Mediation April 14 In Salary Dispute

Mediation of the Manchester Education Association Board of Education dispute on salaries and a contract has been slated for Friday, April 14, at 5 p.m. in the State Department of Education offices in Hartford, the board learned at last night's session.

The MEA last week had submitted a letter to state Commissioner of Education William F. Sanders asking the department to intervene in the impasse which has stalled contract negotiations for the second straight year.

The MEA wants to mediate the question of whether the board should be bound now to a firm teachers' salary schedule and other salary items in advance of establishment of the school budget by the directors on May 6.

The third question relates to health and medical insurance benefits. General Manager Robert Weiss has recommended placing the cost of the insurance (currently paid by the town) back into the school budget so it will reflect there.

If the school board decides to pay teachers the same benefits being proposed for other town employees, the insurance will cost an estimated \$14,000.

The MEA is disputing a board suggestion that teachers should absorb part of the insurance cost by setting for salary hikes less than the \$24,000 agreed to pay teachers the same benefits being proposed for other town employees.

Announcement of the mediation dates and ground rules was made by school Superintendent William Curtis, who said he had conferred with state department representatives yesterday.

In an effort to expedite the talks, he said, the department's representative, Dr. Raymond Fay and Kenneth Lundy, have suggested that each side send a maximum of four spokesmen to the meeting.

Board chairman John Rotunno, who has his displeasure at the limitation which will prevent the four board representatives from taking action at the session but other members had no comment on the rules.

He heard unanimously voted to designate Rotunno, Supt. Curtis, Atty. Thomas Bailey and Walter Doll as representatives. Bailey and Doll are chairmen of the finance and personnel committees, respectively.

One additional factor to be considered, said Atty. Bailey, is that other town employees don't have the benefits being recommended by the management.

In answer to a question, Rotunno, Miss Martha White, co-chairman of the MEA negotiating team, admitted the MEA delegates (not yet announced) would have no authority to act either, until they received instructions from the full membership.

Her reply prompted the salary report from Rotunno: "I don't take kindly to this mediation at all. If we have nothing to negotiate, we'll just be wasting our time."

Sale of Olcott Land Approved by Planners

The Town Planning Commission last night voted to approve the sale of an eight-acre tract recently zoned industrial at Olcott St. and Love Lane, but suggested many stipulations and covenants as to how the land may be sold.

Since it is town-owned land, the covenants could be enforced through the deed on the land to control proper development of the parcel.

Some opposition to this action was expressed in a petition signed by residents of the Verplanck School area, and the Board of Education had expressed disapproval at a public hearing since the area is close to Verplanck School.

In other action, preliminary approval was given for a 1.6-acre subdivision off Bush Hill Rd., opposite Ball St., and for a 2.6-acre subdivision off Lakewood Circle N., a request made by Robert Weiss, town manager.

A public hearing was held on the Bush Hill Rd. and Lakewood Circle matters, but no opposition was expressed. Final approval has yet to be given.

A proposed change on an interior parcel of land off Spencer St. from Rural Residence to Industrial Zone was turned down. This is also town-owned land and some indications had been made that future use of it would have been for the parking of garbage trucks.

Preliminary approval was also given to a 3.6-acre subdivision off Bush Hill Rd., about 600 feet east of Hilltown Rd. The application was made by Arlene Noah.

Strong controls were urged by Town Planner Joseph Tamasky on approval for the sale of the town-owned Olcott St. land. Tamasky informed the TPC members that no buyer has shown an interest.

Now that the TPC has approved the matter, control over development of it will rest with the Board of Directors, Tamasky said.

He proposed that such control as the basic use of the land, bulk and height of the buildings, signs in the area, parking, landscaping, and time period for building all be included in the deed, which may, in the future, pass the land to new owners.

An outline of the parcel, the town itself can review the covenants, he said, though as covenants are added, the value of the land decreases proportionately.

Tamasky said that a policy for requiring sidewalks could be established, but this would have to be based on the necessity for them according to how much traffic would be on the street and how much of a safety hazard the lack of a sidewalk presented.

No requirement for sidewalks was stipulated with the preliminary approval of the Holcomb Empire Tool Co., looking for subdivision.

In the last 20 years, while mail volume has doubled, the number of mail-carrying trains has declined from 10,000 to 800.

But most domestic mail still moves by rail and Hartigan says laws favoring the railroad may hamper the flexibility needed to change the system.

Use of the mails has reached staggering proportions in the United States. An estimated 60 million pieces will course through the system this year, more than is handled by the rest of the world's post offices combined. Four of five pieces are business mail.

Critics like to point to the quicker mail service available in most other countries, but the enormity of the U.S. volume and the distances it has to be delivered make comparison invalid.

In Great Britain, a total volume last year was 11 billion pieces, or 1.5 billion in excess of the U.S. volume.

Four U.S. cities—New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and Washington—match the total British volume.

Nearly every other country combines its postal services with other operations. O'Brien looked at the European systems last fall and may have gotten the idea for a public corporation.

8 Students, Adviser Die in Cornell Blaze

Many Flee Building on Sheet Ropes

ITHACA, N. Y. (AP)—Nine persons—eight students and a faculty adviser—died today in a smoky fire that swept a Cornell University residence hall in the pre-dawn hours.

Eleven other persons, eight of them Cornell students, suffered from smoke inhalation but none was considered in serious condition.

Among the dead students were three who were taking over a six-year experimental course for top-ranked freshmen seeking associate degrees.

A university spokesman said the two-story, cinder-block building on the edge of the city campus housed 71 persons, including 49 in the experimental program.

The cause of the fire was not determined. Firemen said it apparently began in the basement.

The bodies were discovered in hallways, rooms and in the lobby.

Shells dangling from modern, horizontal paneled windows indicated an escape route used by more than a score of the students.

A policeman among the first on the scene told a newsman there was no viable route from the building but "people were hanging out of all the windows."

University President James B. Zerkline was in Paris when informed of the tragedy.

Grant Leads Republicans To Victory in Vernon Vote

On what appeared to be a consolidation backlash, John E. Grant led the Republican party to victory in town elections yesterday.

Grant defeated Peter Humphry, Democrat, for the mayoral seat by a total of 4,172 to 2,711 votes or more than 400 votes townwide.

Grant even took what was supposed to be a Democratic stronghold, the old city of Rockville, by 1,494 to 1,898 votes.

The new government will take over on April 15.

Yotes approved six large elections in the future in one of the three questions on the ballot. But a proposal to abolish the annual town budget meeting was overwhelmingly defeated.

Democrats, it appears, stayed away from the polls in large numbers. Nearly 500 registered Democrats in the city, it was reported, did not show up out of more than 1,400 eligibles.

Republicans took over the Board of Education and the Board of Selectmen. But the 6-6 split in the Board of Representatives was decided by the presiding mayor who cast the tie-breaking vote.

Control of the Board of Education is now clearly Republican as the content of the board switched from 6 Democrats to 4 Republicans.

Both Republican candidates, Charles O'Flinn and Joseph Powers were put on the board by the voters along with Mrs. Marie Herbet, Democrat. They replace Democrats Peter Humphry and Dr. Robert Giacomoni and Republican Arthur Calahan.

Powers was the highest voter on the slate topping even Grant with 3,185 votes.

The most surprising thing the voters did was in the city vote.

Record Viet Cong Defections Bared

SIGON (AP)—An all-time larger enemy unit of about 40,000 Viet Cong deserted from the two U.S. soldiers, with the help from the rest of their regiment, to join the Viet Cong in a surprise attack 80 miles south of Saigon.

The record surge of defections west of the coastal city of Saigon was nearly double the previous high, a U.S. spokesman said, recorded at 22,817 Viet Cong who deserted in February under the ported killing 33 Viet Cong in South Vietnamese government's open arms program.

The U.S. Air Force charged that ground fire from the middle of a North Vietnamese village, Thunderbolt Sunday. The loss of the plane, the 30th downed over North Vietnam in the war, had been announced Tuesday.

The following Air Force announcement, apparently, was intended to show that the Communists position some of their scattered commands in the mountainous and populated areas and that civilian casualties therefore cannot be avoided.

The ground fire from the middle of the village was reported by the U.S. pilot flying wingman for the Thunderbolt that was shot down. Repeated attempts to return the plane to its base were unsuccessful.

LBJ Asks Postal Pay Increase

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Lyndon B. Johnson today asked Congress to raise postal rates to \$60 million and for a three-year pay increase of some \$4.5 billion for all federal employees and members of the armed forces.

In a special message, Johnson recommended that the cost of mailing letters be increased by 2 cents. The change for first-class mail would go to 6 cents and an air mail stamp would cost 9 cents.

The President also called for increases in all other postal rates.

Johnson proposed that the government's 2.5 million civilian employees, and members of the armed forces, be given an average pay increase of 6.6 percent effective Oct. 1.

In addition, he called for further increases on Oct. 1, 1968, and Oct. 1, 1969, for civilian workers.

Johnson said that would make federal salaries, compared with those in private industry, and "with a similar increase for the armed forces, the cost would be more than \$4.5 billion per year."
