





Our world is crowded-the world of our fancy that is—with all kinds wonderful things that have been invented, designed, discovered, announced, and pronounced potentially practical but which have never actually arrived on the scene for actual hu-

man sight and experience. These include the truly economical common sense, safe minimum transportation automobile, the ideal high speed train, the one-design, all purpos school building, the one-garment clothing, and, of course, the truly modern mode of construction.

We have read or heard about them all, and seen none of them. Now we hear of one more, and guess even as we read about it, that it may be another thing we will never see. But it's an appealing thing to have around, even in the imagination.

It is a new formula for making buildings. You take a certain plastic material, cut it into the shapes and dimensions you want the building to be, sew the material together into an air-tight arrangement, pump air pressure into it until it stands erect in the sunlight, and then wait for a certain period of time, depending on the size of the building, for the sun's rays to harden the plastic into a rigid surface that won't burn and

it would take metal to cut. By this process you can build a building that is half a mile in diameter and would take eight or ten days to dry in the sun, and would cost about \$2 or \$3 a square foot, which is somewhat eco-

We think we will start with one of the half-mile domes. We can see such stately pleasure domes rising all over the landscape, confusing, no end, those long-lensed characters up on Mars.
