

Nation's Labor 'Headache' Grows Increasingly Severe

Teamsters' Talks Move At Slow Pace

NEW YORK (AP) — Discontented municipal employees in Philadelphia and New York, the worsening strike of television and radio network newsmen and the ominously slow pace of Teamsters negotiations all added up today to a labor headache for the nation.

In addition, negotiations between 10 unions and five New York City newspapers seemed to be getting no better.

Most serious of the smoldering labor fires was the threat of a strike by the Teamsters. Negotiations in Washington covering 450,000 employees of 15,000 trucking firms were to continue today after bargaining, up until 2 a.m., had matched some sleep. A strike, if one should come, would have far-reaching effects on the nation's systems for distributing essentials such as food.

Teamsters locals throughout the country voted overwhelmingly over the weekend to authorize their leaders at the negotiations to call a strike if and when they feel further talks are useless.

Results in area voting were: Boston local 25, the largest in New England, 2,912 in favor; 47 against; local 404 in Springfield, 477 in favor, 5 against; local 626 in Fall River, 38 in favor, 6 against; East Providence, R.I., local 251, 1,124 in favor, 33 against.

In Connecticut, local 478 in Meriden, 255 for and 2 against; local 677 in Waterbury, 225 for and 3 against; local 445 in New Haven, 600 for and 24 against.

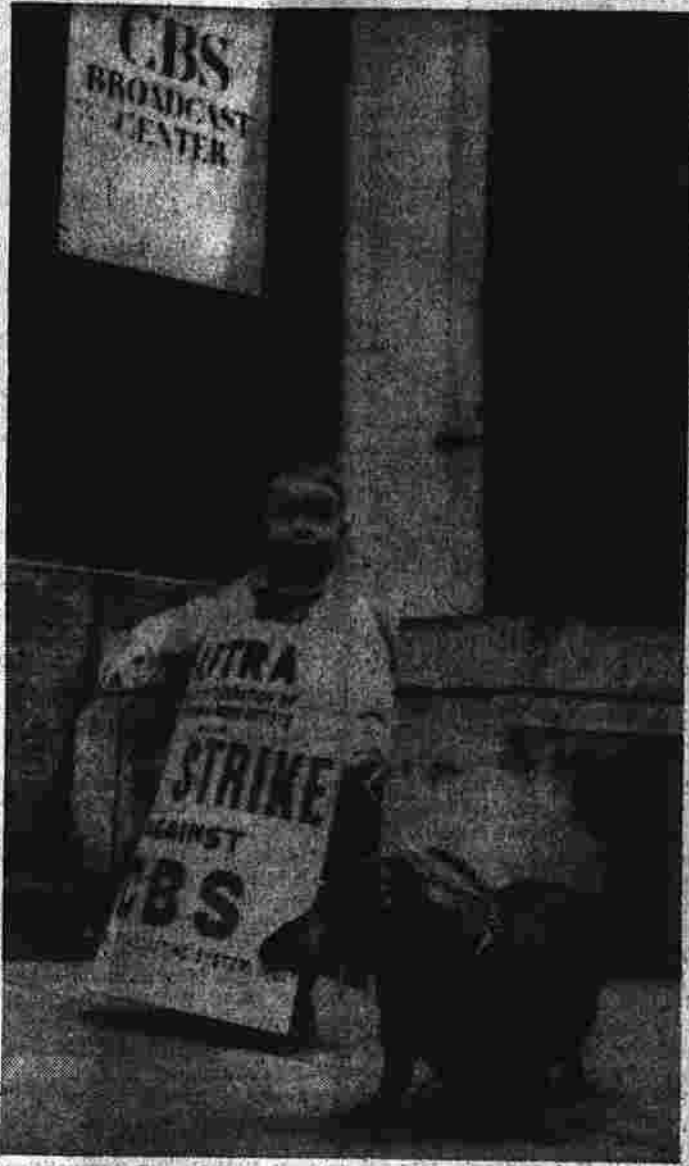
Voting results for local 101 in Bridgeport were not available. The talks were reportedly down to the main issue: money. The last reported wage demand of the union was 55 cents spread over the three-year contract period. The industry's last reported counter to that was 37 cents.

Discussion between the nation's three principal television-radio networks and the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists stopped cold late Sunday night in Washington. Despite the insistence of spokesmen for CBS, ABC and NBC that they were willing to keep going, the chief union negotiator, Donald Conaway, led his side out and said he had no idea when negotiations would resume.

"I regret greatly the inconvenience to the American public," Conaway said. "There was no point in continuing the talks when management's latest offer was inferior to its original one, he said. Without disclosing details of the management proposal, Conaway called it "insulting."

The union is demanding \$226 a week plus a bigger share of commercial fees for its broadcast newsmen. When the walk-out began last Wednesday the

GOP Demands LBJ Drop Tax Hike Plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican leaders demanded today that President Johnson drop his proposal for a 6 per cent increase in income tax bills and instead push government efforts to achieve social goals within the nation's current means.

"The growth of nondefense expenditures in recent years had been more restrained, the proposed tax increase would not even be under consideration," the Republican Coordinating Committee said. The panel said the administration should immediately suspend its request for a 6 per cent surtax "and devote more efforts to restraining the growth of nondefense spending."

Michigan Gov. George Romney was on hand as the GOP panel drafted its declaration. Other figures in the early maneuvering for the Republican presidential nomination were absent. The committee said a "deterioration in economic conditions" could send the federal budget deficit soaring from the \$8.1 billion Johnson forecast to a level of \$25 or \$30 billion this year.

They said "the prospective decline in economic conditions" could force abandonment of the \$5.5-billion surtax and "may even require a tax reduction to prevent a more serious slump." The Republicans insisted that spending on social programs at home has increased more rapidly than outlays for defense. They said the administration should "refrain from promising more in immediate welfare and progress than, in the long-run good of the country, can safely be undertaken."

What's Ahead in Taxes?—Close Gaps or Hike Rates!

EDITORS NOTE — Some people in and out of Congress are urging tax reform — a general closing of loopholes — as a substitute for President Johnson's proposed 6 per cent income surtax. Through those loopholes pours an estimated \$50 billion a year. Are major tax reforms in the offing? Writer Sterling F. Green, a member of the AP's Washington special assignment team, reports on the prospects and also examines some of the major tax loopholes in the following story.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House has planted a go-ahead sign in the way of congressional proposals to plug some of the major tax loopholes through which an estimated \$50 billion of revenue escape every year. Instead of a major loophole-closing, officials expect President Johnson to seek modest changes, mostly clenching up corporation tax rules and offsetting any revenue increases by tax relief for lower-income families. The presidential package won't reach Congress until July or August, under present plans. They could not be enacted before 1968. And under White House orders, the revisions will not produce a gain in revenues. "The reforms will be little and late," predicted Rep. Henry S. Reuss, D-Wis., a ranking member of the Senate-House Economic Committee. He has urged prompt loophole-closing as a substitute for Johnson's proposed 6 per cent general surtax at mid-year on most income taxes. But Reuss reported no signs of a major tax reform effort in the executive branch and added, in an interview: "Unless there is strong presidential leadership you cannot get real tax reforms out of Congress." "Congress is where the vested interests live. The White House is where the national interest lives." Administration aides agree that the President's promised reform package won't go to Capitol Hill until after Congress takes its action, if any, on Johnson's tax surcharge proposal.

Turkish Embassy Bomb's Target

WASHINGTON (AP) — A small handmade bomb was detonated about 20 feet from the Turkish Embassy here early today, just a few hours before the arrival of Turkish President Cevdet Sunay.

The blast caused no damage to the embassy, although it apparently burned the left rear door of a car parked on a lot behind the building. It was not learned to whom the car belonged. Police said the bomb had been placed in a cardboard box. They said first it apparently was thrown from a car, but later found a detonator with a wire leading to the blast scene.

The detonator was found partially hidden in a tree stump about 50 feet from the parking lot. The explosion occurred about 4:30 a.m. Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation are investigating, but nobody has been apprehended, informants said.

The embassy, a combined building which serves also as the residence of Ambassador Melih Esenbel, is on Massachusetts Ave. and 28th St., the "Embassy Row" of Washington.

The back of the embassy faces Rock Creek Park, and there, on a fairly abandoned street, the bomb exploded. The State Department was aware of the incident, but no immediate comment was available. Some sources, however, expressed surprise because there is no known opposition to Sunay among Turks residing in the United States.

2 New Ground Sweeps Add Pressure to VC

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. military headquarters today announced two new major ground sweeps — including the biggest operation so far by Australian forces in Vietnam — aimed at steadily increasing the pressure on Communist units.

The U.S. command said 19 ground actions are currently under way seeking out Communist units from the highlands to the marshes of the Mekong Delta. But only scattered contacts were reported, with 60 to 65 of the enemy killed.

The U.S. command also said the Australian guided missile cruiser Hobart, which joined allied forces off the coast last Friday, shelled a Viet Cong assembly point below Quang Tri City. It was the first offshore bombardment by an Australian ship in the Vietnamese war.

The biggest U.S. ground operation of the war, Operation Junction City in Tay Ninh Province near Cambodia, continued to run into significant numbers of Viet Cong troops in the area where a Red regiment lost at least 581 men last Friday and Saturday. A U.S. spokesman said the U.S. troops reported killing 25 to 30 Viet Cong in scattered skirmishes today.

It appeared that small Viet Cong units were still fleeing the areas of the major battle, and U.S. forces were fanning out to catch them.

The Australian ground sweep in coastal Phuoc Tay Province began March 21 but was kept under security wraps until Monday. It numbers perhaps 4,000 men, including U.S. soldiers under Australian command.

The operation, called Porteus, is aimed at clearing an area long under the control of the Viet Cong and is intended to open local roads so peasants can reach the district market without harassment.

Goshen Farmers First in State To Dump Milk

GOSHEN (AP) — Thirty gallons of fresh Connecticut milk was dumped in a ditch Sunday afternoon as a group of Goshen dairy farmers became the first in the state to join the National Farmers Organization.

The farmers poured the milk into the ditch as a protest against low prices paid dairy farmers for milk.

One of the group, Russ Jackson, said he didn't like to waste food products but it seemed the only way to draw attention to what he called "a two-faced policy in Washington."

The Galleries, holding down of milk prices, he said, is a form of vote-buying, and farmers are a minority.

European dairymen, Jackson said, are subsidized by their own governments. When they send their butter and cheese here, he said, they make it almost impossible for Americans to compete.

Clayton Grits, another member of the group, said because of increased dairy imports, U.S. dairymen are getting less for their milk now than they were 15 years ago.

Gaullists Gain First Victory

PARIS (AP) — Jacques Chaban-Delmas, Gaullist mayor of Bordeaux, today was re-elected president of the National Assembly. This gave supporters of President Charles de Gaulle a victory in their first test in the new National Assembly.

Chaban-Delmas got 261 votes to 214 for Gaston Defferre, Socialist mayor of Marseille.

The nominal Gaullist majority in the National Assembly elected last month is 244-242. Two deputies did not attend today's session and nine others cast blank ballots.

The size of Chaban-Delmas' victory came as a mild surprise. It indicated that a number of centrist deputies, who have no links with either the Gaullists or leftist organizations, had swung over to the Gaullists to organize the assembly.

Even so, Chaban-Delmas' total showed a decline from previous elections. He received 355 votes in 1958, and was re-elected with 287 in 1962.

Prices Up Slightly

1968 Autos Seen Longer and Lower

DETROIT (AP) — Details leaking from behind the auto industry's chrome curtain indicate next year's cars generally will be longer, lower, sportier — and priced \$100 or so higher.

Most major styling changes in 1968 models will be on the intermediate models. Newsweek Magazine disclosed Sunday. Supporting this contention was Robert W. Irvin, Detroit News automotive writer, who reported that "generally, standard-sized cars will get face lifts."

The magazine said standardized Chevrolet, Ford and Mercury will reflect few changes from the 1967 models.

Newsweek said additional safety equipment and exhaust pollution control devices, required by the government, plus increased costs of labor and materials indicate "the average price increase on '68 models is almost certain to total \$125."

Estimates of a \$60 price hike for next year "sound low and \$100 seems entirely possible,"

said Victor G. Raviolo, American Motors Corp. group vice president for automotive products.

Stuart Perkins, president of Volkswagen of America Inc., said, "by doing simple arithmetic you can see that the costs of the air pollution control system, more seat belts and other things are pushing close to a \$100 price increase."

Chevrolet's rear-engine Jet-vair, "despite rumors to the contrary, will remain very much in the GM lineup," Newsweek said.

The magazine said American Motors will build two new cars, the Javelin, a four-passenger sports car priced at about \$2,400, and a two-passenger Fastback sports car patterned after its AMX "idea car."

The published reports say Lincoln will produce a new model. Terming it a "baby Lincoln," Newsweek said the car

When It Began?

The anguish being suffered over the American involvement in Vietnam has prompted many thoughtful people to question the wisdom of the policy.

An article in the current issue of the Princeton University Quarterly offers a rather credible timing of such a first season.

The article relates how, after the Geneva Conference of 1954 had ended the struggle between the Vietnamese and the French and set out a formula for the future unification of the country.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles who held off from accepting the Geneva Accords had to provide the end of the story, and who initiated a mission which was undertaken in November, 1954, by Gen. Paul H. Gillmore, retired Army chief of staff, to see "whether a viable military position could be created in South Vietnam."

Apparently as a result of the Collins survey, and the Dulles determination, the United States, in February of 1955 sent into South Vietnam a "United States military advisory group which took over the training of South Vietnamese forces. This was, of course, the first step in the chain of events which now sees nearly half a million Americans in uniform in South Vietnam."

It was apparently part of this same crucial decision that, in the same year, we advised South Vietnam against complying with the Geneva Accords, and that we provided for elections that year in both North and South Vietnam for the purpose of uniting the country.

Former President Eisenhower frequently disclosed that we advised against holding the elections because we were fairly certain our friends would lose them.

That, then, would seem as good a point as any to fix the first violation of the Geneva Accords, and the beginning of our involvement in Vietnam.

It is interesting to note that we have clashed with previously known instincts and policies of the late Mr. Dulles to credit him with providing the main inspiration for what we did in 1954, in the Eisenhower administration.

Senator Brooke's Decision There are many interesting aspects to Senator Brooke's change of heart in Vietnam. There is, obviously, the strong additional support it brings to the Senator's new position.

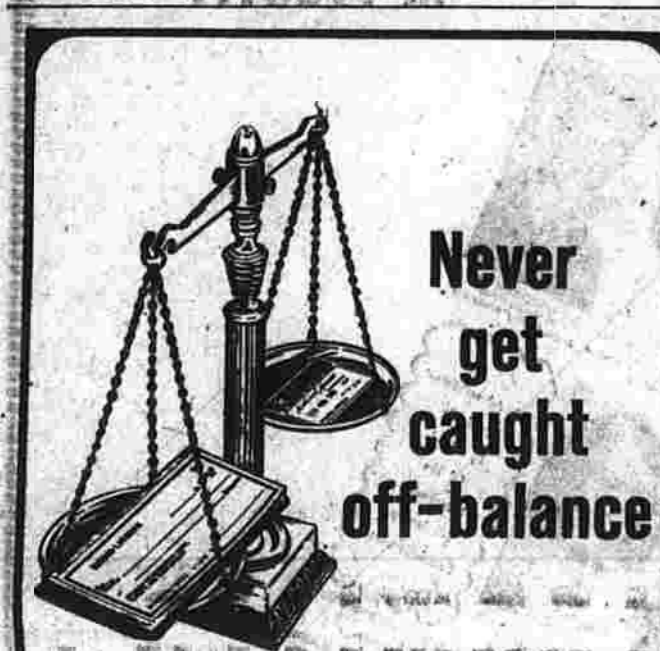

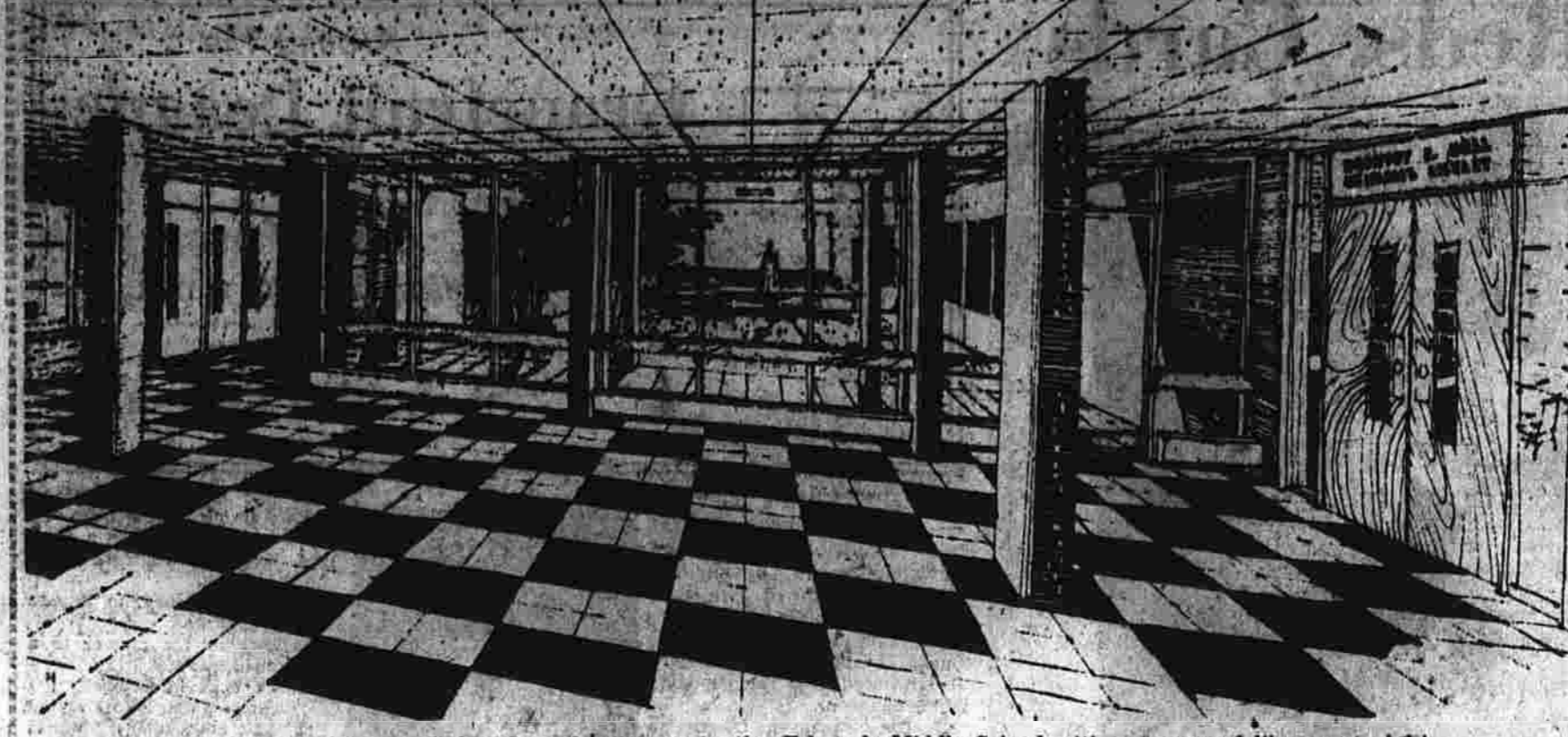

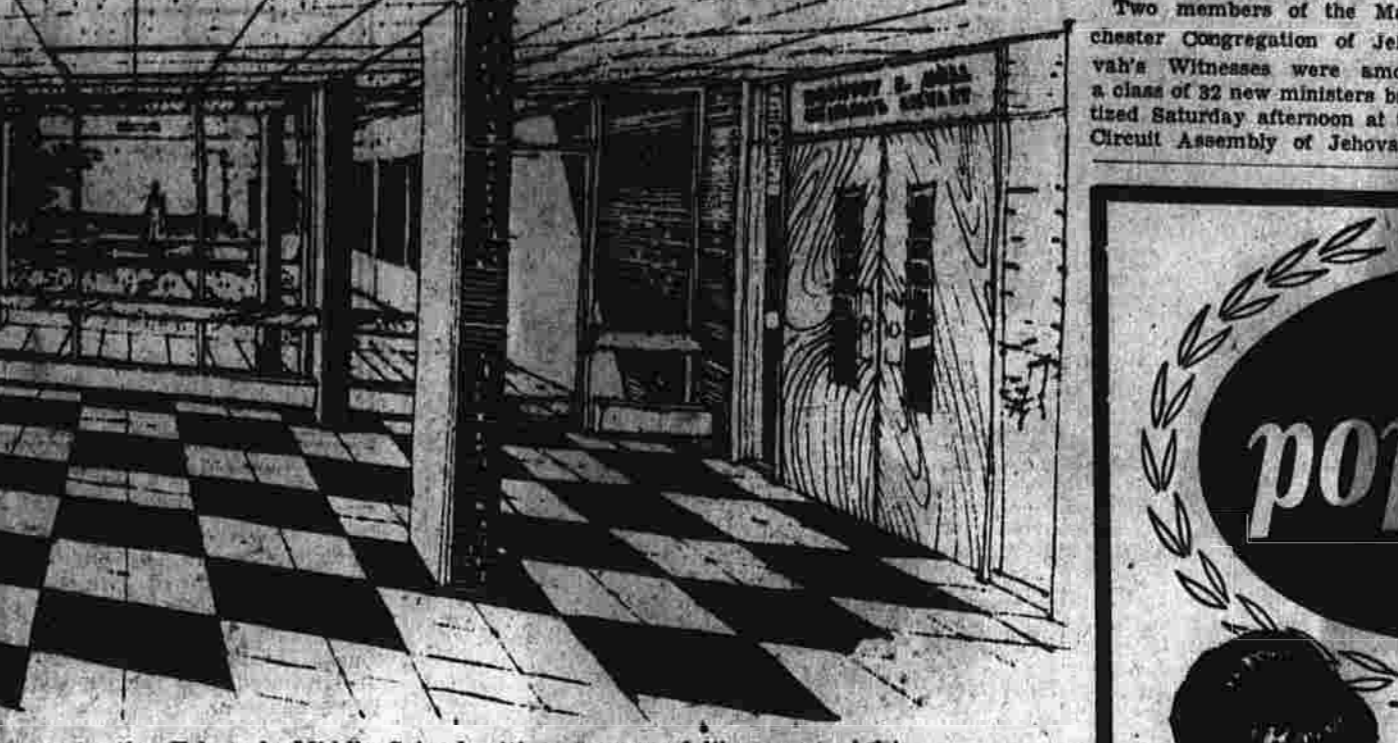
