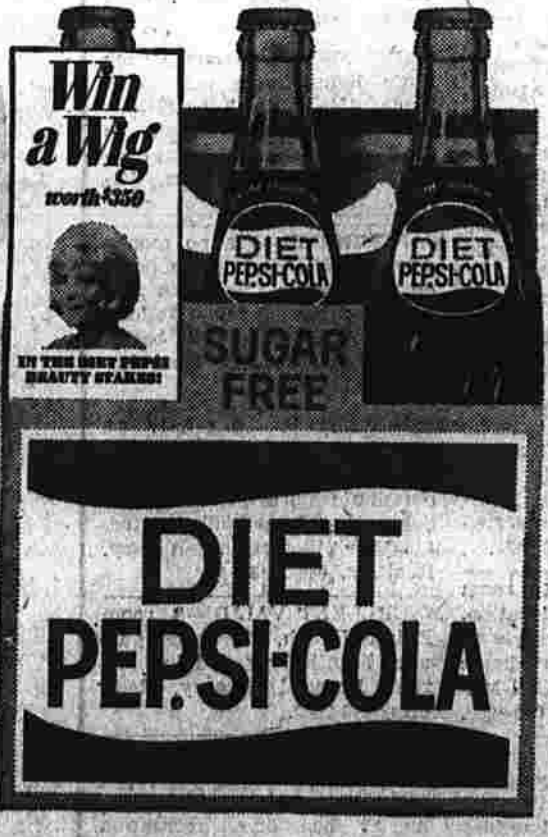

Russian Compares Life in Two Lands

A 36-year-old member of the United Nations, a native of Ukraine, U.S.S.R., spoke to a group of students and the public last night at Manchester High School. His visit was arranged by the Manchester Community College.

The talk, which lasted more than 90 minutes, involved more than 80 minutes of questions thrown at him by some 50 persons who attended. The questions dealt with everything—including Soviet foreign policy, the rift between Russia and China, Stalin's recently deified daughter, the basic differences between the economic systems of the United States and Russia, and the similarities found between the peoples of the two nations.

Some of the questions "the slammed back, some he batted, and others he fumbled off. His reply was quick and accurate.

Mikhail (Michael) Belousov, a member of the U.N. Secretariat, said he took the day off from work to visit Manchester at the invitation of Nicholas Costa, director of the student activity at the Community College. He had permission of his superior—the U.N.—to make the trip, and said he would make up the day by working on Saturday.

The visit was personal, he said. The answers he gave were also personal and expressed his opinion as he saw things. He was not a spokesman for Russia or representing the U.N. in an official capacity, he said.

On his tour of Manchester, he took the students to the school, to the Kiwanis in the afternoon, and later to the assembly at the Community College.

At the Kiwanis gathering, in response to a question, he said that Russia is an incentive in Russia and that people there have two other incentives—moral and money incentives. The question had been asked: "What are the incentives of the Russians?"

He elaborated on this at the Manchester High School. He said, he said, the difference between the economic systems of the U. S. and Russia is the fact that the means of production is not owned privately. The Communist government owns property and controls production, he said. The profit motive is not prevalent, and neither is economic competition, he said.

But there are "material incentives," he said. Persons can own material goods and are given those as bonuses of money for working ability. He said, he said, also numerous American papers. He calls himself "a civil servant of the U.N."

"Did the taking over of the Ukraine by the Russians hamper the economic development of the nation?" asked patrolman

Joseph Brooks, an MCC student, "No," replied Belousov. He said that under Russian rule such industries as the chemical and metallurgical expanded. Under the Communist regime, about 50 years before, the country had been suppressed, he said.

But free enterprise does not flourish in the economy of the country. Though government controls have been lessened, a person with farm goods to sell must still get permission from town officials before he can freely put his produce on the open market. The farmland is still owned and controlled by the government, he said.

In response to the question by Brooks, on a TV show which was recently shown on life in Russia, which both Brooks and Belousov saw, he said Russia is not becoming "more capitalist" and defied the term. He said the TV show was not accurate in use of some terms.

The government controls on profit making, which is a crime in Russia, are becoming less stringent, he said. After answering Brooks' question at great length, he said, "If you call it material incentive."

Belousov is a linguist, speaking several languages. He spoke English with a distinct accent. But his vocabulary is extensive, and he uses off some heavily accented words such as "manifestation, phenomena, suppression and achievements."

Question: "How does the standard of living compare to that of the U.S.?"

Answer: Goods in America are more plentiful, the shop windows have a greater variety of goods. There are many more cars in the United States than in Russia.

Question: "Is there anything in your culture that we have?"

Answer: Yes. It is financed by the government, but "not all kinds of art are financially successful."

Question: "Is there any law in the constitution of Russia which keeps a person from emigrating?"

Answer: No, not in the constitution. If a person wanted to go to New Zealand because he liked palm trees, he could state his arguments to officials. A group would put on a play, B-

Tolland County Provisions of Pollution Bill Outlined by GOP Legislator

The problems which will be faced by industries and individuals in meeting requirements of new water pollution legislation were outlined by State Rep. Robert D. King of Tolland County (Tolland, Ellington) and Somers) at a public hearing.

The House passed the measure, Substitute HB2417, yesterday by a vote of 198-8. The bill incorporates recommendations of the Governor's Clean Water Task Force, a bipartisan committee of 100 citizens appointed in 1965 by Gov. John Dempsey.

Terms of the bill "become effective on passage" by the Legislature, King pointed out, noting that the bill has "teeth."

All sources of water including wells, ponds, brooks, streams, lakes, rivers and tidal waters are put in the category of a precious natural resource and come under the absolute control of the Water Resources Commission, he said.

Cities and municipalities will be required to treat all liquid waste to water purity standards have not been attained.

"Where there are no treatment plants or the existing facilities are inadequate, there will be only one answer — "Build!" King stated.

Industry, whether or not it is liquid waste disposal, "will be subject to the closest scrutiny being the largest single source of pollution of our waters," he predicted.

The definition of pollution in the bill that may prove troublesome to industry is in the treatment of water includes any "alteration of the physical, chemical or biological properties" and "change in color, odor, turbidity or taste" and "thermal effect" of waste discharge in any waters of the state.

"Industry will comply or be shut down by court order,"

Effects of Bill
"The bill is drastic in many of its implications," according to King. "It is tied, in many aspects to federal standards, and federal aid will be the basic definition of water purity, when it is written will be subject to federal approval, he said.

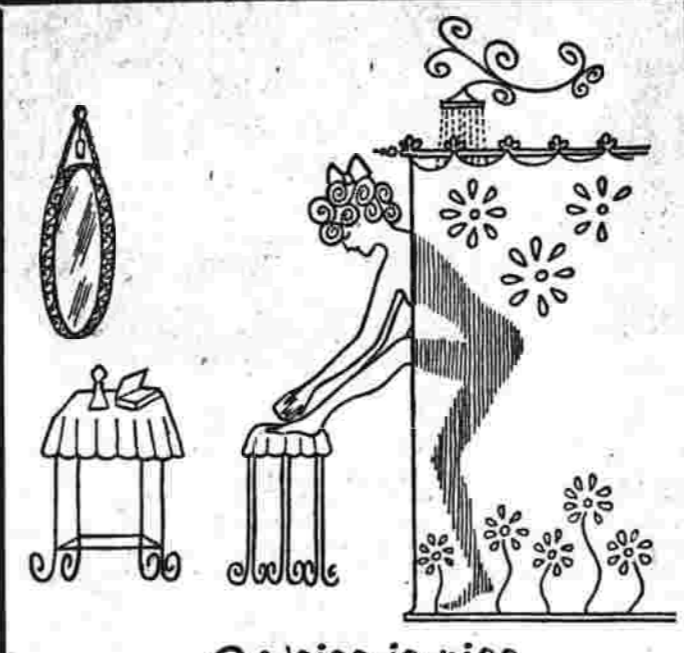
That the church was named in honor of St. Peter is only incidental. In 1782 the Rev. Tory wrote to a brother and sister here expressing solicitude for his slaves.

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The Making of A Tragedy?

The directors of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People...

We are not a peace organization nor a foreign policy organization. The N.A.A.C.P. remains committed to the primary goal of eliminating all forms of racial discrimination...

We are, of course, for a just peace. But there already exist dedicated organizations whose No. 1 task is to work for peace...

To try to merge the two jobs, the resolution went on, 'will serve the cause neither of civil rights nor of peace.'

It will be the instinct of most observers, we think, to applaud this resolution. But there is one view that Dr. King is making a mistake for himself and his race when he tries, from his civil rights position...

The truly absorbing question has to be, of course, why he should choose to take such a drastic risk with everything he has been building and working for.

We can suggest two answers, one big, one small, but both, perhaps, equally powerful in his emotions.

We suggest that it seems conceivable to Dr. King that there will be no world and no America fit to have civil rights in unless the war in Vietnam is stopped before it escalates further.

Perhaps, to put it another way, Dr. King has got himself into a state of mind and emotion in which he puts survival first and civil rights second. It is a sort of reverse twist, perhaps, on the normal attitude toward war.

The citizens of New Haven are willy nilly to be programmed along with all the details of their divorce decrees, tax statements, dog license numbers, and Johnson wants to keep it that way even if it means his

Other cities, including New York, have spent large sums on data processing by individual departments. But the New Haven project is the first attempt to coordinate all of a city's facts in a single information pool.

This is, one might say, another of those bits of human progress which mankind is always dealing out to itself as an accident to its effort to wage more efficient war. But to Dr. King it may seem transferable that the equality his people ought to be entitled to as a matter of course, as their birthright in this country, should come to them not as a result of his own crusading, but as a part of a special bargain designed to get them to fight well.

The Negro testimony that some of his people like the war because of the new status it offers them must seem to him a shameful kind of bargain, which he would like to have his people agree...

That would seem to us to be the second piece of motivation driving him. Where is it driving him? One cannot escape the feeling that he may be another of the great classic-style tragedians coming into the real living of our time and dwarfing, at last, the unimaginable weaknesses of all previous stage and story.

A Philosophy of Competition

If, in your surveillance of international sport competition, you think you have noticed an increase in the grimness of competition, along with a suggestion of a little less success for American competitors, you may find yourself drawn toward some of the philosophy about competition voiced by Andrew Mead Lawrence...

That's the way it has to be in the convoluted politics of a state trying to edge its way into a bi-racial society while no one is looking.

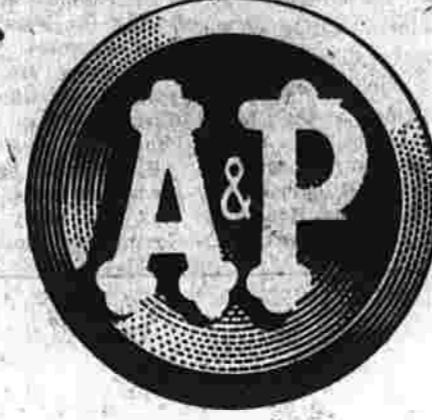

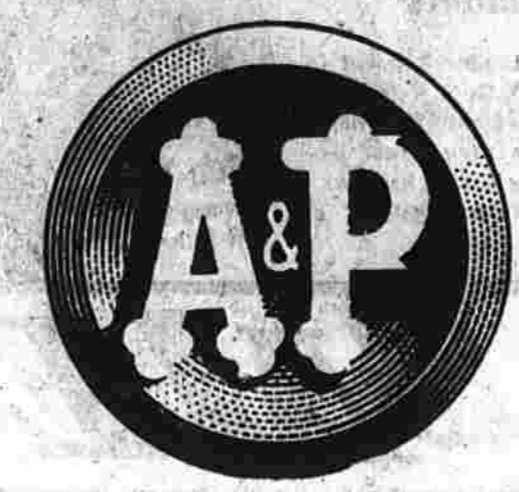

Under the procedure for adopting the budget, the superintendent presents a budget to the board of education for the cost of running the educational system for the coming fiscal year.
The board then considers the budget. Item by item, and makes any reductions or increases as they deem necessary. This budget, as approved by the board is then presented to the town council for their consideration. The council then can either make further reductions or present the board's figures at a public hearing.
As part of the public hearing, a straw vote is taken of those present to indicate the public's feeling on the total amount of the budget as presented. The council is not bound to abide by the results of the vote taken at the hearing, but the result is considered in further deliberations by the council on the budget.
The council then sets a total figure for the coming fiscal year. However, the specific allocations of funds for any item is left to the board. The council may make recommendations for specific amounts for specific items, however.
Snow Days
The length of the current school year came under discussion because of the number of snow days this winter. Superintendent Warner said he had received a second letter from Dr. Saunders, commissioner of education, indicating that the question is not settled. Dr. Saunders was to request the state board of education to set 178 days as the school year for the current year. However, the meeting where the request was to be presented did not have a quorum of board members so the matter was not considered. The calendar is still 180 days at this time.
Supt. Warner commented on conflicting opinions in the state education department on possible loss of state aid if 180 school days are not observed.
The two days that South Windsor is lacking would amount to approximately \$100 on last year's base figure, in loss of state funds.
Board member James Arnold questioned if the state board could control the state aid payment figures.
Supt. Warner said the state board cannot change the formula for state aid payment, but can change the number of days required in the state year.
It was noted by Lindsey Booth that towns in the state receive aid for the number of days they are in session including days over the required 180.
3 Days Allotted
A total of three days were allotted in the current calendar for snow days. A fourth day could be gained by holding school on June 21 which would extend the closing date by one day. However, Avery H. Elementary School, Orchard Hill, Pleasant Valley, Union and the morning session of Windham still have an additional day to make up to meet the 180-day requirement.
Postibilities available include time during the April vacation, Memorial Day or a Saturday morning session of Windham. Superintendent Warner said he will make a motion to make up the days for all schools except the kindergarten by holding school on June 21 and a Saturday to be recommended by the superintendent and approved by the board was tabled. The motion noted that this was of the state
