The Apollo Findings

Until one tragic 20 seconds last Jan. 27, this nation had been preening itself on the extraordinary and almost unbelevable combination of skill and luck which had made possible the accumulation of so many space flight hours without loss of an astronaut. The infinitely complicated mechanisms and systems of our rockets and space craft had somehow been fashioned and operated with such amazing forethought and efficiency that we had escaped what would seem to be the tragedy almost inevitable in any great mortal pioneering project, let alone pioneering in space. On Jan. 27 the long technological, the long human honeymoon ended, as it was

certain to end some tragic day. And now, in the report of the review board set up to investigate the fire inside Apollo which took the lives of Astronauts Virgil Grissom, Edward H. White and Roger Chaffee, we have, in startling contrast to our earlier pride and assurance, discoveries which seem to say that we had hardly been doing anything right, even during the period of our unblighted successes. Where once everything was miraculously right, now everything is shock-

ingly wrong . This is the way all searchlights operate, before and after tragedy. And one insight into the nature of the operation of the post-tragedy searchlight is that although it finds an almost endless list of imperfections which "could" have caused the tragedy of Jan. 27, it admits that "no single ignition source of the fire was conclusively identified," and that it identifies the "probable" responsibility of a faulty electrical wire only because the fire did

occur and did apparently start in a certain location in the capsule. So, for the future, the effort will have to be toward protection against all the many things which might possibly have caused trouble this time, because, even though none of them happened to blight the success of our previous record in space, any one of them could be the

cause of tragedy some next time. This will mean not only worry and work, but delay in the business of reaching the moon. But there has never been any real hurry about something once that it has been shown that it is going to be an inevitability. We will still get to the moon in time to do whatever it is we are going to do when we get there. Meanwhile, we will be doing things which will increase the safety factor in all space travel.

The Vision Gap

Correspondent Henry Tanner of the New York Times quotes various European diplomats as hoping that Vice President Humphrey didn't mistake the diplomatic courtesy he encountered in the various capitals of Europe for any real narrowing of the gap between European thought and the United States. "It's not Hubert's fault," he quoted one of these diplomats, "that the Atlantic is wider than ever."

There's some indication, too, that, for all his breezy, bouncy personality, the Vice President failed to penetrate European thinking and feeling deeply enough to realize how wide the gap is, and how little mere words can do to close it. He did know what causes the gap, as he demonstrated by talking about it at

every stop. He could feel the war in Vietnam in between Europe and ourselves. But, from the nature of his verbal efforts to deal with this divisive agent, it can be guessed that he never really came close to the kind of thinking, and talking, and reasoning, which might have at least have won him respect for intelligence as well as for After all, we human beings have been

inhabiting this earth as conscious, thinking beings for a few thousand years, and been organizing ourselves into nation forms for much of that time, and we have not yet, in either capacity, besome very proficient at seeing ourselves as others see us.

This is the one thing we have never managed, or even tried, with regard to the war in Vietnam. We have never yet tried the simplest

formula for looking at ourselves in Vietmam as others might look at us there. That simplest fgormula would be for as to imagine that some other nationBritain, France, Australia, Italy, Germany, Belgium, The Netherlands, Portugal, was in Vietnam doing what we are doing in Vietnam. What speeches, editorials, resolutions we would be having then! With what thundering idealsm would we be demanding that the outside nation involved submit itself to the jurisdiction of the United Nations! How we would be warning against the perils of neo-colonialism in Asia! How we would weep for the victims of the combings and the napaim! How we would scoff at the claim that anything like this was necessary in order to halt the tide of Communism! How we would scorn the theory that, all other Western powers having finally got out of Asia, one single Western power had somehow inherited the right to proclaim itself a sphere of influence there!

If Vice President Humphrey really wants to understand how some people in other countries may be thinking about us we suggest that he try the imaginary feat of substituting, in all the headlines and stories from Vietnam for a day or two the name of some other nation and nationality wherever the words United States and American now appear in such news. It is not a very pleasant

Last Of The Old-Time Successes? We read that Charles Luce, who is leaving his post as Undersecretary of the Interior to become chairman of New York's Consolidated Edison Co., began his career as a meter reader.

This, we suspect, is one of the very last "who was once a" touches we are going to find in the biographical sketches of noted successes in the world of

Soon, for one reason or another, there will no longer be any meter readers to rise to be heads of multi-millioned great public utilities. There hasn't been a single outstanding company president in this present generation who "began as an office boy," and that is simply because the office boy went out as an institution, even a mythical one, too many

The ranks of future famous Americans are also depleted, by this time, of any such thing as a "one time shoe shine boy." Whoever is going to rise has been de-

prived of a number of other familiar

starting points. Farms are so mechanized there's hardly room for more than one farm boy to a quarter section. In stead of becoming apprentices, people go to college and get degrees and then start out at the top of their chosen professions. At the rate the technology of printing is progressing, the publishers of the future will have to reach their exalted positions without being able to claim they were once a printer's devil. And it is a very lucky thing that modern technology has been so very good at eliminating such historic positions in the economic structure. For there has been a steady decline in the willingness of human beings to start at the bottom and work their way up. The evalent instinct today is for the young beginner to demand instant success, and to marry the girl of his own choice first, so that he isn't even eligible to marry the boss's daughter, which was, in more primitive times, another celebrated way to get to be chairman of

Consolidated Edison may have got itself a real prize—the last of the oldfashioned successes.


Census Beyond Head Counting We have held our peace up to this point on the mail-out-mail-back census test in New Haven-because we did not want the Commerce Dept. bureaucracy complaining that we had jeopardized an important experiment before it was completed.

Now that the Wednesday mailing date is safely past, though, we'd like to join those many New Haveners who have wondered at the nature of some the questions. As the New Haven Civil Liberties Council has pointed out, the census role in the past has always been a statistical role. In the "longform" questionnaires which were randomly distributed in this city, there has been a switch from the statistical to the specific and personal.

Names, addresses, and telephone numbers are repeatedly asked for sometimes over and over again in the same household. In addition-and equally eyebrow-raising in its departure from east practice—the signer of the multiform census sheets is asked to give some information about the income and other experiences of people residing in

the same dwelling. The Census Bureau assures us that the law prevents any other government agency or public official from using this identifiable data. But this is the age of the government wire tap, for better or or worse-and we wonder whether Big Brother will really have the guts to ourn his voluninous dossier once all the figures have been fed into computers. The danger as we see it is not in the present experiment with a sample mailing in a series of sample cities. The danger is with the extension to the entire country of this principle of identification "so we can check back." Before this concept of a census by mail was launched there was-as a result of public protest — some elimination of questions about religion. Now that the concept is being tested, it seems to us that there are still areas for improvement, and protection of privacy, in a process which leaves the cooperating citizen with a feeling that he has been called upon to report by name, number, and signature to an agency that has

heretofore done quite well with anonymous head-counting. We'd like to see Senators Ribicoff and Dodd and Congressmen Giaimo and Monagan join with the general citizenry of the New Haven area in reviewing not only the mail results but the whole method of this census. It raises questions-some of them more pertinent to the country's good than to the mere convenience of the census takers. -NEW HAVEN REGISTER

new state Constitution means anything, this is the next to the last session in which the principle can be easily sidesteppe Article Tenth says that "After July 1, 1969, the genera assembly shall enact no special legislation relative to the powers, organization, terms of elective offices or form of government of any single town, ity or borough." Second, the present session of

the General Assembly has a big Democratic steamroller contro of both houses, so that it can enact at will measures requested by the Democratic cities. In the past, divided political control has operated to hold up and slow down and reduce the amount of special local legislation that could be bargained for and passed. Third,-and this, we suspect,
