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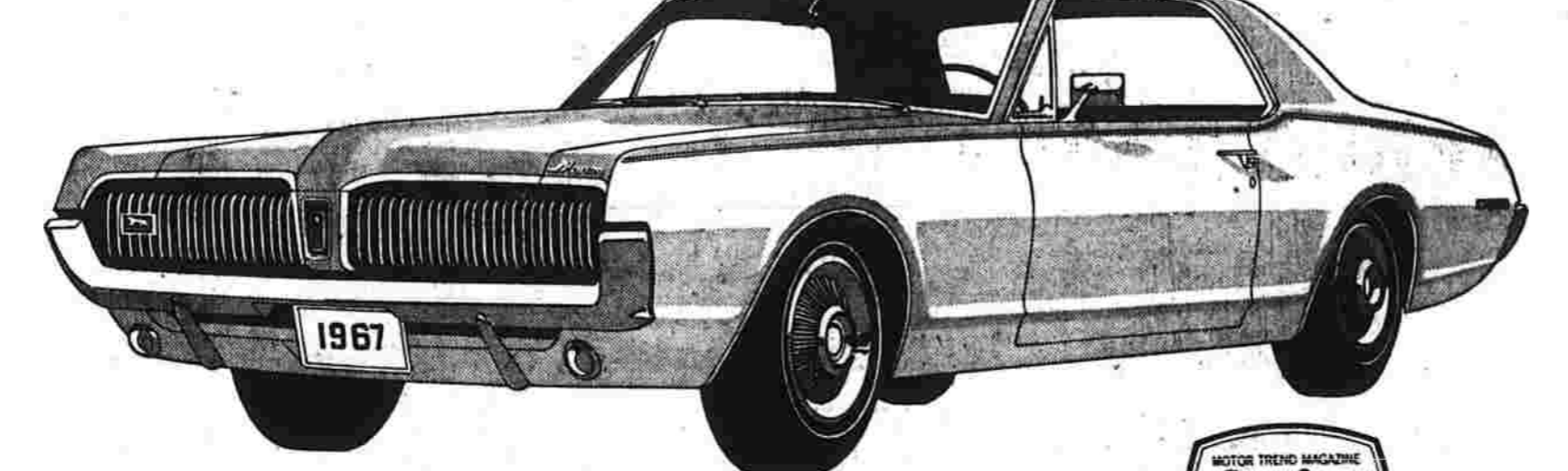

US Tanker Ripped by New Blast

LANDS' END, England (AP)—A violent explosion rocked the engine room of the stranded super-tanker Torgny Canyon today and halted salvage operations.

A Royal Navy spokesman said one man—believed to be the salvage master of the Dutch tug—was killed in the blast and died a short time later.

The huge blast blew the roof and the floor of the engine room off the ship, he said.

Salvage officers said the blast came as air pressure pumping was starting to lift the big tanker off the Seven Sevens Reef.

The explosion touched off a small fire but it was quickly extinguished.

Without engine power, the tanker is more helpless than it has been since it strayed onto the rocks.

The area where the tanker is stranded is now a giant oil slick covering 100 square miles of ocean.

We have now had a number of draft dodgers who have tried to base their defense on the theory that they consider the war in Vietnam an instance of American aggression, and do not want to become war criminals by having any part of it.

So far, the courts refuse to entertain this defense. At the trial level, the military rule is still now. At the Supreme Court level, by an eight to one decision, the Court has refused to entertain an appeal based on the Nuremberg argument.

Justice William O. Douglas, the lone dissenter in the refusal to hear such a case, said he believed the Court should be willing to hear the arguments and try to decide the question involved. There is perhaps considerable technical legal doubt whether the laws we help create at Nuremberg were in the form of a treaty which subsequently became law for ourselves.

When the Nuremberg trials were being conducted, and their verdicts being executed, there was a lot of high-flown, supposedly idealistic talk about a new kind of law in a new kind of world. Now, it seems likely, that has to be rated hypocrisy which actually weakens rather than strengthens the case for law against war.

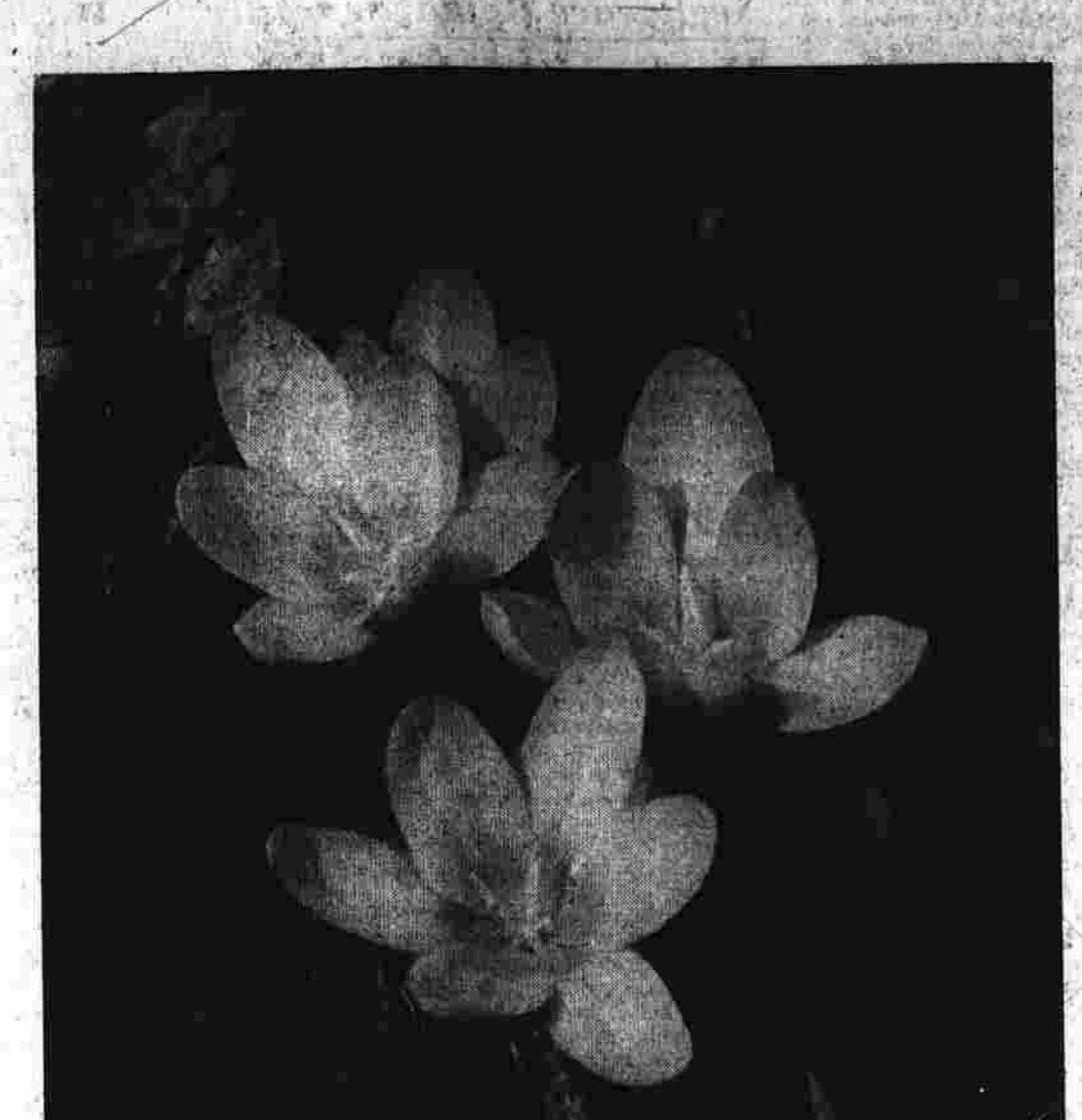

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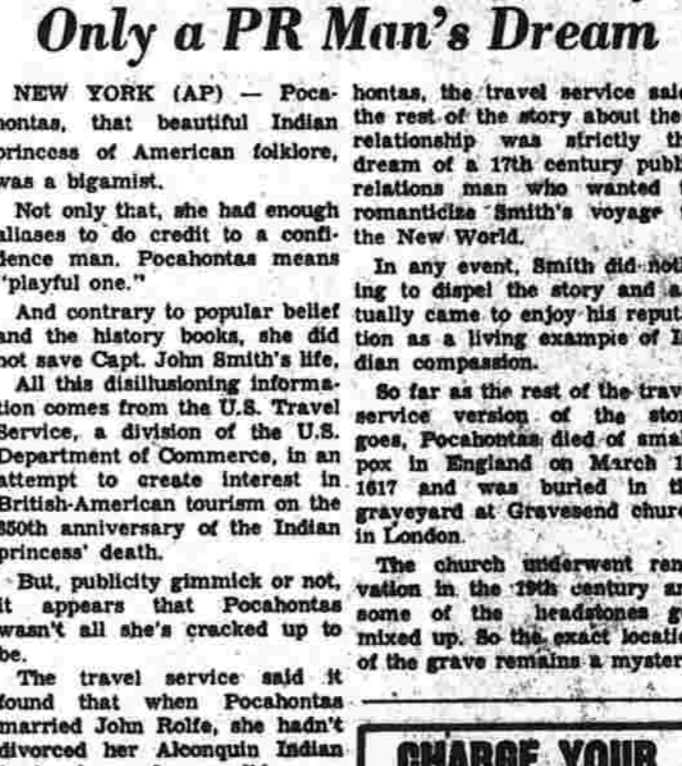
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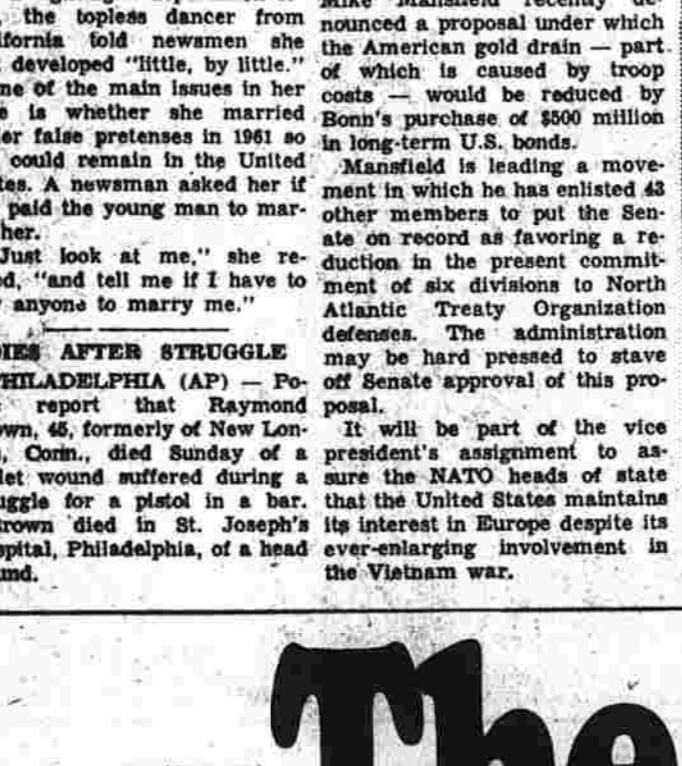

Mahan Tells Theory Busing Is to Test

The main purpose of Project Concern, the regional school busing program, is to test the theory that disadvantaged children learning in a segregated school environment fall farther and farther behind in academic achievement every year they are in school.

Dr. Thomas Mahan, in making an interim report to the board, said research evidence seems to indicate that "compensatory" classes and services within the child's own environment do not achieve the desired educational effect.

Controlled Growth Is Key to Town Plan

By MALCOLM BARLOW
Controlled development seemed to be the key words in the summary of the proposed plan of development presented to the Board of Representatives last night. Industry, homes, park space and school facilities are the important factors in Vernon's future growth, according to the town Planning Commission, which prepared the plan with the help of Samuel Fine of Raymond and May Associates, planning and urban renewal consultants.
Vernon is now a "bedroom" community in the heavily-industrialized region of Hartford, the summary said. Only 28 per cent of the labor force work inside the town. About 51 per cent work in Hartford, East Hartford or Manchester.
But there is change coming. Vernon's nearness to Hartford, its highway vantage point, the initiative and the rapidly expanding skilled labor force give the town an "excellent chance" for getting industry.
In this position, Vernon "has the means to select what type of community it chooses to become," the summary said.
It went on to make proposals for industry, new homes, more parks and schools.
Three Centers
Vernon's business and industry has three centers or focal points instead of the normal town's one. The "obvious hub" is the Rockville Center. Also, there is the Vernon Circle-Talbotville area and the scattered operations along Talbotville Rd., Hartford Tpke. and Windsor Ave.
The plan suggests Rockville Center be retained and strengthened as a commercial, civic and cultural hub. The Vernon Circle area should be a regional shopping center drawing customers from the area and farther via the Wilbur Cross Highway.
Also, it suggests that a small area near the intersection of Hartford Turnpike and Grove Street be a convenience commercial area. More such areas should be made only when there is actual need shown for them.
To avoid traffic congestion, the plan suggested the residential area be kept separate from the commercial area, and dispersed commercial operations, three causes of blight, the plan proposed a "controlled development district."
The district would allow apartments, offices, light in-

New York City Firemen Request Strike Vote Now

NEW YORK (AP) — Five thousand city firemen have called for an immediate strike vote by mail after shouting down a new wage offer. They also voted to authorize a suspension of all services except responding to fire alarms and emergencies.
After the noisy meeting broke up Monday night, some of the firemen shouted on the street, "Strike, baby!" One fireman displayed a large placard with the word "strike" in red letters.
A spokesman for the United Firemen's Association, which represents 10,000 firemen below the rank of fire officer, said the strike referendum would be held "as soon as machinery can be set up."
The fire department has a total of 14,000 firemen, officers and civilians. A department historian said it has never been struck in its 100 years of existence.
The UFA is Local 94 of the International Association of Fire Fighters, AFL-CIO. The international association has a no-strike clause in its constitution.
The UFA spokesman said a strike by the local would "in the face of the international association."
Under authorization by the firemen, the executive board of the UFA will decide when and how to suspend non-emergency services. If the threat is carried out, it would be an interim move pending the outcome of the strike ballot. If a strike is voted, all services would terminate, UFA officials said.
The non-emergency services include building inspections, training, clerical work and issuing summonses for vehicles parked too close to fire hydrants.
First-grade firemen and patrolmen receive \$8,485 a year under the contract that expired last July 1.

Florida Cabinet Considers 'Private Eye' Crime Fight

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The state Cabinet gets a chance today to bestow or deny its blessing on Gov. Claude Kirk's controversial concept of fighting crime with private detectives and funds.
How much of his program the Republican governor would unfold for his six Democratic Cabinet members was not certain. Aides earlier said he would answer questions and list contributions to his anticrime war, but Kirk said Monday the Cabinet would be asked only to approve the setting up of an independent state trust fund to handle receipts.
He proposed an initial \$150,000 account, which he said would provide "just the mechanics of administration of the money."
The Cabinet has the power to reject the financing method but the governor could resort to other financing if it did.
The Cabinet session comes seven days before a special election to fill the entire reappointed legislature. None of the Cabinet members, elected statewide, are involved but Republicans who elected their first governor in 94 years last November have an unprecedented number of campaigns for House and Senate.
A slowdown on Kirk's crusade could be avoided if the Cabinet members choose. They could name a committee to study the proposal and that would delay action until after the election or provide a respite in which to work out acceptable conditions for establishment of the fund.
Kirk, 41, whose gubernatorial campaign bristled with promises to drive crime out of the state, dropped a bombshell during his Jan. 8 inaugural speech by announcing he had suggested the Wackenhut Corp. investigative agency to wage war on crime and that he was inviting contributions from individuals and organizations. He said the agency's duties would include checking backgrounds of candidates for appointive office.
The unorthodox approach to crime fighting quickly drew cries of "restapo" and "Wackenhut" and the like from some critics.
Three Cabinet members added their voices to the furor.
Atty. Gen. East Patrick said the governor's hired agents, answerable only to him, raised serious legal questions and was "fraught with the possibility of danger."
"Both the risk and the temptation to use secret or private police forces for political objec-

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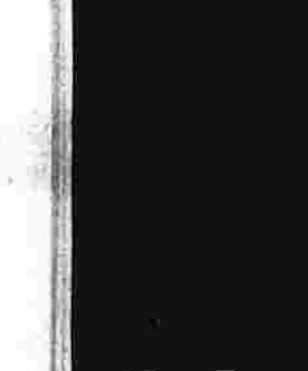
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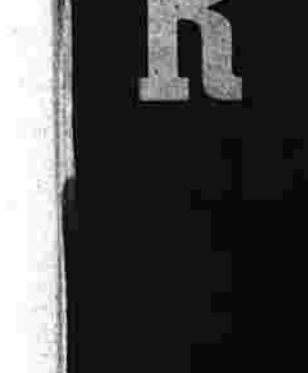
