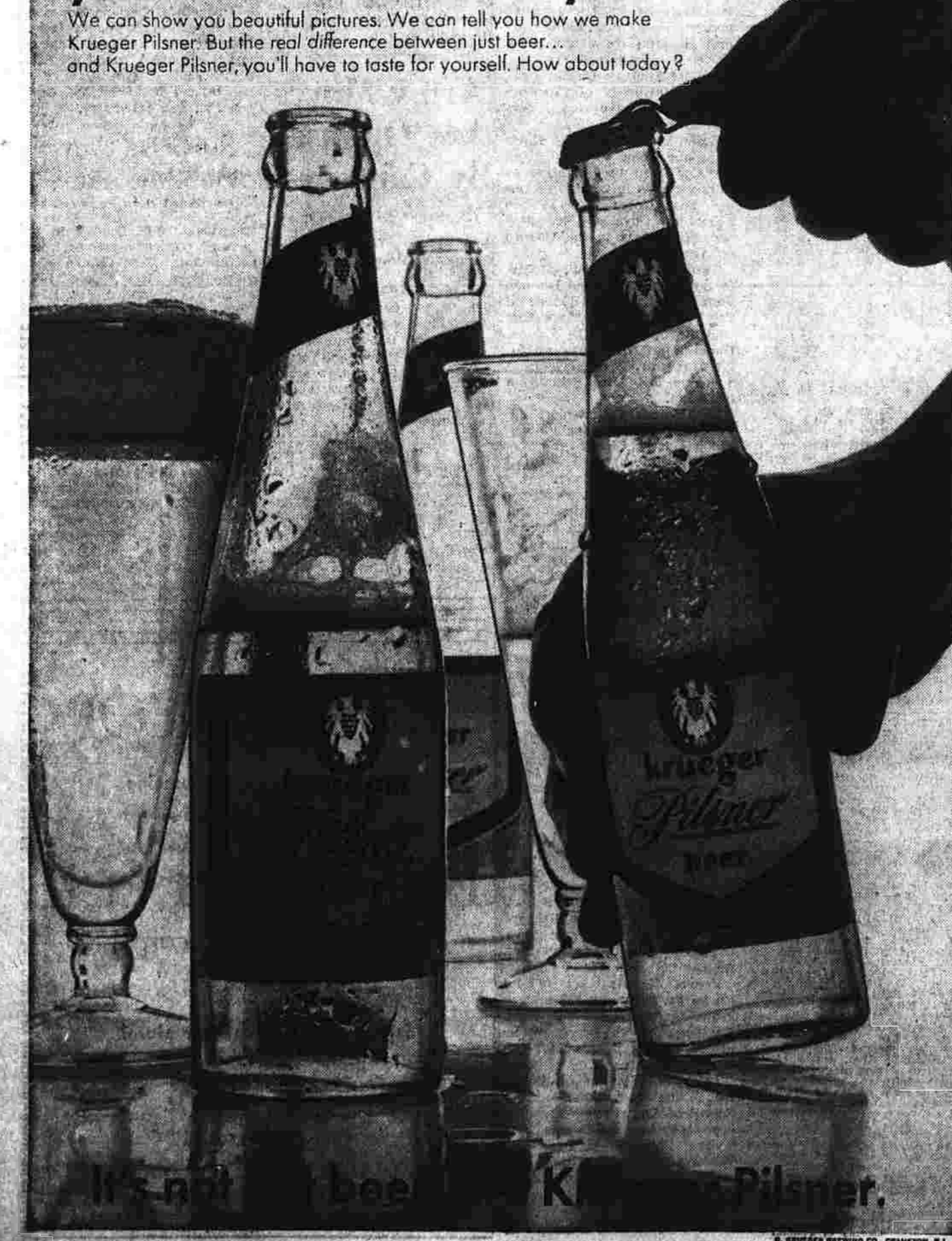

Girl Seared By Flames Loses Fight

CHICAGO (AP) — Robin Dean's struggle to live ended Thursday night, five weeks after a kitchen accident engulfed her in flames and seared more than half her body.

The 16-year-old girl had waved between life and death for most of February but she had been reported improving earlier this week.

Dr. John Boswick, head of the Cook County Hospital's burn clinic, said Robin's death came as a surprise. Her death was the final episode in a sad, yet inspiring, fight for survival.

The story of Robin's suffering began Feb. 9 when flames from a kitchen range set her dress on fire. She was heating some milk for a baby brother.

Her mother, Charlotte Dean, 21, king of the kitchen to find Robin rolling on the floor in flames.

Robin was hurried to Wales Memorial Hospital where doctors realized they were unable to treat the burns which covered more than 60 per cent of her body.

The only facility for such intensive care was at the burn unit of the Cook County Hospital, eight miles from Wales, she was rushed to Cook County Hospital by a Fire Department helicopter because more than two feet of snow slowed highway travel.

The girl's condition was described by doctors as "massive third-degree burns." About 260 pints of blood were donated for transfusions.

The board of education continued cutting its proposed preliminary budget for 1967-68 last night, with cuts now totaling about \$131,500.

This figure is still short of the \$200,000 goal. Most work has been completed and the budget is scheduled to be turned over to the board of finance shortly.

The original budget totaled \$1,449,497, compared with this year's \$1,228,000. The board agreed to try for a \$200,000 reduction, since this still would represent an increase of about 10 per cent over this year's appropriation.

With an increase of about 7 per cent in the grand list, a 10 per cent increase in the education budget was felt by board members to be reasonable.

Last night's budget work consisted mostly of reviewing and totaling cuts made to date, with some items being cut further.

One item passed over in previous discussion was a recommendation from the board to hire a principal for the new school, effective August 15, 1967, and voted to eliminate the position of vice-principal at the high school after opening of the new school. The question of a vice-principal will be reconsidered when the enrollment at the high school warrants it.

Also on last night's agenda was the question of teacher salary negotiations. There has been no progress in this area for some time and no more meetings have been scheduled. The board voted, however, to hire a principal for the new school, effective August 15, 1967, and voted to eliminate the position of vice-principal at the high school after opening of the new school. Legislative Roundup Higher Fees for Physicians Endorsed by Welfare Chief

HARTFORD (AP)—Increased state aid to doctors who treat welfare patients under the Federal Medicare program was urged by Connecticut's medical profession Thursday.

Doctors now receive \$4 for an office visit and \$5.50 for a home visit by the state for the treatment of welfare patients. The new bill \$8.25 would raise fees to "usual and customary charges" that private patients pay for the same service and the State Banking Commissioner.

The days of "charity medicine" are gone, said State Welfare Commissioner Bernard Shapiro as he announced he supported the bill "in principle."

Shapiro suggested to the legislature's Public Welfare Committee that a fee schedule be considered to reflect the "costly and usual charge."

Representatives of the State Medical Society, the Connecticut Academy of General Practitioners, and the Hartford County Medical Association said that the change in the fee program would take the accent off welfare service and place it on medical service.

A Limited "Maturity" The action of the United States Senate in ratifying the consular treaty with Soviet Russia can be hailed as a sign of "maturity" on the part of that body.

At the same time the fairly strong residue of opposition to the treaty—a total of 28 Senators still voted against it, and more would have been there enough to mean a defeat since a treaty requires a two-thirds vote for ratification—is a reminder that, if the main action of the Senate is to be considered maturity and sanity, there is still a formidable survival of something else.

It is a survival of that ideological fear and nightmare which, fostered by those to whom the rivalry with Russia has been a pathological thing, beyond power politics, beyond good and evil, beyond fact, logic, and reason.

The vote of 28 votes against this treaty in the Senate yesterday. That means that there were 28 highly intelligent and highly honored producers of democratic way of life who, by the instincts which govern them, would regretfully consider that Dwight D. Eisenhower in either an unconscious or a conscious way had been a pitifully innocent dupe of the world Communist conspiracy.

It is also an inevitable part of the instinct and belief of such a group of Senators that they share an assumption of the inevitability of showdowns for world mastery between the United States and whatever nations fly the flag of Communism. They regard such a conflict as inevitable and necessary and noble. Their sense of strategy tells them that the sooner the conflict is fought and won the better for our side.

They rate Communism, and Russia, and China as the most menacing evils that they consider the United States to be freed of any and all moral quibbling and scrupling about how we shall deal with them.

These particular Senators were, on the particular vote yesterday, merely the losing minority.

But, with certain occasional refinements of sophistication and intelligence, the instinct which governs them has also been the instinct which has actually governed United States policy for the truly important decisions of the last quarter century.

The point may be illustrated quite simply and directly. The 28 Senators who voted against President Johnson when the matter of this treaty are also the Senate's most willing and forceful supporters of the policies this same President is following in Vietnam.

Postscript To Bracero Controversy One of the more interesting surveys of those interesting and informative surveys which are so frequent in the Wall Street Journal concerns the results of the very controversial end of the "bracero" program in California.

The author of the survey, James E. Blynn, finds that all the predictions made when, in 1964, Congress, at the recommendation of the Labor Department, refused to extend the law permitting temporary Mexican workers to enter the country, have since proved to be poor predictions.

great disasters, with huge crops going unharvested. The union leaders of California predicted vast numbers of domestic workers would be found to replace the Mexicans.

What has actually happened has completely confuted all predictions. In place of the 60,000 Mexicans normally entering California for various agricultural harvests, the maximum number of additional domestic seasonal workers appearing for harvest work was only 11,000.

Part of this deficit had to be made up by having the Labor Department alter after all, 16,000 in 1966 and 7,000 in 1967.

That still left a large net decrease in harvest manpower available.

Nevertheless, California's gross farm income went from \$3.87 billion in 1964 to \$3.75 billion in 1965 to \$3.95 billion in 1966.

Net income, which dipped to \$922 million in 1965 as compared to \$1.05 billion in 1964 came back, in 1966, to \$1 billion.

Obviously, with such statistics, there had to be some factor which had not been predicted by anybody. And there was. It was the swift increase in mechanization of the harvest process which took place.

The most amazing statistic in this regard concerned the 1964 crop. In 1964 only 2% of the tomatoes harvested in California were picked by machine; in 1966 nearly 70% of the tomato harvest was mechanized.

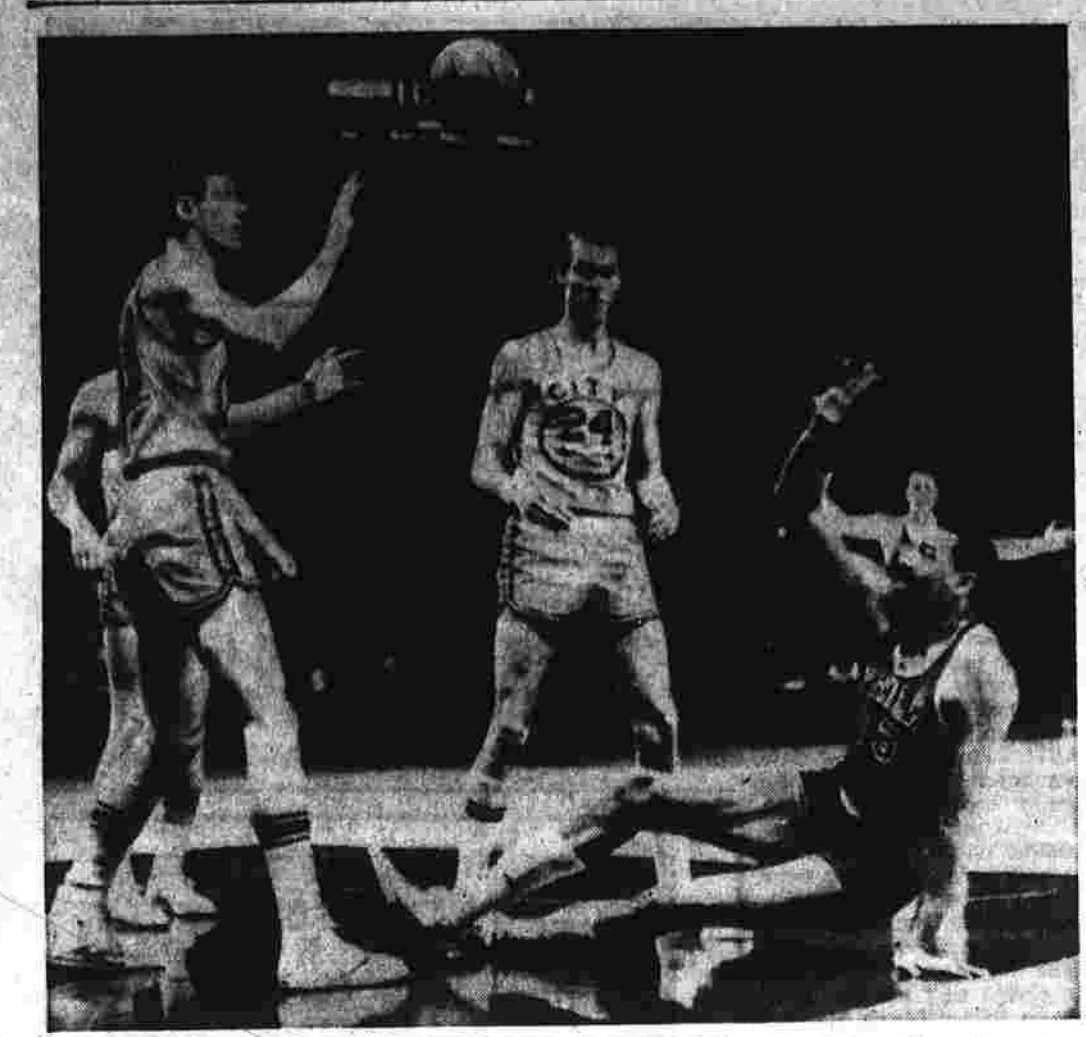

Mills said "I'll have to think about the time to try again to row across the Atlantic."

The Coast Guard kept the dory overnight at the Gloucester life boat station and Mills and his son went home.

Someone asked him if he intended to have a stiff drink when he returned to his home.

"Yeah, I'm going to get a big belt when I get home — from my wife," he said.

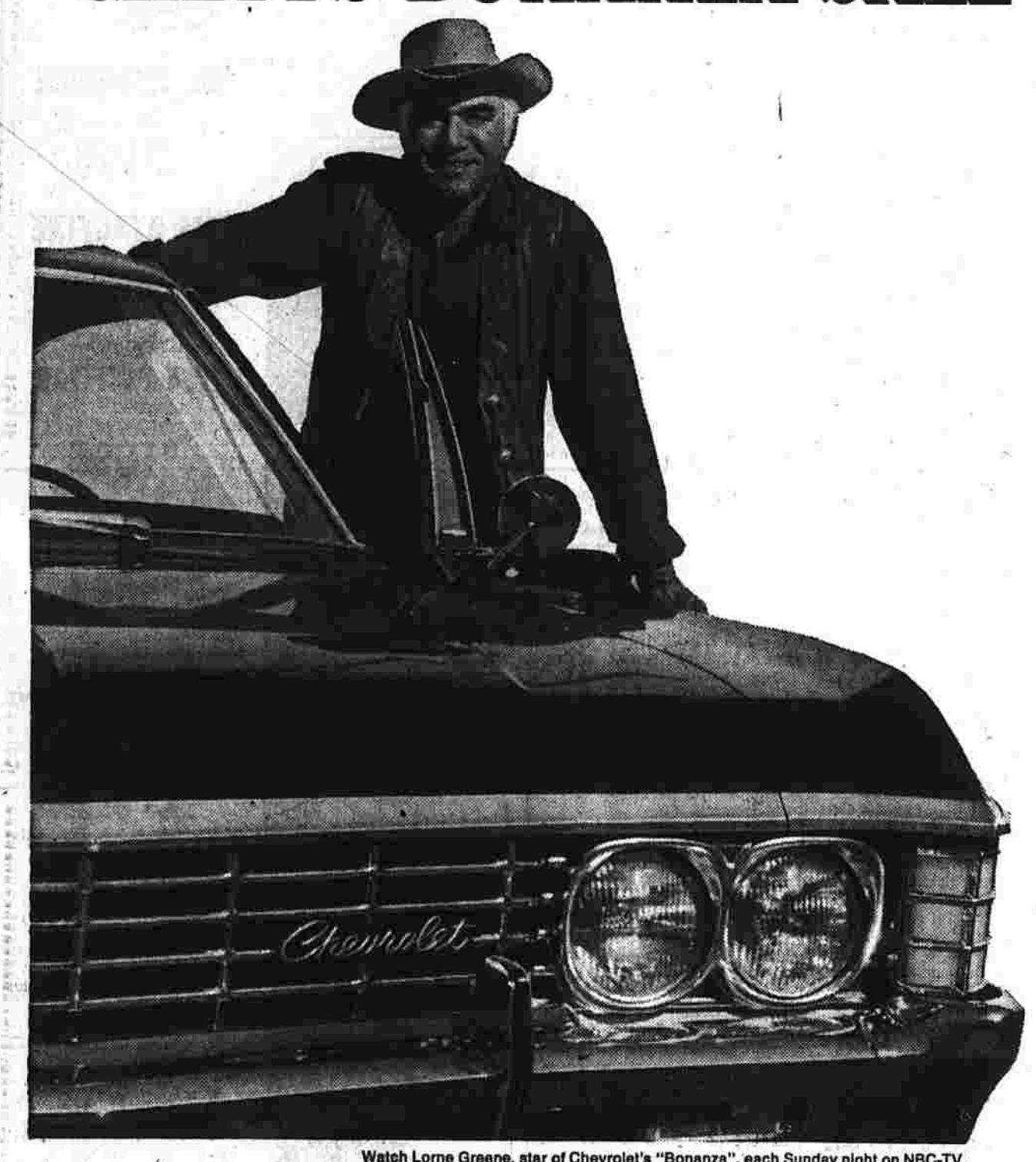
