Can We Share Only The Tragedy? Last Jan. 27, on the launching pad at Cape Kennedy, the United States lost three astronauts to some imperfection in a new model space ship.

Yesterday, a Russian space flight which was also employing a new model space vehicle ended in tragedy and the crew was ejected back into the earth, of a landing Russian cosmonaut.

Both nations have now experienced the same kind of tragedy in connection with their space efforts. It was obvious, in the emotional reaction both ways, that there are few national, racial, political or ideological lines in the deaths of brave men.

We could even forget the cold war for a moment or two in the dramatic impact of human sacrifices in the war to conquer space. Inevitably, then, at such a moment, the vision of a more sensible world rises before us, all as it rose in the public remarks yesterday of James E. Webb, head of our National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

"At this dawn of the space age," said Mr. Webb, "man has the duty to seek cooperation between nations such as the U.S.S.R. and the United States on a realistic basis. . . . Could the lives already lost have been saved, if we had known each other's hopes, aspirations and plans? Or if full cooperation had been the order of the day?"

In his comment, the Russians suggested that such full cooperation, had it been considered possible, might have made a difference. As Walter Cronkite suggested in his comment, the Russians at the time ago discarded the oxygen system which, given the initial spark from some flame, turned the Apollo space capsule into an instant furnace at Cape Kennedy last January. As he also suggested, the much more widely based American system for monitoring and communicating with space flight, as set up around the world, might have been helpful to the Russians this week if they were having any difficulty in communicating with Cosmonaut Komarov or in giving him instructions.

It may also be remembered that one of our own previous space missions encountered the problem of a space ship which seemed to be tumbling out of control, apparently because of the malfunction of one of the stabilizing rockets. What saved that time was apparently merely the final exhaustion of the fuel which was available to the rocket that had gone berserk.

But the alarm felt then, and the fact that we conducted subsequent space missions without encountering that particular kind of control trouble again may mean that we made an intensive study of the stability problem which, had it concerned and findings were shared with Russia, might have eliminated the trouble Komarov was apparently having with his flight, which apparently foisted the interruption of his mission, and which also apparently foisted his reentry and landing.

There is quite a case, then, for the sort of cooperation Space Administrator Webb was talking about yesterday. We are forced, however, to remain cynical — cynical over the possibility that those who really hold power of decision either in Russia or in this country will ever, until they have experienced much more communal tragedy than this, be able to elevate themselves out of their mutual suspicion and rivalry, and beyond the veto influence of their respective believers in the necessity of the death of one side of the world at the hands of the other.

But this is, of course, a triple-barreled sacrifice, for it strikes in the heart of all three kinds of people, those who like real peanut butter, those who like real jelly, and those who like to mix their own peanut butter and jelly combinations.

What the proportions in such a combination should be depends on who the individual is and what kind of day it is. There are days when any old grape will do, and others when only sophisticated grapes matches the luffs of the palate. There are short duty PBJs and long truck PBJs. There are some breads that being kneaded into firmer texture, will take a higher proportion of jelly than others.

But the most important element in a good PBJ is that someone, as an individual possessing free and enterprising character has actually decided to have that particular kind of sandwich, as a special kind of luxury which is worth a little extra touch of effort.

Delay everything else one can ever get by reaching for it, the instant PBJ will have lost most of its flavor.

Inside Report

LONDON—For the first time, Harold Wilson is falling in the superb exhibition of political juggling he has performed since becoming Prime Minister in October, 1964.

That is the interpretation, widespread in the House of Commons and in the opposition Conservative party, of the unexpected Conservative landslide in the recent county council elections here. The irony is that Wilson, a trimmer by nature, is good newspaper form. The complaint against him here comes as a result of having looked at the parade closely for hours, and then reading a statement from the President which is invalid and insulting. . . .

On the television yesterday afternoon, here was Dean Rusk, who probably wouldn't say hello unless Johnson told him to. And Rusk was saying, "The Communist apparatus is very busy at this (anti-war activity) all over the world and in our own country. But I do not mean to say that all of those who have objections to the war in Viet Nam are communists. Most important, Communist movement is working very hard at this."

This was diplomatically McCarthy. McCarthy could have saved his whole career with the soft delivery and "I do not mean to say" sentence structure that Rusk slipped us yesterday. The other point Rusk made is that he feels the net effect of peace demonstrations such as Saturday's is to prolong and shorten the war. He explained that he feels Hanoi is not sophisticated enough to understand that the demonstrations are not a sign that we are ready to quit.

Here he took you into the subtleties and cloudiness of the war. The thought that he's right, and that a parade such as Saturday's could cost the lives of some of our kids someday, causes you to throw up. But at the same time, Viet Nam has had continual fighting since 1941. And our own fighting in there was well underway two years ago when the Secretary McNamara was finally admitting it was going to be a long war, a long time before peace demonstrations in any numbers got into the streets.

It is all very nice of Rusk to lay all this trouble onto the people legitimately disagreeing with the government. All of this goes into the general, end-all argument which never seems to provide an alternative or a workable answer to Viet Nam. The specific point about Saturday's demonstration was that it was immense and that it was comprised of the type of people who voted for Lyndon Johnson. You can disagree with the demonstrators. So can the administration, but Lyndon Johnson should have enough respect for the people who voted for him not to let statements saying the FBI is watching them because they are part of a Communist plot.
