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Red Chinese Violinist Fled Homeland in Tug

NEW YORK (AP) — Chinese sources say that Ma Sun-gang, a cultural leader and violinist, fled his Communist homeland last January in a small tugboat later found abandoned near Hong Kong.

The musician, whose escape was revealed Wednesday after he and his family were granted asylum in the United States, refused to comment on the report from his refuge at his brother's Manhattan apartment.

The Hong Kong sources with Nationalist Chinese contacts said today Ma was one of 12 seamen aboard the Communist tug and added they believed his wife and two children were also on board.

Ma's wife and their daughter, Ma Hsiang, were understood to have taken a different route to freedom, according to the sources which refused to be quoted by name or position.

Ma told his own story in a dramatic fashion, saying he fled after spending "108 days in a dreadful fight for survival."

There are no towns and few villages in British, mountainous country between India and China. The country's 700,000 people center their lives around Buddhist monasteries, which rise castlelike from the hills.

Chicago Trucks Stay Idle; Tons of Goods Stacked Up

CHICAGO (AP) — Most of the nation's truck fleet rolled across the highways today after the end of a three-day lockout, but 60,000 Chicago drivers and dock workers remained off the job and turned back trucks from other ports.

As a result of the nationwide strike, halted most truck traffic in the city and turned back hundreds of trucks which had set out from other cities after the national settlement.

Some long-haul drivers turned back by pickets strived onto their home depots. Others telephoned their employers for instructions.

The strike also barred Chicago-based long-haul drivers from heading for out-of-state points.

Long-hauls from Denver and Indiana were among those being routed around Chicago to avoid local pickets.

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Two State Men Held in Mudup At Springfield

Police said three men took part in the hold-up. They said one of the three hid in an office, held a doctor at gunpoint and fled by a rear door—dropping two bags containing \$30,000 of the loot.

Police have not apprehended him.

'Greenbelts' Urged as Buffers to Urban Sprawl

The use of "greenbelts" as a means of controlling urban sprawl in the Capitol Region has been recommended by the Capitol Region Planning Agency in its proposed Open Space Plan.

The greenbelts are designed to meet the dual purposes of setting boundaries on the future development of urban centers and to meet the recreational needs of the region, now and in the future.

Four stretches of green land proposed for the region constitute the basis of a regional park system, considered of highest priority by the CRPA. Priority has been assigned to the expansion and protection of water based facilities.

The park system would encompass a full range of recreational opportunities extending from the most active forms such as swimming, boating, fishing, hunting as well as general sports to the most passive forms, including walking for pleasure, nature study and sight-seeing.

The creation of an extensive trail system for hiking, horseback riding and bicycling should also be of immediate consideration, according to the proposal. CRPA recommends the state assume the regional responsibilities for the provision of park and forest lands in the urbanized Capitol Region. It also recommends the appointment of a commission to study the feasibility of the multiple use of water supply resources.

Immediate efforts needed to create and preserve the proposed greenbelts are urgent, the CRPA maintains, due to the rapid growth of residential development in the area. Action must be taken, the CRPA says, to assure the permanent preservation of the substantial water company lands.

The expansion and development of existing state park and forest lands should be given particular attention because they presently comprise many scattered tracts of land, the plan states. The development of public recreation facilities and access to water bodies should also be carefully considered, it notes.

Establishing a regional park system will require increased cooperation between all levels of government and private interests. The use of various "open space reservation techniques" will be necessary, including the obtaining of conservation easements, covenants, tax abatement, zoning, gifts and public and private acquisitions.

The creation of the Eastern Highlands Greenbelt is of primary interest to the Manchester region. The large band of green land stretches through the towns of Manchester, Vernon, Bolton, Tolland, Hebron and a small portion of Andover.

Other towns included in the greenbelt are Ellington, Somers, Glastonbury and Marlborough. The Connecticut River Greenbelt will affect South Windsor and a small portion of Manchester on the western border. Standards used for the protection of regional open space lands call for the provision of 20 acres of federal or state reservations per 1,000 persons; municipal or regional reservations at 20 acres per 1,000 and public utilities and private reservations at 49 acres per 1,000. Additional flood plain zoning is recommended along all water courses when such regulations are warranted.

Development and locations for industrial and commercial centers are to be undertaken by local recreation commissions, according to report says. Increased public opinion is demanding the creation of trails for hiking, horseback riding and bicycle riding, according to reports. It will be warmer with afternoon temperatures climbing into the 60s.

In contrast a variety of weather exists across the nation. It is highlighted by a spring storm over the center of the nation. Heavy snows are reported in the southern Rockies with hazardous driving and cold wave warnings posted for portions of New Mexico. Meanwhile the cold high pressure system responsible for Connecticut's windy and unsettled weather of the past three days is presently moving off the Atlantic coast. Winds will swing into the southwest ushering in a rising temperature for the next few days.

Major stream fishing areas are located in Tolland, Andover and Hebron. Potential water oriented recreational sites are recommended for development in Manchester (2), Hebron, and Andover. Expansion of existing facilities in Manchester, Bolton, Vernon (2), and Tolland (2) are also recommended.

Recreational facilities. Special recreational facilities are recommended for location in Bolton and Ellington. Camping includes golf courses, hiking facilities and picnic grounds. The report notes that no camping facilities are available in the Capitol Region, although a minimum of 44 sites should presently be available according to minimum established standards. These should increase to a minimum of 80 to meet the future needs of the area.

Overnight camp sites are recommended for location in Tolland and Hebron. The importance of overnight camping for both mobile and tent increases with the prospects of the Connecticut River scenic area presently exists in the region, according to the CRPA report. Based on the provision of four acres per 1,000 residents, the area should have 2,500 acres of picnic areas at present, compared to only 500 now in existence. The projected picnicking needs will be 2,500 acres ultimately.

Proposed picnicking areas in the region are located in Tolland (2), Vernon and Manchester (2). Scenic Highways. New major highways need not be looked upon as "the scourge of the countryside" if they are designed and located around park lands and open spaces instead of through them," according to CRPA. Preserving the scenic views and essential character of the landscape and improvement of recreational opportunities for the traveler, is possible with a little planning, the report states. "The encroachment of unnecessary signs and billboards is prohibited," he said. If more consideration is given to scenic placement and natural surroundings the traveler will benefit and the public. Another proposed highway would be the most acceptable of construction of new major highways, CRPA points out. A portion of the Wilbur Cross Expressway in Hebron is described in the report as an existing scenic highway, although the rest of the highway is not. Proposed expressways in Manchester, Vernon and South Windsor have been designated as deserving special design treatment.

Two-Way Rule On Confessions?

We don't want to try to make a federal case of it. In fact, a mere recital of the factual sequence of the incidents, trials, convictions, acquittals, and reversals in the career of one George Whitmore Jr. of Brooklyn, N.Y., is all that is to be done and would seem merely to cause a confusion even then. One of the things in the record is that Whitmore confessed to, and was held for, the murder of Justice Wylie and Emily Hoffer, Manhattan career girls—a crime for which another man was later convicted.

Another thing in the Whitmore record is that he has twice been convicted of the same crime—the attempted rape of a Brooklyn practical nurse. He had to be convicted a second time because an appellate court held that, in the first trial, the jury had been misled.

What has happened lately in the Whitmore case is that his second conviction has now also been set aside.

It is the reason the Appellate Division of the New York State Supreme Court used for setting aside this second conviction which has some ironic interest at a time when the legal standing of various confessions is a matter of national interest and issue.

Normally, in these times, we hear of instances in which a conviction is thrown out because a confession obtained by the wrong police methods was used in obtaining it.

In this Whitmore case, the conviction here has been thrown out because the presiding judge in the lower court refused to let Whitmore's discredited confessions to various women be introduced as evidence. The poor presiding judge thought he was doing the right thing, in this case, by throwing out such questionable confessions. But he was thinking on the wrong level. In this particular, special instance, Whitmore's confessions were not an unfairly obtained indication of his guilt, but, by their high content of fraud, a sort of proof that he should never be trusted no matter how many crimes he might confess to. In this case, the defendant's confessions were an asset to the defense his lawyer was trying to make for him.

On the surface, this would almost make it seem that confessions are inadmissible when they may help prove a defendant's guilt, but compulsorily admissible if they may help him go free. We are sure this is not the real legal truth, but we have neither time nor the space to file a demurrer.

Are We Tired Of Selling Arms?
One could hope for the dawn of some new principle—but one guesses that perhaps only a question of tactics has actually been involved—in the State Department announcement that this country has terminated the sale of grant military weapons to India and Pakistan.

By its announcement, we will merely ally to these two countries, for cash, spare parts for weaponry they already possess.

If it has been a question of tactics which has influenced the State Department, the reasoning would go like this: We made a mistake in relying on Pakistan's member of two regional alliances we forged to contain Russia and China, not to start playing football with Communist China; we made a mistake in relying on India, the India of Gandhi and Nehru, to prove a pacifist and non-violent in its own quarrels as it has been with regard to our own.

We were embarrassed by both our mistakes when, in 1965, both India and Pakistan began using against each other the arms we had supplied them to use only against Communist China.

Perhaps we "new this only as a matter of bad calculation on our part. But perhaps, more hopefully, we are beginning to reassess, as a matter of principle, the way we have been setting ourselves up as armorer to the world.

Perhaps we have begun to conclude that for us to maintain a series of ill-arms races along with our own great

Federal action about Daylight Saving Time has accomplished more than we expected. The latest report is that only two states, Michigan and South Dakota, have taken the definite action required to exempt themselves from the new federal law about Time.

Michigan states definitely set to the contrary, it is now Daylight Saving Time everywhere from April 30, the last Sunday in April, to October 28, the last Sunday in October.

That is good. We would still amend it, so that it would start with the first Sunday in April rather than the last.

There's many a spring yard and garden, and many a spring game of golf, for that matter, that could benefit from having the mid-April sunset delayed until 7:30. On some nights it might feel more like skating than golf, but the point is that, in the living of most of us, the potential benefit of a lot of April sunlight is lost because we live by the clock, and because the clock, by law, treats April as if it were still on the dark side of the year.

Skim, Scuba Diving Requires Care

MIAMI—It's an entirely different world down there. It's the awed response of skin and scuba divers after the first dive.

It's an alien world, too. But man can function easily there for recreational enjoyment and some he cannot get above.

Like other recreations, such as skiing and flying, diving, holds no special hazard, would the diver is careful and uses common sense, good judgment and good equipment.

Scuba means "self-contained underwater breathing apparatus." A diver wears one or two tanks of compressed air on his back, with a tube from the tank to a mouthpiece. This is called a demand regulator. It automatically gives him as much air as he demands. The supply usually lasts about an hour.

He breathes quite normally. His teeth grip the rubber mouthpiece. He inhales air through his mouth. As he exhales, it goes out. It's that simple.

Because of water pressure, the regulator supplies air at the right pressure to permit his lungs to equalize the pressure of the water on him. Very deep dives are possible but are recommended only for pros. Depths of 30 to 40 feet should satisfy the amateur.

Accidents can happen, so the cardinal rule of diving is never dive alone. A diver who has no diving buddy is an accident looking for a place to happen.

This diving fan learned to function underwater last year in the Caribbean, taking lessons from a qualified instructor. That's the only way to begin. After rules and procedures were learned and practiced in a deep swimming pool, the instructor took two students out to a protected lagoon about 25 feet deep for the first dive to see how they did and to determine whether anyone was panic-prone.

I was lying on the bottom, fascinated by the sight of a small octopus in its hole in the coral (it was the instructor's pet) when someone tapped my shoulder. It was the instructor without scuba gear. He tapped my regulator mouthpiece, indicating I should give it to him.

There is a certain reluctance to give up one's source of air underwater, but instruction had shown that if one diver's equipment broke down, he could share his companions' air as both ascended. We passed the mouthpiece back and forth as we went up.

As a reward for lessons learned I was allowed to go outside on the ocean next day to explore leaves and hunt large fish.

Later, the other student, who was an older man turned out not to have the personality for diving. He thought he was running out of air and panicked. He had ample air in his tank, but he thought it was empty. He shot up and began to thrash about wildly.

The instructor was beside him immediately, jettisoning equipment. Everything a diver wears has quick-release safety straps. If the strap is pulled, the equipment easily drops off.

WASHINGTON—Behind the recent one million dollar grant by the Vincent Astor Foundation to build parks in the Brooklyn Negro slum of Bedford-Stuyvesant is a story dramatizing Senator Robert F. Kennedy's current political slump.

Official of the Astor Foundation thought long and hard about making the grant and came within a hair of saying no. Why? Because the creator, sponsor, and moving force of the Bedford-Stuyvesant project happens to be Bobby Kennedy.

Mr. Astor telephoned New York's senior Senator, Republican Jacob Javits, to inform him she wanted no part of a project—no matter how worthwhile—whose purpose might be construed as the endorsement of Kennedy. Only if Javits were to join him in the project, she said, would the grant be made.

Earlier, several other members of the New York managed establishment approached for funds by Kennedy had expressed similar reservations to Javits.

Kennedy for some time had been urging Javits to collaborate in the project to order to give it a bi-partisan, non-political tone. Considering Mrs. Astor's call and the inherent value of the project, Javits decided to accept, but first advised Governor Nelson Rockefeller what was going on.

Rockefeller objected vigorously. Bobby Kennedy is in a bad political snafu, the Governor told Javits. Why pull his chestnuts out of the fire in Bedford-Stuyvesant?

Rockefeller's advice, Javits agreed to join Kennedy as a board member of the corporation set up for the Bedford-Stuyvesant development. The Astor grant was made and, presumably, other contributions previously denied Kennedy will soon be unlocked.

But the point of the story transcends the Bedford-Stuyvesant development. Last autumn, with his prestige soaring, it would have been inconceivable for the moneyed people of New York to shy away from involv-

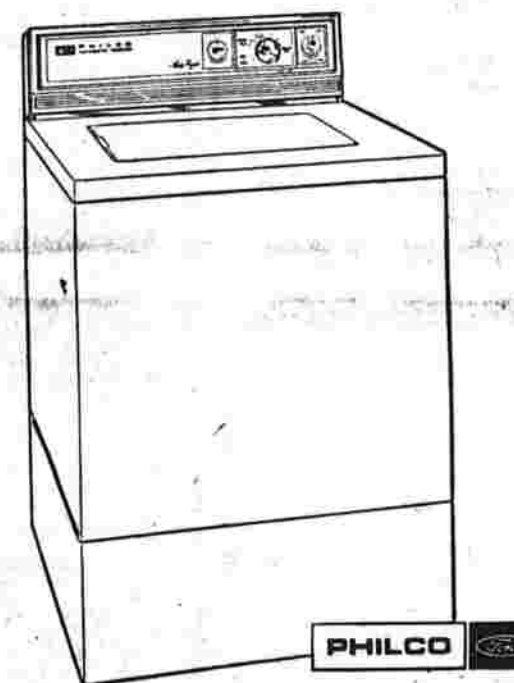

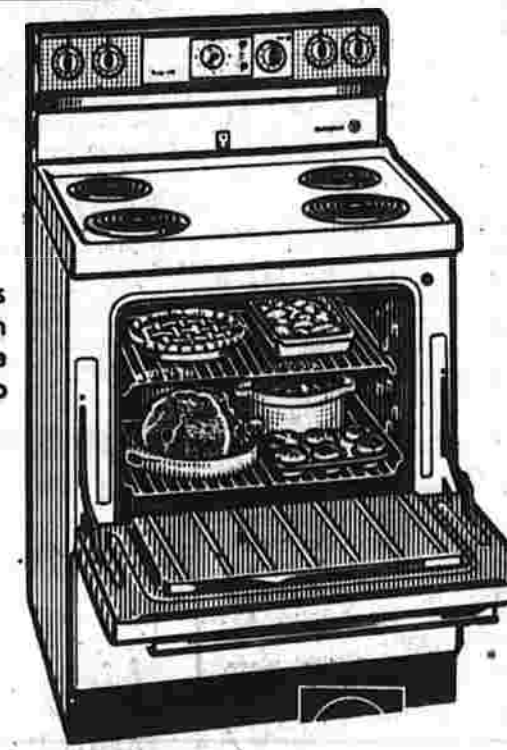

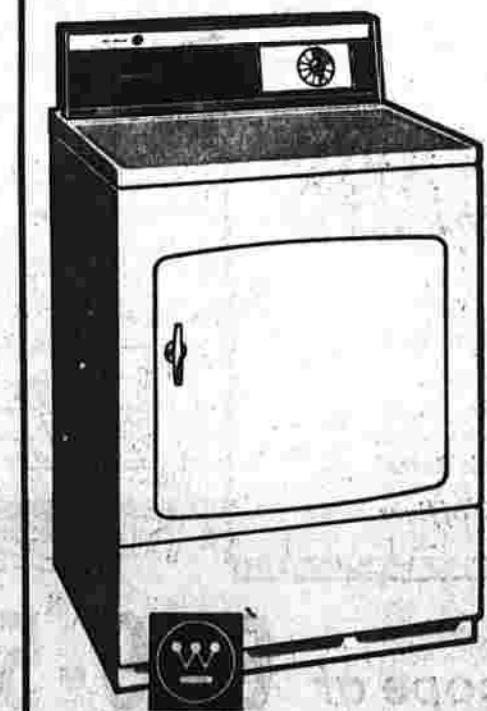

Her full-time job is as a supervisor at United Aircraft in East Hartford.

IOH has adopted the goal of building its own swimming pool to teach the handicapped and more than \$25,000 has been raised by the teen-agers themselves, toward that program.

Auto Sales Show Hike Over 1966

DETROIT (AP) — There is a big increase in auto sales for the first time in months. In the first 10 days of April dealers sales topped those of the same period a year earlier.

It was the first time this year in which sales surpassed those of the comparable 10 days of 1966 — the second best year in the industry's history.

"This is a firm indication that the spring selling market has opened up," said Thomas A. Coupe, American Motors vice president for sales, who reported an eight per cent gain in the April 10 period as compared with the same year ago.

This feeling was echoed by other dealers in the industry, which is being buoyed by many a belief that the nation's economy.

Dealers sales in this month's opening 10 days totaled 207,387, or 2.7 per cent more than the April 1-10, 1966, period.

January's sales were 17.5 per cent off the same month in 1966. February's down 23.8 per cent and March's 21.5 per cent lower.

April's first 10 days: General Motors up 5,000, and American Motors up 1,000.

Ford Motor Co. was down 5,000 cars, although its Lincoln-Mercury division was a gainer.

Chevrolet division of GM also was down, but by only 2,810 cars, compared with Ford's 4,300.

GM's Cadillac division was up 1,233 cars to 8,736.

Despite the April gains, U.S. auto sales are running 45,000 cars behind their 1966 sales pace, 1,900,000 vs. 2,000,000.

GM's Cadillac division was close to its 1966 sales total of 4,810 Cadillacs in the April 10 period, compared with 4,783 raised its 1967 dealer deliveries to 57,841, just 2,891 shy of the total sold in a similar period of 1966.

- 1 quart red wine

- 1 cup heavy cream, whipped
- Wash fruit, cut in half; remove seeds and place in an enamelware kettle; cover with water and wine. Add sugar and cinnamon and cook on medium heat until fruit is soft enough to put through sieve. Remove from heat, cool, and take fruit out of juice and put through sieve into bowl. Mix a small amount of arrowroot with arrowroot and stir back into juice, in kettle. Boil about 10 minutes. Whip cream. This recipe serves six.

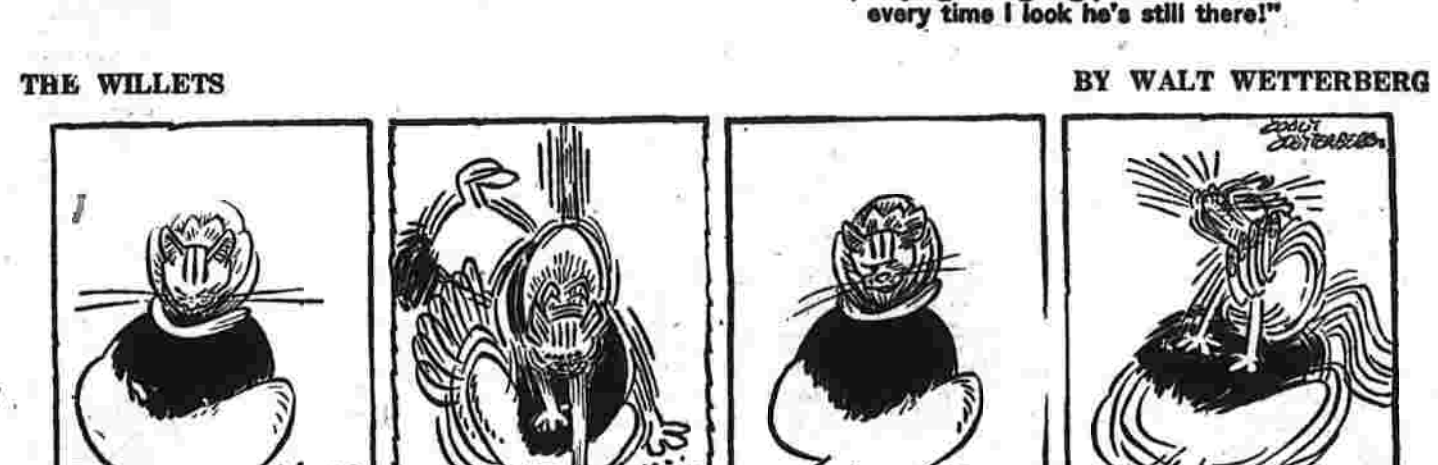
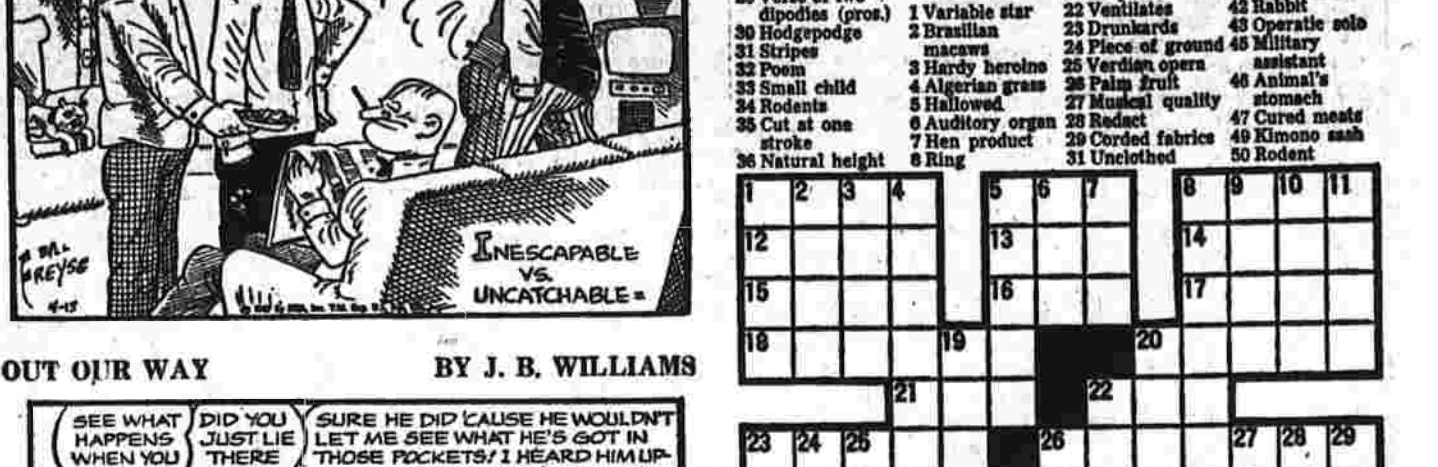
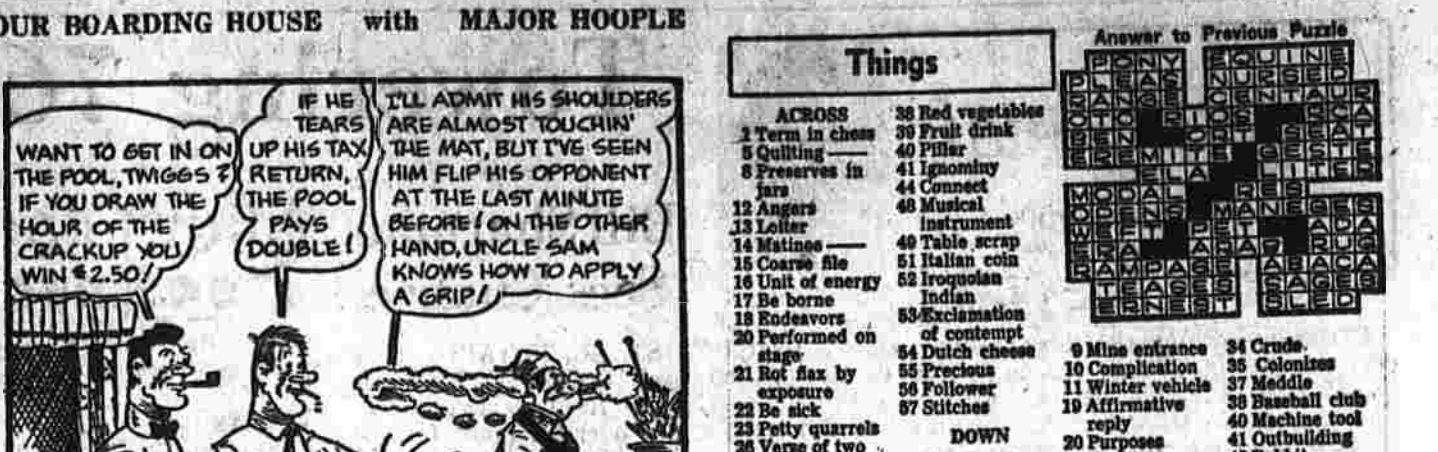
