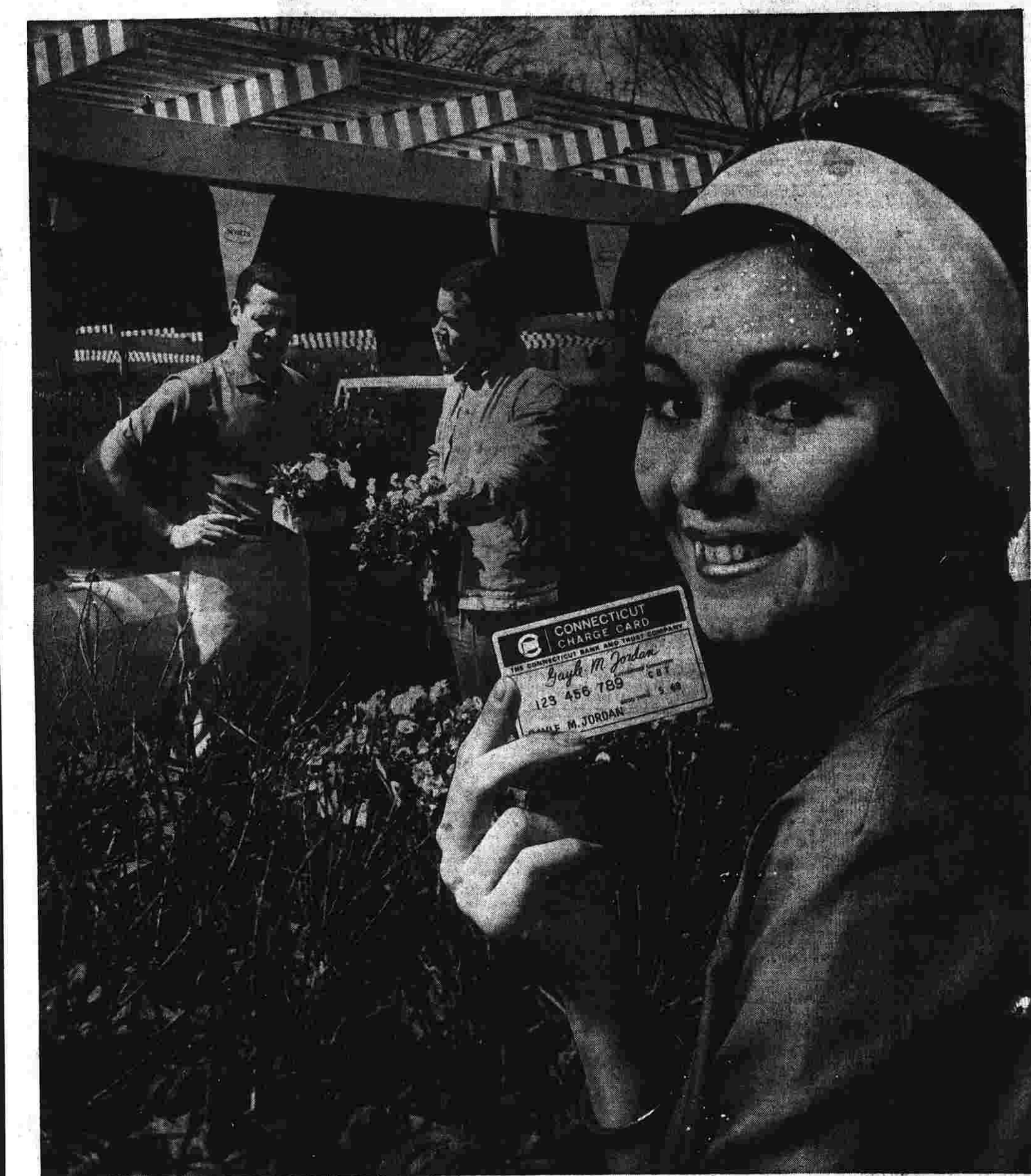

Sheinwold on Bridge

TROUGHTFUL PLAY NEEDED AGAINST TIGHT DEFENSE

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD
When your opponents are tight defenders you must sometimes make very thoughtful plays. The breakdown may not be needed against the average taxpayer, but it will work just as well.

Opening lead—ten of clubs. When today's hand was played a few weeks ago in the annual Intercollegiate Bridge Championships, West led the ten of clubs. South invariably won with the ace of clubs, and most declarers shot back the queen of hearts.

The average East took the ace of hearts and returned it like a bridge player. East simply refused to take the ace of hearts when South led the queen of hearts at the second trick.

Eight Tricks
Now South had eight tricks, but eight tricks would prevent him from getting a ninth. South was unable to set up and cash dummy's hearts and a suitable East would avoid giving declarer a second diamond trick.

South should make the contract even against tight defense by making his heart plays in the reverse order. He should lead the low heart first, trying a finesse with dummy's ten.

If East takes the first heart, declarer leads a low heart from dummy and this makes sure at once of two heart tricks.

Partner opens with 1-NT (16 to 18 points), and the next play is passes. You hold: Spades, K-6-5; Hearts, K-10-8-7; Diamonds, J-8; Clubs, 5-3-2.
What you want is a heart lead. Answer: Bid two hearts. The hand is not quite strong enough for game unless partner has a good heart fit and at least 17 points. If he has such a hand, he will raise to three hearts; and if he doesn't have such a hand you are content to play the hand at two hearts.

Jobless Claims Rise in Town

A 37.7 per cent rise in local unemployment compensation claims was reported for last week by the Manchester office of the State Labor Department. The total claims reported rose by 75—from 534 for the week ending April 8, to 736 for the week ending April 15. On a statewide basis, claims decreased by 551 last week to 14,690 total. The figure was 18,114 during the corresponding period last year.

Young King, Old Politico Key Men in Greek Crisis

A handsome, 29-year-old king, an 80-year-old political veteran and the latter's ambitious 48-year-old son are the chief cast members in the newest political drama to grip turbulent Greece.

Constantine II is probably the best Greek ruler who was educated for the specialized profession his father, the late King Paul, referred to as kingship. As a child, he absorbed classroom instruction by his father with nine other boys including a shipowner's son, a banker's boy and the offspring of a lawyer.

At 18 he began military training as a private in the Greek Commonwealth. Living and sleeping in a dormitory with the same duties as the others including cleaning latrines.

"If he had not been a king, he could still have been a first class military officer," a colleague recalled.

In 1950, the busy youth entered line school at Athens and at the same time took added courses in constitutional law, economics and modern physics.

All during the formative years, Constantine was never allowed to forget the career that lay before him. From the age of 12 he attended royal meetings and sat in at his father's audiences with cabinet ministers.

"My father thought it would be very good for me to listen to his discussions with cabinet ministers or his staff on state affairs," he recalled recently. "When I was 18, I was allowed to express my view, but my father made the decision and that was the final word."

But the young prince was known as a private as a member of the royal family, fond of fast sports cars, pretty girls and spending many summers in the mountains where he was fearful when his father's death brought Constantine to the throne at the age of 23.

The trading stood him in good stead. In 18 months came the "Papandreou affair" in which the young king stood up to state powers and popular old premier, George Papandreou.

Constantine and his beautiful 23-year-old queen, the former Princess Anne-Marie of Denmark, are still the world's youngest monarchs. An inheritance, a traitable politician. Just a

Over the years, he has headed the Socialist Democratic party and the Liberal party. He broke away from the Liberals in 1951 and founded the Center Union Party.

The slogan "democracy will triumph" won him a landslide victory and a decisive parliamentary majority in the 1964 elections after seven years of conservative government.

Papandreou's first political post was governor-general of Chios island in 1957. Three years later he was appointed minister without portfolio but resigned to run for Parliament and was elected.

He was elected in 1958 because of opposition to the dictator, Gen. John Metaxas. He returned to Greece after the government's fall only to be imprisoned by the Nazis.

He escaped to the Middle East in 1944 and formed a government in exile. He returned later in the year as head of government when the country was liberated and held in that post until January 1946.

Following his premier in 1962, Papandreou launched reforms that appealed to the workers and farmers and built up a strong following that he could summon into the streets.

Papandreou's reforms led to a dispute over control of the armed forces in 1966. Papandreou's Greece is a state of turmoil for two months. A master slogan, he popularized such phrases as "the king reigns but the people rule."

GODAU HA, Vietnam—(REAP)—The rice farmer gazed on his knees and squeezed the color from his hands. He was on the verge of weeping, but no tears came. Only his shoulders shuddered in sorrow.

His eyes were fixed on the nearby road.

U.S. trucks moved by in the dust.

The rice farmer frowned. And he slowly shook his head.

The American vehicles were not new to him. He had seen them passing for months. There a week they formed a six-mile-long, 300-unit convoy that made a solid, olive drab string along the road.

The convoy was from the 10th Transportation Group near Saigon but, contrary to the farmer's belief, he knew only that the endless caravan groped its way past his estate. The farmer did not know. "Hello, hello."

The children formed miles and miles of outstretched arms. They cried for can openers, chewing gum, toilet paper, tin foil, ballpoint pens, cookies or anything and everything.

And often they got what they asked for. Ever since the convoys began the rice farmer had seen the soldiers toss out hundreds of items from the trucks, and he felt it was extravagant but generous.

That was, though, was about all he knew of the Americans. He did not mix in politics or war and thus he knew the large-bodied U.S. representatives only by rumor and reputation.

He had heard, for instance, of awesome American guns and planes and of the swarms of Yankees who camped in secret bases throughout the country. He had heard the bees were dangerous and that only a few Vietnamese citizens were allowed to hear them.

Once in his hamlet, an American doctor arrived to treat the sick. He stayed for two days and did a wealth of good. That



But, other than that, the rice farmer knew nothing of the soldiers in the convoys which passed his land. And he did not care to. He was much too busy with his work.

He was difficult, weary labor. Hours of planting and cultivating and nearly all by himself. He had only the buffalo to help him.

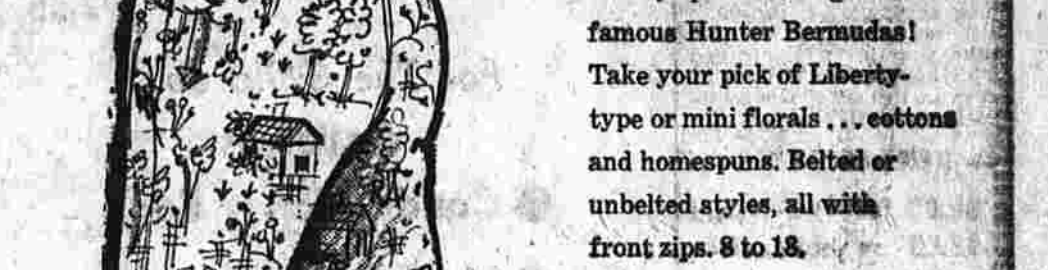

Tolland County King Scores Pension Plan For State's Legislators

Many, if not a majority, of state legislators are inclined to agree that the provisions of the proposed pension plan for legislators "smells a little heavy."

The range of service required is usually 10 to 20 years, with few exceptions, according to King.

Most legislators feel a pension plan, if it is to be provided at all, should carry a retirement age of at least 60 or 65.

With these provisions, most legislators would find the plan "palatable," King predicted. The plan would be similar to plans for legislative pensioners in other states.

One of her reasons rumored for bringing out the non-contributory plan, according to King, is that the Connecticut judiciary has "long enjoyed an excellent pension plan, with retirement at two-thirds of salary at age 70, all without contribution."

House Passes Amendment Members of the House yesterday voted 90 to 55 in favor of an amendment providing pensioners of at least \$100 a month for life, starting at age 65.

The bill will now have to be passed by the Senate before it goes to Governor Dempsey to be signed into law.

Each of the 33 states providing pension plans for their legislators, King stated, in 27 of the states, the contributions are based on a fixed percentage of the salary the legislators receive.

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N.J. School Board's Rules Spark Student 'Minitempest'

POMPON LAKES, N.J. (AP) — When the school board in this New Jersey community proposed last week to tighten rules against long-haired boys and short-skirted girls, it touched off a minitempest.

"School is a place of business, and students are expected to dress and groom themselves appropriately," began the ruling, due to take effect May 7 after a second reading.

From there the code goes on to specifically prohibit sweat-shirts, slacks, work jumpers, tight pants and long hair for boys, and skirts, blouses, hair styles, slacks and shoes or shorts for girls.

"No miniskirts," it said.

"We're not trying to change a fashion trend," said Lester V. Jochen, principal of Pompton Lakes High School, speaking at a public hearing. "We're only interested in working out the extremes. We all know women and girls are wearing shorter dresses now."

Jochen said he believed that only about a dozen students out of 1,176 are affected directly.

One of that dozen was Louise Woolf, 17, a senior, wearing a man's button-down shirt, tie, a long sweater and a short skirt.

"I don't think any student should feel like how to dress," said Louise. "Pompton Lakes is very provincial."

But "most of the time it is a talk," said Frank Campagna, 18, a senior and secretary of the student council.

"They feel their rights have been violated — and they're right to an extent," he said. "I feel the student voice should be heard, but it should be heard through the right channels, such as the student council."

Amelia Murclio, council vice president, who admitted her skirt was "probably a touch too long," agreed. "I think the student should be allowed to wear anything they want outside of school, but in school they should conform," she said.

Average Guy Rarely Meets Governmental Secret Agent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Your only contact with U.S. intelligence agencies may be when a full field investigation to the neat-looking man flashes imposing credentials at you and asks preliminary questions for information about a fellow who's looking for a government job.

A lot is heard about FBI sleuths and CIA cloak-and-dagger operations, but the average citizen is a lot less likely to meet one of these men than an investigator for the U.S. Civil Service Commission.

Each year commission investigators contact 2.5-3.5 million Americans either by letter or in person. Their aim is to determine whether persons who want to go on the federal payroll have the good records.

The commission's task is to conduct certain types of investigations for the entire federal service. One type is called "national agency check and inquiry."

This falls into two parts: 1. A check of fingerprint files, the commission's own files, which contain 10 million card records of past probes of the Army, Navy, Air Force or Coast Guard, and the House Committee on Un-American Activities "as appropriate."

2. Written inquiries to former employees, college instructors, agencies of the applicant's former town, state or country. If the person has been abroad, immigration service if he is an alien or naturalized citizen.

But suppose the applicant is trying for a job designated as "sensitive" — one in which he could have a material adverse effect on the national security? He went wrong. Then he must be subjected to a "full field investigation."

This includes, among other things, personal interviews with present and former employers, supervisors, fellow workers, references, neighbors, school authorities.

Flood of Applications Frightening to Colleges

BOSTON (AP) — State university officials in New England face this spring's mounting flood of freshmen applications with old fashioned fear.

"I think we're all scared, even those of us who don't like to admit it," said William F. Field, dean of students at the University of Massachusetts.

"There are just so many people who want an education."

Enrollment in the region's state universities has increased 600 per cent since the end of World War II, and the pressure remains intense.

Massachusetts has had 17,000 applications for admission to its freshman class at its Amherst campus.

The other schools are fighting similar odds. Only three of the universities—Connecticut, Vermont and New Hampshire—say they are able to find room for every qualified student from their states.

Maine and Rhode Island say they find room for about 80 per cent. Massachusetts says 40 per cent.

Deans of admission at each state university agree that it is tough for a student to get into any college anywhere, and that a student with a poor high school record is in very serious trouble.

"Each has been said about the late-blooming student," said James W. Eastwood, dean of admissions at Rhode Island. "But our admissions officers do not give much credence to it."

"Oh, you get many very good cases," Eastwood said. "Students with terrific high school records come in here and say a great revelation has come to them in the last few months regarding ground games."

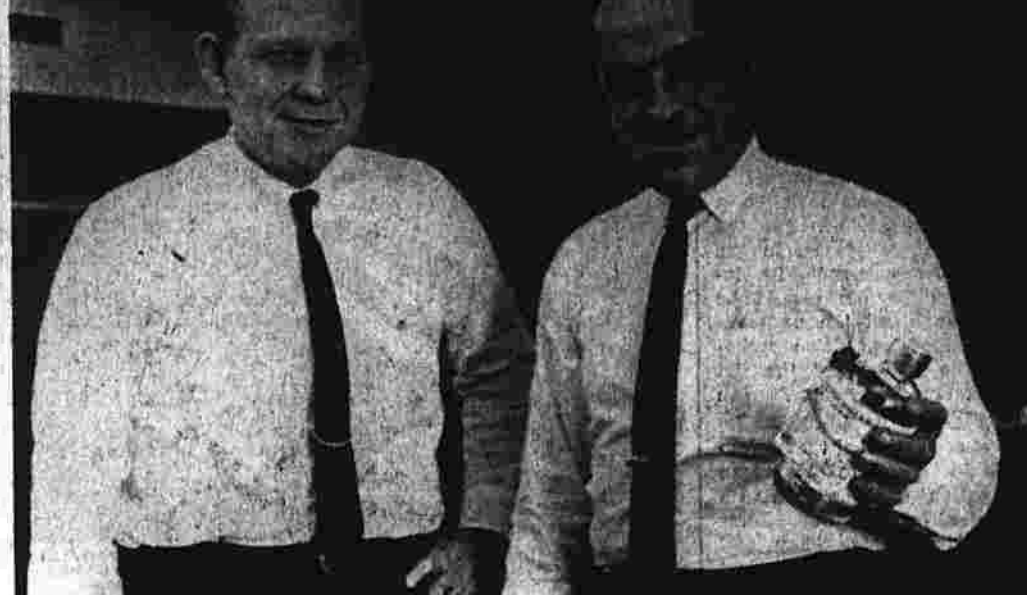

CA Club Hears African Speaker

Mr. Elkin Sitohle, an African citizen of the Union of South Africa, was the guest speaker at the April 18 meeting of the Current Affairs Club.

Mr. Sitohle explained that the white inhabitants divided the 12 million citizens of the Union of South Africa into four distinct social classes in order that each may live separately and have no common language, religion, or customs.

Mr. Sitohle has personally experienced the African's role in the caste system. As an African, he paid the same tuition at the University of Natal as the whites, and yet, when he became a history teacher, he was paid far less than they were.

This caste system is one of the major objections of the eight million Africans of the Union of South Africa. It reduces their chances of employment, and motivates the strict passport system within cities and countries. The Africans are object to the Group Areas Act which gave 80% of the land and all of the natural resources to the whites, leaving 20% of jungle and poor farmland to the Africans. Shortage of food and machinery prevail in these areas also. There is no standard wage between classes, although consumer prices remain the same for all.

Surveyor Digs Moon, No Surprises Found

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Surveyor 3 dug a trench about three feet long and at least six inches deep in the surface of the moon today but uncovered nothing spectacular.

The trench, the second scooped out by a two-by-two-inch shovel in less than three hours, turned up a considerable amount of lumpy material much like that on the undisturbed surface.

Pictures of the operation, televised to controllers at Jet Propulsion Laboratory showed no surprises and nothing to indicate the moon's surface might be unsafe for manned landings.

Shortly after midnight, the spyglass device did its first digging—a foot-long trench in three jerky motions lasting two seconds each.

A television camera, mounted above the scoop, passed through the trench about an hour later but spokesmen said the pictures were not clear enough to show whether the trench had been deepened.

At this point, the moon was beyond the horizon of the tracking station controlling the spacecraft and the operation was suspended.

A television camera, mounted just above the scoop's extended arm, relayed a series of photographs of the history-making operation to its controllers at Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

Surveyor 3 first dropped the scoop into the soil between two of its legs, creating a rectangular hole an inch to an inch and a half deep.

After a brief delay to let the electronics of Surveyor 3's over-heating camera cool off, the shovel was moved to the right and lowered again with its scoop open.

The trench that resulted when the scoop was pulled back appeared sharply defined in photographs. The soil on the sides of the hole was strongly cohesive, something like wet sand.

It was the first time pictures were relayed to earth of a hole in the moon's surface.

UN Delegates Pessimistic On 2 Pacts

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Delegates to the U.N. General Assembly's special session expressed pessimism today that agreement will be reached on the two issues at stake.

South-West Africa's future and U.N. peacekeeping finances.

The 15-nation assembly is supposed to carry through its session of the last regular session to terminate South Africa's League of Nations mandate over South-West Africa and bring it under U.N. auspices.

The session also inherited the nagging problem of peacekeeping, maintained by Soviet insistence that only the Security Council has the right to authorize and finance such operations.

The United States and other nations insist that the General Assembly share that authority, particularly when council action is blocked by a veto.

The last assembly placed the territory of South-West Africa under U.N. responsibility as a first step toward independence for the former German colony.

The issue is whether the United Nations should try to force its way into the territory or renounce it and the South African government. The demand for force has been limited mainly to the extremist wing of the African and Asian groups.

The United States called Friday for renewed contacts with South Africa under the territorial issue.

"We favor a dialogue," said the U.S. representative.

47 Killed, 1,500 Hurt By Trio of Tornadoes



Dazed and Drenched, Students Leave Damaged High School

CHICAGO (AP)—Three death-dealing tornadoes that turned heavily populated sections of northern Illinois and western Michigan into a nightmare claimed 47 lives yesterday and scorched fever more hotly would be found in the rubble today.

More than 1,500 persons were injured in the tornadoes that left vast wastelands in their wake.

The tornadoes killed 24 persons in Oak Lawn, a suburb of Chicago; 20 in Belvidere, Ill., a town of 18,000 about 85 miles northwest of Chicago; 1 in Chicago; 1 in Stone Park, another Chicago suburb; and 1 in Hillsdale County, Mich.

The Chicago Weather Bureau said the tornadoes "appear to be the worst since March 26, 1920. And when the final report is in, it may be the most devastating tornado on record in northeastern Illinois."

Hurricane-force winds whirled through the streets of Belvidere, Ill., through scores of brick and masonry buildings, before moving on to Stone Park, Ill., and then to Hillsdale County, Mich.

A big superstorm in Oak Lawn was broken up by Friday evening showers, which reduced to rubble. Although the damage to the school could raise the death toll.

Newman, who Friday requested a hearing May 8 on a temporary injunction, said the government's suit is based on a claim that the Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act of 1940 exempts nonresident servicemen and women from all taxes on personal property.

The purpose of the law, Newman said, is to "relieve armed forces personnel of the burden of supporting the government of states where they are present solely in compliance with military orders."

In an attached affidavit, Newman said that Connecticut's tax department has rejected appeals for exemption from the sales tax.

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Touring U.S. Priests Tell of Greek Coup

ROME (AP)—Two American Roman Catholic priests who were in Athens during the military coup reached home today and told of streets filled with tanks and tanks.

They said however, there was no sign in the Greek capital of any fighting or bloodshed.

The Rev. Jacob Bauer, 44, Ravenna, Neb., and the Rev. Joseph Hargarten, 50, Gordon, Neb., arrived in Rome with 30 other passengers aboard the first airliner released by Greek military authorities 33 hours after the coup.

The priests are on a two-month tour of Europe and the Middle East.

"The streets were filled with tanks, all wearing helmets and carrying rifles with bayonets," said Father Bauer.

"They didn't bother us much but Greeks were told to get off the streets," he said.

"Greeks were not allowed to stop in any one place for more than three minutes. The soldiers roamed through sidewalk cafes and restaurants, looking for trouble and a medium security prisoner were accompanied by Warden Raymond Meier and five custodial officers as they spoke Friday.
