Income of Probate Judges Not Always Tied to Volume

HARTFORD (AP) — Not in accordance with the volume of the state's probate judges are not always directly related to the total wealth of estates probated by the court. This is made evident in figures released Monday by Secretary of State Ella T. Grasso. The figures showed that the Hartford Probate Court probated estates worth \$26,024 in 1966 to lead all other probate courts in the state in gross income. While that court posted the highest gross, Judge James H. Kneisel was sixth among probate judges in net income, which totaled \$20,865.

According to the figure, the highest net income went to Waterbury Probate Judge James R. Leaver, who reported an income of \$2,179 based on his court's gross income of \$77,394. Next on the income scale was Groesbeek Probate Judge L. Paul Burke who netted \$26,500 based on a gross income of \$90,778.

Other probate judges topping the \$20,000 mark were: Hartford Judge James H. Kneisel with a net income of \$20,865; New Haven Judge Charles Henschel who received \$20,414 out of a gross income of \$59,849; Fairfield Judge John T. Fitzpatrick, \$20,780; Middletown Judge Stephen S. Greer, \$20,268; and Westport Judge Earl H. Jackson, \$20,177.

State to Ban Parking East To Town Line

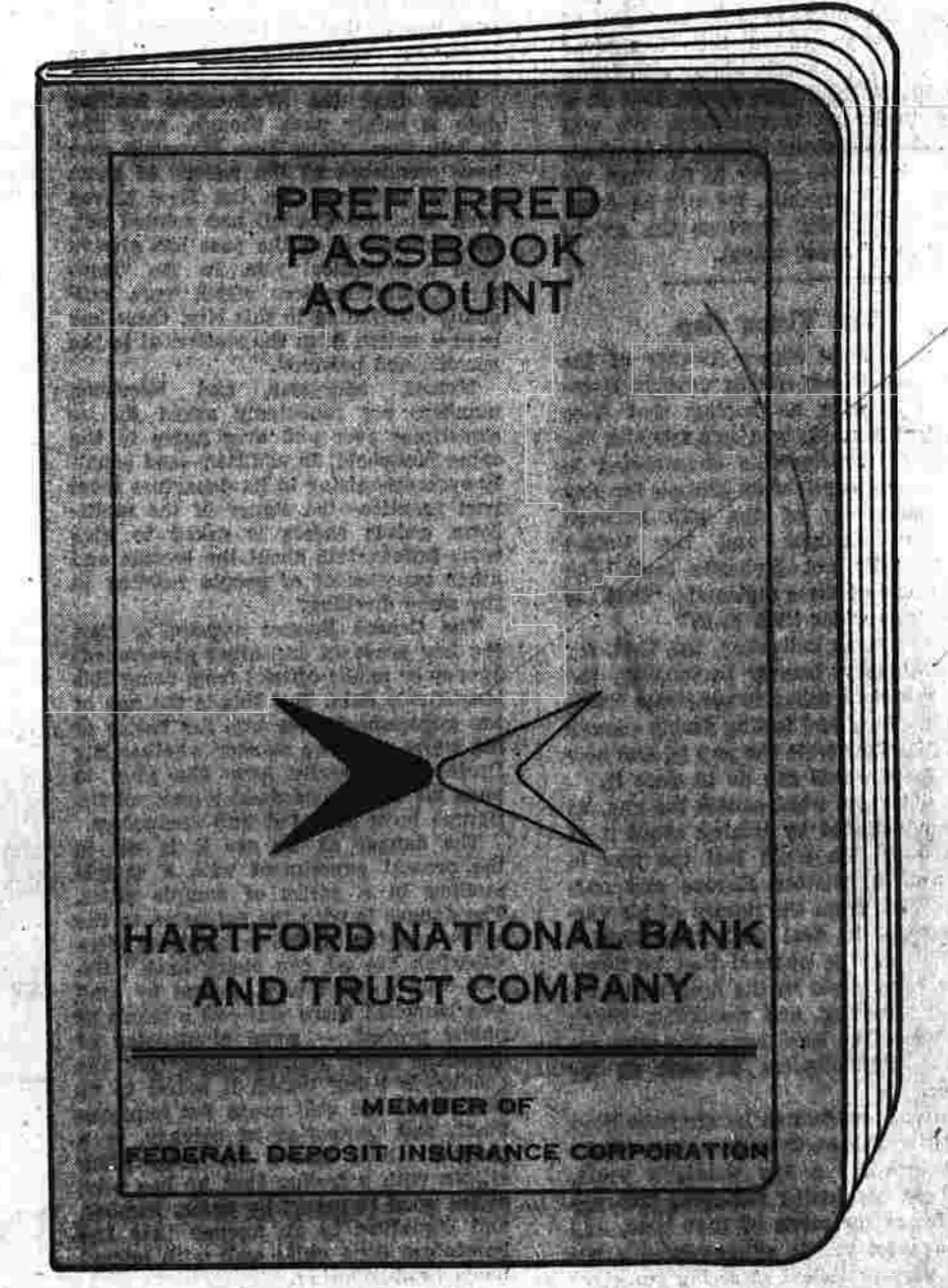

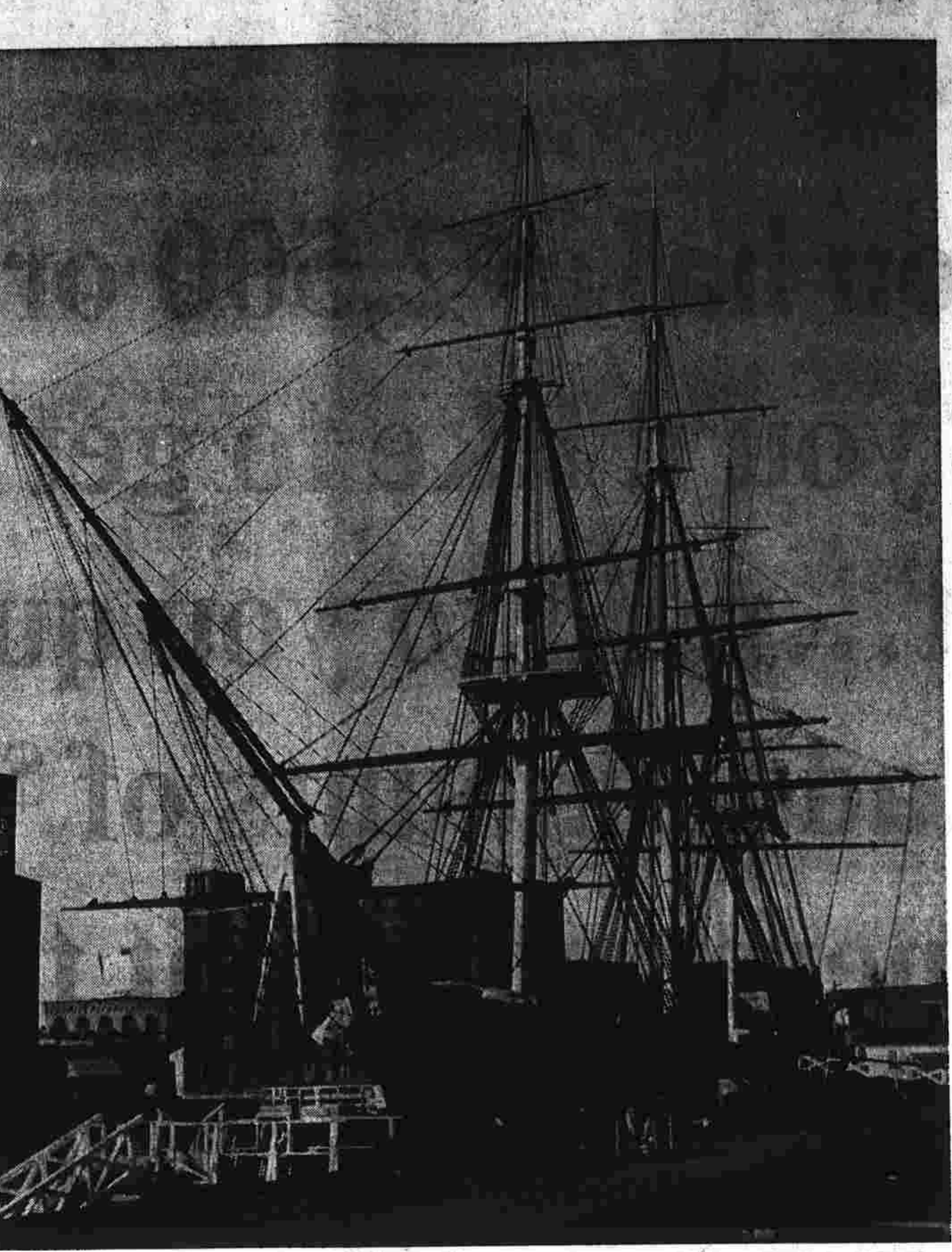

WASHINGTON—In the shadow of the United States Capitol stands physical evidence of how militants in the civil rights movement can sometimes shatter their own dreams. This is the tragedy of Southwest Washington, which once gave promise of becoming an oasis of true racial integration of the schools in a city where—as in other major cities—fact segregation is the rule.

How that dream was shattered is worthy of study, because it indicates how difficult it is to achieve racial integration in the present mood of the civil rights movement. Southwest Washington, for decades a pestiferous slum, was raised by urban renewal bulldozers 10 years ago and replaced by high-rise middle-class housing (town houses and apartments) and subsidized public housing. Suburbanites streamed back into the city to live in Southwest, both for convenience and for something more intangible: A model, racially-integrated community. This was to be one part of Washington not ghettoized by race, with quality, integrated

Connecticut Yankee

After having spent the greater part of two decades fighting for adoption of the principle of home rule, its cities and towns, Connecticut, in the current actions of its General Assembly, is busy finishing the principle down the drain. To recapitulate briefly, the two-decade-long drive for home rule has been based on two concepts—the first the clean principle that the voters of individual cities and towns ought to have the right to decide their own affairs without having them manipulated and managed by the processes of state politics at Hartford—the second, the practical consideration that the General Assembly itself was being needlessly burdened by the demands of relatively petty problems communities ought to be able to resolve for themselves.

The reasons for what is apparently going to be this session's outrageous evasion of the home rule principle are several in number. First, the new state Constitution means anything, this is the next to the last Edition of the Constitution which can be easily sidestepped. Article Tenth says that "After July 1 in the general election, the voters shall elect no special legislation, relative to the powers, organization, terms of office or form of government of any single town, city or borough." Second, the present session of the General Assembly has a big Democratic steamroller control of both houses, so that it can enact at will measures requested by the Democratic cities. In the past, divided political control has operated to hold up and slow down and reduce the amount of special legislation that could be bargained for and passed.

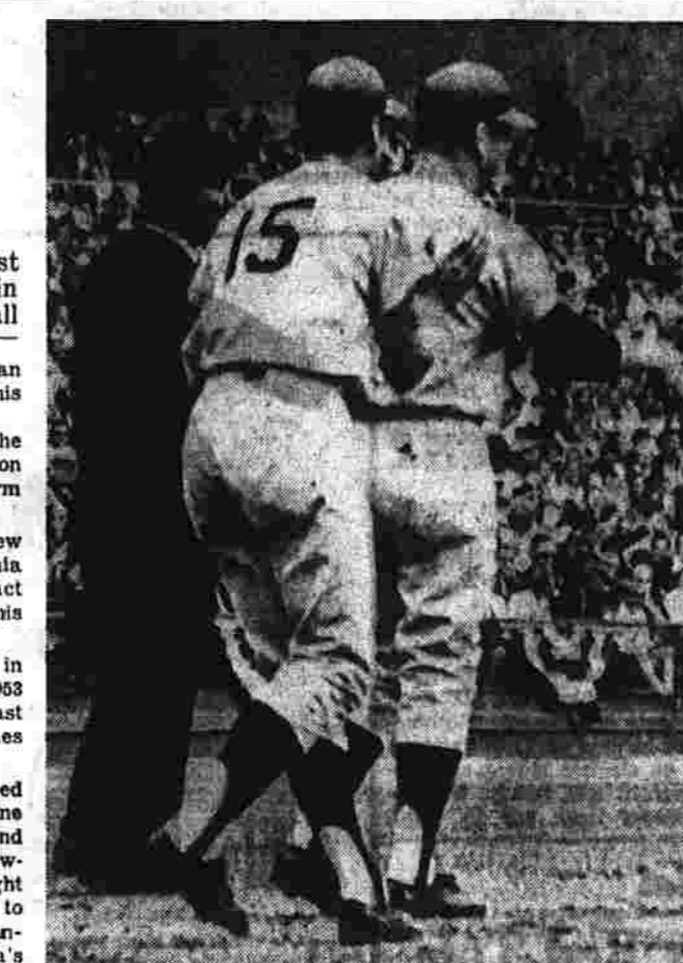
