Pope Leads Good Friday Observance

NEW YORK (AP) — The earliest Easter in 16 years Sunday and wintry weather in many parts of the country apparently haven't dampened plans for traditional sunrise religious services and displays of finery in the Easter parade.

While preparations were being made for the services and parades, Pope Paul VI led Roman Catholics in the annual Good Friday observance today of Christ's Crucifixion.

Thursday night in Rome, the Pope washed the feet of 12 boys, emulating in a Holy Thursday Mass at the Basilica of St. John Lateran the action of Christ at the Last Supper.

Good Friday is not a legal holiday, but still many businesses offices across the country were closed today, including the stock and principal commodity exchanges in New York.

Banks, retail businesses and department stores were generally open for Easter shoppers. An Associated Press survey showed retail sales of spring clothes down two to five percent in the snowy Northeast and Midwest, but up as much as 28 percent in Richmond, Va., about five per cent nationally.

New York's Easter parade up Fifth Avenue is expected to be as gaudy as ever.

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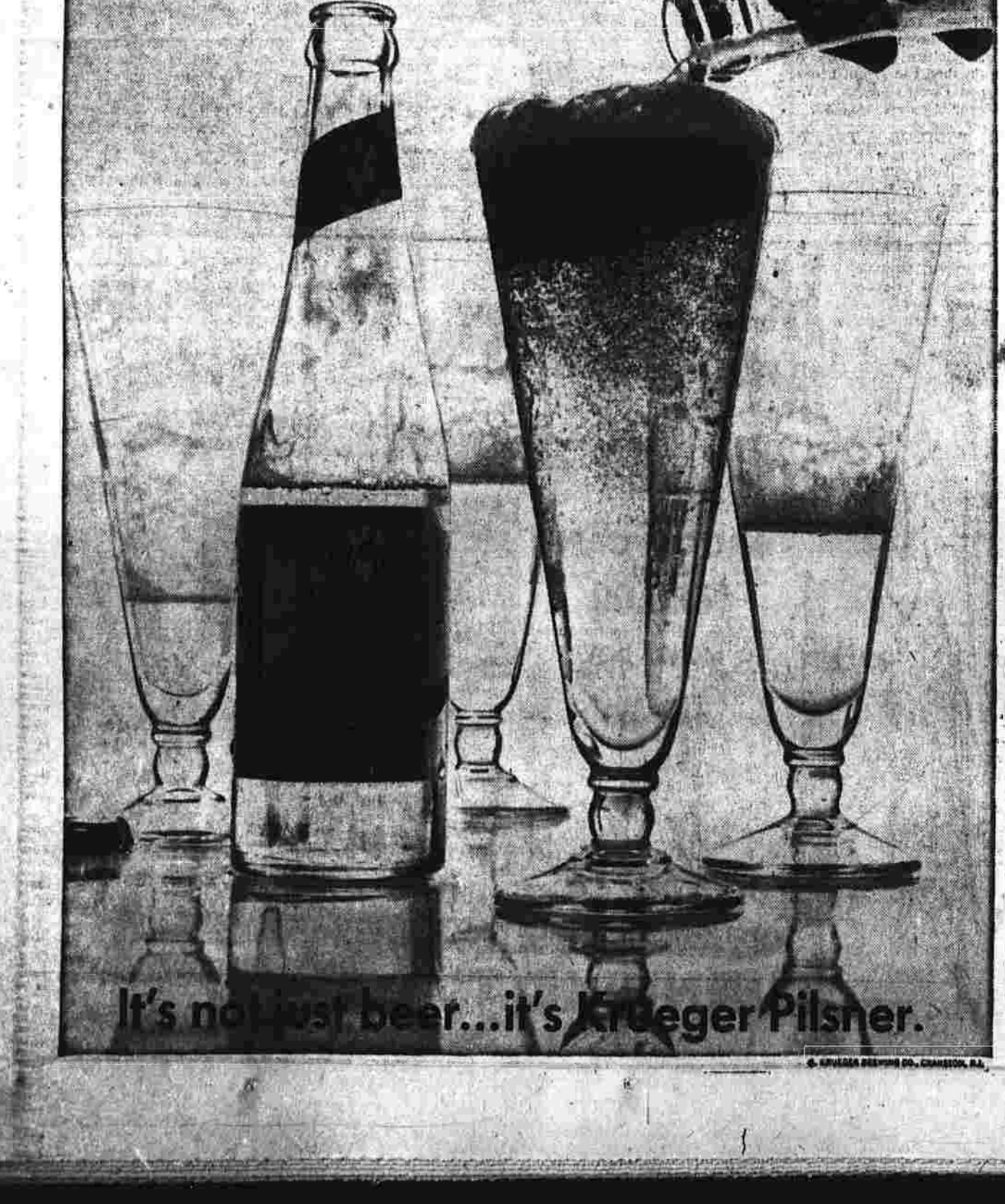

**Girl Abducted
By Mad Sniper
Wed Near Lair**
Peggy Ann Brundick, who was abducted last May by a deranged sniper, was married Thursday night in a country church near the area where she was held captive.
Peggy, 18, who lives in this rural southeastern Pennsylvania community, became the wife of Darrell Logan, 21, of Lewisburg, Pa. She is a pupil in a beauty school. He works in a supermarket.
The Rev. Raymond Piper officiated at the simple, 20-minute ceremony at the Pleasant Hill Evangelical United Brethren Church. About 20 persons, including the bride's parents, attended.
Just a few miles to the south, hundreds of state policemen, FBI agents and volunteers, aided by helicopters and tracking dogs searched last spring for Peggy Ann and her abductor.
She was kidnapped by William F. Hollibaugh, a recluse who lived in a mountain cabin, as she was walking home from school. For a week, he dragged her through the heavily wooded area, hiding in caves during the night.
During the manhunt, Hollibaugh shot and killed an FBI agent, Terry Ray Anderson. The next day, Hollibaugh died in a gun battle with State Police. Peggy Ann was rescued - tired but unharmed.

Sheinwold on Bridge
TAKING ALL FINESSES MAY COST YOU A BLAM BY ALFRED SHEINWOLD
The average bridge player takes every finesse in sight on the theory that he has everything to gain and nothing to lose. Actually, a certain kind of finesse gives you a chance to lose but no chance to gain.
Opening lead-jack of diamonds.
You play the queen of diamonds from dummy at the first trick, and East covers with the king. You win with the ace of diamonds and play your play. Do you start with a spade finesse, or do you try the club finesse?
In actual play, the average bridge enthusiast would not even stop to ask any questions. He would try the spade finesse at the second trick. East would win with the king, and South would be down one without any delay.
An expert would not bother with the spade finesse because it gives him a chance to lose the slam but does not help him win it.
If the club finesse works, South will win the game. If the diamond no matter which opponent has the king of spades.
Does Not Matter
In other words, the spade finesse does not matter. The contract depends solely on the club finesse.
South should therefore ignore the spade finesse. He should lead the queen of spades at the second trick, just in case West happens to be an honor-creeper. But when West plays a low

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New School Budget Jumps 20 Per Cent
The board of education has approved a \$1,300,000 budget for the fiscal year July 1, 1967, through June 30, 1968. The budget represents a 20.8 per cent increase over last year's \$1,081,717.
The budget does not show the amount of state aid grants which are reimbursements paid into the general fund of the town. The school enrollment is expected to increase about 375 per cent next year.
The budget stands at \$1,300,000 (a 18.8 per cent increase) before the costs of a kindergarten program are included. In agricultural expenses of a kindergarten are listed at \$44,475 and would result in a \$1,255,525 budget. Transportation costs for kindergarten students were estimated at \$25,000 by the board.
The kindergarten figures were included in the budget Wednesday night's public hearing on kindergarten.
The kindergarten budget does not reflect the estimated \$300,000 the town would receive in state grants to offset the cost.
Income Factors
School Superintendent Robert Briarson attributed the increase to several factors, including the start of a high school and the kindergarten program, which require additional teaching personnel.
Other factors cited are increased enrollment, textbooks and instructional supplies for high school, additional facilities for the 16-room arts and science wing at the high school and additional professional and professional personnel.
The increased enrollment anticipated in September is a stable, particularly with the inclusion of the kindergarten program and the town's first freshman high school class.
An approximate 37 1/2 per cent student increase is expected with 1,838 students compared to 1,337 this year.
Budget Breakdown
The budget is broken down into 10 categories. Administration expenses are budgeted at \$131,900 and include the salaries of the superintendent, board and office secretary and book-keeper, contracted services for administration, census enumeration and board of education expenses.

CONCORD, N.H.—One year away from their probable abode in New Hampshire's first-in-the-nation Presidential primary, Richard M. Nixon's lead over Governor George Romney is far less substantial than many Republican politicians around the country believe it to be.

Indeed, Nixon's advantage in New Hampshire is so small it approaches the meaningless. Party chieftains here who once swore fealty to him are displaying a marked reluctance to join the Nixon camp this early.

Perhaps more important, our conversations with rank-and-file voters evoked little enthusiasm for Nixon. Thus, the March 8, 1968, primary looks like Romney's to win or lose—depending on how he performs.

There is poignancy in Nixon's tiny head start in New Hampshire in no other state does he have so many close political allies. Three statewide primary campaigns were conducted for him here. Yet Republicans looking for a winner are eyeing the stranger from Michigan.

The chips will be piled here in 1968. If New Hampshire is a two-man race, the loser may well be eliminated from Presidential consideration. For that reason, Romney's political lieutenants have been fretting about Nixon's presumed head start here.

Here, the surprise in the results of our unscientific sampling in two communities, Concord and Dover. Out of 66 registered Republicans interviewed, only 5 declined to state a preference between Romney and Nixon. Among the rest, Nixon led by a bare 33 to 28.

More important was the reason given for the choice. "Nixon's tried it once, and we need new blood," said a retired salesman in Concord. Other comments by Romney supporters invariably were anti-Nixon rather than pro-Romney. "No dynamic enough," "been around too long," "Nixon's had it."

Coventry

Property Owners Warned On Absence of Facilities

Some 100 Coventry property owners will be notified by the town engineer, Robert A. Allen, building inspector and deputy sanitarian, that they are lacking one or more of the required facilities on their properties. They are installed sanitary facilities, hot and cold running water, and a septic tank or drain.

The town engineer is asking that if these facilities exist and the property is occupied, he and Mrs. Antonio D'Ambrusco would appreciate a letter so stating, as well as establishing an appointment for an inspection of the premises.

Lack of any one or more of the three facilities constitutes a violation of the Coventry Minimum Housing Facilities Ordinance passed at a town meeting in April 1962. Under this ordinance property cannot be occupied unless the minimum installations are made previous to occupancy.

The ordinance states that any building used for living purposes year round or seasonal must have a complete bathroom group installed, consisting of a toilet, washstand and a bathtub or shower; a kitchen connected to a hot and cold running water system, with drains connected to a properly installed septic tank and sewerage system if not drained.

In order to conform with this regulation it is necessary that permits be obtained in the office of the building inspector and sanitarian. A permit is a condition of occupancy in Coventry before any installations are made, the communication so stipulated in the ordinance does not exist and the property is occupied, the penalty as provided in the ordinance is a \$100 fine for each violation.

The town official pointed out that it is the intent of the Town of Coventry to vigorously enforce this ordinance through whatever legal action may be necessary to enforce compliance.

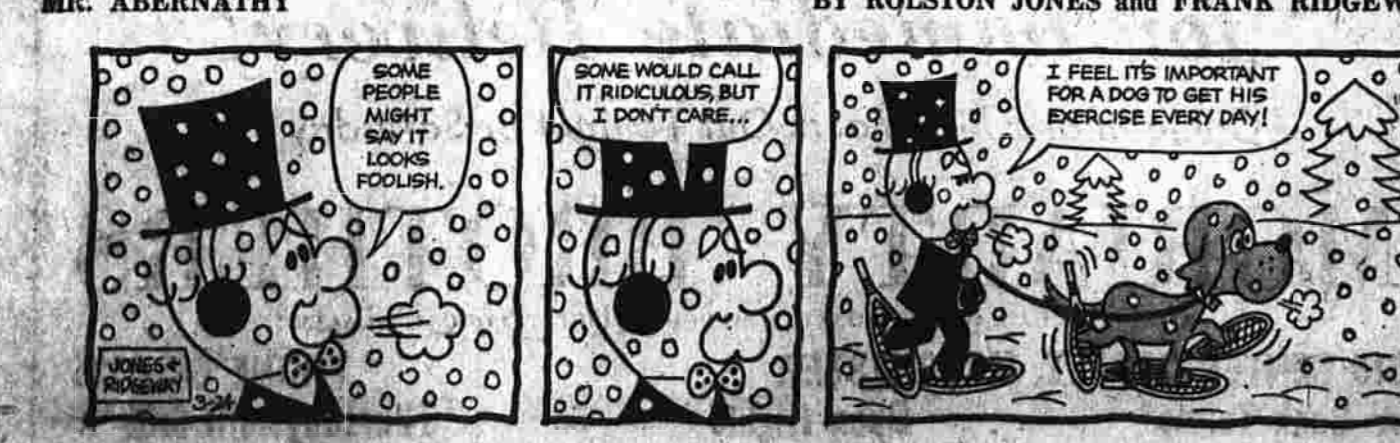
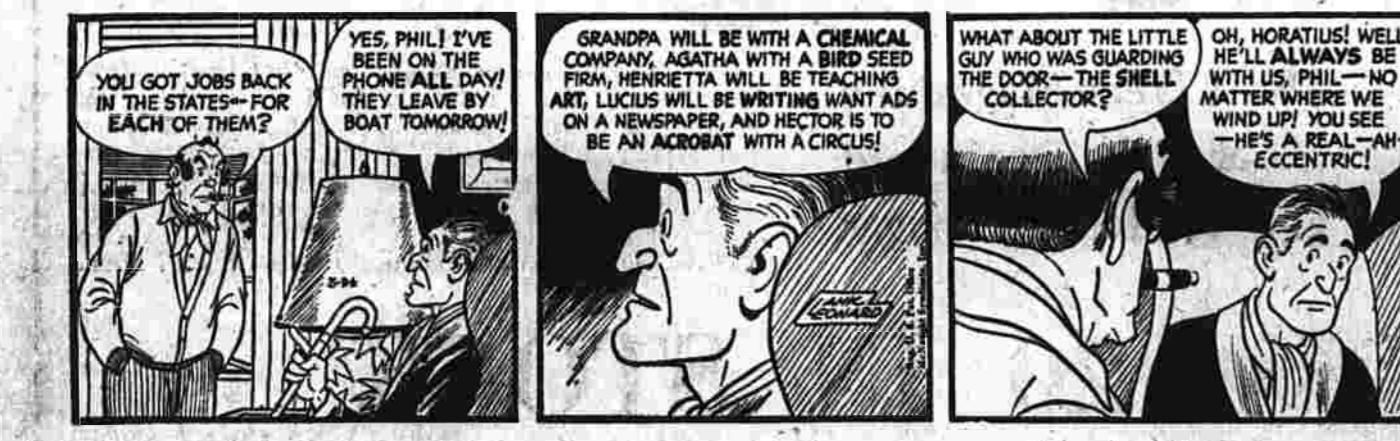

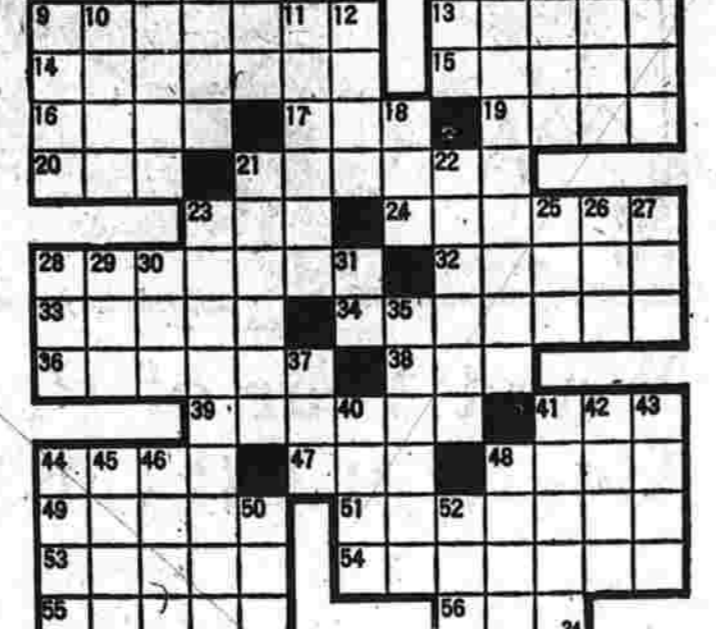
