





How Long Would Space Stay Pure All the billions we have spent in space to date-even ten times as much -would be completely justified on the basis of what the United States has got out of satellite reconnaissance alone, President Johnson told a gathering of educators in Tennessee the other night. The President was, perhaps, seeking to asmage possible academic theory that the 35 to 40 billions of dollars we have spent in space might better have been applied to more practical needs of our

enemy has, the President elucidated, keeps us from worrying over the possibility that he has more than he has. The President didn't say that it is guite likely that the way in which we use our satellites of various types to spy on what Russia is doing is paralleled by the way Russia uses its satellites as they pass regularly over us. But Russia has already admitted, at least, that it does have reconnaissance satellites in

The presence of this mutual spyingon in space as contrasted to the U-2 flights in this atmosphere which once surprised and shocked the world—seems to be taken for granted, and not as any great cause for alarm.

Yet, obviously enough, it is spying undertaken mainly for purposes of military security and military information.

While this military spying is proceeding as a matter of course, the space powers are also busy negotiating themselves a space treaty. In which they propose to pledge themselves against the use of space for purposes of war.

They propose to keep space sanitized, under the same kind of international agreement as that now in effect for

What we poor doubting, cynical laymen wonder is this: suppose the great space powers get into a war with one another down on land, a war in which they are using their reconnaissance satellites in order to trace each other's military production, movement, and rocket launchings. How long before each of them will be trying to shoot the other's satellites down? How long, then, before they would discover that the best way to shoot a satellite down would be to take another armed satellite up to do the job? How long before fleets of space ships would be engaging one another? How long before the moon would be so highly prized a base in space that rival nations would have to make an all-out effort to capture it?

The answer to such questions-like the answer to the parallel question of when and how nuclear nations are ever going to succeed in keeping nuclear weapons out of war—is short and blunt and unhappy. Man will succeed in keeping the atom out of war and war out of space when he succeeds in denying himself war itself. Until he does that, both nuclear treaties and space treaties are so much plous wistful nonsense.

The formula, in case anybody is still tooking for it these days? A United Nations, with its own independent police power stronger than any combination national military forces, and with clear authority and law to keep all nadons, big or small, from trying to take aws and decisions into their own hands by their own force.

They even looked as if they might be capable of solving, in some not too desperate way, the great tormenting problem of modern man-that of what to do with his leisure time.

For the moment, one cannot dispute it, the trend and the fad and the occasionally painful self-disciplining effort is toward the trim, rapier-like figure of a man, who slices his neat lean way through a cocktail party directly to a twist of lemon on the rocks.

But this, too, is merely one point on revolving cycle. The appeal of that more comfortable image—of girth, of expansiveness, of some cheer and peace and relaxation of mind and drive, of a ontent with rather than a fear of the good and pleasant things of life-this appeal is beginning its subtle growth among us all. ### Like A Full Pardon'

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - For its stars, the reinstatement of "Gunsmoke" was "like coming off condemned row with a full pardon," says Milburn Stone.

Stone, 62, born 80 miles from the story's locale, Dodge City, Kan., has played its sympathetic, crusty Doc Adams since the Western series came to television 12 years ago, with several years on radio.

When CBS announced Feb. 21 that the show had been canceled for next fall, said Stone: "Amanda (Blake, who plays Kitty) came unglued, crying so they couldn't keep makeup on her. Jim (Arness, who's Marshal Dillon) was stunned. All I could say was Well, I'll be d--d'."

Stone, a handsome, youngerlooking man without his makeup as Doc, got his first real haircut in 12 years, figuring he wouldn't need his shaggy hair any longed.
