

Turcotte Gets 2 to 7 Years

A two to seven year state's prison sentence was imposed on Richard E. Turcotte Jr. today by Superior Court Judge Michael Radin for the Sept. 22 shotgun slaying of Turcotte's wife, Marie, in her parents' home at 11 Orchard St.

Turcotte, convicted of manslaughter March 17 by a jury of seven women and five men, appeared relieved at the sentence. He is eligible for parole after serving 18 months in prison.

More Units Moved Near North Viet

BAIGON (AP) — More American troops have been shifted into new positions in the northern part of South Vietnam to meet increasing Communist pressure in crucial border areas, the U.S. command disclosed today.

Troops of the U.S. 1st Cavalry Airmobile Division have taken over an operational area in Quang Ngai Province about 250 miles north of Saigon, a spokesman said, and have killed 100 enemy there in action that began April 8.

The move took the air cavalrymen farther north than they have been since their arrival in Vietnam. It was expected to free U.S. Marines there for duty closer to the 17th Parallel dividing South and North Vietnam.

No major fighting was reported across the country today, but the Viet Cong appeared to be stepping up terror tactics aimed at disrupting local elections and intimidating local officials.

In the air war, U.S. B-52 bombers made four raids inside South Vietnam and American fighters punched through a cloud cover for 96 missions against North Vietnam Sunday.

The disclosure that elements of the 1st Cavalry had moved farther north came with the announcement that a multibattalion force had begun Operation Lejeune in Quang Ngai Province more than a week ago. In addition to the 100 enemy killed, 650 persons have been picked up as suspects. American losses so far in the operation were put at 12 cavalrymen killed and 40 wounded.

Steady Communist infiltration and the presence of 35,000 North Vietnamese regulars around the demilitarized zone is causing U.S. commanders increasing concern. Last week 4,000 men of the U.S. Army's 198th Light Infantry Brigade were moved to Chu Lai, in the northernmost part of Corps area, to free U.S. Marines for duty closer to the border.

No Time to Relax, You Must Pay a Tax

WASHINGTON (AP) — Clear off the kitchen table, dig out those old receipts, sharpen your pencils, dad, and tell the kids to get out that racket — you've got to figure out your income tax by midnight tonight.

If your middle name isn't procrastination, maybe you can go to a movie tonight, relax with a long cool one or swing those golf clubs you've already bought with your refund check.

But for up to one-third of U.S. taxpayers, even with an extra two days for figuring, it's down to the wire with tax calculation — and then down to the post office to get a postmark by midnight.

Usually the deadline is April 15. But since that fell on Saturday this year, the government extended the filing deadline to the next business day.

As of April 7 — the latest figures available — 46 million individual income tax returns had reached the government. That left an estimated 25 million yet to come.

Quoting from two letters from Turcotte's former Manchester employers — The town of Manchester and Sear Roebuck and Co. — Atty. Plepler disclosed that both employers thought highly of his client.

Ernest J. Tureck, highway department, called Turcotte a "good, dependable worker" who the superintendent "would not be reluctant to hire" again.

R. W. Smith of Sears, Turcotte's former immediate supervisor wrote that for five years, he had had the "good fortune of having Richard Turcotte as an employee." Smith praised the father of four for his "high caliber" work and exemplary conduct.

Atty. Plepler argued that the execution of his client's sentence should be suspended so that Turcotte can care for his children, who for the past six months have been in the custody of his maternal grandparents.

Two of the children now are being taken care of by Turcotte's sister. The other two are in foster homes, Atty. Plepler said.

During the past month while Turcotte has been free on \$5,000 bond, the children "have welcomed and savored the time with their father," he said.

Atty. Plepler, outlining the purposes for imprisonment, said his client does not need to be rehabilitated, nor does society need to be protected from him.

How can we imprison Turcotte, who's not a criminal and who has no criminal record? Atty. Plepler asked.

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Children Help Clean Oil Smeared Beaches

EASTHAM, Mass. (AP) — Vacationing school children joined today in the work of cleaning some 40 miles of Cape Cod beach smeared with thick crude oil which also grounded countless wild migratory ducks.

The oil slick blackened sections of beach along the outer shore from Chatham to Provincetown, with Eastham reportedly the harshest hit.

The youngsters worked with rangers of Cape Cod National Seashore, volunteers from the

Wellfleet Job Corps Center and private citizens in the messy job of removing the blemishes on the broad beaches.

A Coast Guard spokesman in Boston said planes found no more oil on the waters off the Cape. On Sunday, widely scattered oil slicks were seen by a Coast Guard plane.

Where the oil came from was a mystery, the Coast Guard said. It could have been dumped by some tanker either only a few miles or several hundred miles southeast of Cape Cod.

There were no reports of oil coming ashore at Nantucket Island, which lies some 15 miles off Cape Cod, between the mainland and the open sea.

In addition to cleaning beaches, volunteers were working to remove the oil scum from grounded wild ducks. The Massachusetts Audubon Society said detergents could be used although it removes the natural oils in duck feathers and makes it impossible for the ducks to swim or float.

Plans are under way to house the afflicted ducks in National Park Service buildings at Wellfleet until the de-oiling process is completed. When the oil is removed, a society spokesman said, arrangements will be made to keep the ducks in cages until they moult and grow a new set of feathers.

The moulting and growing of new feathers, he said, may take from 4 to 6 months and the greatest difficulty during that period will be in feeding the wild fowl. They do not pick up food as domesticated birds do, he said, and may have to be hand-fed during their captivity.

Park officials estimated some 2,000 waterfowl perished when the oil destroyed their natural buoyancy. Most seagulls in the area were not affected, they said.

Stanley Joseph, National Seashore superintendent, said several weeks will be required to clean up the beaches.



Lightning Caused This Hole in the Side of the Kelly House

Lightning Rips House; Dad, Daughter Uninjured

A bolt of lightning struck the Richard Kelly home at 76 Florence St. Saturday, knocking a gaping hole in one corner, smashing windows, burning out the entire electrical system and driving Kelly and his two-year-old daughter, Theresa, to the street.

The lightning, which Kelly described as an explosion, came as he was watching television and tending his daughter, who was asleep in an upstairs bedroom just above the point where the corner of the building blew out.

Neither Kelly nor his daughter were hurt. His wife, Jeanette, was on her way to the movies when the bolt struck shortly after 8:30.

The lightning apparently first hit a tree two houses away at 54 Florence St., jumped to a wire fence near the tree. It then followed the fence for 300 to 350 feet behind two residential properties, around a corner and to the end of the fence, about five feet from the rear corner of the Kelly house. It was at that point that the current jumped to the seven-room frame structure.

Leaves which had accumulated along the base of the fence for its entire length were scorched. At one point intact only by a few strands of wire, the current burned the wires off, jumping the gap in the process.

Despite the lack of a fire, the bolt and the explosion it caused, took a heavy toll on the structure. The loss is adequately covered by a homeowners' insurance policy, Kelly's insurance agent said.

The blast scattered shingles and laths and hunks of plaster over a considerable distance and some pieces of debris smashed windows next door.

It cut a 4 by 4-foot patch of siding and sheeting intact (See Page Eleven)

As soon as Kelly felt the blast, which shattered bulbs in the living room table lamps, he ran upstairs to get Theresa who was crying and shaking. He brought her to the street where neighbors took over.

Two telephone calls were received by firemen who went to the house, used ejectors to clear smoke which filled it. The firemen later expressed surprise there was no fire except for a couple of rags in the cellar which began to burn.

AVCO Strike Is Halted by Court Order

NEW HAVEN (AP) — A federal judge issued a 10-day restraining order today to halt a strike disrupting production of helicopter engines needed in Vietnam.

U.S. District Court Judge William H. Timbers granted the government request for the order after hearing arguments in the dispute between the Lycoming Division of Avco Corp. and the AFL-CIO United Auto Workers Union.

President Johnson directed the Justice Department Sunday to seek an injunction for ending the strike.

An attorney for the government presented an affidavit today from Deputy Secretary of Defense Cyrus Vance that said the strike, if permitted to continue, will "imperil the national safety."

Avco's Lycoming plant in Stratford, Conn., was struck at 12:01 a.m. Sunday in the dispute over wages, a cost of living clause, supplemental unemployment benefits and pensions.

Timbers set April 25 for a hearing on a preliminary injunction for invoking the Taft-Hartley Act, bringing about an 80-day cooling off period in the dispute.

The 10-day restraining order was to be effective immediately, and a company spokesman said operations at the plant would resume with the second shift starting at 3 p.m. today.

Picketing was peaceful and orderly today, but more than 3,000 production workers did not report on the 7 a.m. shift.

About a dozen pickets marched at each of eight gates at the plant, and only salaried employees went through their lines—without incident.

The contestants and 100 parents and relatives, who had paid \$2 each to see the show, arrived, and waited for the ceremonies to start.

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Court Won't Stop Induction of Clay

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court today turned back an effort by heavyweight boxing champion Cassius Clay to stay out of the Army.

Clay's request for an injunction to block his scheduled April 28 induction the Army was flatly denied without comment.

The boxing champion had filed various motions with the court in an effort to freeze his draft situation until the court could act on several constitutional

arguments raised by him in lower courts.

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Scientists Call Orbit 'Excellent'

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—Packing its own little shovel to plow the moon's soil and crack open lunar rocks, America's Surveyor 3 sailed through space today aiming to softly land Wednesday at a site chosen for U.S. astronauts.

The 10-foot-tall spacecraft — most complex robot ever tossed toward the moon by the United States — blasted off at 2:05 a.m. EST today aboard an Atlas-Centaur rocket to begin a planned 65-hour, 237,000-mile trip.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration said sensors aboard the craft successfully looked onto the sun. The sun and the star Canopus were to guide Surveyor 3 to the moon.

The hookup with Canopus was made on schedule, about nine and one-half hours after launch.

"It looks like we have an excellent bird," a project spokesman said.

Plans called for the 2,288-pound craft to fire a braking rocket about 7 p.m. Wednesday and gently set its tripod legs on the lunar surface, ready to spend at least two weeks taking pictures and digging into the soil.

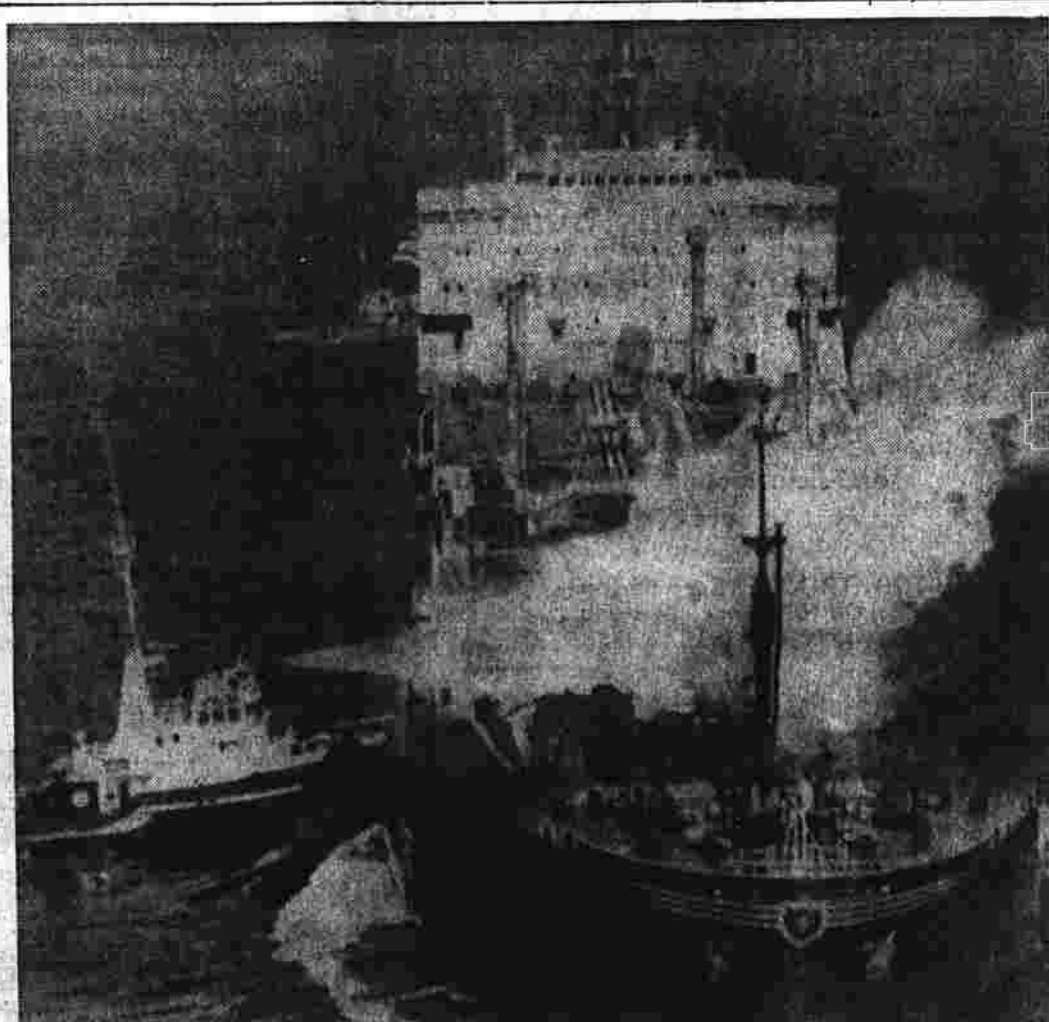
Except for the shovel and two additional mirrors to expand the camera's field of view, Surveyor 3 was almost identical to the Surveyor 1 which achieved this nation's first soft landing on the moon last June 2 and returned 11,150 photographs.

Surveyor 2 was aimed for a spot in the moon's Ocean of Storms, located on the right side of the moon's visible face and slightly below the equator.

Surveyor 3's digging device is strong enough to break open concrete one inch thick.

The shovel was designed to reach up to five feet away from the craft's main frame and so dig a furrow 30 deep as 18 inches wide.

The craft's digging device consists of a scoop about the size of a man's hand. It is attached to an expandable arm which can be manipulated, much like a small steam shovel, by radio signals from the ground.

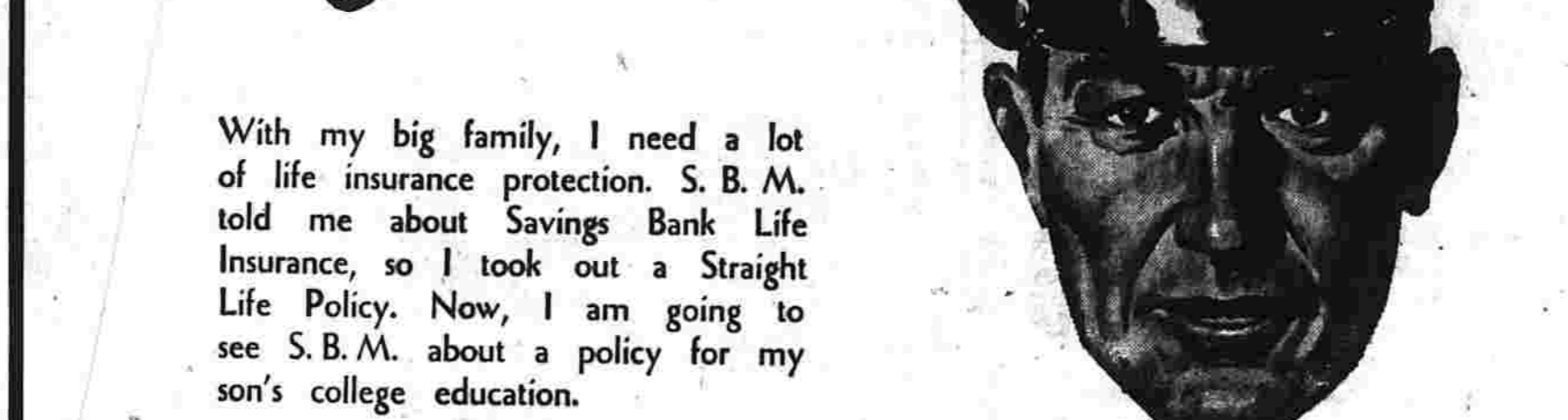

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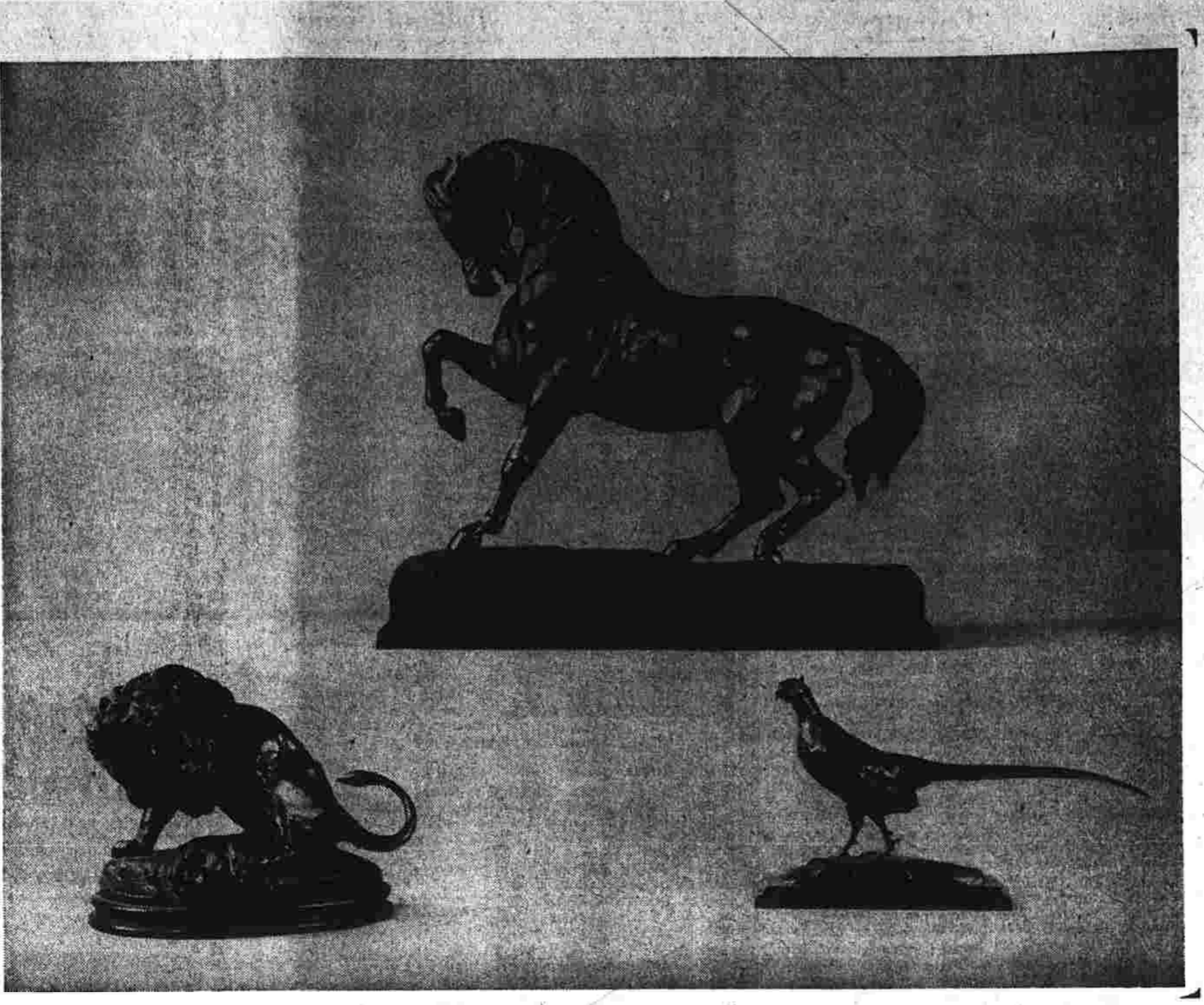

True Even If Communist Says It
 With all due deference to the special talents of the Communist propaganda line, that Communist party official who spoke to some 400 students over at Trinity the other day had moments when he was close to the truth.
 It takes no Communist, for instance, to alert many of us to the danger that, if this country does not solve the Negro problem, the Republic itself will be destroyed.
 That is a proposition which is almost as self-evident as anything else fundamental in our way of life. This nation is now confronted, in the problem of the relationship between its various internal groups, with a situation which goes down deep into its founding creed. We still live, one hundred years after the Civil War, with a cruel anachronism which honors in practice our own best principles.
 We cannot, as a nation, survive a continued failure to put our own house in civilized, moral, decent order.
 This is so deeply, fatally inevitable that it remains true even when a Communist says it.
 We cannot shake the problem. We can only try to answer it. If we have any choice, it is perhaps merely that of seeing who does most to give the problem the civilized kind of answer.
 We cannot expect any certain percentage of our population to endure forever conditions and presumptions which the rest of us would find unspeakable and intolerable.

The Cruel Absurdities Of War
 The first thing to remember, in trying to achieve some perspective on those tragic incidents in Vietnam where we kill our allies, or innocent villagers, or our own men as the result of somebody's mistake in geography or computation, is that the same sort of thing has happened in other wars, but without instant publicity.
 In other wars such happenings were tragic memories the veterans brought home with them, to be related only when they compared notes with fellow veterans.
 In the curious kind of savage but un-declared war we wage in Vietnam, the tragic mistakes—or at least most of them—hit the world news almost instantaneously.
 So we know more, this time, about the cruel absurdities which are part of the game of war.
 These absurdities in themselves are not new. What is new is that we know about them, while the war itself is still in progress. We are invited to make a judgment about them. We are invited to accept some degree of responsibility for them.

Practical Applied Biocybernetics
 You must never allow modern high-sounding scientific phraseology to discourage your natural curiosity.
 The more you know, the more you will find out. It may lead, after a momentary initial difficulty, to some great social boon, like, for instance, the instant banning of all the legion of delectable commercials on television this year.
 Begin, let us say, with cybernetics. Cybernetics is the science of automatic control and communication.
 Now progress to biocybernetics. Biocybernetics is the study of "biological control functions that operate with conscious awareness."
 Don't linger in admiration of the way one simple prefix coils a new word and a new meaning.
 The first law of biocybernetics says that the response of a biologic receptor to a stimulus is characterized by "unidirectional rate sensitivity."
 Don't leave us now. We are getting close to something understandable and important.
 "Unidirectional" means in one direction only.
 If your sense of smell smells something, it smells only a one-way change in the intensity of the smell.
 Or, in the words of the high priest of biocybernetics, a New York state scientist named Dr. Manfred Clyman: "manly" means in one direction only to smells and they respond only when a smell is introduced or intensified.
 The small stays the same, the small receptors adapt to it, and no longer notice it.
 Having the smell stay the same, then, is, sensation wise, the same as having it disappear. The nose cannot tell which is happening.
 That's the science, according to biocybernetics.
 So, if those television commercials could only be forced to wait a few minutes before they need a new, more potent odorant because, as soon as noses get used to smelling any particular smell, it always turns to roses.

WASHINGTON — With two conspicuous exceptions, Governor George Romney's air-clear speech on Vietnam had a remarkably good reception in the Republican party.
 The exceptions, neither of whom publicly criticized the Republican Presidential front-runner, were Senator Charles Percy of Illinois and Mayor John Lindsay of New York. Both would have preferred Romney's taking a slightly more dovish position on the war in Vietnam.
 Percy and Lindsay might well have been left without any reservations had it not been for last-minute changes in the Romney text, made just 36 hours before it was delivered to the press.
 The most significant change was an insertion on page three of the speech which committed Romney to the use of "military force as necessary to reduce or cut off the flow of men and supplies from North Vietnam."
 Party leaders who wanted Romney to come out of the speech with an identifiable war position slightly to the left of President Johnson felt these words could be interpreted as a bid for more bombing in the North.
 Some of Romney's own advisers also argued against adding the word "force." They were worried that a Republican recommendation would be interpreted as a bid for more bombing in the North.
 Oddly enough, the author of this recommendation for "military force as necessary" was Thomas E. Dewey, the former Governor of New York and twice defeated Presidential nominee.
 A footnote: Republican strategists credit President Johnson with a major political coup in issuing a White House statement praising Romney for his Vietnam speech. That guaranteed newspaper headlines linking Romney's Vietnam policy to Johnson's own Vietnam program, thus tending to box in the Michigan Governor.
 The sudden immersion of Dr. Martin Luther King in the anti-Vietnam movement together with his implication that Negro youths are carrying more than their share of the fighting, caused immediate repercussions in the White House Oval Office.
 Dr. King's speech in New York on April 4, President Johnson specifically asked if there were any cases on record of draft-dodgers being discriminated against by local draft boards.
 A quick check turned up the name of one case, a Negro youth whose family claimed he was an epileptic.
 The youth's appeal for deferment on medical grounds had been carefully examined and turned down by the draft board, by a local medical appeal board, by the state appeal board, and finally by the Army induction center, none found any evidence to epilepsy.
 Finally, however, the

The board's reaction to the budget has not been gauged yet.

The appointment of Abbot Schwebel as town counsel is expected tonight. He was chosen by the Republican Town Committee Tuesday night.

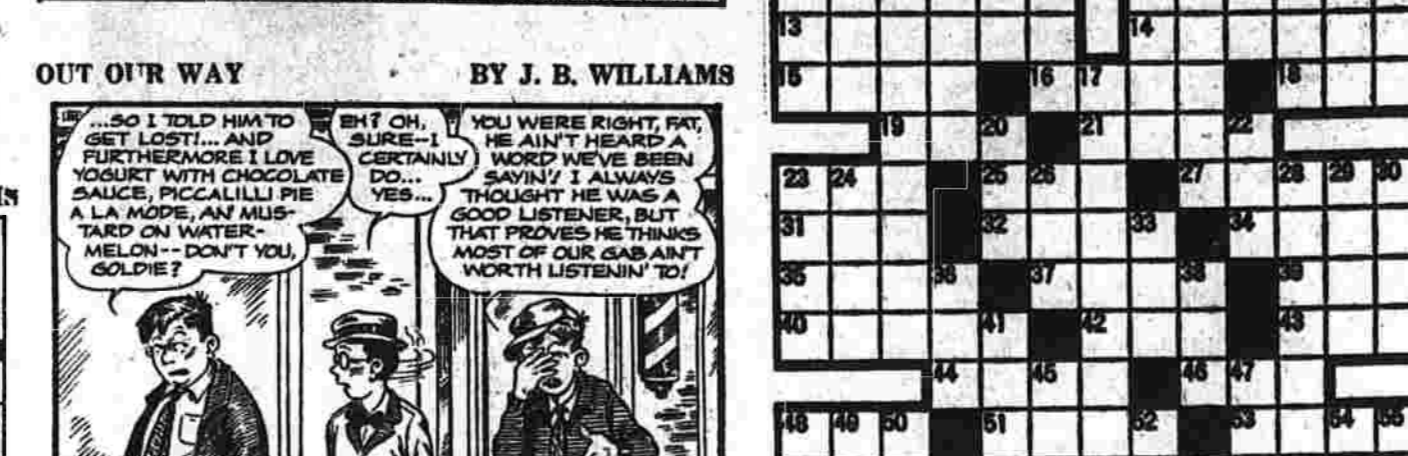

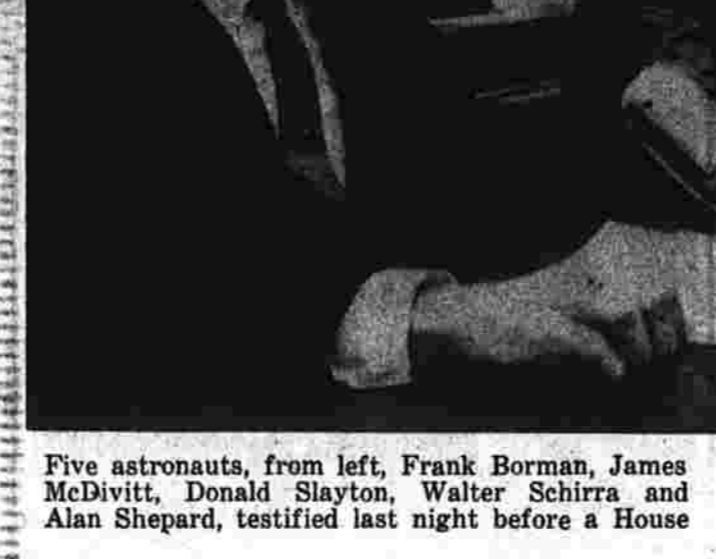
