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Turcotte in Control, Two Doctors Testify

Two Hartford psychiatrists testifying as state witnesses in the trial of Dr. Robert Turcotte today told the jury that he was in control of his actions at the time of the shooting and that he was not psychotic or mentally ill at that time.

Dr. Bancroft testified: "I believe Richard Turcotte was in a state of great anger, frustration and disorientation at the time of the shooting but that he was not psychotic or mentally ill and that he was able to control his impulses at that time."

The testimony from the two defense psychiatrists, which Dr. Dougherty and Bancroft disagreed, contended that Turcotte was laboring under an emotional disturbance at the time of the shooting but he was not in control of his actions when he shot his wife.

Turcotte, 29, is accused of shooting her three times with a .310 shotgun in her parents' home at 11 Orchard St. Turcotte's counsel, Atty. Gen. J. P. Fiepler, and Asst. State's Atty. Edward J. Daily, both expected to present their closing arguments tomorrow to the jury of seven women and five men.

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Community College Set in Waterbury

The commission for higher education today announced a plan for a regional community college in Waterbury.

The commission had recommended colleges in the Hartford and New Haven areas, but had put off a decision until a decision was made on whether to establish a community college in Waterbury.

The situation, said Donald H. McCann, commission chairman, was that Waterbury already had a branch of the University of Connecticut and a technical school.

Educational interests and newspapers in Waterbury have been calling for a community college, saying there was an immediate need for one in the area.

McCann was at the governor's news conference this morning and plans were announced for "a unique higher education center in the Central Naugatuck Valley including a regional community college which would open this fall."

The college would have temporary headquarters in the John F. Kennedy High School.

The higher education center was proposed as a prototype for other areas in the state.

The center would operate all existing higher education operations in the area. It would combine services and administrative functions in one building.

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Vernon Humphry Pledges To Cut Tax Rate

A lower tax rate was pledged today by Peter Humphry, Democratic candidate for mayor in the April 4 election.

"I want two different and productive years of consolidation to be behind us," Humphry said. "One government must assume duties of three, act on delayed programs and face the prospect of educational needs, he said.

"But now 'we must take a long step and reduce taxes,' he said.

The larger Grand List, state aid and savings for re-election, plus debt reduction by the present Democratic government of Rockville lower taxes possible, Humphry said.

"I have studied the present and future tax picture in depth and am confident in my ability to fulfill this pledge," Humphry said.

In this he is making his business opponent, Jack Grant who has said, "We are not going to reduce taxes in my administration."

"To assure the tax reduction, Humphry asked for all the Democrats to be seated on the Board of Representatives in the April election. He asked the "political haggling" in the early months of consolidation with the Thomas G. Carruthers, Republican, as town chairman and board member.

The Grand List has gone up \$12 million to \$80 million in the last two years. New commercial and industrial growth will compensate for educational and government cost rises, Humphry said.

Humphry's pledge included such "contingencies" as the teacher salary dispute now in progress and the chance the completed contract could be much higher than the figure he has recommended the town plan for.

His suggested budget figure is \$5,000 starting. The teachers are asking for \$6,800. March 29 in Hartford.

South Windsor Education Budget Goes to Council

The board of education has submitted a total budget request for the 1967-68 school year of \$3,204,900 to the town council.

The total represents an increase of \$97,888 over last year's budget of \$2,417,450 that included some \$10,000 in net out-

Board of education expenses, totaling \$3,830 in the request, show an increase of \$995 over last year's figure of \$2,835. This provides for the salary of \$50,277 from the original request of \$50,287.

Estimated receipts during the coming year are at \$1,851,065, and net income of \$75,768 from last year's figures of \$78,218.

The total amount to be raised by taxes, if the proposed budget is accepted by the council, is \$2,500,875.

It was noted in the letter of transmittal from Charles Warner, superintendent of schools, that all items relating to salaries of certified personnel, with the exception of teaching, superintendent and assistant superintendent, are related to the teachers' association.

The negotiations between the teachers and the board on next year's salary agreement will be presently under mediation by the State Board of Education.

One budget category includes salaries of the superintendent, assistant superintendent, business manager, secretaries, emmentation costs, chief maintenance man, contracted services, expenses of the board and superintendent's office.

Superintendent's Salary

A net increase of \$1,000 is shown for the salary of superintendent who is directly responsible to the school board for the general control of the system.

The board allocation for the current year was \$18,700, with the total request for the 1967-68 school year being \$18,700.

The increase for the assistant superintendent is set at \$1,700 over last year's allocation of \$13,800.

Responsibility for curriculum development, recruitment of teachers and supervision are noted under the post. The assistant superintendent also assists the superintendent on the present allocation of \$29,200.

Audio visual equipment, an increase of \$13,229 is shown over last year's allocation of \$29,210 for the coming year.

This position co-ordinates purchasing, transportation, accounting, federal grants and as an assistant to the superintendent and assistant superintendent.

A total increase of \$3,244 for secretaries over the allocation made last year of \$21,170 includes the staff of five members, one each for the superintendent and assistant superintendent, bookkeeper and two clerks.

The total request for the coming year in this category is \$24,414.

Emmementation Cost

The cost of enumeration, as required by law, is requested in the amount of \$1,000 an increase of \$100 over last year's figure.

State Dept. Checks Nothing Sinister Seen At Antarctic Stations

WASHINGTON (AP) - which will be given to the treaty members and made public.

The team members are Frank the Soviet Union and six other nations apparently found nothing sinister about the stations.

The inspectors "do not seem to have turned up anything unusual," said the State Department official. "The stations are in good shape and the equipment is in good condition."

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A U.S. group inspected one before, in 1964, and reported no activity for other than peaceful purposes.

State Department officials said the 1967 inspection team of five experts sailed from Wellington, New Zealand, on Jan. 29 aboard the U.S. Coast Guard icebreaker "Eastwind". They flew around Antarctica by plane and returned aboard the "Eastwind" to Punta Arenas, Chile, March 5.

They inspected France's research station at Dumont D'Urville, Australia's Wilkes and Mawson Stations, Japan's Showa Station, South Africa's Sars, Britain's Signy, Argentina's Orcadas and the Soviet's Molodetnaya stations.

They also checked a Danish ship which was unloading at Wilkes.

The U.S. group visited back with a preliminary clean bill on all the bases they reached. Some of the members are still on their way back to the United States. They will write a full report.

School board chairman Waddell had this comment: "One thing I'm certain of—we garden rooms rather than two do need a school." But he said in the proposed 12-classroom school.

In doing this, the school board adopted a suggestion made by one of its members Harold Smith, at a meeting with the architects and the public building commission (PBC) last year. PBC chairman Douglas Cheney attended the meeting to find out for the architect what educational programs the school is being planned to encompass both initially and in the future.

Flexibility Asked

The school board and the superintendent ask that the school be designed for flexibility, so that future educational innovations will not be limited because of the standard design. This means, they said, the installation of either movable partitions between classrooms or walls between rooms which could be knocked down.

Ligouri said from the May 1966 educational specifications adopted by the board:

"The school should be designed to be adaptable to almost any kind of educational program. It should be as efficient a school as possible—each most of its space able to be used during most of the school day and during most of the calendar year. This space should be rearrange-able by means of movable and operable walls to meet changes in the existing program or to accommodate the school to future programs involving classes of varying sizes.

"This kind of adaptability necessitates a school building with the smallest possible number of permanent interior walls, a building that could be arranged if the educational program demands a different kind of space.

"These educational aims suggest a building with as few load-

Viet Diplomatic Switch Boosts Military 'Voice'

SAIGON (AP)—Replacement of the top men in the U.S. Embassy in Saigon means that the U.S. military is going to have a commanding voice in the all-important pacification program to bring the South Vietnamese people under control of the Saigon government, many American in Saigon believe.

Though reports from Washington say the new embassy team is to step up the pacification program, senior American officials here don't expect major changes in the program itself. Outgoing Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge told newsmen today he doesn't believe Washington is unhappy at the progress of civilian programs in Vietnam.

However, many sources believe the departure of Lodge and Deputy Ambassador William O. Porter, both determined advocates of civilian rehabilitation, is certain to give Gen. William C. Westmoreland and his officers the dominant voice.

For some time there has been an underground struggle between the U.S. military and the embassy for influence. Fear of a military takeover of civilian affairs led to the formation of the Office of Civilian Operations, headed by Porter, to direct the multimillion-dollar military pacification program.

Many feel that only the strong personalities of Lodge and Porter kept the demands of the military officers at bay.

Porter has built up a powerful military organization that controls and coordinates the civilian agencies supporting the revolutionary development program, the current name of the pacification program. The deputy ambassador will leave behind a capable, functioning organization.

Of South Vietnam's estimated 11,000 hamlets, 4,461 are classed as pacified but this figure is open to doubt. The goal for 1967 is 1,100 more.

Population is probably a better index of control. Of the estimated 15 million South Vietnamese, 8 million are considered under government control, 6 million under Viet Cong control, and the remaining 2 million are in a shadowland.

The 1967 pacification program has four priority areas which will get more aid and assistance than the others.

One region is around Da Nang, where U.S. Marines were operating. Another is in coastal Binh Dinh Province, where the current pacification scheme took root. The third embraces several provinces around Saigon. The fourth is an area of the Mekong Delta, centered on the Hoa Hao religious sect's province of Giang.

Large chunks of 26 of South Vietnam's 43 provinces are included in the priority areas. Thousands of revolutionary development teams, each made up of 50 South Vietnamese, are being trained to work in the target villages. They enter a village, take a census, before the villagers, do small jobs of rebuilding and recruit a local guard.

The "rev dev" teams are supposed to stay about six months in each hamlet and leave it pacified before they move on to another.

The problems of pacification are enormous.

Many of the teams are too frightened to spend the nights in 1967.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Lawyers involved in the reorganization of the New Haven Railroad have received nearly \$689,000 so far for their work, Interstate Commerce Commission files showed Wednesday.

On Tuesday, the ICC approved payment of \$85,125 to the law firm of Sullivan & Worcester, special counsel for the trustees of the bankrupt railroad. It was the latest in payments made to the Boston law firm since May frightened to spend the nights in 1967.

New Haven Rezoning OK'd GOP Loses First Battle In New General Assembly

HARTFORD (AP)—House approval of a bill reauthorizing a bond program unveiled by Gov. John Dempsey Wednesday in the first partisan battle of the 1967 session.

During the three hours of debate preceding the 9:40 roll-call passage of the bill, House defeated three Republican amendments dealing with referendum and revision aspects of the bill.

House action on the bill was spurred by two factors — the need, by simply authorizing the legal deadline of March 31 set three years ago by U.S. District Judge T. Emmet Clarke and a natural deadline in the form of a sudden storm which piled snow deeper and deeper on the highways.

Senate passage of the bill last week had brought New Haven reauthorization halfway to reality. House Minority Leader Nicholas A. Longo maintained that the court required only a progress report by Wednesday and that an immediate vote was unnecessary.

Republicans had forestalled a motion to vote on the bill. It takes a two-thirds majority to suspend the rules, and the Democrats couldn't muster it.

But there was little question about the bill's future: Republicans urged Democrats to be open-minded and fair, and Democrats replied that they rule the House now.

The GOP's main pressure point was whether the court would accept the Democrats' open-minded and fair, and Democrats replied that they rule the House now.

HARTFORD (AP)—Neddy Connecticut College students would receive an added financial incentive under a new state law passed Wednesday.

The governor will ask the legislature for a \$25 million bond authorization which would guarantee \$12 million worth of loans to colleges and universities students over the next 10 years.

Finance Commissioner George J. Donkin said that the bonds would not even have to be issued, by simply authorizing the borrowing, the state would create sufficient credit to guarantee the loans.

He said, "The state would obtain the loans from the market."






