A Dog's Best Friend

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Lassie's best friend may well be William Beaudine, who has directed the talented pooch through 75 chapters of the long-run series and appears ready to direct 75 more.

Big Bill knows just how to write the right emotion from Lassie and — just as importantly — how to bring the films in on budget or under.

"I've never gone over a shooting schedule in my whole career," the director says proudly.

And what a career it has been! At 75 Bill Beaudine claims to have been a director longer than anyone else in Hollywood.

"I directed my first picture starting on Oct. 12, 1915," he recalled. "It was a one-reel comedy called — get this — 'Minnie the Lion.'"

"I don't know of anyone who started before I did. Raoul Walsh? He was still an actor for D. W. Griffith. Jack Ford was an assistant for his brother Francis. George Marshall was an actor."

For over a half-century, Beaudine has pursued his proudest of two Mary Pickford deals between pictures. He is proudest of two Mary Pickford movies, "Sparrow" and "Little Annie Rooney." He has no illusions about most of the others.

"Long ago I quit thinking that every picture I did was going to be an academy award contender," he said. "I'm a commercial director; I know how to save money and get something on the screen. I let those arty guys shoot the scenes through chandeliers or from behind a wine glass. That's not for me."

"I'd like to see a George Stevens or a William Wyler shoot a Lassie in three days, the way I do. Heck, they'd be three days trying to make up their minds about the first shot."

Beaudine is a big, cheery man with a pointed mustache. He figures he has turned out 300-350 television shows — "Naked City," "Rin Tin Tin," "Rocket Squad," "Walt Disney Presents," etc. He receives from \$1,300 to \$1,800 for a half-

The Bishop Show: A Shaky Start

NEW YORK (AP) — "The Joey Bishop Show," presided over by a very nervous host, took off in a shaky, thoroughly disorganized style on ABC Monday night.

It probably will settle down ultimately and assume some of the smooth operation of its prototype, the long-playing "Tonight Show" on NBC — that is, if Joey ever stops thanking people for coming to see him.

The 90-minute late evening show is a frank copy of its NBC competition in everything, including its faults.

Bishop is installed behind the traditional desk with the guest accommodations on his right. Like his East Coast rival, he keeps fishing behind his chair to produce an endless assortment of products. The commercials continually interrupted the show. I counted 10 during the first 30 minutes.

The first program should have provided considerably more entertainment than it did. Gov. Ronald Reagan was the first celebrity guest. Since neither he nor Bishop seemed prepared, it was a long confrontation broken

by awkward pauses.

Bishop moved into the audience and introduced a few celebrities and his wife, Debbie Reynolds turned up and described her work as a Girl Scout leader but was snapped off short when she started to do some amusing impressions of stars. Danny Thomas was in his usual reverent, patriotic and humble form.

Bishop's "side kick" is a Dennis Day-ish sort of fellow named Regis Philbin. "That's Greek for Hugh Downs," said Bishop. He seemed to have little to do except take abuse from the comedian.

It was a pretty awful beginning.

'Cool and Loose'

NEW YORK (AP) — The late Humphrey Bogart has become the center of a cult, most of whose members are so young they can only have seen his films in their endless television reruns or in revivals.

Joe Hyams, a former Hollywood newspaperman and author of a book, "Bogart," believes that he understands why Bogart is popular today with fans young enough to be his children. "Bogart was always cool and loose, the way they'd like to be," he said. "His voice was a rasp and he even had a lisp, but he was tough outside while there was something warm inside. He may be partly father image, but there's also something about him that they can identify with."

Hyams served as production consultant for "Bogart," a documentary about the actor which will be broadcast on ABC next Sunday and found the assignment presented problems unknown to a book author but also revealed facets of his subject that literary research left concealed.

"In a TV documentary, the primary goal is an interesting show," he continued. "It is important to entertain the viewers and attract sponsors. I interviewed over 100 people for the book, but for television we cut out the interviews, however revealing, with the cooks, the valets. The word was 'find the stars who can move this show along.' The problem then was to find big names who could

make a point to help explain the man and the myth." Hyams found himself watching endless hours of old films.

"It was fascinating to watch him develop," he said. "He always had a natural way of taking a woman in his arms, but it became smoother."

Hyams also observed that in their many films together both Bogart and James Cagney invariably wound up repeating almost identical closing lines and even wore clothes they had used in earlier films.

Except for Cary Grant and perhaps a couple of others, Hyams thinks that film stars don't come in Bogart's dimensions today.

'RAUNCHY' LYRICS

The six McLendon radio stations served formal notice on the music industry Wednesday by advertisements in trade journals that they were tired of records with "raunchy" lyrics and tired of complaints from listeners.

Starting May 15, the stations will refuse to consider playing any record submitted with a printed copy of the lyrics.

Gordon B. McLendon, president of the chain, said he was "disturbed at the lyrics and sounds of many records popular with the youth of America. I think these records are morally damaging and I have ordered all our stations to ban this type of recording."

He urged the record industry to police itself, not to leave it up to the broadcasters.
