imperatives are suddenly any the less binding just because they may involve a world instead of a jungle, or full, instead of limited, weaponry.

The dire possibilities that lie ahead are the risks inherent whenever any great nation embarks upon a course of no return. As it closes its own options, it also, by the same act, narrows the options of its adversaries. The more it becomes impossible for us to draw back, the less possible it becomes for them to stay out. The greater the proportion of the victory we intend to seek, the greater the compulsion upon Russia and China to dany it to us. The more obviously we seek to exploit the split bethe danger we will force them to heal

There is, of course, the brighter side, We have the thing almost within our grasp; given not too much more time we can squeeze it to our will; no one will dare interfere; if we make this one, we shall have taught the world a lesson hat may last for a thousand years.

William Fulbright, Senator Robert Kennedy, and President Charles de Gaulle.

In the course of a lifelong association study of flies-a study he undertakes in order to find out more about human beings-a Rockefeller University geneticist, Dr. Theodosius Dobzhansky, now thinks he has observed the beginning of the arrival on this earth of a new spe-

The possible arrival of a new kind of fly is not, in itself, any matter for

What is scientifically exciting is the possibility that the good professor, by being able to watch this creation of a new species take place, may be able to discover just what process is involved, and what agents may be at work in order to set the process in motion.

If he can discover how and why it happens, and what particular kind of manipulation, chance, accident, or stimulation it takes, then, some day, he might be able to set out on his own to create a new species. This is one more indication, then,

that mankind is making rather steady scientific progress toward the point where it may be able to accomplish what will amount to the creation of life in such forms as we choose to design. Should we ever find ourselves with such a power, would we ever be able to agree how to employ it? Are, we, in the clutch, really capable of designing something different from what we ourselves already are? Could we agree on the shape and content of the ideal human being? Or even that of the ideal servant to the human being? Or the ideal pet-companion to the human

And if we ever could agree on what we would do with such suddenly instant creative power, how, then, would we alibi our long failure to make at least some token process toward the same ideal by slower, harder work during all the centuries we have held the franchise on our earth?


#### Chairman Hausman

Thus in the Legislature it is the Republican leadership, which is advocating fiscal responsibil ity, big spending and more taxes, while Governor Dempacy assumes the posttion of balanced progress within the ability of the state to pay. Until these images change Chairman Hausman has task which no one can envy.

It is not a task which is impossible. Connecticut is still the "land of steady abits." It is so wealthy that great progress can be made in governmental service without destructive taxation. The so-called big city vote is not as irresponsible as demagogues would suggest. It many big cities all across the country there has been a swing from irresponsibility and the GOP has generally gained. This swing can be exploited by good GOP leadership in Con-

Chairman Hausman has only one thing going for him. The GOP is now so weak that the rule of its ruin has no attraction.
