Two-Way Pressure From Guam We do not recollect that there has ever been an international conference with such violent swings of emphasis as

that just concluded on Guam. The violence of the swings from one npression to another leads us to beeve that there was considerable artificiality in the creation of the conference's supposed moods and directions. And when we venture to guess what course actual events may now be expected to take, as a result of what hapened on Guam, it becomes our guess that what we will get will have no particular reference to Guam, and will consist mainly of a repetition and intensification of what we have already been

The swings at Guam were indeed, if ne tried to swing with them, rather xtreme and violent. Everybody in Washington was sure that President hnson was going to Guam in order to how his hawk feathers. Perhaps for no greater reason than that he has developed an almost pathological reluctance to do what he is expected to do, the resident himself, at Guam, tried to play down the purely military aspects of our policy, and concentrate on politics and pacification.

As for Premier Ky, he seemed to attend the conference in several phases, one for each side of every issue. The news media trying to cover this cose-ganglioned event wound up facing to all directions at once. They predicted

new military build up, they predicted more attention to pacification, they found Premier Ky impatient for bigger military blows and tough in his refusals o negotiate for peace, they found him cooing like a dove, and above all they found his entire delegation radiant over their conclusion that Premier Ky, who ariginally wasn't even invited, had suceeded in dominating the conference rather completely.

So far, however, we see no reason to fudge that anything really happened at his conference. It was, we think, being used by the

determined to go the full way to what he considers necessary for a successful ending to the policies he has chosen. His main concern, from now on, aside from the success or failure of his chosen course, will be to end division and debate, get everybody in line and in order, and fashion as mighty a domestic consensus as he can. The expedition to Guam was, we suspect, mainly a showmanship exercise in national unity. We may expect the White House to keep driving for such unity, for a mandate more universal and genuine than it has ever hitherto enjoyed for its conduct in Vietnam. Just as the enemy in Vietnam is to be subdued, by persistent and never-relaxing inches of military escalation, so the American people at home are to be asked to help the inevitable struggle by healing their own differences and coming voluntarily into the White House fatherhood.

There must be reservations, about what such persistence can accomplish in Vietnam, about how successfully it can wear down deep differences of opinion at home. But that is what Guam was -another piece of pressure toward victory in Vietnam, unity at home. Both may be impossible. The President may wind up getting them both.

In Some Defense Of Scuffing

The purported advantage of making shoes out of poromer instead of leather is that the synthetic material is healthier and more comfortable because it permits the enclosed flesh to breathe. The disadvantage credited to the poromeric shoes is that they don't scuff very well. For the market moment at least, the response to this, among shoe manufacturers in the synthetic field, is not to use the poromer in children's

The specialists in synthetics, no doubt, will get to the business of perfecting a material which will take to scuffing as well as any leather. In fact, the Wall Street Journal quotes a firm titled Rogers Corp., a name which has a familiar sound, as claiming it already has one poromeric which is especially impervious to scuffing.

That seems to us a fair and honest approach, which may eventually let the synthetic into the children's shoes mar-

We hope that this continues to be the only approach to a solution of the prob-

Our society is full of so many people and so many agencies and so many urgencies telling human beings what to do and what not to do with every minutest department of their living that we don't think we could stand it if we ever had to take a major anti-scuff campaign on top of all the rest of it. Besides, scuffing is a natural exercise

of a boy's muscle and curiosity, his own scientific way of testing out the materials he wears, just as the results with the poromeric shoes have illustrated, testing out the materials he encounters, like occasional stones, curbs, and ice at the edge of ponds. Let the manufacturers struggle along, we say, on the permanent assumption that a boy, now and then, has to have something to kick around in.

Woman Without A Country?

A fantastic chase is now under way in the Swiss Alps as hundreds of re porters, photographers, publishers' representatives and, presumably, intelligence agents seek to locate the elusive vetlana Stalin. Already this pursuit has produced scenes worthy of a James Bond farce, but there are serious issues

It is evident that the United States Government found itself in a major quandary when, as the State Department has now admitted, Miss Stalin asked for political asylum here. In the heyday of the cold war there would have been no problem. The propaganda and intelligence value of much more obscure figures has won them refuge in this country and Government-sponsored access to communications media. But Miss Stalin had the bad luck from her standpoint, of making her request just when President Johnson is in the midst of a major effort to build bridges to the East, an effort that might be compromised by resentment in Moscow at

American exploitation of Miss Stalin. The United States has followed a compromise course in dealing with its dilemma. It arranged to transport Miss Stalin from India and found her a temporary sanctuary in Switzerland. Apparently a part of this arrangement was agreement by the central figure whether voluntary or under pressure is unrevealed-that she would remain in-

But the intense worldwide interest aroused by her defection makes it unlikely that she can be kept away from newspapermen indefinitely - provided she is not locked in a de facto jail or otherwise artificially and uncomfortably isolated.

This history is in sorry contrast to the oft-repeated United States declarations in favor of free speech, free movement and all the other freedoms. Moreover, the United States Government assumed a clear obligation to Miss Stalin when it decided to make possible her exit from India. The makeshift arrangement now adopted hardly satisfies that

If Miss Stalin still wants to come to this country, then she should be allowed to do so. And she is entitled to say what she wishes to the people of the world. We do not pretend to know what Miss Stalin might say if given the opportunity, but to gag her for reasons of political expediency violates her rights as a

human being. To continue on the present course is to follow the Soviet principle that the rights of the individual are subordinate to the needs of the state. That is not a principle Americans want to live with. - NEW YORK TIMES

Police Backing Barry Law Bills

The Manchester Patrolmen's Association has unanimously endorsed all of the bills pertaining to law enforcement introduced by State Sen. David M. Bar-

Association president Samuel Maltempo said that his group is solidly behind a Barry pro-posal to provide law enforcement courses in the State Community College System, free of charge to members of organized police departments.
